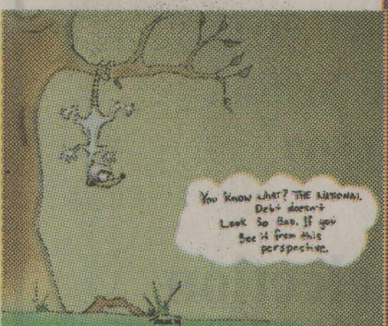

Have Mercy On Me

Over the years, the Broncos have suffered a few large losses. In 1964, Mason defeated Sonora by a score of 40 to 0. What made that game memorable was the fact that Mason showed us some mercy. They punted on first down every time they got the ball once they had scored their 40 points. Comfort showed us no mercy in 2006 when they beat us 61 to 13. Coach Sine and Coach Phillips have shown weaker opponents mercy in our blow out wins. This past Friday night, the Broncos defeated the Owls by a score of 41 to 8. All 41 points came in the first half.

The Broncos received the opening kickoff. After five running plays and two first downs, Andres Acevedo threw deep to a wide open Noah San-Miguel for a 53-yard Bronco touchdown. Hunter Hughes missed his PAT kick, and the Broncos led 6 to 0 with 9:19 left in the first quarter.

The Owls answered with an impressive first drive. They moved the ball deep into Bronco territory before turning the ball over on downs.

The Broncos used their running attack on the next scoring drive. Elijah Cross got it started with a long run up the middle carrying several Owls. Acevedo moved the chains with a keeper/scramble around right end. Then on a planned option play, he kept the ball and scored on a 37 yard run. Hughes kicked the PAT, and the lead was 13 to 0 with 3:17 remaining in the first quarter.

Jonathan Gutierrez recovered a pooch kickoff. This time Coach Phillips used his NASCAR offense with Hunter Hughes as quarterback. Moving quickly with no huddles, Hughes completed passes to Acevedo and Gabe Rollert. The drive ended with Rollert catching his third touchdown pass of the year. Hughes' kick was good making the score 20 to 0 with 1:36 left in the first quarter.

Much of the fight in the Owls was gone, and they went three and out and punted. Acevedo hit tight end Hughes for a touchdown. Place kicker Hughes made his kick for the Broncos upping the score to 27 to 0. 9:13 remained in the

first half. The Owls moved the ball into Bronco territory by completing two passes before turning the ball over on downs. This drive featured quarterback Hughes throwing deep to receiver Acevedo for a touchdown. After the PAT, the scoreboard read 34 to 0 with 3:54 left in the first half. The Owl drive quickly

Memorial service: 2 p.m. Wednesday at Aledo United Methodist Church, 100 Pecan St., Aledo 76008.

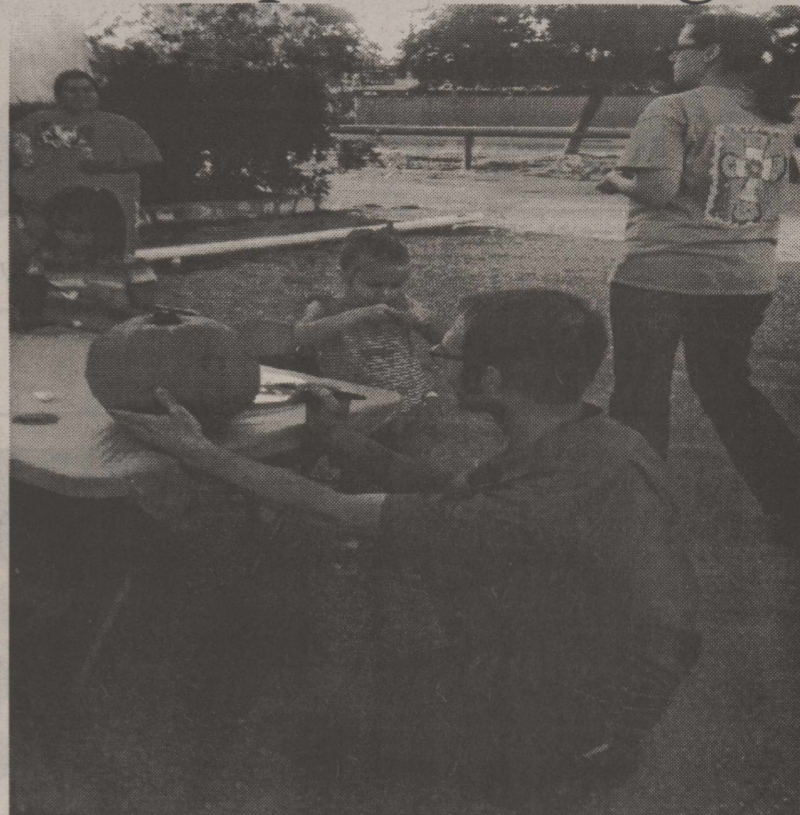

Extension Workshop Features Feed Costs, Herbicide Updates, and CEUs

Cooler fall weather reminds ranchers that the winter livestock feeding season is not long off. This time of year brings questions on what the feed grain markets did, are doing or might do, which in turn leads to head-scratching on what feed costs might be. The end of the year also brings reminders that some folks may need Texas Department of Agriculture continuing education units (CEUs) to keep their pesticide applicator licenses in good standing.

With that in mind, the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service will conduct the multi-county Range and Pasture Workshop on Nov. 18 at the Sutton County Civic Center, 1700 N. Crockett Ave. in

Sonora.

The workshop, a joint program among the AgriLife Extension offices in Sutton, Edwards, Crockett and Val Verde counties, opens with registration at 8:30 a.m. with the program to follow from 9 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

It is our goal with this workshop to give a winter feeding price synopsis and inform producers about the latest brush control innovations as well as provide CEUs for those folks with a pesticide applicator license.

Individual preregistration is \$10 by Nov. 14 and \$15 thereafter. The fee will include program materials and refreshments during breaks.

Topics and speakers, all from

San Angelo, will include:

- Grain Updates and Winter Feed Cost Outlook, Dr. David Drake, AgriLife Extension agronomist.

- Brush Control and Herbicide Update, Dr. Morgan Russell, AgriLife Extension range specialist.

- Pesticide Laws and Regulations, Cory Pence, Texas Department of Agriculture.

The three Texas Department of Agriculture continuing education units include one each in the integrated pest management, laws and regulations, and general categories.

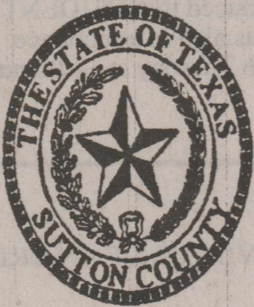

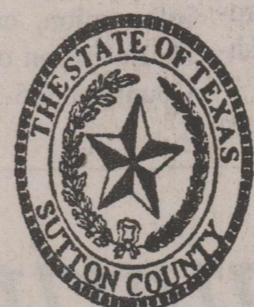

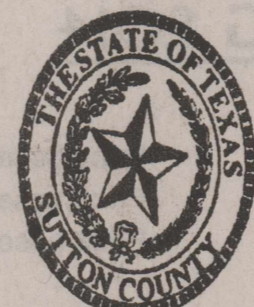

stalled. They lined up to punt where Dusty Holmes moved yards respectively. Gutierrez stormed through the chains several times with 23 Broncos made 15 solo and 95 assisted tackles. Jerad Willey and Ethan Patlan had 11 and 10 tackles respectively. Jonathan Martinez had two solo tackles and one tackle for a loss. Sid Anderson made a tackle for a loss. Cross tackled two Owls for a loss, and Kevin Martinez had one tackle for a loss.

The Broncos travel to San Angelo Stadium to play the Bi-District game against the Coahoma Bulldogs. The last time Sonora played Coahoma in San Angelo was in the 1968 playoffs. The field was covered in snow. Sonora won that game by a score of seven to six en route to our second state championship.

The 2014 Bulldogs have a six and four record. Coahoma was two and three in district beating only Stanton and Ballinger. They will enter the 2014 playoffs as the fourth place team. Kickoff will be at 7:00 on THURSDAY night. The Broncos will be the home team.

Acevedo handed off to Cross who scored on an easy four yard run. Hughes made the kick, and the Broncos had finished scoring for the game. It was 41 to 0 at the end of the first half.

Most coaches will start the first string for the first drive of the second half. But Coach Phillips wanted next year's defense to get a lot of real playing time. They allowed the Owls to drive the field on their first possession of the second half for a touchdown and two-point conversion. The Owl quarterback scored on an 18 yard run. He then passed for the two points from the swinging gate. The last of the scoring was complete with 7:19 left in the third.

After that, the young Bronco defense was solid. Toward the end of the game, the Broncos put on a time consuming drive

where Dusty Holmes moved the chains several times with some good running. Once the Broncos reached the Owl eight-yard line, Hughes took a knee to run out the clock. This was an unusual game as the Broncos had four receiving touchdowns and two rushing touchdowns. I can't ever remember a Bronco game where each quarterback threw a touchdown pass to the other. Acevedo also had a hat trick. He ran for a touchdown, threw for two touchdowns, and caught a touchdown.

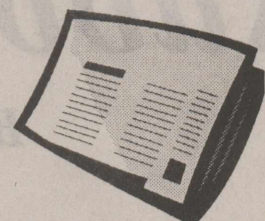

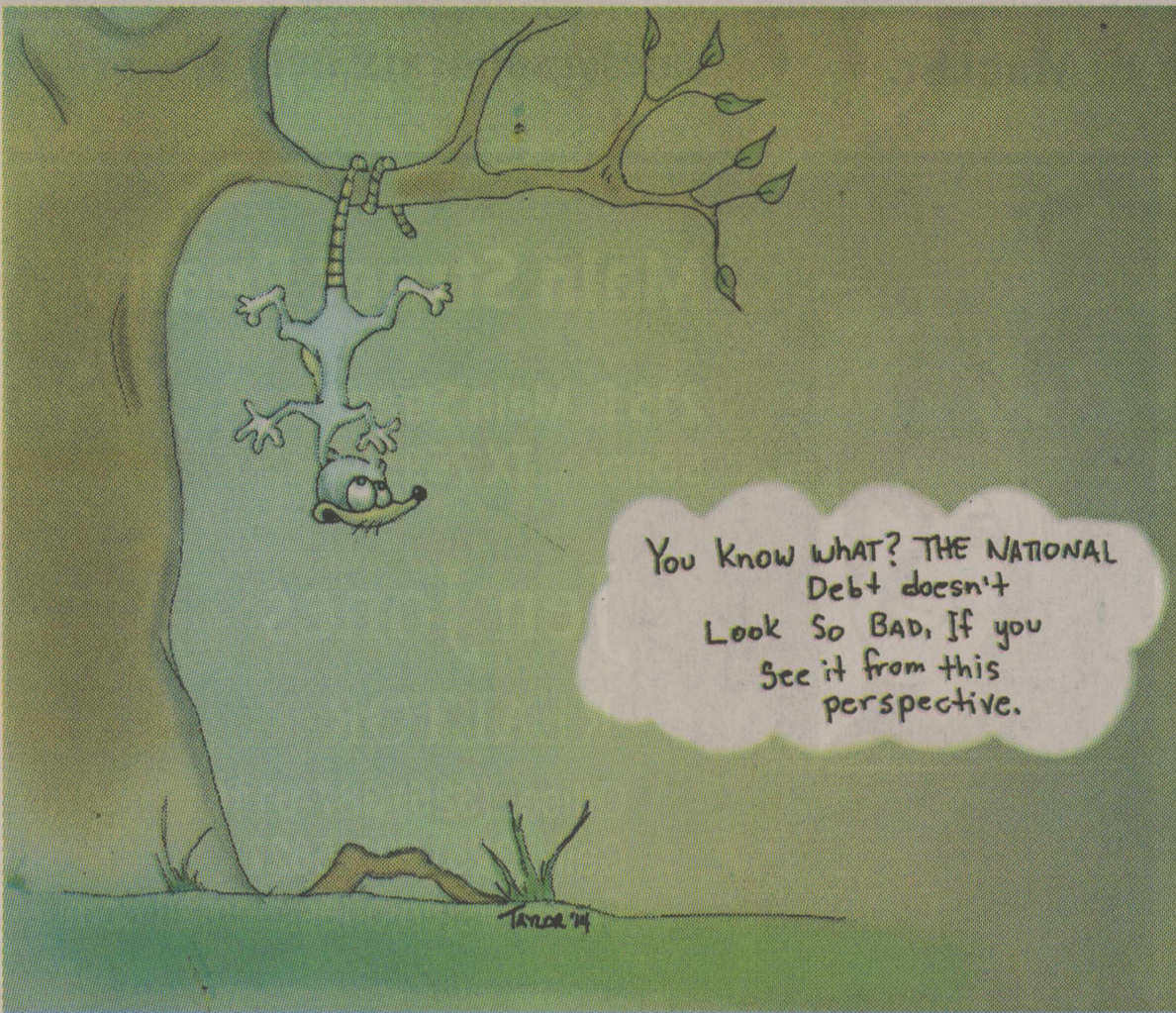
