Summer Fires Beat Mesquite

Engagements



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VERNON – Fire must be effectively managed to get the best control of mesquite seedlings, a Texas A&M AgriLife Research rangeland ecologist said.

Dr. Jim Ansley of Vernon recently published study results in “Rangeland Ecology and Management” journal that indicate both season and intensity are important factors in the mitigation of mesquite seedlings by fire.

“We know adult mesquite trees are fire resistant because they resprout following a fire,” Ansley said. “We have determined that range managers might have a greater success of mesquite control with fire if their efforts are aimed at the seedlings.”

In the study, mesquite seeds were planted in mid-grass and tall-grass plots in the spring and then burned in the winter at 10 or 22 months seedling age or in late summer when they were 17 months old.

He said summer fires were especially effective in the mid-grass fuels and yielded a higher death rate when the seedlings were 17 months old than did earlier winter fires when seedlings were 10 months old.

However, Ansley said, this same advantage of summer over winter fires is not seen in higher fuel load areas, such as those with tall-grass types. In that case, both seasons had a high death rate of trees after

fire.

The air temperature was, of course, higher during summer fires, and this greatly increased fireline intensity on the mid-grass plots, but only slightly increased intensity on the tall-grass plots, he said. Grass fuel amounts were similar for both winter and summer fires in the mid-grass plots, about 1,700 pounds per acre, and slightly higher in summer than winter in the tall-grass plots, 6,900 versus 5,950 pounds per acre.

“One of the most important conclusions was that there was a very close positive relationship between fireline intensity and seedling mortality, especially in winter fires,” Ansley said. “So, conditions that yield high fire intensity such as higher fuel loads or summer burning will have the greatest effect on seedling mortality.”

Summer fire in lower-grass fuel amounts may accomplish the same level of mesquite seedling mortality without the need for lengthy grazing deferral to accumulate sufficient grass fuel needed for a successful winter fire, he said.

The published paper shows a common scenario for controlling mesquite seedlings with fire. Typically, a drought year followed by a wet spring accelerates mesquite seed germination, Ansley said.

If the pasture remains ungrazed or lightly grazed, this

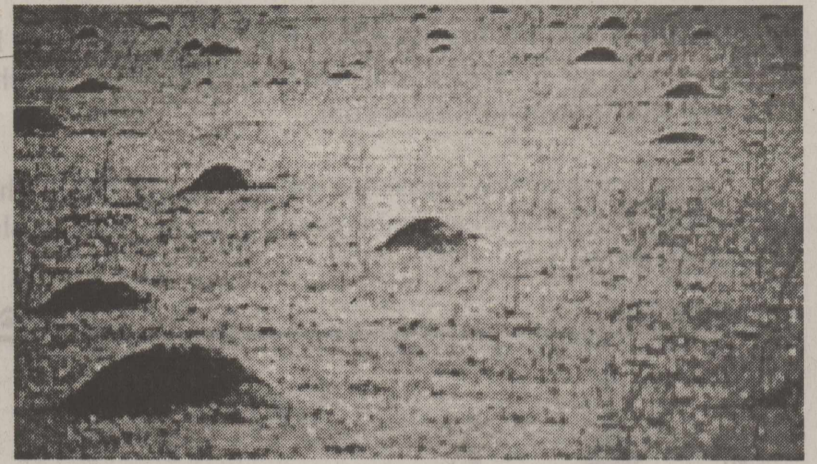
would create the highest probability for a natural fire to occur within five to 20 months after mesquite seedling emergence.

“This is probably how mesquite was kept in check naturally before Europeans settled the region,” he said. “The introduction of cattle and fire suppression disrupted this natural cycle and mesquite populations exploded.”

Ansley said his results show a prescribed fire applied during this period, either in winter around February at about 10 months seedling age or in late summer at about 17 months age, reduced the number of surviving mesquite seedlings by 35-80 percent in mid-grass and over 75 percent in tall-grass stands. Mortality in winter fires in the mid-grass fuel type was never more than 35 percent, however.

“So you need either higher fuel or a summer fire to really be effective.”

Any removal of grass by livestock grazing during this period of high grass accumulation would obviously reduce the probability of higher fireline intensities during the brief window of time when seedlings would be vulnerable to a prescribed fire, Ansley said. Certainly, he said, more research is needed to explore this critical window of mesquite seedling vulnerability.



Fighting Fire Ants: AgriLife Extension Expert: Treatment Depends on Mound Location, Situation

SAN ANTONIO – The recent rains have brought fire ants closer to the surface, both literally and as a matter of concern for area property owners, said a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service expert based in San Antonio.

“Rain doesn’t necessarily make fire ants more abundant,” said Molly Keck, AgriLife Extension entomologist and integrated pest management program specialist for Bexar County. “They were always there; they just weren’t as noticeable. When it rains, the ground becomes saturated and the fire ants move their colonies higher, giving some people the impression there are more of them than there were during dry months.”

Keck said unless homeowners have been treating regularly, it’s a safe assumption they already have or will be getting at least one fire ant mound in their yard.

“I have found mounds when weeding my garden, in my vegetable beds, along the sidewalk, next to my newly planted fig tree and in the middle of the yard,” Keck said. “They are huge, ugly, and look fairly ominous.”

Keck said there are many options for fire ant control, but the best option for control often depends on the location of the mound. She said some of the most common situations, along with her suggestions for control, are:

— Fire ants in vegetable gardens: There are limited options for control here, so if you are treating with a pesticide, be very careful to read the label to make sure what you are using is safe for use around vegetables. Boiling water and oils will work, but depending on how close that mound is to the plants, you may kill some vegetable roots. “I suggest products containing

Reminders About Brush Control

This time of year, we get questions about herbicide treatments for mesquite, cactus, and other brush. So we are re-running a couple of reminders about herbicide treatments for these brush species.

Leaf-Spray Method for Mesquite

The leaf-spray method works best on mesquite trees that are less than eight feet tall. Recommendations are to spray during the growing season when all foliage is a dark-green color. This dark color indicates that leaves are mature and producing; carbohydrates are thus flowing toward the roots. Spraying during flowering or when mesquite beans are not fully elongated may reduce mortality rates.

For best results, don’t spray when rains have stimulated light green new growth in tree tops or when mesquite foliage shows damage from hail, insects or disease.

Pad or Stem-Spraying Cactus

This method works best on relatively thin stands of pricklypear, tasajillo and other species of cacti. The Brush Busters pad or stem spray method can be applied throughout the year. The herbicide used in the Brush Busters method, Surmount™, is taken up through the pads and stems and through the roots after rains have moved the herbicide into the soil.

Apply the spray until the pads or stems are almost wet, but not to the point of runoff. Results will be faster and more consistent if both sides of the prickly pear pads are sprayed. Prickly pear dies very slowly following application of pad or stem sprays. Total plant kill may take two or three years. The absence of rain for extended periods after spraying may reduce plant kill. So this may be the year to attack prickly pear.

Lastly, do not spray within 100 feet of known sinkholes or fractures that would allow herbicide to enter underground water aquifers.

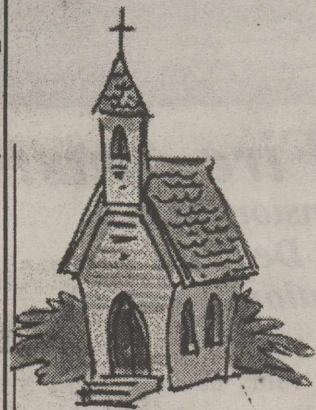


Wellness Ministry

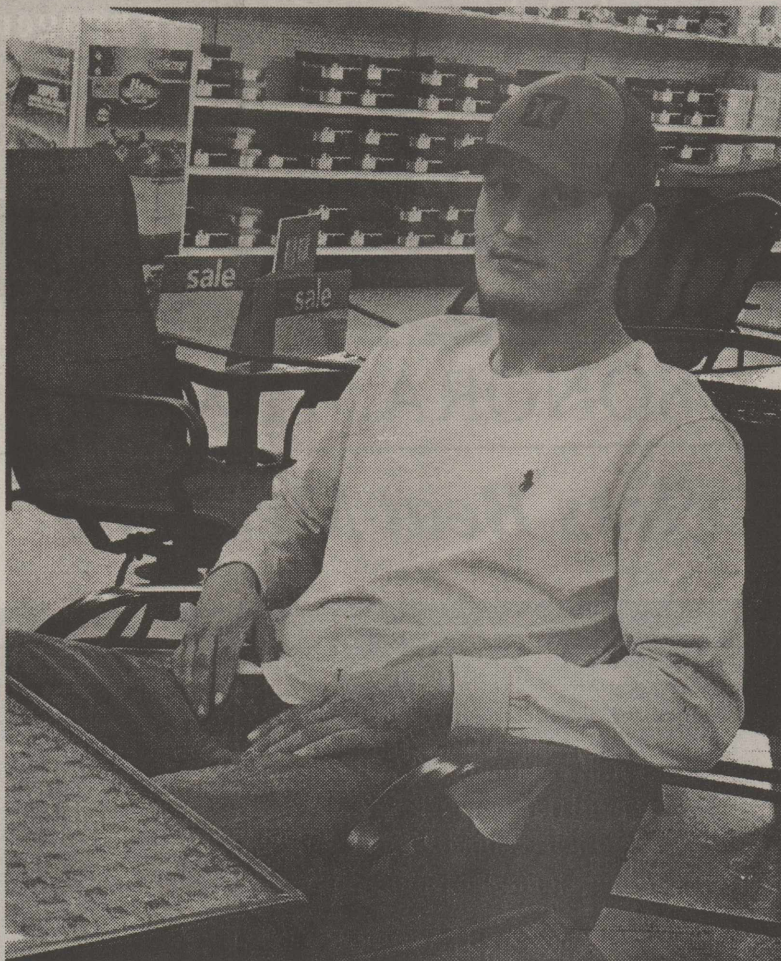

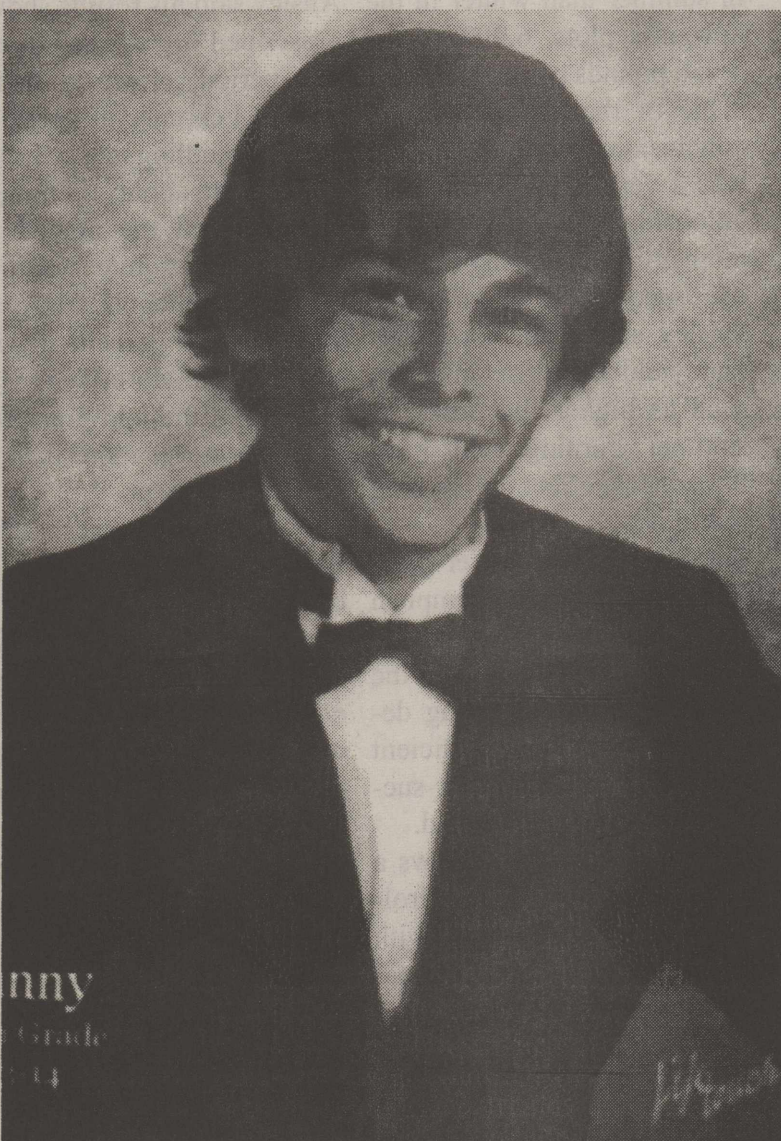

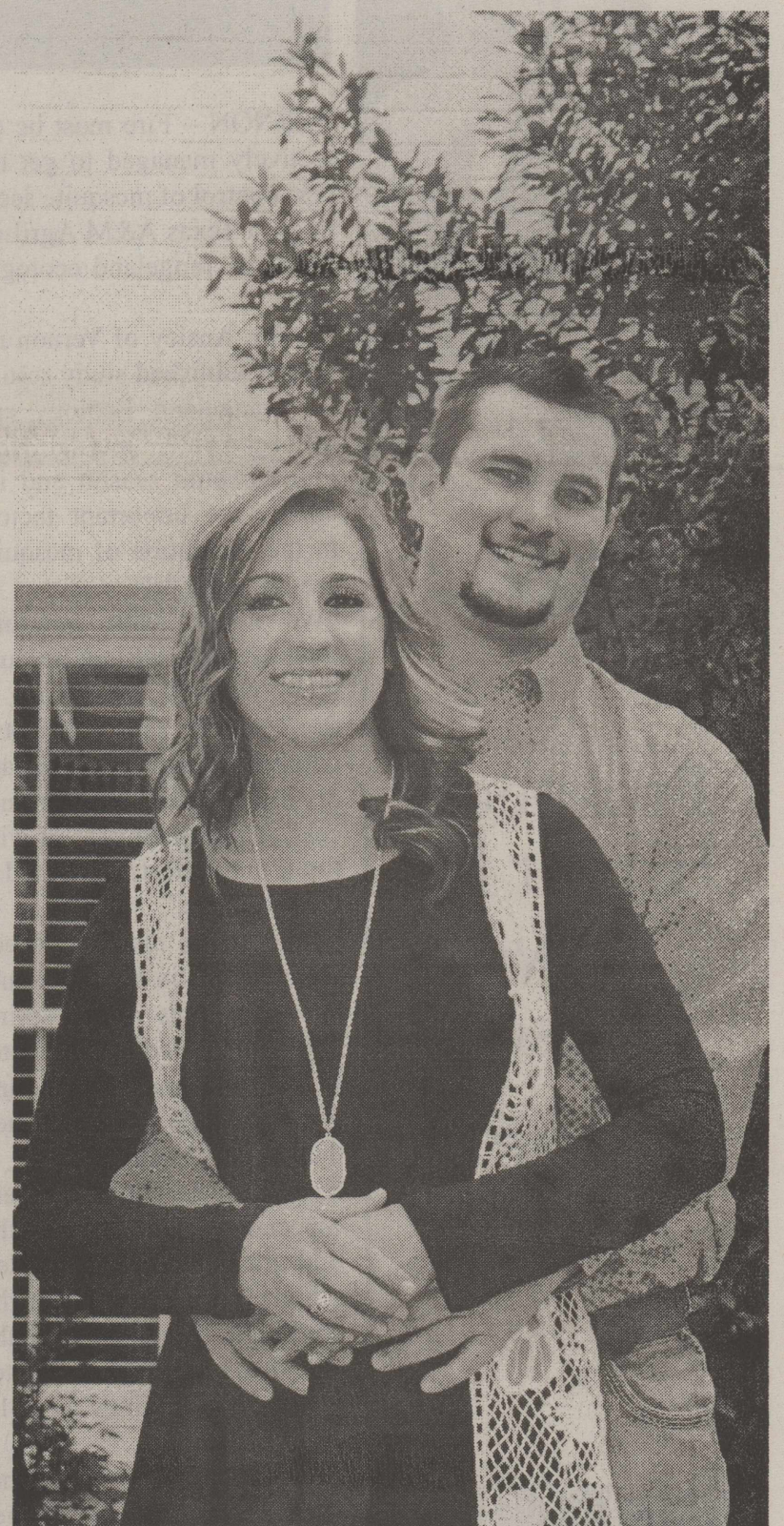

Prospects Bright for Dove Season

AUSTIN – Dove hunters will have more opportunity earlier in the season with dates and bag limits finalized recently by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has approved the 2015-2016 Texas dove season, including a 70-day season and 15-bird daily bag statewide, and a 16-day early teal and Canada goose season.

The traditional September 1 dove season opening day in the North and Central Zones remains. The first segment in those zones will be five days longer than last season, closing on Sunday, Oct. 25. The season will reopen Friday, Dec. 18 and run through Friday, Jan. 1, 2016 in the North and Central Zones.

In the South Zone, the first segment will be longer by two days compared to last year. The South Zone opens Friday, Sept. 18 and runs through Wednesday, Oct. 21. The second segment will run Friday, Dec. 18 through

Friday, Jan. 22, 2016.

The daily bag limit for doves statewide is 15 and the possession limit is 45.

The Special White-winged Dove Area will be restricted to afternoon only (noon to sunset) hunting the first two full September weekends on Sept. 5-6 and 12-13. Hunting in this area will reopen Friday, Sept. 18 and continue through Wednesday, Oct. 21, and then reopen Friday, Dec. 18 through Monday, Jan. 18, 2016. During the early two weekends, the daily bag limit is 15 birds, to include not more than two mourning doves and two white-tipped doves. Once the general season opens, the aggregate bag limit will be 15 with no more than two white-tipped doves.

“Age-ratios (juveniles versus adults) from last season indicated very strong production in mourning doves across Texas last year; we expect similar or slightly increased production this year with the improved habitat conditions across

nearly all of Texas,” said Shaun Oldenburger, TPWD’s dove program leader. “However, improved habitat conditions equal more food and water on the landscape, which means hunters may need to spend more time patterning mourning doves prior to opening day in their area.”

Duck hunters can anticipate improved conditions for the September early teal season as abundant rains have filled lakes and marshes for the first time in several years. With record numbers of teal expected to make their way into Texas during the upcoming months, prospects should be good.

A 16-day statewide early teal and Eastern Zone Canada goose season will run Saturday, Sept. 12 through Sunday, Sept. 27. The daily bag on teal remains six, with a possession limit of 18. Bag limit for Canada geese will be three and a possession limit of six in the Eastern Zone only.

Farmers to Receive Documentation of USDA Services

(COLLEGE STATION, TEXAS), July 2, 2015 — U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) State Executive Director Judith A. Canales reminds agricultural producers that FSA provides a receipt to customers who request or receive assistance or information on FSA programs.

"If you visit our office, you'll receive documentation of services requested and provided," said Canales. "It's part of our mission to provide enhanced customer service for producers. From December through June, FSA issued more than 327,000 electronic receipts."

The 2014 Farm Bill requires a receipt to be issued for any agricultural program assistance requested from FSA, the National Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) and Rural Development (RD). Receipts include the date, summary of the visit and any agricultural information, program and/or loan assistance provided to an individual or entity.

In some cases, a form or document — such as a completed and signed program enrollment form — serve as the customer receipt instead of a printed or electronic receipt. A service is any information, program or loan assistance provided whether through a visit, email, fax or letter.

Today's announcement was made possible through the 2014 Farm Bill. The Farm Bill builds on historic economic gains in rural America over the past six years, while achieving meaningful reform and billions of dollars in savings for the taxpayer.

Since enactment, USDA has made significant progress to implement each provision of this critical legislation, including providing disaster relief to farmers and ranchers; strengthening risk management tools; expanding access to rural credit; funding critical research; establishing innovative public-private conservation partnerships; developing new markets for rural-made products; and investing in infrastructure, housing and community facilities to help improve quality of life in rural America.

spinosad as either a drench or bait, as it is labeled for use in vegetable gardens," Keck said.

— Fire ants without visible mounds: Keck said baits are definitely the way to go here. If you can't see the mound, you can't drench it properly. Ants take baits back into the nest and feed them to the other ants, including the queen. Baits may take up to two weeks to work, so be patient.

— Fire ants in yards: Treat individual mounds and follow up a couple of days later with a broadcast bait. You will eliminate or at least reduce the size of the mounds you treat individually, and the bait will help keep the populations down and knock out the mounds

that you didn't see.

— Immediate treatment: If you're having a party or outside gathering in a few days, or need to treat quickly for some other reason, Keck suggested using broadcast granules or individual mound treatments or both. If the ant population is really dense, treat individual mounds with a liquid drench or a dust labeled for fire ants. Then use a broadcast granule treatment to provide a barrier to prevent new mounds from popping up, as well as to treat any unseen mounds.

— Long-term fire ant management: If you want to avoid "emergency" fire ant treatments, it's best to have a treatment regimen and to

use baits as the preferred method. If your fire ant populations are fairly low to begin with, you can treat every six months. Treatments in the fall may result in no ants in the spring, in which case you can eventually drop back to once every 12 months. If the mounds are large and fire ant populations are dense, you may need to treat once, then again in six to eight weeks. Then you can return to an every-six-months routine. As with all pesticide use, she said, read the label first, apply only what is recommended and wear protective clothing during application.

"Overall, I think the most effective and lasting results come from the use of fire

ant baits," she said. "Baits are food to the ants, so they are attracted to it and take it back to the mound and share it with the others. This means putting less pesticide into the environment while getting better long-term results."

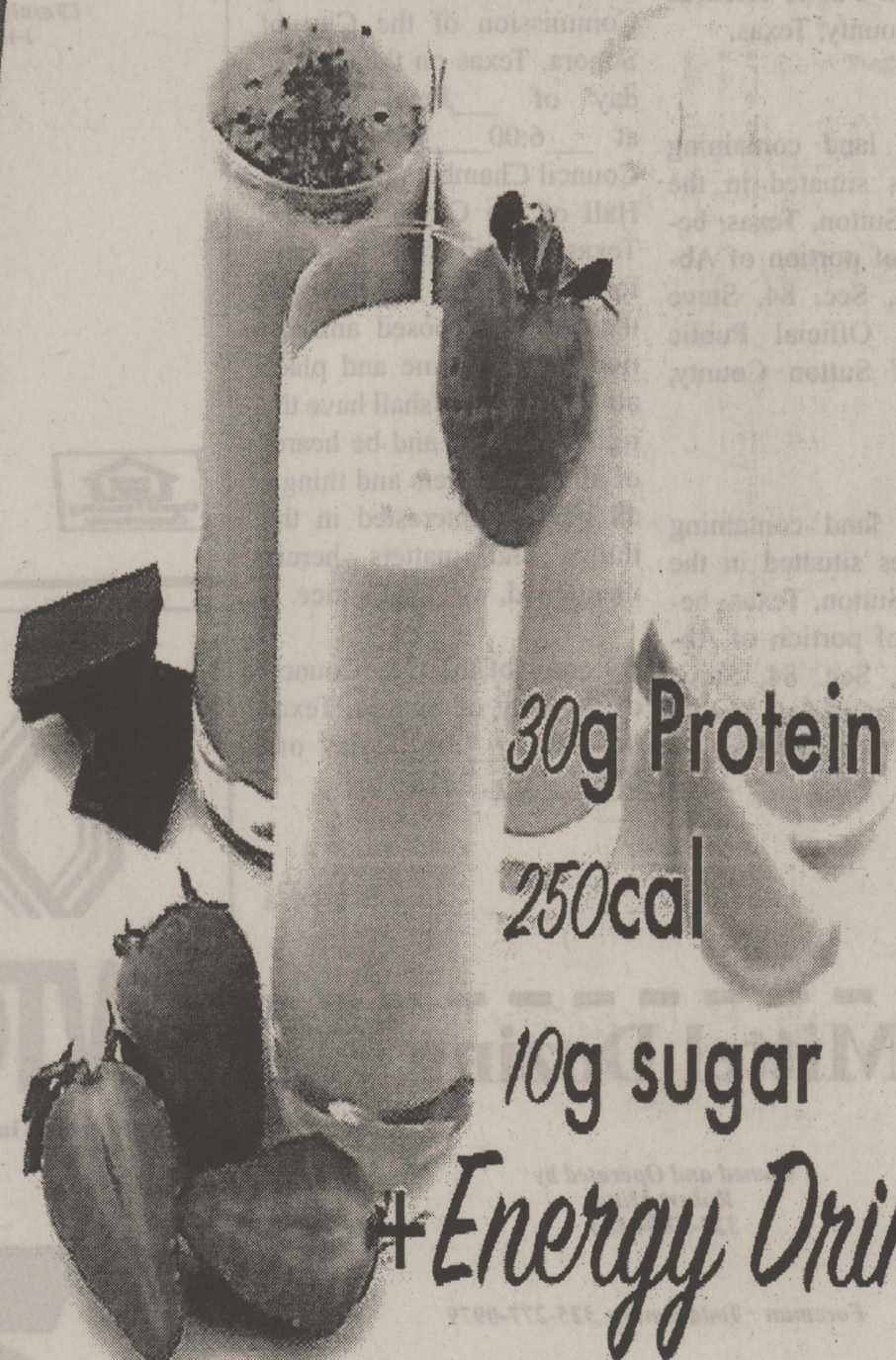
