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Sutton County Thanks Judge Carla Garner For Her Years of Service

Sutton County has been blessed with the leadership of one woman. Judge Carla Garner, will retire after 30 years of service.

Judge Garner graduated from Sonora in the mid 1960's. Judge Garner attended North Texas State University in Denton. She moved back to Sonora in the mid 1980's and went to work for Judge Charles Sherrill. In 1985, Judge Sherrill took a position in Kerrville, TX and Carla was appointed to fill his unexpired term. She has continued to hold this position for the past 30 years.

Judge Garner joined the Sutton County EMS as a volunteer in about 1988 and continued serving for over 20 years. She brought with her

a knowledge of organization and leadership. She became a certified instructor and began to educate and help organize a superior ambulance service. Influenced by this experience some of them went to get their paramedic certifications. In 2001, she was chosen by her peers (EMT's across Texas) as EMT of the year for the State of Texas. In 1988 the ambulance was manned by volunteers with minimal training, they did the best job they could. Today we have fully trained paramedics that answer your call for help. They continue to provide and improve their service by helping with the elderly and education for all emergency services in

Broncos Win District 4-3A Championship

Two years ago, Alpine beat Sonora on the last play of the game with a Hail Mary touchdown pass. They went on to win the district championship. Last year, Chance Campbell entered the game in the second half, rushed for over 200 yards, and helped Sonora win by a score of 43 to 33. Even though it was the first district game of the season, Alpine was the best of last year's district opponents, and the victory over Alpine made winning the district championship easy. This year, all of our district opponents look like cupcakes compared to the Broncos. With four wins and no losses, the Broncos have won the 2014 District Championship with one home game left to play.

I listened to the Alpine radio station during the pregame, and Mr. Sotello was very concerned about the Broncos' running attack and Elijah Cross in particular. He knew that Brett Castillo had rushed for 186 yards against Crane. For some reason, he didn't seem to know much about Andres Acevedo, as he kept talking about Acevedo as a converted tight end.

Alpine won the toss and deferred. Noah SanMiguel returned the opening kickoff 45 yards to mid-field. After Castillo and Cross had rushed for a first down, Acevedo kept the ball on the option. After about 30 yards, he was finally caught, but he still managed to drag the defenders to the six yard line. After Castillo made it to the three, Acevedo ran to his left and saw no one could stop him. He scored the first Bronco touchdown. The Broncos attempted the swinging gate, but the snap from Gabe Rollert was intercepted. Alpine returned it 95 yards for two points. The score was 6 to 2 with 9:29 left in the quarter.

The Bronco defense forced the Bucks to punt. The Broncos started on their 20 yard line. It took nine plays to cover the 80 yards for the next Bronco touchdown. Cross and Acevedo had the longest runs of this drive. Bryan Garcia got his first carries and gained good yardage on the option pitch. Acevedo picked up his secondary receiver and completed a pass to Gus Barrera

at the two yard line. Acevedo scored on the quarterback sneak. Hunter Hughes came to kick the PAT, but the Bucks jumped offsides. Coach Phillips decided to go for two, and Acevedo easily scored the two point conversion following his massive line of Ethan Patlan, HL James, and Lionel DeLeon. Sonora led 14 to 2 with 3:59 left in the first quarter.

Alpine went three and out. After the punt, Sonora fumbled and the Bucks recovered on the Broncos' 19 yard line. On their fourth play, Buck quarterback Daniel Rojo com-

pleted a seven yard touchdown pass to receiver Christian Morris. Their PAT kick was wide right, and the score stood at 14 to 8 with 1:40 left in the first quarter.

After a touchdown and two penalties, the Broncos were backed up near the Bucks' goal line. Acevedo kept the ball up the middle to the 22 yard line giving the Broncos some breathing room. Acevedo handed off to a Bronco runner, but the ball came out. Acevedo picked up the foot

JV Bronco Speed Takes Down Bucks

Last Thursday night was the last home game for the JV Broncos. They made their families and fans proud by defeating the Alpine JV Bucks 58-6 to get their fifth victory of the season.

The Bucks got the Netza Estrada kickoff and had a great return before Isaiah Lira closed and made the tackle at the Bronco 40. The Bucks made no further progress and punted. The ball went back to the visitors after Kade Creek fumbled on the first Sonora play from scrimmage. The Bucks took advantage and scored a quick six points. That was it for the Bucks' scoring. Juan Villaneuva broke through the line and sacked the quarterback to stop the two-point conversion.

The Broncos had an immediate response when Drew Buitron took the kickoff 75 yards for the score. The two-point conversion failed. At 6 minutes in the first quarter the score was tied 6-6.

The Bucks made one first down and then turned the ball over to Sonora. Two

plays later, Jose Hernandez took the ball 45 yards for the second Bronco touchdown. Jarrett Jackson made it look easy and got the two points around the right end of the Bronco line. At the end of the first quarter, the home team was up 14-6.

Alpine had to punt again and Sonora's Buitron scored again on the Creek pitch from the 45. Creek threw a bootleg pass to Lira in the end zone for the two-point play. Just like that, it was 22-6 at 9:41 in the second quarter.

Jackson took Alpine's next punt 70 yards for Sonora's fourth touchdown and caught the two-point play pass from Creek. Sonora 30 Alpine 6

On the next Alpine possession, after Bronco defender, Joseph Abshire blew up the Buck's play, Jackson intercepted the tipped pass, "lateralled it" to Hernandez for the quick score. Creek wasn't ready for the snap and he got sacked to stop the two-point play.

The Bucks didn't try to punt and the Broncos got the ball in Alpine's territory. On fourth down, Creek

completed a 25-yard touchdown pass to Lira. Rafael Mendoza got the call and bulled his way in for the two points. With 1:32 left in the half, the score was 44-6 Sonora.

The Broncos opened the second half with another Jackson touchdown. Creek kept the ball for the two-point play. At 8:14 in the third quarter, it was Sonora 52 Alpine 6.

The Broncos wore down the Bucks to make the game's final touchdown by alternating Christian Ramon and Henry Ramos carrying the ball. Grady Bush kept the ball for the touchdown on the midline push. The two-point pass play was no good. The JV Broncos take their four game winning streak on the road to Big Lake for the final game of the season. In Alpine, the 7th grade Colts won their third straight game 32-6. The 8th grade remains unbeaten. They won 22-16. The Colts will be playing at home against Reagan County Middle School teams on Thursday.

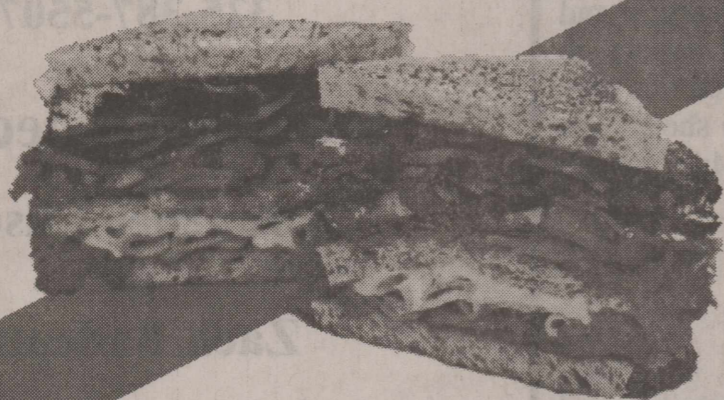

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ball and raced down the left side line. He was finally tackled at the three yard line after a 76 yard run. Sid Anderson scored on a three yard run. Hughes kicked the PAT, and the Broncos led 21 to 8 with two seconds left in the first quarter.

Alpine took the kickoff and drove to a first and goal. The Bronco defense held, and the Broncos took over on downs. The Broncos ran about ten plays before having to punt. The score at the end of the first half was 21 to 8 in favor of the Broncos.

The Bucks opened the second half with a ten play drive that covered 64 yards. The Broncos held, and they kicked a 19 yard field goal making the score 21 to 11 with 9:20 left in the third. The rest of the third quarter belonged to Cross. He scored on runs of five, 41, and 18 yard runs. Hughes kicked the PAT after each touchdown. The score at the end of three was 42 to 11.

In the fourth quarter, Rojo hit his receivers with some big plays. Alpine scored their second touchdown of the game on a 28 yard touchdown pass. Their next score came on a one play drive that covered 70 yards as Rojo hit Michaelis on the pump and go. The Sonora defender slipped

and fell giving receiver Michaelis an easy catch and run. With 3:59 left in the game, the Bucks had narrowed the score to 42 to 24.

Coach Phillips sent Acevedo back into the game. The Broncos used four plays and 1:33 to cover 65 yards for an insurance touchdown. The biggest gain came on the option pitch to Castillo who gained 40 yards to their 20 yard line. Castillo followed up with a nine yard run for the last Bronco touchdown.

The Bucks were not finished. They took the kick off and drove 68 yards in five plays for the last score of the game. They kicked the PAT, and the game ended with the Broncos winning 48 to 31.

While the Broncos only passed for 54 yards, the team had 521 yards of rushing. Three Broncos gained 452 of those rushing yards. Brett Castillo rushed sixteen times for 124 yards and one touchdown. Elijah Cross rushed ten times for 152 yards and three Bronco touchdowns. Quarterback Andres Acevedo kept the ball twelve times, gained 176 yards and scored twice.

The top three defenders were once again Ethan Patlan, Jonathan Gutierrez, and Lionel DeLeon. Patlan had eight assists, one tackle for a loss, one interception, and one pass

deflection. Gutierrez had ten assists. DeLeon had two solo tackles and seven assists. The Bronco defense only yielded 79 Alpine rushing yards.

It's hard to believe, but next Friday night will be the final home game of the 2014 season. It is also Senior Night. The Broncos will be playing the Reagan County Owls.

The Owls are 3-6, 1-3 coming into this week's game after losing 19-0 last Friday to Crane.

All of the sub varsity teams have had a great year. The Seventh Grade Colts have lost only once. The Eighth Grade Colts are undefeated. The JV Broncos tied the 4A Boerne JV team and have won four in a row against district opponents.

The playoffs are right around the corner. This Friday, our Bi-District opponent, the fourth place team in District 3, will be determined in a game between Colorado City and Coahoma. While not trying to jinx the Broncos, Spearman is playing at Idalou to determine the District 1 Champ and Cisco is playing at Eastland to determine the District 2 Champ this Friday night also. It's sad that the best time of the year is quickly approaching a finale in December. Come out and support all your Colt and Bronco football teams this week.

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The Biggest Day Of My Life

I had no idea what my father was planning. It started with the dismantling of the old wind charger tower that was just outside of the dining room window. The wind charger used to recharge the gigantic batteries that were kept in a wooden box on the southwest side of the house. These batteries had been used to power the 12-volt lights in the bottom floor of our house. Once the REA made it to our ranch, the batteries were no longer used, and the tower could be used for something else.

My father and his hired hand started digging the anchor holes at the northeast corner of the house, which is where the living room was. After some very deep holes were dug, the anchors for the tower were cemented into place. They waited

The afternoon that the tower was up, my father finally told me what the tower was going to be used for. I was so excited that I almost hyperventilated. Mr. Nelson Stubblefield was coming in the morning to complete the installation.

The next morning, I decided to stay home from school, and I forcible announced my decision. To my surprise, my parents decided that missing one day of first grade would not have a long term negative impact on my education.

Mr. Nelson (I was having trouble saying Mr. Stubblefield) saw that the wind

charger tower needed more height to clear the large pecan tree in the northeast corner of the yard. He had come prepared, and they spent about three extra hours welding an extension in the form of a 2.5 inch pipe to the top of the tower. Once that was complete, they spent about an hour running the guy wires from the tower to the pecan trees to the east, to the large Mesquite trees in the western part of the yard, and to the Oak trees in the south.

Finally, Mr. Nelson was ready to install the necessary equipment to the top of the tower. He ran the cables down one of the legs of the tower and made sure everything was grounded.

Mr. Nelson and my father went to his truck, and, between the two of them, they brought it into the living

room. Once in the house, they carefully removed it from the Zenith box and placed it in the northeast corner of the living room. The wires from the tower were routed through a hole in the wall and connected. The black control box was placed on top, and he explained to me how to work it.

I looked out the window to see the school bus going by. I was so happy that I had been able to stay home and experience the most exciting day of my life.

Mr. Nelson turned it on. He turned the dial and selected channel 8. He showed me how to use the vertical and horizontal hold buttons to stabilize the picture. My first television show was an old Johnny Mack Brown western.
