## Hawk Speed Equals Bronco Loss

It is not often that the speed of one opposing player has such an impact on the outcome of a football game. Wall's speedy Kris Gutierrez scored two of Wall's three touchdowns and made the defensive play of the game. If the Hawk fans are dishonest with themselves, their season depends on the health of senior running back Gutierrez.

On a cool, windy Friday night at Bronco Stadium, Wall kicked off to the Broncos.

One first down came on a run by Brett Castillo and another on an Andres Acevedo bubble screen to Noah San Miguel. Then the Broncos fumbled the ball that Wall recovered.

Wall took over at the Bronco 41 yard line. From the first defensive Bronco play until the last one, the Hawks knew that gaining yardage against the Broncos would not be easy.

The first time the Hawks ran Gutierrez on the option pitch, Ethan Patlan and Gabe Rollert

were ready for him. The next time Gutierrez got the ball, Castillo met him in the backfield and tackled him for a loss. Lee Deleon then sacked the Wall QB for a loss ending the drive.

The Broncos went three and out on their second possession. The Hawks got the ball on their 41-yard line after an Acevedo rugby style kick that went 36 yards into the wind. Gutierrez, the fastest player on the field, got the first Wall TD on the option pitch. At 2:10 in the first quarter, Wall took a 7-0 lead.

The Broncos got their only score of the game at the 9:43 mark of the second quarter. The Broncos used seven running plays and one pass. The drive covered 73 yards on eight plays and lasted 4:27. Rollert caught a pass from Acevedo for a 26-yard reception. Castillo took the ball up the middle for the ten yard score. Hunter Hughes' kick banged off the left upright. The scoreboard read 7 to 6 in favor of Wall.

The Hawks scored their second touchdown on an eight-play 59-yard drive. Clint Masters, a 205-pound fullback, had most of the carries up the middle. With the Broncos concentrating on stopping Masters, Gutierrez once again took the option pitch. He raced untouched (and uncatchable due to his speed) for the Hawks' score. Their PAT was good and Wall led 14 to 6.

The Broncos threatened to score with time running out in the first half. Acevedo's long pass to San Miguel in the end zone was incomplete. At the half, the score was Wall 14 and Sonora 6.

The only points scored in the second half came at the 9:49 mark in the third quarter. The Hawk kick returner took the opening kickoff to their 44-yard line. Five running plays later, Wall scored its third and final touchdown as Masters

A dedicated wife, devoted mother, doting grandmother, and dear friend, she was preceded in death by her mother, Martha and loving stepfather, William "Willie" Miers, her father, Andrew Moore and step mother, Nellie, and half-brother, Andy Moore. Jodie was born November 5, 1928, in Austin, Texas. Jodie attended Sonora High School and the Hockaday School in Dallas before graduating from Austin High School. She went on to receive a degree in Home Economics from the University of Texas at Austin where she was involved in intramural sports and won the campus wide posture contest. While at UT, Jodie made many life-long friends as a member of the Delta Gamma sorority. Jodie met Lawrence Finklea in the spring of 1951 and they married on August 14, 1952 at the historic Burton Parish Episcopal Church in Colonial Williamsburg, Virginia. ## AgriLife Specialist: Need to recycle water? 'Give the ground first shot at it'

TEMPLE — The key to solving some of Texas' water shortage problems may be as simple as teaching homeowners and cities how to efficiently and cleanly return wastewater to the ground, according to a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Specialist. "To me, having a long-term positive impact on our water supply is to put the treated effluent back in the ground safely," said Dr. Anish Jantrania, AgriLife Extension specialist, Temple. "And if cities and towns start doing that, it will stabilize the groundwater supply because you're putting millions of gallons back in the ground. And the ground holds water a lot longer than reservoirs." Jantrania is the new wastewater specialist at the Blackland Research and Extension Center in Temple. His emphasis, according to his website bio, will be to develop "a statewide AgriLife Extension education and research program related to surface and groundwater quality protection, with specific emphasis on non-

point sources and other environmental issues." His appointment is 70 percent AgriLife Extension, and 30 percent Texas A&M AgriLife Research. Although Jantrania is new to Texas A&M AgriLife, he has more than 25 years of experience working in the wastewater industry, both in public and private sectors, with a focus on on-site sewage facilities and home septic systems, according to his vitae. Before coming to Texas, Anish has worked in Virginia, Massachusetts and West Virginia. He received his bachelor's from Udaipur University, India in 1982, a master's from Ohio State University in 1985 and a doctorate from Clemson University in 1989 — all in agricultural engineering. He also earned a master's in business administration from West Virginia University in 1993. Jantrania said that conservation methods such as rainwater harvesting are good, and he'll be working to promote those efforts too, but conventional conservation measures only go so far when there's no rain.

"The current infrastructure is dependent upon rain," he said. "Lakes, reservoirs and groundwater supplies are all dependent upon rain. Whatever is happening in nature, the rainfall pattern is changing." There are options, such as pumping water in from other sources and desalination, but currently they are very expensive, though research is ongoing to find ways to lower the cost. "Conservation is always step No. 1, and the second thing is reuse or multiuse," he said. Imagine, Jantrania said, a typical water cycle of a city. If the city is drawing water from wells or from a reservoir, it is using most of it only once. Some water is used to irrigate lawns and athletic fields, and may quickly return to the watershed, but much of it is treated and then released into a river or stream. "The water will go down the stream, hit the bay, and it may or may not come back in the form of rain to the same city; that's the natural hydrological cycle," he said. "But what if you can

keep the water where it's being used more effectively and efficiently?" He said there are different ways to do this, including treatment plants using several levels of filtering and disinfection, which involve high-energy and operation costs. "But with the proper soil, technology and management, the same disinfection and cleaning can be done at a fraction of the cost. This is what small private septic systems and large decentralized systems can do," Jantrania said. Jantrania will be working with homeowners, landowners and municipalities to make better use of what water they have, he said. He will also be involved in developing training programs for homeowners in better managing their home aerobic and trench-style septic systems. He also plans to be involved in research for other means of reclaiming water.

## Ranch Financial Planning Focus of Extension Workshop

For some time now, ranchers have faced persistent drought, reduced livestock numbers, and high agriculture production costs. The saving grace has been that cattle, sheep, and goat markets have been strong. However, to remain in business, sound business and financial decisions are a must.

To that end, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service will be offering an educational program on September 25 at the Crockett County Convention Center. A group of savvy experts will cover topics that are very important when making business and financial decisions to ensure a safe and prosperous future. Registration is at 8:30 a.m. and the program begins at 9.

Topics for the day include Oil and Gas Lease Negotiation Tips and Pipeline Regulations presented by Dr. Tiffany Dowell, Extension Specialist Ag Law. The second topic is titled "Insuring the Future" and presented by Dr. Wayne Hayenga, Extension Specialist. It will discuss estate planning for ranchers.

The third speaker is Extension Economist Bill Thompson who will discuss "Livestock Production Budget Analysis and Comparisons".

the ball was fumbled prior to crossing the goal line resulting in a touchback. Possession went to the Hawks. The rest of the game was a defensive struggle and neither team scored again.

Acevedo completed five of 14 passes for 83 yards. He had one interception.

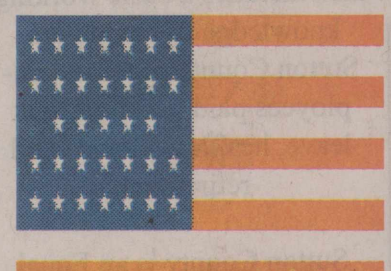
San Miguel had two receptions for 31 yards. Hughes, Rollert and Gus Barrera each had one reception.

**Proposition Number 1 (SJR 1)**

SJR 1 would authorize the transfer of certain money from the general revenue fund to the state highway fund and the economic stabilization fund. Money transferred to the state highway fund may be used solely for the construction, maintenance and acquisition of rights-of-way for public roadways.

The proposed amendment will

appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the use and dedication of certain money transferred to the state highway fund to assist in the completion of transportation construction, maintenance, and rehabilitation projects, not to include toll roads."

**Hon. Pedro Gomez Graduates From the Texas College for Judicial Studies**

Honorable Pedro Gomez, Judge of the 112th District Court in Ozona, Texas, was part of the 2014 graduating class of the Texas College for Judicial Studies in Austin, Texas, from May 5-9, 2014. Judge Gomez will be recognized at the 2014 Annual Judicial Education Conference in September for his commitment to obtaining judicial education.

The Texas College for Judicial Studies is a multi-year program designed to provide additional educational opportunities to judges who desire to improve their adjudication skills and acquire more knowledge in their jurisdictional specialization. The College consists of a core curriculum of 16 hours and a specialty curriculum of 27 hours. To receive a certificate of completion, judges must complete the core curriculum plus 27 hours in their selected specialty jurisdiction, for a total of 43 hours. Judges can obtain the training within three years, but may take up to five years to complete the College. Only courses taken from the College will be applied towards graduation.

The College is offered by The Texas Center for the Judiciary, a nonprofit corporation whose purpose is to provide outstanding judicial education to Texas judges so that a qualified and knowledgeable judiciary and court staff may administer justice with fairness, efficiency, and integrity. Since its creation on January 1, 1973, the Texas Center has served as the primary source of judicial education for all appellate, district court, statu-

tory county court, probate, associate and retired and former judges who hear cases by assignment.

"Texas judges who complete to course requirements of the Texas College for Judicial Studies show a commitment and dedication to obtaining the highest level of judicial

education available," said Texas Center Executive Director Judge Mark D. Atkinson. "We are therefore very proud of each and every one of these judges, and are confident that their learning and knowledge will benefit the people of the great State of Texas."

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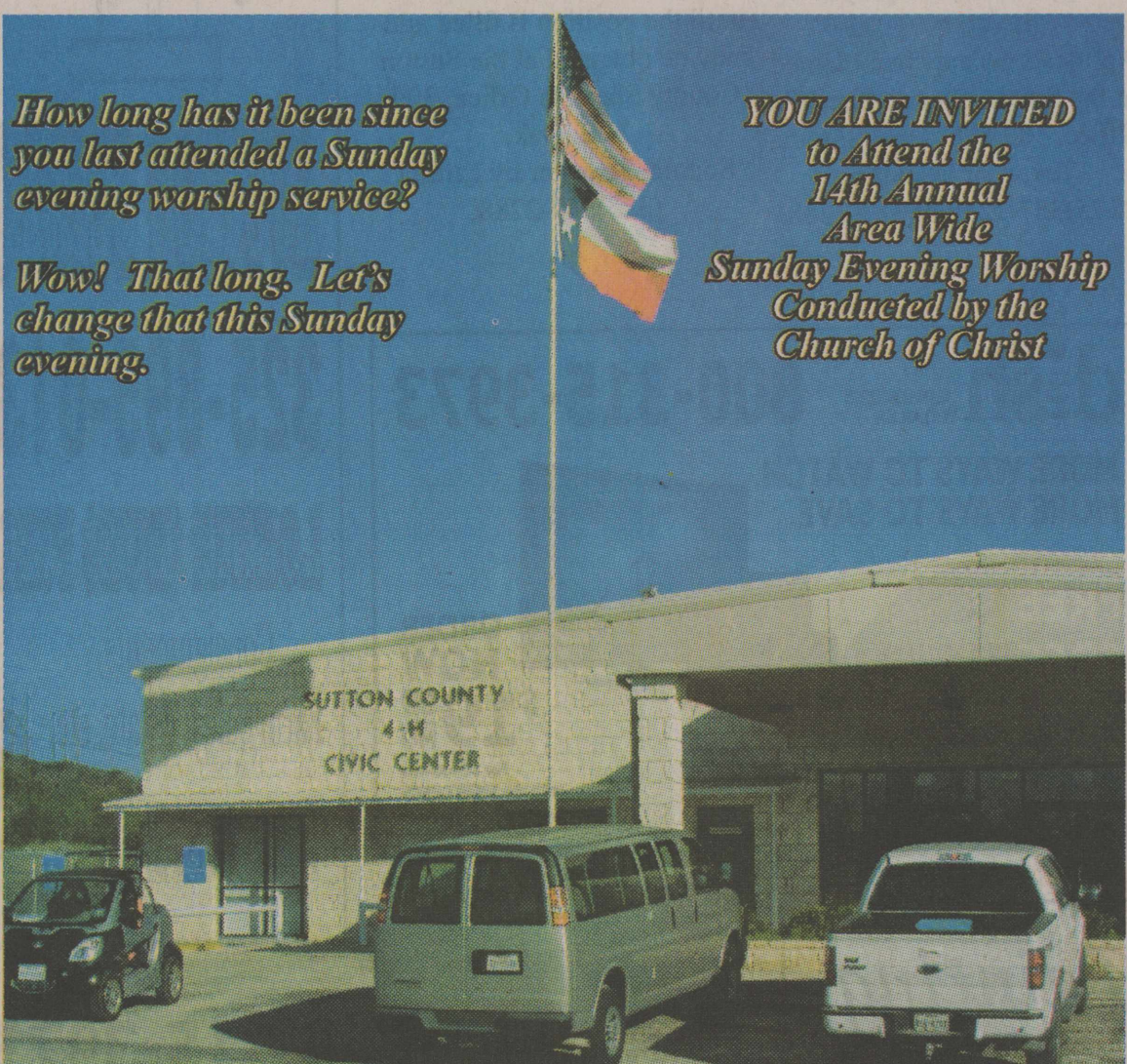
