City Council Approves New **Ordinance:** No More Texting And Driving In Sonora

The City Council approved an ordinance that makes it unlawful for a person to use a wireless communication device to view, send or create and electronic message while operating a motor vehicle upon a roadway with the city. the City Council took the ordinance into consideration in response to concerns form city residents. The ordinance sets standards that prohibit texting within city limits.

Tee Ball Baseball is for boys and girls 4-6 years old who want to learn the fundamentals of hitting and fielding. In Tee Ball, players hit a ball off a batting tee.
