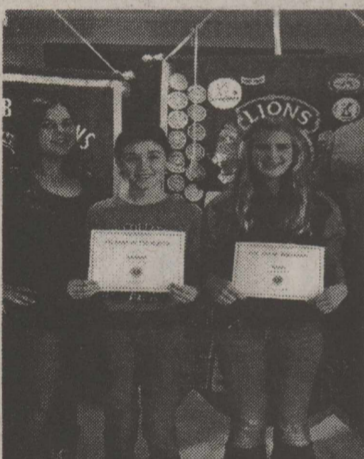

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Bi-District Was A Tough Win

There have been many memorable games between the Sonora Broncos and the Ballinger Bearcats. In 1968, Ballinger beat the Broncos in the third game of the season by two points. Sonora was one win and two losses going into district. They never lost again enroute to Sonora's second state championship. In 1990, the Bearcats demolished the Broncos in the regular season only to lose the Area Championship to Sonora. Last week's game will probably have a spot in the "Do you remember the ..." list when Bronco history is discussed.

I was nervous about this game. Many people expected a Bronco blowout win. Colonel Bradley reminded me that they beat us easily during this summer's 7 on 7 competition. Also, the grapevine/internet reported that three of their best players, including Jake Morgan, their quarterback, were out for our game.

Noah SanMiguel took the opening kickoff and returned it 28 yards to the Bearcats' 42-yard line. Quarterback Kaden Cordell took the shotgun snap and started looking for a re-

ceiver. When he found no one open, he changed direction and started running to avoid Bearcats, until he crossed the goal line for a touchdown on the first play of the game. Octavio Mendez's kick hit the left upright and didn't go through. The Broncos had a six point lead after only 23 seconds of game time.

Ballinger came right back to let everyone know that they had come to play. Their drive had two big plays. The first play would've been over-turned on "further review." Morgan threw deep to Rusty Fischer. As Fischer was going out of bounds, Luke James stripped the ball out of his hands, and it hit the ground. Somehow, the official missed it and called it complete. Three plays later, Morgan scored on a 31 yard run. Tyler Matschek's kick just barely cleared the crossbar. Ballinger had its only lead of the game at 7 to 6 with 9:06 left in the first quarter.

James caught the kickoff at the 29-yard line and started up field. He broke to his right to follow his blockers. Nearing the 50-yard line, Matschek grabbed James' facemask and

jerked his helmet completely off. James gained nine more yards without his helmet. After the penalty, the Broncos were in good field position at the Ballinger 34-yard line. With his helmet securely fastened, James gained 13 yards up the middle. Two tough runs by Kevin Martinez, and the Broncos had a first down at the 11-yard line. The Bearcat defense forced a Bronco turnover on downs, and they took over at the one-yard line.

After two stops, Andrew Pinkins broke through the line. Only a great solo tackle by Cordell prevented a large gain. They had to punt. Martinez ran once, and SanMiguel caught a Cordell pass to get the Broncos to the Ballinger's 14-yard line. Cordell took the snap, looked to his right, before turning and throwing to James on the left side of the line. James caught the ball and smashed his way to the touchdown. Michael Solis came in as quarterback. He leaped over the goal line for the two-point conversion. Sonora 14 - Ballinger 7 with 2:40 left in quarter one.

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Grants Available For Events And Attractions

The Sonora City Council has restructured the spending of tax funds, known as HOT (Hotel Occupancy Tax) funds, to facilitate making grants available to organizations, groups or individuals whose events and attractions increase overnight lodging in Sonora. The Sonora Tourism Steering Committee (STSC) has been established to manage HOT fund grants to aid eligible activities and support tourism facilities in and around Sonora.

The primary objective of the Sonora Tourism Steering Committee (STSC) is to identify and fund events and attractions that will entice travelers to the area, with a focus on maximizing hotel occupancy and promoting local businesses.

By general law of the State of Texas, the City of Sonora collects a 7% HOT from hotels, motels, and bed and breakfasts within the city limits. Under state law, the revenue from the HOT may be used only for specific tourism-related purposes. Both elements of the following two-part test must be met before the STSC considers grant requests.

Criteria One requires that expenditures of HOT funds directly enhance and promote the tourism and/or convention and hotel industry to attract out-of-town visitors who will likely spend the night in Sonora.

And

Criteria Two requires that expenditures of HOT money clearly fit into one of the nine statutory categories described

below.

- (1) Funding the establishment, improvement, or maintenance of a convention center or visitor information center.
- (2) Paying the administrative costs for facilitating convention registration.
- (3) Paying the advertising, solicitations, and promotions that attract tourists and convention delegates to the city or its vicinity.
- (4) Expenditures that promote the arts.
- (5) Funding historical restoration or preservation programs.
- (6) Funding costs to hold sporting events that substantially increase hotel activity.
- (7) Funding the enhancement or upgrading of existing sports facilities or sports fields.

(8) Funding transportation systems for tourists.

(9) Signage directing tourists to sights and attractions that are visited frequently by hotel guests in the municipality.

The STSC accepts applications from public and private entities whose programs/events meet the two criteria tests described above. All requests for funds should be submitted in writing and accompanied by the official application and supporting documents. You will find the application on the Sonora Chamber of Commerce website at www.sonoratexas.org.

HOT funds granted to recipients must be used for an event (activity, service, or venue) that has the attraction of tourists and/or other over-

night visitors as one of its main purposes, and expenditures and performance metrics must be properly documented and reported.

The application process will be centralized and managed by the STSC which works under the authority of the Sonora City Council. The STSC is currently accepting applications.

Ballinger moved the chains twice. Then on third and long, Drew Bruitron and Jose Hernandez combined for a sack to force them to punt. Morgan got off a low, bouncing punt that rolled into the end zone for a touchback.

On the second play, K Mart broke free for a 43 yard run to the 30-yard line. SanMiguel gained 23 yards on a completion from Cordell. A Ballinger penalty moved the ball to their three-yard line for a first and goal. The Bronco line fired out, and Solis scored on the quarterback sneak. Mendez kicked the PAT. Sonora 21 - Ballinger 7 with 9:21 left in the first half.

Both teams played punishing defense the rest of the first half with no more scoring.

When the second half started, I was still nervous remembering two trips into the red zone with no scores. Turned out, I had a reason to be nervous.

On Ballinger's fourth play of the second half, Morgan scored on a 42 yard run. Matschek's PAT made the score 21 to 14 in favor of the Broncos. Their drive lasted 3:03.

After one first down, the

Broncos had to punt. The Bearcats took over on the 31-yard line. There was movement on the lines before the snap. It appeared that the Broncos relaxed just slightly waiting on the penalty whistle. Morgan threw deep to 6'3" tall, 185 pound tight end Fischer for a 69 yard touchdown. Matschek made his kick, and the game was tied at 21 all with 7:07 left in the third.

Sonora responded with a 63 yard scoring drive that featured only running plays. Solis scored a touchdown on a 28 yard run from what I call the 'Ethan Morriss Trips Right' formation. Mendez added a point. Sonora 28 - Ballinger 21 with 3:43 left in the third quarter.

Ballinger fumbled on their first play after the kickoff, and Michael Mungia recovered for the Broncos. The Bearcats stopped four Bronco running plays short of the goal line. This was their third goal line stand.

Ballinger drove to Sonora's 20 yard line. Morgan dropped back to pass and was chased by Hernandez. Morgan reversed his field and retreated

Don't Crash the Party on Thanksgiving! Buckling Up Could Save Your Giblets!

The following article is provided by the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Passenger Safety grant in College Station, TX provided by Bev Kellner Program Manager and TXDOT. It is being published in Sonora, TX to ask individuals to buckle up all passengers every time.

As families travel long and short distances to gather together on Thanksgiving and begin the holiday season, the roads become more heavily traveled and the chances for car crashes go up. In fact, the Thanksgiving holiday is one of the most dangerous holidays of the year when it comes to vehicle crashes and fatalities. During the Thanksgiving holiday weekend in 2013 there were 301 people killed in traffic crashes across the nation — and tragically, 58 percent of those killed were not buckled up. Buckling up is the single most effective step you can take to increase your chances of a safe road trip on Thanksgiving! Taking those few seconds to make sure all of your passengers, young and old, are buckled up, as well as keeping your focus on driving and preparing ahead for the trip, can make all the difference.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service Agent Jessica Stapper, Sutton County reminds motorists to give driv-

ing your full attention, buckle up, check road and weather conditions, and protect yourself and others on the road. Follow these steps to make sure you arrive alive:

Prepare. Make sure your car and tires are in good condition and that roads and visibility are clear. If using a GPS device, enter your destination before you start to drive. If you prefer a map or written directions, review them in advance.

Make sure all passengers are buckled up correctly. Passengers in the back seat need to buckle up — it's the law! Make sure children are in appropriate car seats for their age, height, weight and developmental stage.

Turn it off and stow it. Turn your phone off or switch it to silent mode before you get in the car. Then stow it away so that it's out of reach.

Pull over. If you need to make a call, first pull over to a safe area.

Secure your pets. Unsecured pets are not only dangerous to themselves and other passengers, they can also be a big distraction in the car.

Mind the kids. Pull over to a safe place to address situations involving children in the car.

Focus on driving. Multi-tasking behind the wheel is dangerous. Refrain from eating, drinking, reading, grooming,

smoking, and any other activity that takes your mind and eyes off the road.

As a reminder to buckle up, the Click It or Ticket campaign will be in force during the holiday weekend with extra officers on patrol to increase awareness and enforcement of the seat belt and car seat laws. The key message of the effort is that surviving your Thanksgiving drive this year — and making it to next Thanksgiving — can be as simple as buckling up!

about 15 yards before he threw the ball away. The ball didn't make it to the line of scrimmage resulting in an intentional grounding penalty. After three quarters, the score stood at 28-21.

As the fourth quarter started, Morgan was facing third and 25 from his 35-yard line. He threw deep and Carter Zook almost came down with an interception. On fourth down, Morgan tried a pooch punt. The line drive ball went right to Louie Castro. He caught it and returned it. It was strange to see Castro catch the ball with Ballinger defenders behind him hoping to cover the ball before it went into the end zone.

The Broncos drove the field until they reached the red zone. Once again, the Bearcats kept the Broncos out of the end zone and took over on downs.

Using the running game, Ballinger moved from their three-yard line to the 45 yard line. Morgan threw deep and Cordell intercepted at the Broncos' 23-yard line with 4:51 left in the game. The Broncos fans' cheers erupted.

The Bronco offensive line fired up by the coaches and the fans opened holes for the running backs. James and Martinez had three straight carries and each carry was more than 12 yards. James was tackled at the Bearcat 44 yard line. He was hit late, and the penalty moved the ball to the 29-yard line. After reaching the 14-yard line on carries by K Mart and James, the Bearcat defense

stiffened. They called a run blitz and caught James behind the line of scrimmage at the 24-yard line. James caught a Cordell pass over the middle setting up a fourth down at the 15-yard line with 1:20 left in the game. Cordell then dropped to pass and threw to San Miguel who was running the crossing pattern in the end zone. San Miguel leaped over two defenders, got BOTH feet down, and gave the Broncos a two score lead with 1:08 left in the game. I finally got over my nervousness. Broncos 34 - Bearcats 21.

On the second play after the Bronco kickoff, James intercepted Morgan to seal the Bi-District Championship for the Sonora Broncos.

Kaden Cordell had an outstanding game. He completed 16 of 20 passes for 159 yards and two touchdowns. He scored on a 42 yard run. On defense, he led the Broncos in tackles with 17 and seven of those tackles were solo. His interception stopped Ballinger's last real chance to tie the score and setup the game clinching drive.

K Mart led all rushers with 129 yards on 18 carries. James gained 45 yards on seven carries. Solis had 38 yards on six carries and two rushing touchdowns.

SanMiguel led all receivers with five receptions for 71 yards and one leaping touchdown. James, Solis, and Zook each caught three passes for 29, 19, and 24 yards respectively.

Buitron, Wesley Dutton, Mungia, and Liam Yourgalite

had three solo tackles each. Isaiah Lira was the second leading tackler with 10 tackles.

Buitron, Hernandez, and Yourgalite had one sack each.

After the presentation of the Bi-District trophy, I tried my hand at interviewing some of the players. It is not something that I am good at. I asked Yourgalite if he was ever scared that we would lose the game. He answered no. If you could have heard him, his tone indicated that it never entered his mind, and why did I ask such a foolish question. So I asked an easy one. "Did you hear the announcer mispronouncing your name?" He smiled and said yes.

I asked Coach Sine why he had to make the game so scary. I could tell by his face that he had had a few nervous moments also. I asked if Cordell's arm was injured since he never threw deep. "They were dropping eight and sometimes nine into coverage. Their game plan was to stop all big plays," said Sine. "So, we ran the ball."

The Broncos play the Eastland Mavericks (9-2) in the Area game of the 2015 playoffs on Thursday in Sweetwater's Mustang Bowl. This is the second time in Bronco history that Sonora has faced the Mavericks. Last year, the Broncos were the underdog and defeated Eastland in the Region Quarterfinal 42-37. We go into this game as the underdog also. Bronco fans need to be loud so the players can hear the fan noise on the field. Go Big Red.

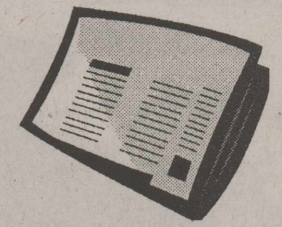

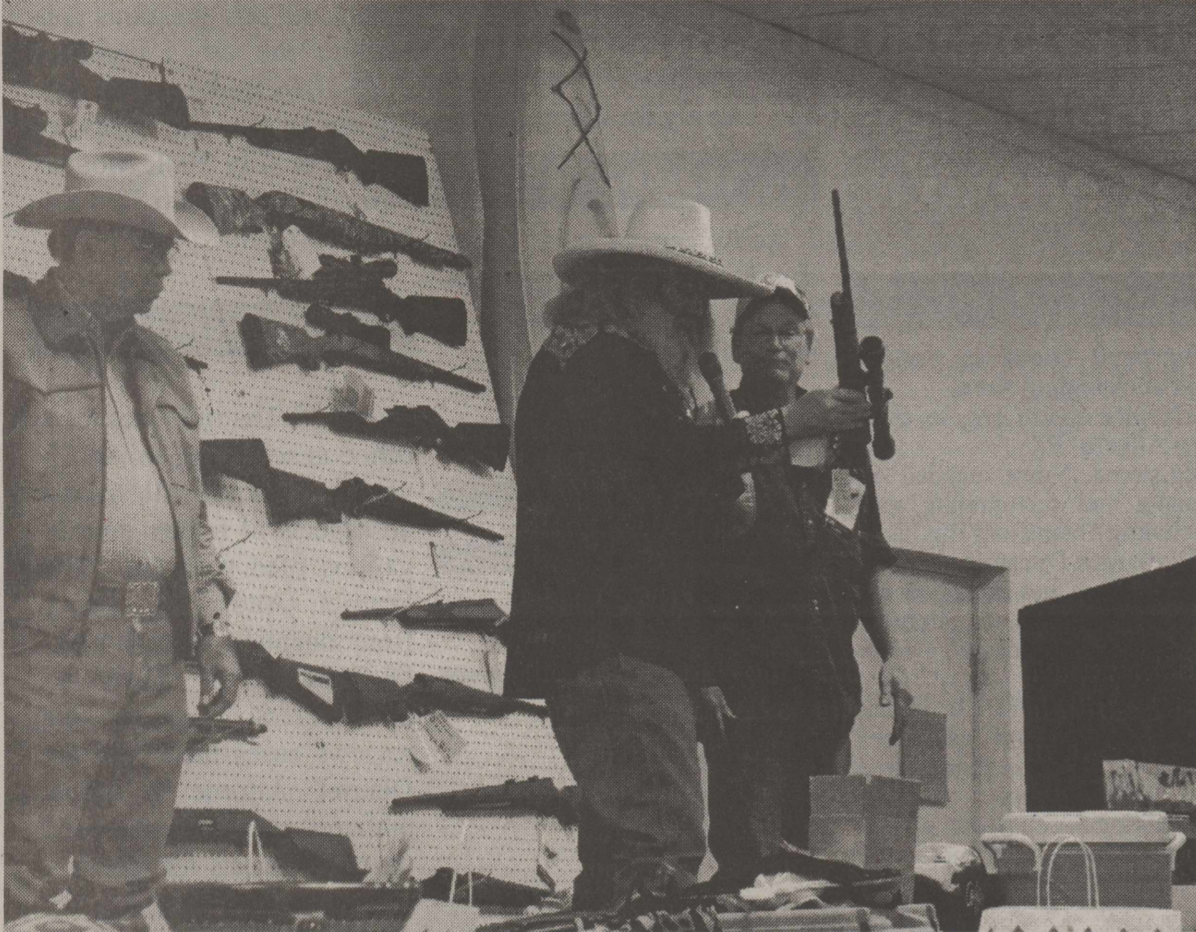

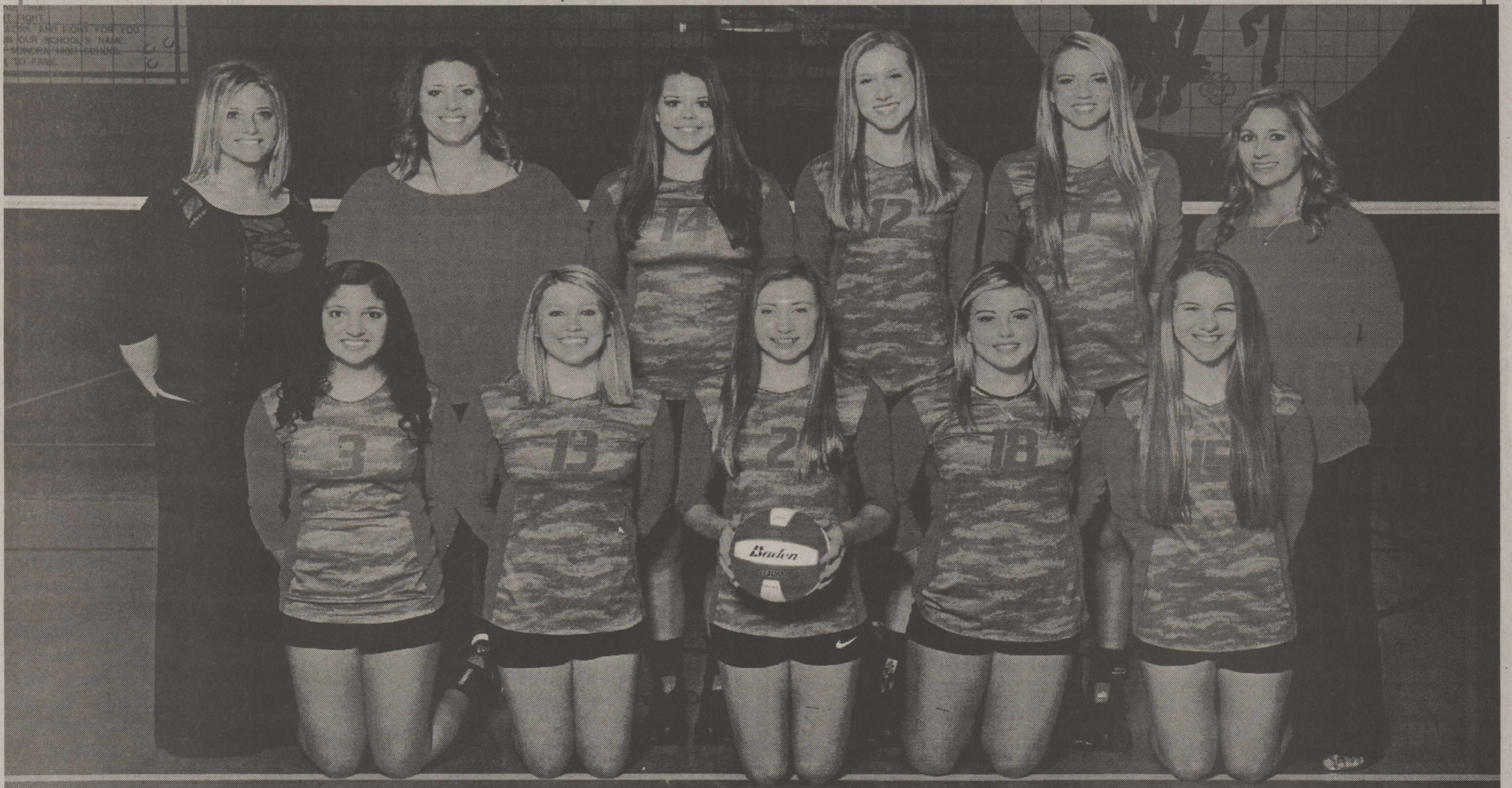
