For the past two games, our Broncos have put up some truly impressive numbers. Against Grape Creek, the offense shown. Now consider what the defense did against the Crane Golden Cranes.

Crane ran the ball 33 times and gained ONLY 31 yards for a 0.9 yards per carry average. The Cranes completed 7 of 14 passes for 106 yards and two touchdowns. That calculates to 137 yards of total offense. Drew Buitron had an outstanding night with 13 total tackles with four of them solo. The Broncos logged 18 total solo tackles out of their total of 79 tackles. Buitron, Jonathan Martinez, and Juan Villanueva each had two sacks. Liam Yourgalite had one sack. Villanueva, Ramiro Reyes, and Jarrett Jackson each had hurries. Kaden Cordell, Luke James, and Jackson were credited with a pass defended. Quealy Shain recovered a Crane fumble.

The Broncos had the ball first, but the Cranes forced a punt. Cordell's punt pinned the Golden Cranes on their own two-yard line. Crane fumbled and Shain recovered at the three. Two Bronco fumbles later, Octavio Mendez kicked a 24-yard field goal for a three-point lead at the 8:26 mark in the first quarter.

Crane answered with a multi-play drive that ended when Zeke Roman caught

a 28-yard touchdown pass from Kolton Sena. The extra point kick was wide right. Crane led six to three with 2:18 left in the first quarter.

Jackson took the hand-off from Cordell. He juke past the first would be tackler and sped down the near sideline for a 63-yard touchdown. Mendez kicked the point after, and Sonora regained the lead 10 to 6 with 2:06 left in the first.

Crane responded with a scoring drive that lasted 1:41. Sena passed to Rafael Meza for the touchdown. James tipped away the PAT pass attempt, and Crane lead by a score of 12 to 10 with 25 showing on the scoreboard clock. From this point on in the game, no more Golden Cranes scored.

Jackson scored his second rushing touchdown on an eight-yard run. The run came from a wishbone type of formation. James and Kevin Martinez were the lead blockers, and Shain took out the right defensive end from his left tackle position. Going for two, Cordell had his pass attempt knocked down. The Broncos were in the lead to stay at 16 to 12 at the 3:36 time remaining the first half.

There was no score in the third quarter despite lots of offensive yardage by the Broncos. K Mart scored on a one yard run with 11:24 left in the fourth quarter. Sonora 23 - Crane 12.

In the fourth quarter, Michael Solis had a touchdown reception and a touchdown run called back for penalties. After his rushing touchdown was called back, the coaches called the exact same play. Once again, he sped down the near sideline for a 46-yard touchdown, and this time it counted. Cordell handed off to James who leaped over two Cranes and was able to extend the ball over the plane of the goal line for the two-point conversion. This made the final score 31 to 12.

Jackson, Solis, and K Mart led the Broncos in rushing with 124, 60, and 43 yards respectively. Cordell completed 15 of 23 for 125 yards with one interception. Five Broncos caught passes: Noah SanMiguel (3 for 27), Solis (3 for 8), James (4 for 56), Jackson (2 for 24), and Carter Zook (3 for 10).

On Thursday night, the JV Broncos defeated the Crane JV 37-12. There was lots of action. Dylan Taylor and Daniel Gonzales both intercepted the Crane QB. This week, the JV team heads to Angelo to play the TLCA JV Thursday, while the 7th and 8th grade Colts play at home. The Bronco Varsity plays the team's third District 4 game on Friday night in Bronco Stadium at 7:30pm. The Broncos are 4-3, 2-0.



LMH and the Food Pantry and Resource Partner Together to Reach More Sonora Citizens

On October 13th, the Lillian M. Hudspeth Memorial Hospital and the Food Pantry and Resource Center of Sutton County combined the hospital's regular health fair with the food pantry's open house to reach more citizens in Sutton County and the surrounding service area. The event served two primary purposes: raise awareness of important resources available to Sutton County citizens and to present an opportunity to create lasting relationships within our community.

The Food Pantry and Resource Center hosted their first open house; and with a generous donation from the hospital district and Gigi's on Main were able to cook and serve over 100 hamburgers and many more hot dogs to families that came out to celebrate a successful and rewarding first year. The hard work of the volunteers, board of directors, and Theresa Ward, the food pantry's executive director has certainly paid off; in their short tenure the food pantry has fed hundreds of individuals and children in Sutton County with 125 families and 80 children being fed during regular distribution in the month of October alone. Enrollment in the Food to Kids Program has grown to 78 children. They plan on growing their services exponentially

in year two.

Along with the Open House, the hospital hosted its 3rd quarterly health fair. Several vendors and charitable organizations came out to share their services with the community. People who attended were able to get free glucose and blood pressure checks, won door prizes, and received education in everything from mammogram enrollment to knitting (thanks to Knitting Hats for Little Hearts). "It is important that we make our community aware that we are there for them, not only when they are sick, but when they are well," said Sarah Teaff, Associate Administrator of Compliance and Development for the Sutton County Hospital District. "The health fair provides us an unique opportunity to partner with other community organizations to develop meaningful and lasting relationships with the communities and people we serve."

The Food Pantry and Resource Center of Sutton County relies on the generosity of the community. They appreciate any and all donations, including canned or dry goods, personal hygiene products, and monetary donations. The food pantry is located on the corner of Glasscock St. and 277 South.

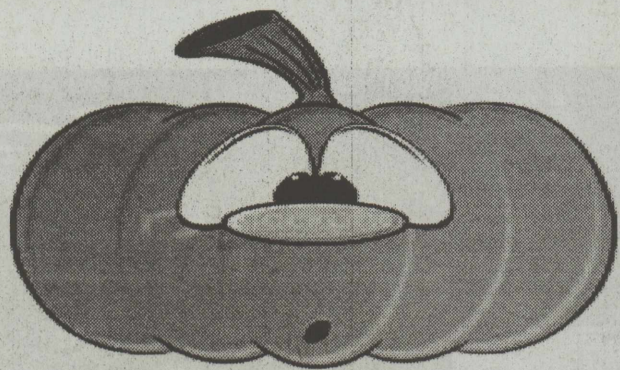

Pumpkin Trivia

This time of year we think about pumpkins because of jack-o-lanterns. We also like them because of pumpkin pie. Let's take a look at some trivia on pumpkins.

The Pilgrims probably did not eat pumpkin pie. What?!

They cut the top off of a pumpkin, scooped the seeds out, and filled the cavity with cream (milk), honey, eggs and spices. They placed the top back on and carefully buried it in the hot ashes of a cooking fire. When finished cooking, they scooped the contents out along with the cooked flesh of the shell like a custard.

If you've thought about planting pumpkins, you should know that they thrive in sunshine and deep, well-drained soil, and should receive about 6 hours of sunlight per day. Pumpkin roots prefer 4 feet of growing space, but a foot or two of soil depth and adequate moisture and nutrition would be more than adequate. Pumpkins also do well on our mildly alkaline soils.

Plant your seeds 1/2 to 1 inch deep from May to early June. Allow at least 3 to 4 months for your pumpkin to grow; the longer it is in the ground the bigger it will be! Once fully

mature, the pumpkin skin will harden so that a thumbnail will not easily puncture it and the color will change from green to the normal color of the particular variety. Cut them from the vine leaving a few inches of stem, and store it in a cool dry place.

According to Extension Horticulturist, Dr. Juan Anciso, Texas is the fourth leading state in commercial pumpkin production, and generates \$2.4 million for farmers, with an economic impact of \$7.4 million in the state. He calculates that 5,000 to 8,000 acres are planted annually in Texas. 90% are in the west Texas region. Over 90% are produced for seasonal ornamental use.

The pumpkin is a cucurbit. Cucurbits are plants of the gourd family (Cucurbitaceae), which includes melon, pumpkin, squash, and cucumber. They are mostly climbing or trailing plants.

Pumpkins produce tremendous amounts of foliage, which favor insects and disease. Chemical control is essential, along with cultural control methods. Resistant varieties are not available.

Raully found Dylan Taylor on 79 yard touchdown reception for a touchdown followed by a reception by Brian Van Winkle for the two point conversion. (Broncos 24-0) With the ensuing kick Mark Chavez stripped the ball from the runner giving the Broncos another chance to score. Broncos moved the ball but eventually punted. Daniel Gonzalez jumped high in the air to intercept the pass stopping Crane's chance of scoring right before half.

With 7:40 on the clock in the third quarter Dylan Vaughn recovered a fumble in the end zone for another Bronco touchdown. Marcos Talamantes kick was good for the PAT to bring the score to 31-6. Late in the game Raully connected with Hector Mendez on a three yard touchdown reception for the last score of the night. (Kick no good) Broncos won 37-12

Game Warden Field Notes

The following items are compiled from recent Texas Parks and Wildlife Department law enforcement reports.

You Missed a Spot: Two San Augustine County game wardens apprehended two men for road hunting with a spotlight near Sam Rayburn Lake. When the wardens inspected the men's truck, they saw the truck bed had been power washed clean, but the men missed a tiny spot of blood and hair. When the wardens pointed out this evidence, the men confessed they'd killed a deer a few days earlier. Both men face charges of hunting from a public road, possession of deer in closed season and unlawful carry of a handgun.

Won't See You Later, Alligator: After a Shelby County game warden received a call about a five-foot alligator that had been shot on the Attoyac River, he contacted a gas company located near the river, hoping someone who worked there had seen something. An employee said he saw some people by the river a few days earlier and gave a description of the people and their vehicle, which the warden found a few days later at a local hunting lease. After running a vehicle check, the warden found the owner on Facebook, and the gas company employee positively identified him as one of the people he had seen near the river. The warden went to the suspect's house, and the suspect confessed his friend shot the alligator with a .20-gauge shotgun. After calling his friend to come over and verify what happened, the cooperative shooter arrived at the house a little while later. The warden filed multiple cases, and civil restitution is pending.

Campground Terror: A Shelby County game warden was on patrol when he heard a 911 call over dispatch about an assault with shots fired at a local marina campground. The caller said the shooter was threatening to kill her and would "shoot when he saw police cars" and was "going to die tonight." The warden, two deputies and a constable responded to the scene, though they didn't know the shooter's exact location. Using night vision goggles, the warden and other officers searched and cleared the campground. When they saw the silhouette of a man walking quickly through the shadows, they told him to stop and took him into custody. The warden found a loaded .357 handgun nearby. The man was charged with aggravated assault with a deadly weapon.

Selfie Incriminated: A Matagorda County game warden received information from a citizen about an individual who had illegally obtained and kept an alligator. Because the individual posted pictures of the alligator on social media, the wardens found him quite easily. The individual admitted to taking the alligator from a public roadway.

"Biting So Good": As two Jefferson County game wardens patrolled Port Arthur, they came across two men fishing from the bank around 1 a.m. The individuals were fishing under lights and catching speckled trout. They said they trout were "biting so good" they couldn't help themselves. The wardens found the men in possession of 18 undersized trout. Cases are pending against them.

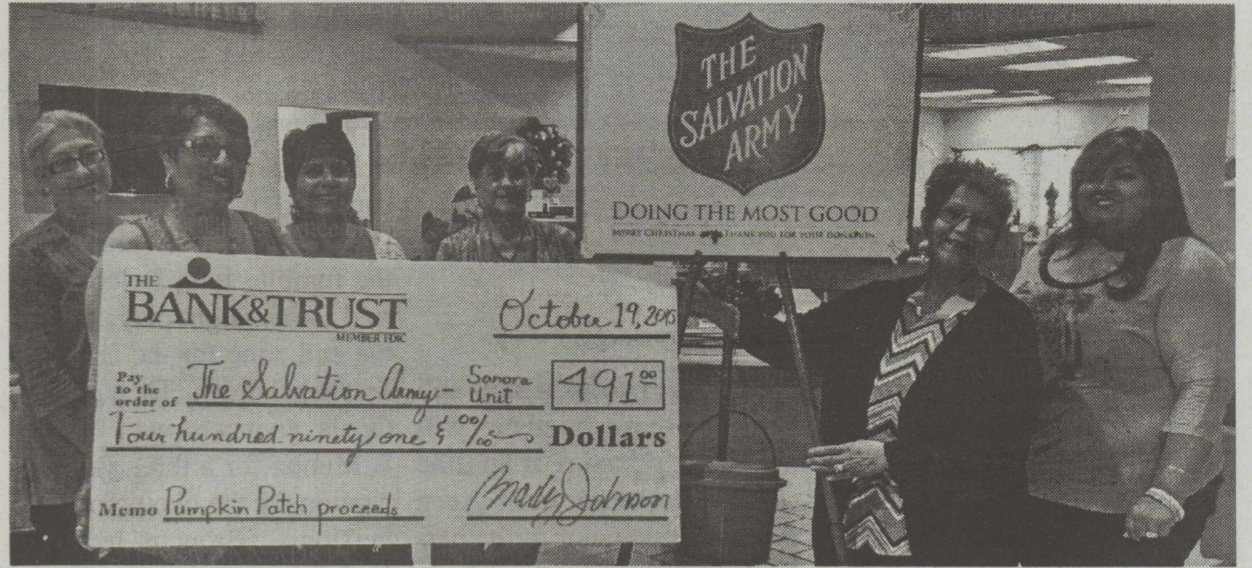

The Sutton County conducted public hearings on September 3, 2015 and September 14, 2015 on a proposal to increase the total tax revenues of the Sutton County from properties on the tax roll in the preceding year by 2.000112 percent.

The total tax revenue raised last year at last year's tax rate of 0.529804 for each \$100 of taxable value was \$3,319,639.06.

The total tax revenue proposed to be raised this year at the proposed tax rate of 0.565355 for each \$100 of taxable value, excluding tax revenue to be raised from new property added to the tax roll this year, is \$3,382,090.92.

Introducing The New Agrilife Extension Sheep And Goat Assistant

AN ANGELO – Sterling “Ty” Crooks became the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service state sheep and goat assistant effective Oct. 12.

Crooks is headquartered at the Texas A&M AgriLife Research and Extension Center at San Angelo. His primary duties will involve working with the state’s 4-H sheep and goat youth programs, said Dr. Reid Redden, AgriLife Extension state sheep and goat specialist at San Angelo and Crooks’ supervisor.

“I am very pleased to have Ty assisting me with our agency’s extensive youth and adult educational programs across the state,”

Redden said. “He has a strong 4-H background, exhibits a genuine willingness to work with our clientele and has an excellent working knowledge of both our agency and the industry.”

“The Texas youth sheep and goat projects typically involve some 20,000 animals annually. It’s no small endeavor, in fact, it’s one of the most popular project areas within our agency’s youth component and that of FFA.

“Ty’s well-rounded interest and positive attitude are ideal to assist not only with the youth component, but also with adult industry educational programs as well.”

Redden said Crook’s du-

ties will include playing an important role in assisting with the state 4-H wool and mohair judging program.

Crooks holds a bachelor’s degree in animal science from Angelo State University and is currently working toward earning a master’s degree in sheep and goat nutrition at the university. He has served as the university’s assistant wool judging coach since 2013.

While attending ASU, the San Angelo native was a member of the school’s Delta Tau Alpha Honor Society, served as treasurer for the Block and Bridle Club and was a member of the Meat and Food Science Association. He was also part

of the 2013 Reserve National Champion Angelo State University Intercollegiate Meats Judging Team and the 2012 Angelo State Intercollegiate Wool Judging Team.

Crooks previously was involved in ranch work and is co-owner of Crooks Club Lambs.

He fills the position formerly held by Joshua Smartt who accepted a post with the U.S. Department of Agriculture-Farm Service Agency in the Bryan-College Station area.

“This state sheep and goat assistant position has developed numerous sheep and goat industry leaders in the past and we expect more of the same with Ty Crooks,” Redden said.

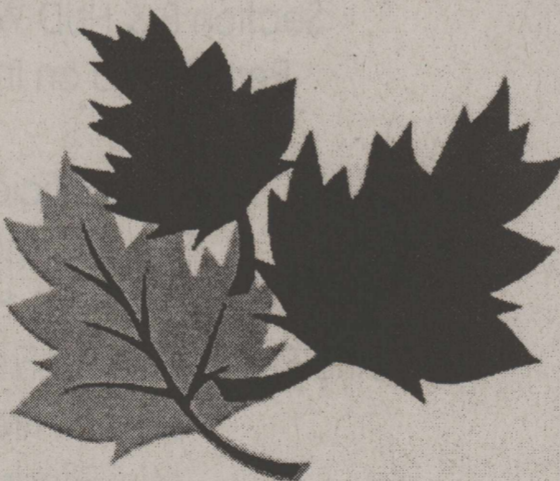
