## Lady Broncos go 3-1 at Harper Tourney

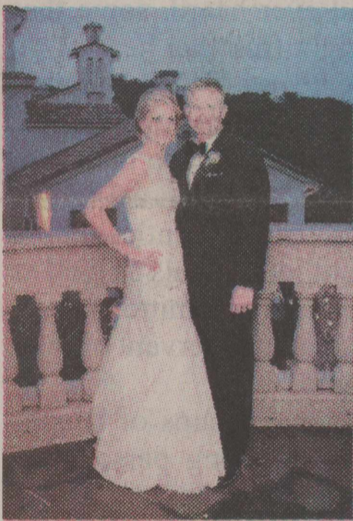
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The Sonora Lady Broncos had success at the Harper Tournament by defeating Blanco (88-45) and teams from Kerrville Tivy (67-37) and Fredericksburg (73-45). Sonora, Harper and Leakey (62-71) all finished the tourney at 3-1 with Sonora taking 3rd place. In the first game, TGCA #1 ranked Leakey defeated Sonora. Kylie Love lead the Lady Broncos with 27 points (11 of 12 from the free throw line) and pulled down 15 rebounds. Gracie Dozier had 10 points, Katie Hartman delivered at point guard with 6 assists while Tyler Hampton held tough in the paint with 10 boards.

Next up was Blanco (that defeated Leakey) and the Sonora team rolled to an 88-45 victory. Kylie scoed 33 and secured 13 rebounds. Gracie played a nice all round game with 21 points, 6 assists and 5 steals and Tyler Hampton had a double-double with 15 points and 10 rebounds. Zella Powers had a very productive game with 8 points and 9 rebounds. Cip Tobias helped the reservers with a 3 pointer and 4 rebounds.

Next up was the big team from Tivy (67-37) with Gracie hitting 22 points mainly from passes from the 'general' Katie Hartman (8 assists). Jill Buitron had 4 points and Naomi Dozier had her 1st of two games with 5 rebounds each. In the final game of the tourney, Sonora defeated Fredericksburg 73-45. Kylie Love again was unstoppable with 30 points, Gracie and Tyler both had 12 points each and JoJo Gutierrez had 8 points on 6 shots. Janelle Vasquez had a sweet three and finished with 5 points and 3 steals. Kylie Love was all-tourney.

Earlier in the week the Sonora Lady Broncos JV team remained undefeated with a 31-30 victory over Harper. Sky Jennings led the offense with 2 threes and Brianna Jarratt sparked the defensive effort. Next up for the Lady Broncos is Iraan Tuesday 12/10 in Sonora and then The Bank & Trust Sonora Basketball Tournament December 12-14 with 52 games in 3 days featuring both boys and girls varsity teams and boys and girls JV teams from 1A to 4A and from Midland to Llano.

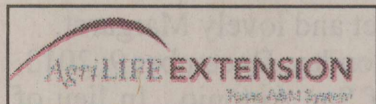
## Players in Progress: PIPs Giving Kids a Headstart On Basketball

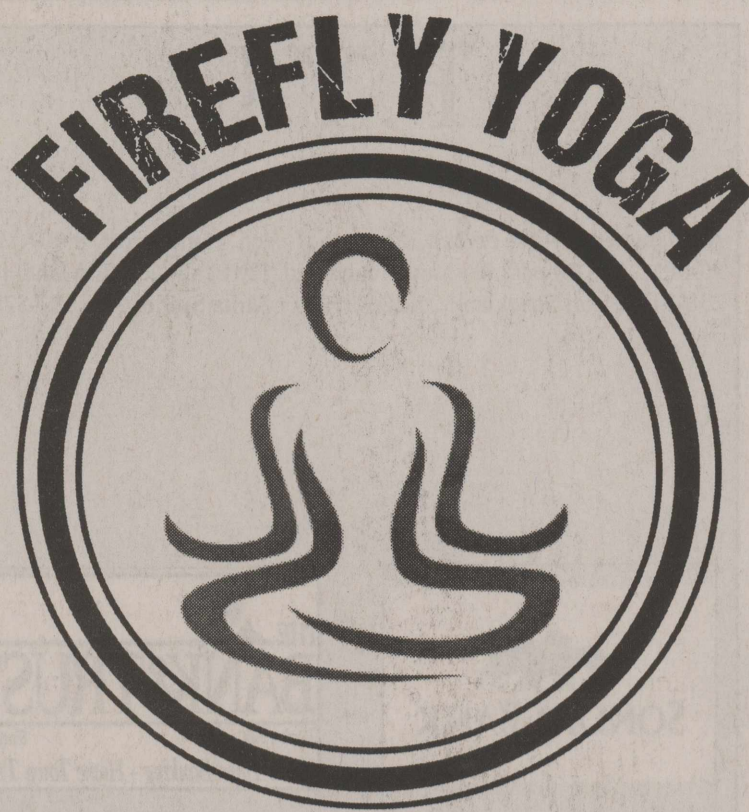

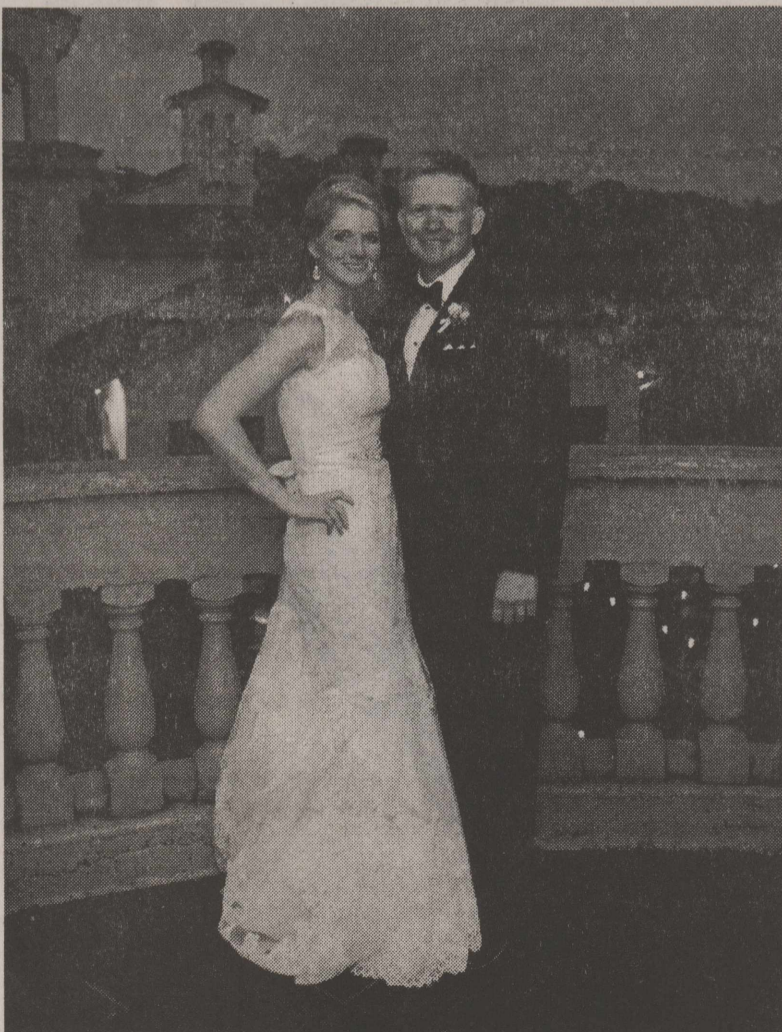

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## Does Cold Weather Reduce Insects?

It's not even winter yet, but it seems like we've had our share of cold days already. So does the cold spell mean fewer insects next year? Maybe or maybe not. Insects have a variety of methods for surviving the coldness of winter. Many insects can gain shelter and nourishment through the winter in a variety of micro-habitats. Among these niches are under the soil, inside the wood of logs and trees, and even in plant galls. Many large wasps seek shelter in the eaves and attics of houses or barns. Tree holes, leaf litter, under logs and rocks are common shelters for overwintering adult insects. Honey bees stay in hives during the winter, and form clusters when temperatures fall. They also are able to raise the temperature by vibrating wing muscles. Here are other strategies:

**Migration** is one strategy for escaping the killing temperatures. The Monarch Butterfly is the foremost example of this maneuver, but other insects migrate into northern areas from the southern states in the spring.

**Overwintering as Larvae.** Many insects successfully pass the winter as immature larvae. The protection of heavy covers of leaf litter or similar shelters protect the woolly bear caterpillar, while other insects replace the water in their bodies with glycerol, a type of antifreeze! Some grubs simply burrow deeper into the soil to escape the cold.

**Overwintering as Nymphs.** Not many insects are active in the winter, but the nymphs of dragonflies, mayflies and stoneflies live in water. They feed actively and grow all winter to emerge as adults in early spring.

**Overwintering as Eggs.** Lesser numbers of insects lay eggs which survive the winter. The most prominent insects in this category are Praying Mantids, and the destructive Corn Rootworms also engage in this strategy.

**Overwintering as Pupae.** Some insects overwinter in the pupal stage, then emerge as adults in the spring. Moths in the Silkworm Family, Saturniidae, may be found attached to food plant branches as pupae in the winter.

**Hibernation as Adults.** Many insects hibernate as adults. Lady bird beetles are a well-known example. Insects that are inactive during the winter months undergo a state in which their growth, development, and activities are suspended temporarily, with a metabolic rate that is high enough to keep them alive. This dormant condition is termed diapause.

In spite of winter's cold, insects are able to cause problems in the spring. That is because we usually don't have cold enough weather to dramatically impact insect populations. The only time winter temperatures become significant is when temperatures stay below 32 degrees F for five to seven days in a row. However, cold weather is important because it limits insect development and stresses the insect population.

## Game Warden Field Notes

### •Neighborhood Watch

A warden received a call from Bell County dispatch from a witness who saw someone in a vehicle shoot a deer in a new subdivision in Temple, load it up and leave the scene. As soon as the operator said the street names, the warden recognized the location as his neighborhood. In fact, he jogs there at night. When he responded, the warden met with the person who made the complaint and was given a license plate number for a vehicle registered in Williamson County. The plates also matched with a hunting license held by someone living around the corner from where the deer was shot. The warden went to the house, located the subject and found a doe in a shed in his yard. The man confessed that he and his uncle had shot the deer. During the interview, the man said, "Yeah, I hope we didn't get you out of bed! I knew you lived around the corner and me and my uncle had the conversation before we left that it might not be a good idea because the game warden lives right around the corner!" Several deer and weapons seized, and multiple citations issued.

### •You Can Run, But You Can't Hide

A Gillespie County game warden received a call from a landowner who had a photo of two unknown hunters standing over a dead deer under his game feeder. The warden found drag marks and blood evidence leading through two other properties. After spending the day knocking on doors and meeting with other landowners, the warden found the subject's residence, or former residence. The warden spoke to the suspect's mother and found out that the suspects had moved back to Alabama two days after the deer was shot. The warden then contacted the Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources for assistance. Alabama wardens interviewed the suspects and secured the evidence. The meat will be donated to a needy family in Baldwin County, Ala. Cases pending.

### •Ruger's Nose, Knows

Two game wardens received a call in southern Travis County regarding possible hunting without landowner consent. When the wardens arrived, they found a truck pulled off the road near a construction site and decided to wait until the owner returned. Hours later, the subject had someone drop him off at his vehicle. When confronted, he admitted digging for artifacts and fishing without landowner's consent. The subject had numerous prior drug charges and seemed to be very nervous during the interview. One of the wardens ran police dog Ruger around the truck and he alerted outside the driver's door. Ruger then searched inside the vehicle and reacted to the sunglasses compartment where less than two ounces of marijuana was found. Numerous citations issued. Cases pending.
