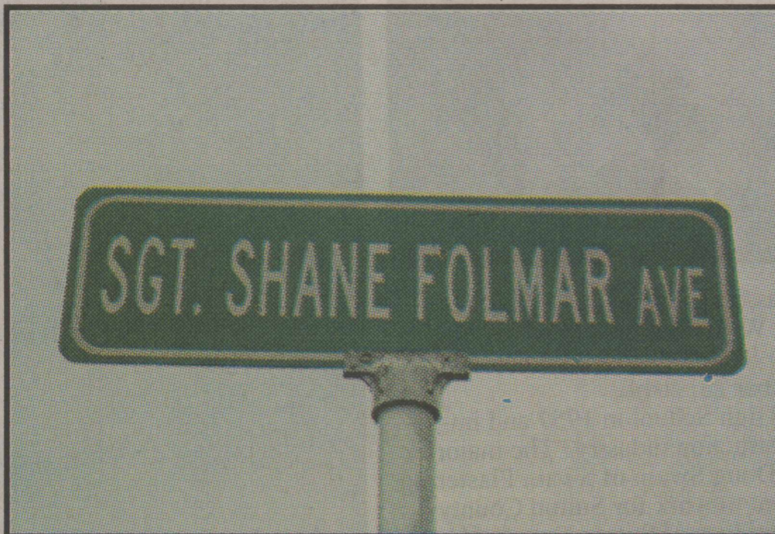

Shane's Road



"As I stand at the beginning of my path where do set my eyes? To look down the road is to ignore the hazards of the present, but to focus on the present is to lose sight of the future. I choose to simply walk, and let the road connect the man I am to the man I am destined to be."

All life is lived in the space between the connection of two points. We live in that span of time that exists in-between birth and death, but we measure the value of that life on things such as: success and failure, mediocrity and fame, poor and rich. The simple truth though is that each of us spend too much time obsessing about those specific points.

We either look with ambition towards the future, or with regret we dwell on the past. As children all we want to do is grow up, but as adults we all dream about being a child again. Our jobs drive us towards goals that when achieved are simply replaced by loftier ones. Since our society rewards success by the acquisition of achievements, is it any surprise that in our grief we only look at death. This is no way to measure the value of one's life.

It's time to change. It's time to step back and look at what connects all of us together, because in the end that is all that really matters. Connection is life, and to see it that way is to live the way God intended

us to. All of us do live our lives in the space between two points. Both those two points are not birth and death; they are birth and everlasting life. If you live your life by focusing on the connections you make rather than what you have achieved, then your life becomes a road without end.

This is your road but it is up to you to decide what your destination will be. This is the road to salvation, redemption, and acceptance. This is the same road that bears the name of one of Sonora's own sons. This is Shane's Road.

It has been nine years since he died on the field of battle, but Sonora still remembers and honors that sacrifice. This September 24, 2014 Sonora erected a sign that carries Shane's name. When we asked those that new him best what he would have thought about the dedication, they responded in the same way that Shane might have. They had few words to speak, but those words were important. Tammy Tidwell commented that, "He would have probably been a little embarrassed

about all the attention, but after a second or two I think he would get that smile on his face."

It doesn't take you very long after talking to his friends and family to realize two very important things about Shane. First, he was quiet and second, he was a loyal and good friend.

Childhood friend Josh Hopkins commented that, "If you were his friend...you were his friend. It's hard to say it in words, but if you knew Shane you would know what I mean. That's just the nature of Shane. He was more than a Marine, he was my best friend."

Shane's family and friends were all on hand to witness the unveiling of his sign, and while it helps heal the loss that our community has suffered, it by no means closes the book on his life's road.

Shane's road is one of redemption, salvation, sacrifice, and finally acceptance. His road took him from Sonora to Afghanistan and finally back home again. While the road that bears his name is finally finished, the road that bears his life continues on. It continues through us, and how we choose to live our lives. His was a life well lived, and he did live it in the space between two points. Both those two points were birth and everlasting life. It is only fitting then, that the sign that bears his name has a perfect view of the flag he loved so much.

Editors Note-While sitting down to write this story I quickly realized that it was much more than the naming of a street, or honoring a Marine. We have had a flood of calls, emails, pictures, and stories about Shane. Greyhounds Nip The Broncos

When the 2014 football schedule was released, I predicted that the Broncos would be 2 and 3 after the non-district games were finished. I based my prediction on the strength of Denver City, Wall, and Boerne. Denver City and Wall finished last season with a combined record of 26 and 2. A University of Tennessee quarterback recruit leads the Greyhounds, a 4A school. While I expected that the Broncos would not be able to beat these larger opponents, I was very pleased and excited by how close the games were, and, in fact, all of them came very close to being Bronco wins.

Santi Garza took the opening kickoff and returned it about 20 yards. Andres Acevedo faked the dive handoff to Elijah Cross, pulled the ball out, and ran for a first down. After two running plays gained only two yards, Acevedo rolled to his right. He twirled and threw a throw

back screen to Brett Castillo who gained enough for another first down. A very promising opening drive ended when Acevedo was stripped of the ball after a nice gain on the mid line keeper.

Boerne took over at their 25-yard line. Quenten Dormady opened with three complete passes for good yardage. They tried a running play that the Broncos stuffed. Then he threw a quick pass to his right that went for a touchdown. Pop Quiz: when is a touchdown not a touchdown? Went it is called back for holding! The holding penalty only delayed the Greyhounds five plays. Dormady hit his wide receiver, Finch, for a 22-yard touchdown. Their PAT kick was good, and they led 7 to 0 with 8:55 left in the first quarter.

The Broncos next drive lasted six plays before a fourth down pass to Hunter Hughes

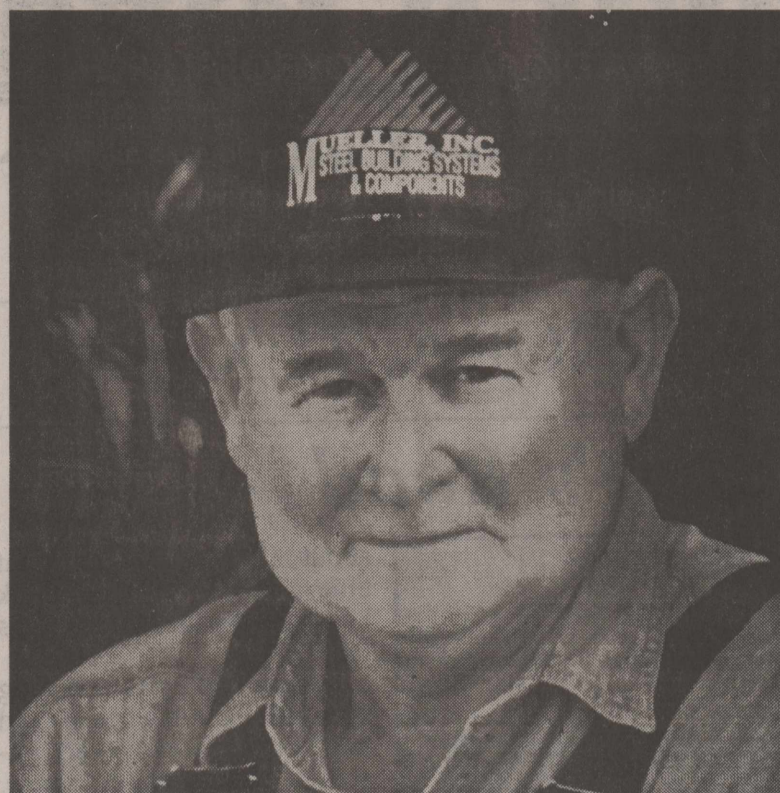

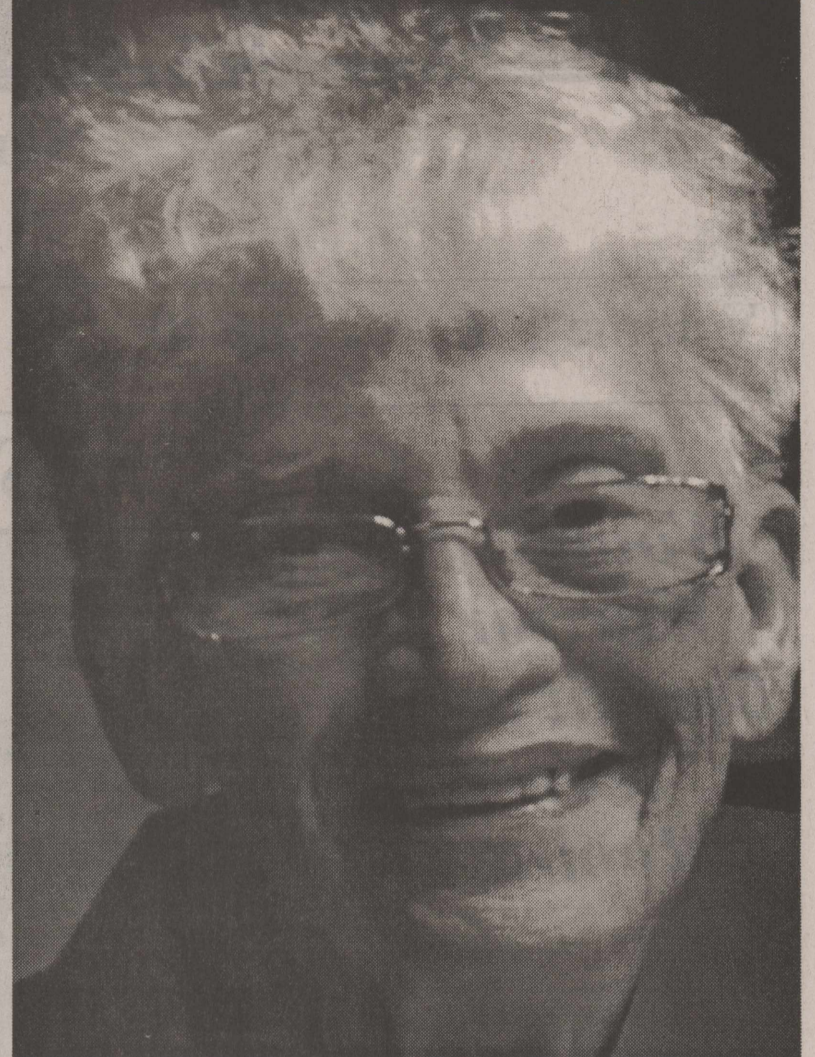

James graduated from Lake View High School in 1957 and immediately went to work in the construction industry. The majority of his time was spent working for Doug Swain of Swain Plastering Company. After retirement, he went to work for Sutton County helping to maintain the roads and bridges of Sutton County. Upon his second retirement, he moved back to his hometown of San Angelo.

SAN ANGELO ~ Dorothy May Green Harrell was the first-born child of William Tom Green and Betty Brown Green in Ft. Stockton, Texas on September 23, 1928. She grew up in Ft. Stockton, Big Lake, and Tennyson, Texas as her father worked as a painter.

In the mid 1930's, the family settled in Tennyson, Texas and leased/bought different partials of land for farming and to raise some stock. Butter, eggs, milk and vegetables from the farm were sold to the neighbors for income. Dorothy's mother and brother were Postmasters of Tennyson. She eloped to marry E. L. (Joe Ed) Harrell on November 24, 1945 in Robert Lee, Texas. They lived in Tennyson and then Plata where her husband worked for the railroad. They returned to Tennyson while Joe Ed worked road construction out of Bronte. Then they moved to Sonora, Texas in 1948 as her husband had hired on with the Sutton County Road Dept. Their first son, Gary Harrell, was born in San Angelo in 1950. Their second child, Karen Harrell Davis, was born in 1955 in Sonora. Dorothy's husband was promoted to County Road Superintendent and they moved into the "County" house where they lived until Joe Ed passed away at the age of 74 on Friday the 13th, January 1989. Dorothy ran the household on a 'tight' budget and also helped her husband coordinate work from the field by operating the base unit 2- way radio. She also babysat friend's children after school and did some sewing for the public. In later years, Dorothy very much enjoyed traveling with her daughter and son-in-law and her lady friends to places like Colorado, Vegas, Branson, and as always, her cabin on the Devil's River. Dorothy played bridge and helped her neighbors by driving them to appointments and taking them her home cooked meals. She liked to mow her own yard and kept a flowerbed that not only had flowers but also a few vegetables. Her dog, Cujo, was a great companion and she enjoyed her walks with him. She attended the Presbyterian Church of the Good Shepherd. At age 76 Dorothy broke her hip but was determined to recuperate fully and stay independent, which she did, although she did give in and purchase a riding lawnmower.

Those who took the time to know Dorothy learned what a kind, generous, loving person she was. She was with her brother and then later her father when they were sick and passed away at their home. Dorothy was preceded in death by her husband, E. L. Harrell; parents, Tom and Betty Green and brother, William Jessie Green of Tennyson. She is survived by her sister, Grace Ditmore of Robert Lee; son, Gary Harrell and wife Donna of Caldwell; daughter, Karen Harrell Davis and husband Bob of San Antonio; three grandchildren, Kellie, Trisha and Les, several great-grandchildren and several great-great grandchildren.

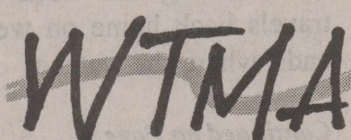

Get Into The Hog Out

Sutton County will once again try for the Texas Hog Out Program. The Program is designed to encourage counties across the State of Texas to make a concentrated and coordinated effort to reduce the feral hog population and the damage caused by these animals during the three month period of September 1, 2014 through November 30, 2014.

Through this program, the highest ranking counties will receive assistance to continue local activities which may range from educating the landowners on abatement methods, coordinating trapping and hunting programs, to conducting aerial gunning and addressing public safety hazards related to feral hogs.

To be eligible for an award under the Program, the applicant must be a Texas county. The county must have or develop a method to accurately track the number of feral hogs taken in the county during the period of September 1, 2014 through November 30, 2014. Counties that have received, or are currently receiving, grant funds from TDA for feral hog abatement are eligible to receive another award in 2014; however, results submitted in the application must not be funded by a TDA grant or related matching funds, if applicable.

TDA will make awards after all applications are processed. Grant funds will be available on a cost reimbursement basis for county use on feral hog abatement expenditures during the grant term. A total of \$90,000 is available for this funding opportunity. TDA anticipates making 8 awards ranging from \$20,000 to \$5,000 each.

Applications will be evaluated on the following criterion:
1) Number of feral hogs taken in the county, as certified by the county.
2) Number of individuals participating in county-approved educational courses addressing feral hog abatement technologies, as certified by the county.
3) Written narrative describing future activities.

Please support the effort by turning in hog tails at the Sonora Woolhouse and by attending educational programs such as the one on October 28th in Sonora and November's Game Dinner. For more information, contact the AgriLife Extension Office in Sutton County.

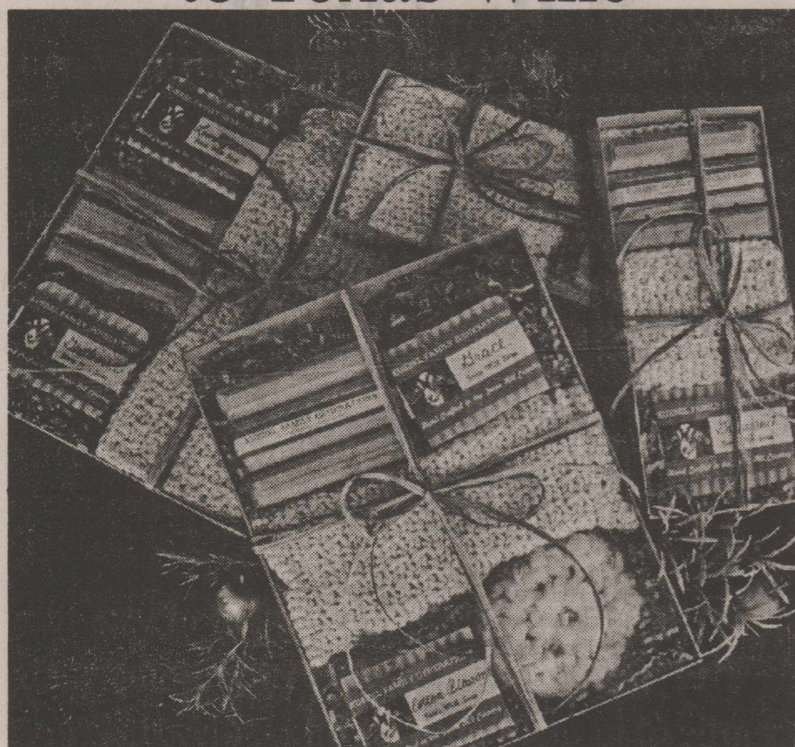

fell incomplete. The Greyhounds started their drive near midfield. (Since I video from field level, I can't always tell exactly what the actual yard line is.) On the first play, Dormady was forced to scramble. Getting ready for college football, he practiced his slide technique to avoid getting hit at the end of his 15-yard run. After his first down run, the Broncos showed blitz and they tried to run. The run went nowhere. Three incomplete passes later, the Broncos took over.

Castillo, Brian Garcia, and Acevedo continued to run the ball from the usual under center formation and from the spread formation. The heavens opened and a slow, steady rain started. Facing a fourth and short deep in their end of the field, the Broncos went for it. Garcia went into the pile and everybody had to wait until the sticks determined that the Broncos had made the first down. Sid Anderson burst through a huge hole opened by HL James and Ethan Patlan. Ten yards into his run, Anderson was spun around by a defender. He finished the unintended 360, kept his balance, and was finally caught and pushed down inside the Greyhound's red zone. A Bronco holding penalty took away some of the run, but the Broncos were still in Boerne's end of the field at their 40-yard line. Kevin Martinez got his first carry that was good for five yards. Anderson followed up with an outside run back into their red zone. Acevedo lost his helmet on a run up the middle. Hughes came in as quarterback and handed off to Castillo up the middle. A Boerne penalty gave the Broncos a first and goal near the nine-yard line. Castillo, the second man through, was tackled just short at the one-yard line. James, Patlan, Lionel DeLeon, and Liam Yourgalite moved the Boerne line enough for Acevedo to score on the quarterback sneak. Hughes kicked the PAT, and the game was tied at 7 with 7:46 left in the first half.

Boerne moved the ball with

great difficulty the rest of the first half. When they completed passes, the Broncos quickly tackled them for very few yards after the catch. With time running out, Boerne tried a field goal. It hit the cross bar and bounced backwards - no good.

With time running out, the Broncos moved the ball past midfield before losing the ball on a fumble by Castillo. I watched my video in slow motion. He was carrying the ball in his right hand. As a defender was closing in, he shifted the ball to his left hand and tried to stiff arm the defender. But the impact of the tackler caused the ball to slip from his left hand before he could really get a good hold on the ball.

Boerne drove down the field and once again was in field goal range. Patlan blocked the kick, and the half ended tied at 7.

The Broncos kicked off to start the second half. Sticking "to what brought them," the Greyhounds can out passing from the spread. Martinez and Anderson made the receivers, who did manage to catch the balls, pay. On one play, Gabe Rollert, Jared Willey, and Anderson rode a receiver to ground for a short gain. The Broncos had success with the blitz as Martinez and Jonathan Gutierrez sacked Dormady for a loss. After that loss, Dormady pooch punted and pinned the Broncos deep in their territory at the Bronco eight-yard line.

Boerne loaded the box, and the Broncos were unable to run for a first down. Acevedo got the Broncos out of the bad field position with a 57-yard punt.

The Broncos kept the Greyhounds from making any significant progress for seven plays. Then they got a nice run after catch from their best receiver. At the end of the run, the official threw a flag. I have watched the video in slow motion, and I can't see anything wrong. Boerne scored a touchdown on a run. Their kick was good, and they led 14 to 7 with 5:07 left in the

third. After a short kickoff, Garza had to retreat to pick up the wet ball. He was tackled at the 16-yard line. On the first play, the Broncos fumbled and the Greyhounds recovered. The Bronco defense stepped up and stopped them cold. I guess they figured three times a charm as they attempted another field goal. He missed and the Broncos took over making the lost fumble a non-event.

The Greyhound run defense in the second half was awesome. On the second play of the drive, Acevedo handed off to Anderson who ran to his right. A Boerne defender put his helmet on the ball, and it (the ball, not his head) dropped to the ground. Acevedo picked it up and ran to his left. He spotted Rollert and tossed him the ball. Rollert was able to run far enough for a first down. Sonora got another first down on four running plays with the last being a quarterback sneak. Acevedo dropped back to pass, and finding no open receivers, ran for 14 yards and a first down near the Greyhound 30 yard line. After three runs by Anderson and Garcia gained nothing, Acevedo ran five times in a row. The last one was for a two-yard touchdown. When the snap was mishandled, Noah SanMiguel rolled to his right and tried to complete a pass to Rollert. The pass fell incomplete, and the score was Boerne 14 and Sonora 13 with 8:51 left in the third. That scoring drive covered 80 yards on 14 plays and it lasted 7:29.

The Broncos tried an on-sides kick that Boerne recovered. The Greyhounds went to work throwing and moving the chains. It looked like the Hounds were going to increase their lead. Facing third and four, Dormody threw over the middle to his favorite receiver. The ball bounced off of his hands into the hands of Rollert who was able to make a NFL reviewable interception. The Broncos took over at the 20-yard line after the touchdown.

On the third play, the Broncos luck at dodging bullets finally ran out. After the ball was snapped, Anderson and Acevedo were too far apart as they approached the point where Acevedo had to decide to hand it off or to keep it. The play was doomed and the ball hit the ground. Boerne recovered.

Four plays later, Dormody finally found an open receiver for the touchdown. Their kick gave them an eight-point lead at 21 to 13 with 4:38 left in the game.

Both teams finished the game playing hard and neither scored again.

After the Open Week, the Broncos start district play by traveling to Grape Creek. The Eagles are two and two. The Colts will travel to Grape Creek while the JV will be at home.

The JV Broncos travelled to Boerne and came home with the 24-24 tie. With the Greyhounds leading 24-16, Jarrett Jackson lofted a half back pass to Isaiiah Lira in the end zone. The two-point play was good. The JV Bronco defense kept the Greyhounds from scoring with a four down goal line stand to secure the tie. The JV Broncos are 1-2-1 going into the Open Week. The team plays next at home on October 9th against the Grape Creek JV Eagles.

Like all Bronco fans, I would like to see all Bronco teams go undefeated. It has happened four times in Bronco history. Conventional wisdom supports the idea that a tough loss to a "better" team is better than a blowout over a cupcake. I certainly don't see college football teams benefiting from their 70 to nothing cupcake wins. With that said, here is my prediction for the rest of the season. Assuming no more crucial injuries, I would lay even odds that the Broncos will have six consecutive "easy" wins. After these wins, the Broncos will be in the Area round of the playoffs and the playoffs are always unpredictable.
