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Sonora JV Broncos vs Comfort Bobcats

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Bobcat Ears Sawed Off

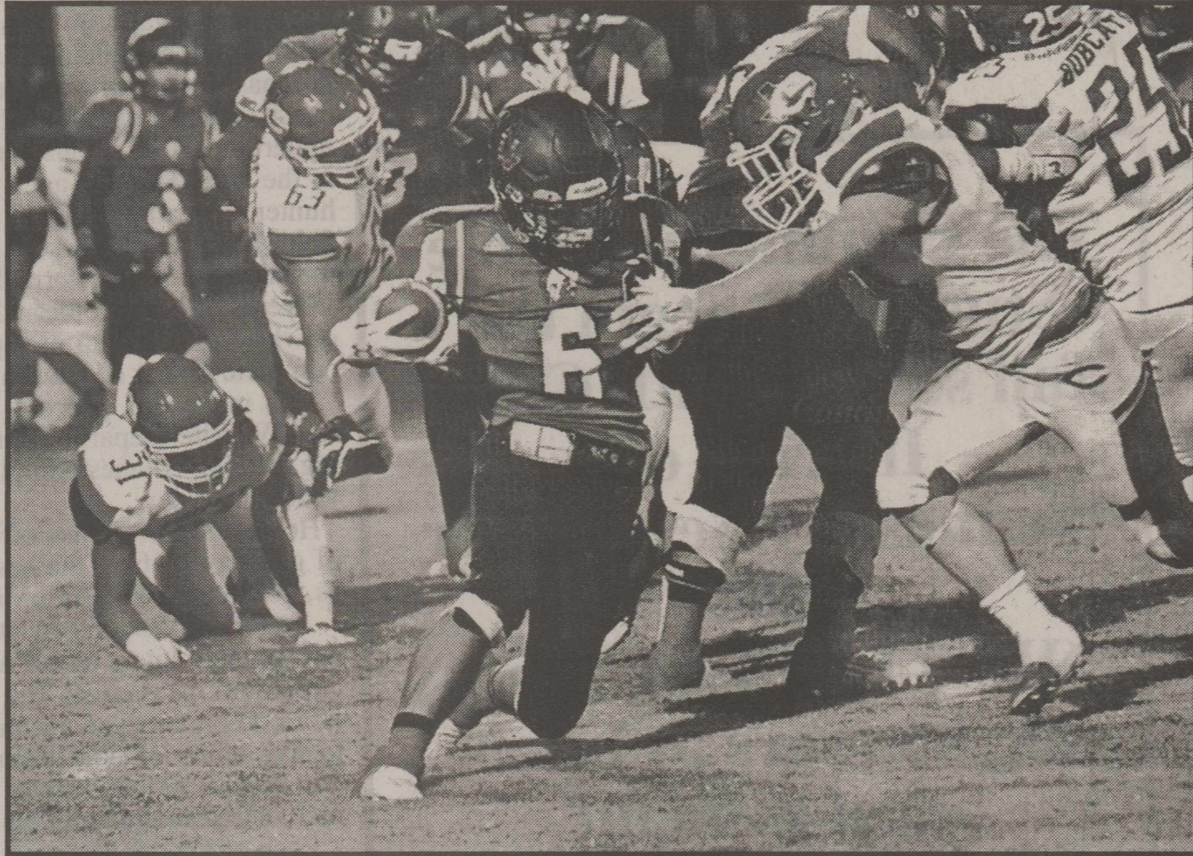

An old football adage goes something like this: the team that controls the clock and almost doubles the opponent's time of possession, has more offensive yards and first downs, never has to punt, and never turns the ball over on downs wins the game. The Comfort Bobcats held the ball for 31:31 while Sonora's time of possession was 16:29. Comfort gained 436 rushing and passing yards for 22 first downs to 383 and 11 first downs for the Broncos. Sonora punted twice while the Bobcats never punted.

Another one goes like this: the team with the fewest turnovers and better special team's play wins the game. Comfort committed three turnovers to only one for Sonora. The Broncos successfully made all of their PATs while Comfort missed three times. Sonora scored a touchdown on a kick-off return. Adage one proved false for Comfort while adage two proved true for the Broncos. Sonora won the game 43 to 40.

The Broncos just missed scoring on the first play of the game. Kaden Cordell took the snap from center threw a backward pass to Michael Solis. Solis threw deep to a wide-open Luke James who was unable to complete the catch.

After Cordell punted, the Bobcats responded with a 13-play scoring drive. They scored on a 21-yard counter play. The PAT kick hit the left goal post - no good. With 6:19 left in the first quarter, Comfort led 6 to 0.

Noah San Miguel fielded the kickoff at the five-yard line and returned it to the Broncos' 43-yard line. After one run by Solis, Kevin Martinez swept left for a 52-yard touchdown. Octavio Mendez kicked the PAT, and the Broncos were in the lead at 7 to 6 with 5:48 remaining.

Solis shanked the kickoff, and it turned out to be a suc-

cessful onside kick as Jose Hernandez recovered for the Broncos. After six running plays moved the chains once, Solis took the snap, and turned quickly to his right. He threw a backwards pass to San Miguel who then threw deep to Carter Zook for the second Bronco touchdown on a 43-yard reception. After another successful kick, the new Bronco Nation Scoreboard read Home 14 and Guest 6 with 2:14 still remaining in the first quarter. Booyah!

On Comfort's fifth running play, Liam Yourgalite ripped the football out of a Comfort runner's arms and Kevin Martinez recovered for the Broncos. The Bobcats held and forced Cordell to punt. Louis Castro made a great Special Teams play to smother the ball at the two-yard line.

The Bronco Nation had visions of a three and out, a Bobcat punt, and great field position. Comfort put together the second longest scoring drive possible. They ran and ran and ran and ran. Then a play action pass resulted in a wide-open Bobcat for Comfort's second touchdown. After missing their last PAT kick, they went for two, but the Broncos held. With the score 14 to 12, the Broncos had only 1:51 left in the first half to respond.

On the sixth play of the drive, Solis rolled to his right and threw deep to San Miguel running a fade. The perfectly thrown ball hit San Miguel in stride for a 26-yard touchdown reception. San Miguel lined up on the right side of the formation, came in motion, Cordell rolled left and threw to a wide open San Miguel for the two point conversion. The scoring drive had used up all but 18 seconds. The Broncos led at the half by the score of 22 to 12.

Comfort opened the second half with a seven play touchdown drive. Once again, the biggest gain came on a perfectly thrown, play action pass. San Miguel caught the

Bobcat short of the goal line, but they pushed in two plays later on a two-yard run. With 9:24 left in the third, they made their first PAT, and the Broncos lead 22 to 19.

Solis used 18 seconds to score his first varsity rushing touchdown on a 74-yard cutback run. The Broncos regained their two possession lead at 29 to 19 after another successful kick for extra point.

The Bobcats used 10 runs and 1 pass and scored on a one yard run. After the touchdown, a Bobcat smashed into Cordell after the whistle. After the penalty, Comfort tried a 35-yard PAT kick that was just barely short. Broncos 29 - Bobcats 25 at 2:34 in the third.

After one first down, the Broncos fumbled giving the Bobcats a great opportunity to retake the lead. With a short field, the Bobcats were trying to pound the ball. A Bobcat seemed to be on his way to the end zone when San Miguel caused and recovered a critical Bobcat fumble.

On the sixth play, Solis rolled to his right and threw deep. James caught the ball in stride near the Bobcats' 30-yard line. At the ten, James juked past the last Bobcat defender and strolled into the end zone for a 61-yard touchdown. After a game high of four leaping chest bumps, Mendez remained perfect on his PAT kicks. With 9:31 left in the game, the Broncos had scored 36 points while the Bobcats had 25.

The Bobcats appeared to be completely unfazed. They kept with the running game for seven plays. Since stopping their running game was very difficult, the play action pass was hard to defend. This time it worked for a 51-yard touchdown reception. The successful two-point conversion reduced the Bronco lead

Reminder to Take Hunter Education before Heading to the Field

AUSTIN — With hunting season right around the corner, it's time to get your hunter education certification.

To hunt legally in Texas, anyone born on or after Sept. 2, 1971, must complete a hunter education training course or purchase a one-time 'deferral', good for one license year. Because the minimum age of certification is 9 years old, hunters under the age of 9 must be accompanied by a licensed hunter in the field. Hunters ages 9 through 16 must either complete hunter education courses or be accompanied while in the field. Deferral purchasers must also be 'accompanied' which means to be within normal voice control of a licensed hunter 17 years of age or older who has completed hunter education or who was born before Sept. 2, 1971. Hunters 17 and up must complete hunter education courses.

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To make this process easier than ever, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department now offers the option of completing training courses completely online for Texas residents 17 years and older.

However, TPWD also offers three other convenient methods of getting certified: the basic, enhanced and advanced courses, which involve classroom and/or field time.

The basic hunter education course is designed for novice and young hunters ages 9 and above and requires six hours of classroom instruction. The enhanced hunter education course is a combination of an online home study program and up to five hours of field training. The advanced hunter education course requires more than six hours of instruction and includes more content than the basic and enhanced courses.

Each of the courses costs \$15, and the passing grade for all courses is 75 percent.

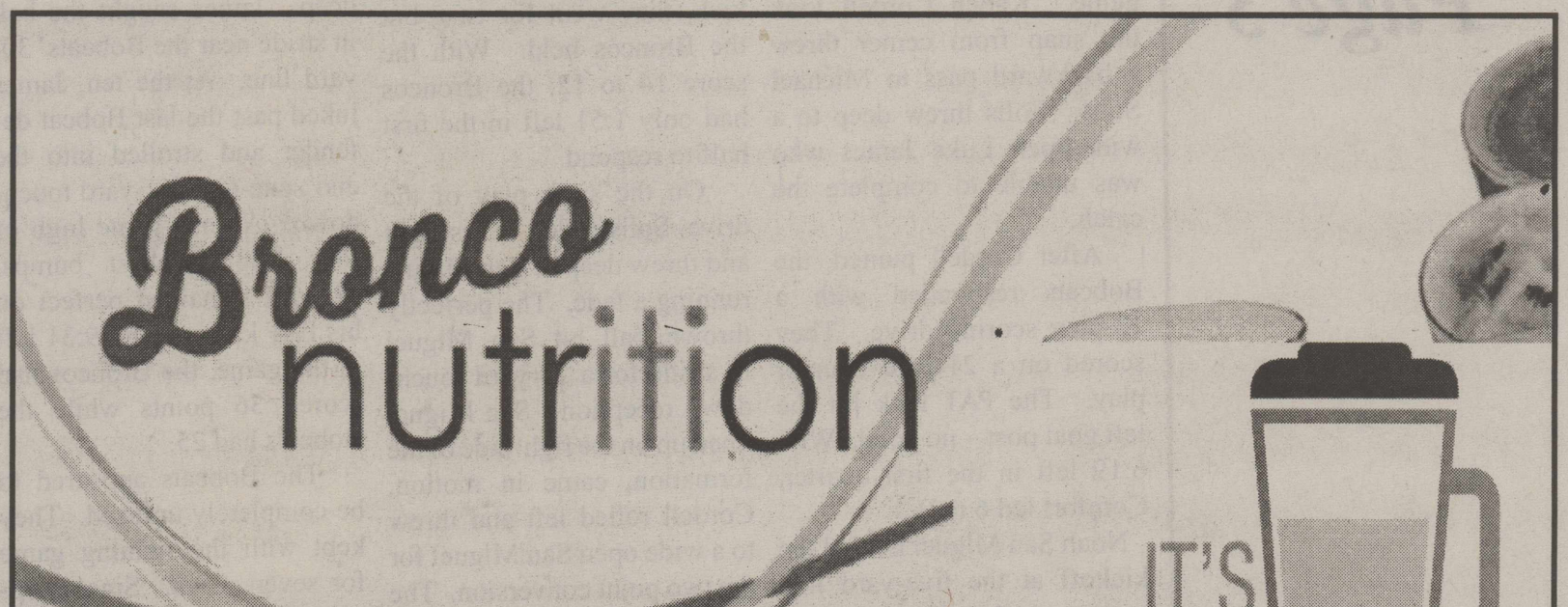

Freshman Broncos Start With A Win

Last Thursday, the Freshman Broncos beat the Miles JV Bulldogs by a score of 41 to 18 in Miles.

The Broncos scored on the opening drive of the game. The drive covered 65 yards in eight plays. It was a balanced drive with four runs and four completions. JR Velasquez, Willy B Munoz, and Wesley Dutton carried the ball while Walker Sine, Munoz, and Dylan Taylor caught passes from Dutton. Willy B got the score on a 21-yard sweep to his left. Brandon Martinez kicked the PAT, and the Broncos led 7 to 0 with 6:59 left in the first quarter.

The Bulldogs answered with a 70-yard scoring drive. Their drive used five running plays and two passes. They scored on a 43-yard screen pass. Their try for a two-point conversion failed, and the score was 7 to 6 in favor of the Broncos with 4:25 left in the first quarter.

Dutton fielded the kickoff at the 25-yard line, and he sprinted down the east side of the field for a touchdown. The PAT kick was wide right making the score 13 to 6 with 4:11 left in the first.

On the third Miles' play, Noe Estrada wrestled the

football away from a Bulldog runner and returned the "fumble" 22 yards for a touchdown. Dutton rolled to his right and completed a pass to Sine for the two-point conversion increasing the Bronco lead to 21 to 6 with 3:11 left in the opening quarter.

Miles responded with a six play 63-yard scoring drive. Once again, the Broncos stopped their try for two. 21 to 12 with 1:13 left in quarter one.

The next Bronco drive ended with a lost fumble on the third play. On the fourth play of the Bulldog's drive, Brian Van Winkle intercepted a sideline pass and returned it 15 yards into Bulldog territory.

Three plays later, the Bulldogs came with a blitz and Dutton threw an interception to a Miles lineman. Velasquez caught the Bulldog at the Bronco eight-yard line. They scored on a sweep to the right. Once again, the Broncos stopped their try for two. With 5:27 left in the first half, the score was 21 to 18 in favor of the Broncos.

The last drive of the first half ended with Velasquez scoring on a three yard run. Dutton's PAT pass to Taylor was incomplete. During the drive, John DeLeon had a nice

touchdown run called back on a penalty. Sine, Dutton, and Munoz all had exciting runs during this drive. The half ended with the Broncos in the lead at 27 to 18.

In the second half, the Bronco defense stopped the Bulldogs from scoring any more points. DeLeon got the first Bronco second half touchdown on a reception from Dutton. The last touchdown was setup by a true schoolyard play. It started with Dutton on a keeper. After he had gained about 12 yards, he was helmed in and about to go down. Sine called for the ball and Dutton pitched it to Sine. He ran to his left and was dragged down at the one. After Efrain Manriquez was stopped short of the goal line, Dutton got the last touchdown on a short keeper.

Last week, the JV Broncos opened their season in Comfort. The short-handed Broncos played well but ended up losing to the Bobcats 20 to 16.

The final score was 41 to 18. This week, the Freshman Broncos play Jim Ned there at 5 PM. The JV Broncos travel to Llano to play their JV team with a 5PM kickoff.

Sonora JV Broncos vs Comfort Bobcats

The Sonora Broncos received the ball to start the game. However, offense got off to a slow start and had to punt the ball.

The Bronco Defense took the field on the next possession. The Bobcats moved the ball down the field and was able to get inside the 10 yard line. However, the Bronco Defense stiffened up and stopped the Bobcats on four straight downs.

Sonora returned to the field on offense. The first play from scrimmage resulted in a safety for the Broncos. Broncos 0 - Bobcats 2.

The Broncos had to kick from the 20 yard line due to the safety. The Bobcats took advantage and ran the Kickoff in for a touchdown. Bobcat 2 pt conversion was no good. Broncos 0 - Bobcats 8.

Again the Bronco offense stalled and was forced to punt on their next offensive possession. The Bobcats took advantage of great field position and 3 plays later found the endzone on a well designed screen play. Bobcat 2 pt conversion again stopped by the Mighty Bronco Defense. Bronco 0 - Bobcats 14.

2nd QTR:

Sonora's Offense finally gets things clicking and march the ball down the field against the stifling defense. Raully Ojeda, on 2nd and 6 from the 18 yard line, pitches the ball to Christian Ramon and Ramon does the rest. Ramon makes several miss, as he rumbles and stumbles to the endzone. Ojeda scrambles around and then finds the endzone to make the 2 pt conversion good. Broncos 8 - 14.

The Bobcat offense once again marched their way to the Sonora Goalline but the Bronco Defense tightened up and on 3rd and Goal Abel Cruz stripped the Bobcat ball

carrier and Lugo recovered the fumble.

The Broncos took over and took a knee to run out the clock in the 1st half.

3rd QTR:

The Broncos kick the ball off to Comfort to start the second half of play. On Comfort's first possession, a host of Broncos hammered the ball carrier and Chavez recovered the fumble for the Broncos.

The rest of the 3rd Qtr, the defenses would take over the game. Both squads forced 3 and outs which resulted in punts. Both defense also had a takeaway each. Lugo had an interception on a beautifully defended pass. And the Sonora Offense fumbled the ball and the Comfort Defense recovered.

Sonora takes advantage and marches down the field. Ramiro Reyes scampers in from the 33 yard line, after several nice moves. 2 pt conversion by Ojeda good. Broncos 16 - 20.

The Broncos try and onside kick but Comfort recovers and takes 2 straight knees to end the game.

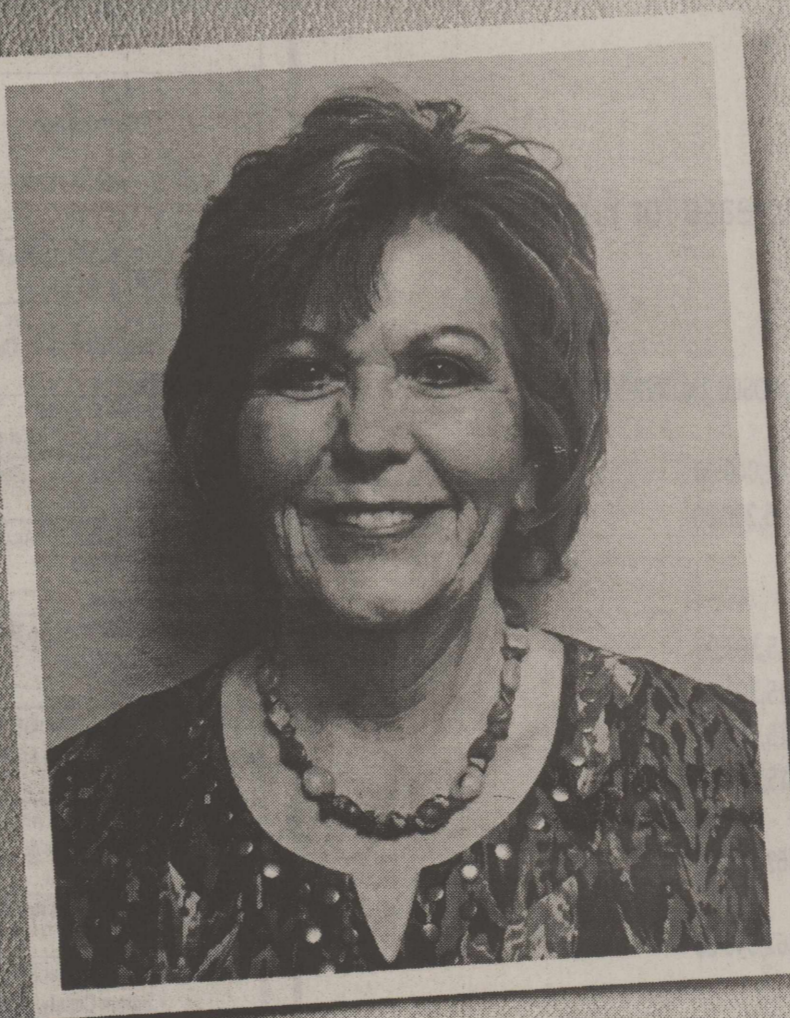
Despite the loss, The Sonora Broncos represented Bronco Nation proudly. They played hard for 4 qtrs and never gave

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Meeting Mineral Needs of Livestock Can Be Challenging

Mineral supplementation of livestock raises many questions that are sometimes difficult to answer. That's because mineral requirements depend on age, sex, stage and level of production and can vary across breeds of livestock. Also range plant mineral content depends on soil, plant species, stage of maturity, pasture management and climate.

Most naturally occurring mineral deficiencies in livestock are directly related to soil characteristics of specific regions. For example, alkaline soils tend to be more abundant in most trace elements than more acid, coarse, sandy formations. Also, leaching and weathering of soils in heavy rainfall and high temperature areas accentuate mineral deficiencies.

Minerals are divided into categories relative to the amount thought to be required in the diet of ruminants. The seven major essential minerals are called macrominerals, while the nine minor essential minerals are called microminerals.

The macrominerals are cal-

cium, phosphorus, sodium, chlorine, magnesium, potassium, and sulfur. Let's list major functions of each.

Calcium is used in the formation and maintenance of bones and teeth. It also functions in transmission of nerve impulses and contraction of muscle tissue. Phosphorus works in conjunction with calcium in the formation of bone. Magnesium is an activator of many metabolic enzymes.

Both sodium and chlorine function to maintain the volume, pH and osmolarity of body fluids. Sodium is involved in muscle and nerve function. Chlorine is essential for hydrochloric acid production in the abomasum and for carbon dioxide transport.

Potassium is required in large amounts by most organ systems for normal functioning. Sulfur is present in protein, certain vitamins (thiamin and biotin), enzymes and other compounds.

Microminerals are iron, iodine, copper, zinc, molybdenum, manganese, cobalt, selenium, and fluorine. Micro-

mineral requirements are typically quoted in parts per million (ppm) of the diet.

Mineral supplements are most often needed when livestock are grazing dormant, mature and/or weathered forage. Commercially prepared free-choice minerals are generally developed for specific geographical areas to meet 100-125% of the average herd's requirement for that region.

Show animals or those in the feedlot can usually meet their mineral requirements without feeding a mineral supplement. That is because most commercially prepared feeds are balanced for the entire mineral profile and do not require mineral supplementation. Mineral is usually provided to show animals, however, as insurance in meeting the needs of individual animals.

For specific questions concerning mineral nutrition for livestock, it is best to consult a knowledgeable professional nutritionist.

Notice is hereby given to all citizens of the City of Sonora that City ordinances are in effect for you and your real property. The City will grant a 90-day grace period from the date of this publication for the citizens to come in to compliance; during this time warning will be issued.

Under state law, on June 29, 2015 the City has annexed new areas to the City pursuant to Chapter 43 of the Texas Local Government Code.
