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Final Thoughts On The 2015 Football Season

The day after the Broncos ended their season in Sweetwater, Nancy and I went to Boerne to video the Class 2A Division I Region 4 Area Championship between the Junction Eagles and the Flatonia Bulldogs for KIDY TV. Coach Phillips was at the game, and I got to talk to him. I (jokingly) mentioned that we are glad that the schedule, that included Boerne, Wall, Denver City, and Comfort, was finally finished. Coach Phillips explained why we ended up with that schedule. Sonora was looking for non-district opponents after advancing to the Semifinals in 2012 and the Area Championship in 2013 AND was returning lots of starters. None of the teams close to us would agree to play us. "I even tried to get Refugio to meet us half way." That is why we ended up with such a tough pre-district schedule the past two years. I told him that some people in Sonora think that he was "run off." He gave me a puzzled look and said that he was not pressured to leave and that he left for personal/family reasons.

At Two-A-Days in August, Coach Sine and his staff

knew they were facing a big challenge. They only had three returning starters from the massively talented 2014 Semifinal team. That team may have been the strongest team ever. The 2014 Sonora Broncos would just line up and run over you. The 2015 Broncos would be a "rebuilding" team. The 2015 Broncos would be transitioning to the spread offense and a new defense. I asked Coach Sine what he expected of this year's team. "This team will surprise a lot of people."

The non-district went pretty much as could have been expected. The Broncos lost to the teams with larger populations. However, the coaches and players were learning the new offense and defense and getting better each week. When district started the Broncos steamrolled their district opponents and won the District Championship. After winning the Bi-District Championship, they were eliminated by the senior laden Eastland Mavericks.

I really miss not knowing the statistics from years' past. Records are sketchy at best. With that in mind, I would like to mention some plays

that were probably records. From my video, it appears that Jarrett Jackson ran for a 96 yard touchdown joining Darien Lopez in 2012 and Chance Campbell in 2013. Jose Hernandez had a pick six of 92 yards AND returned a fumble 92 yards for a touchdown. Luke James surpassed Word Hudson's single season receiving record with 1,022 yards, just 15 more yards than Hudson's record set in 2011.

Kaden Cordell had an amazing year. He is probably the first quarterback in Bronco history to ever lead the team in tackles. He finished with 108 tackles that were 22 more than the next closest Bronco. He is surely the only Bronco quarterback to ever throw five touchdowns in two consecutive games. He threw for 2,442 yards and 26 touchdowns. Each total is third behind Clayton Parks in 2011 and Bryce Williams in 2000.

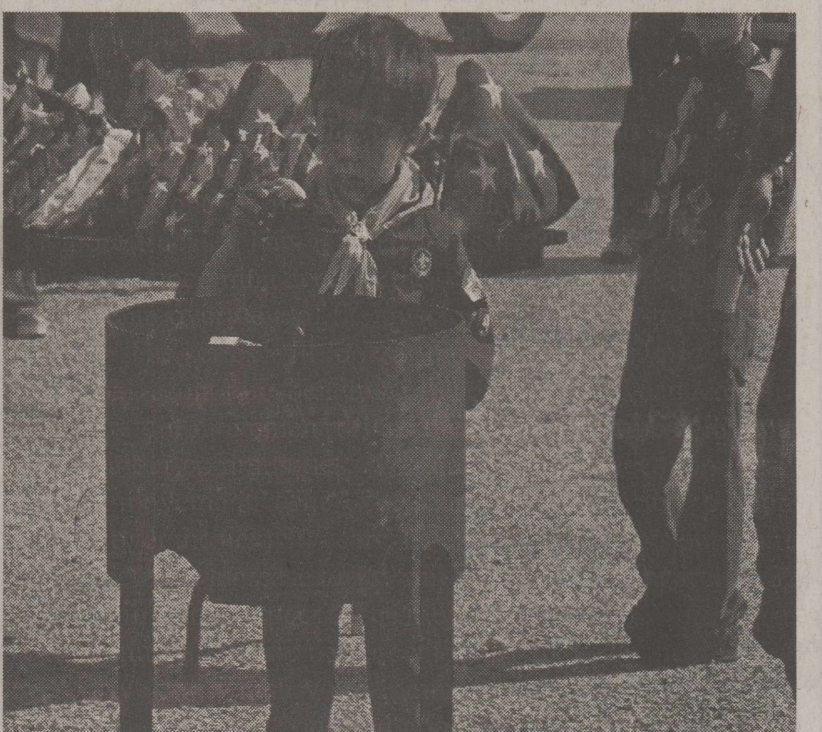
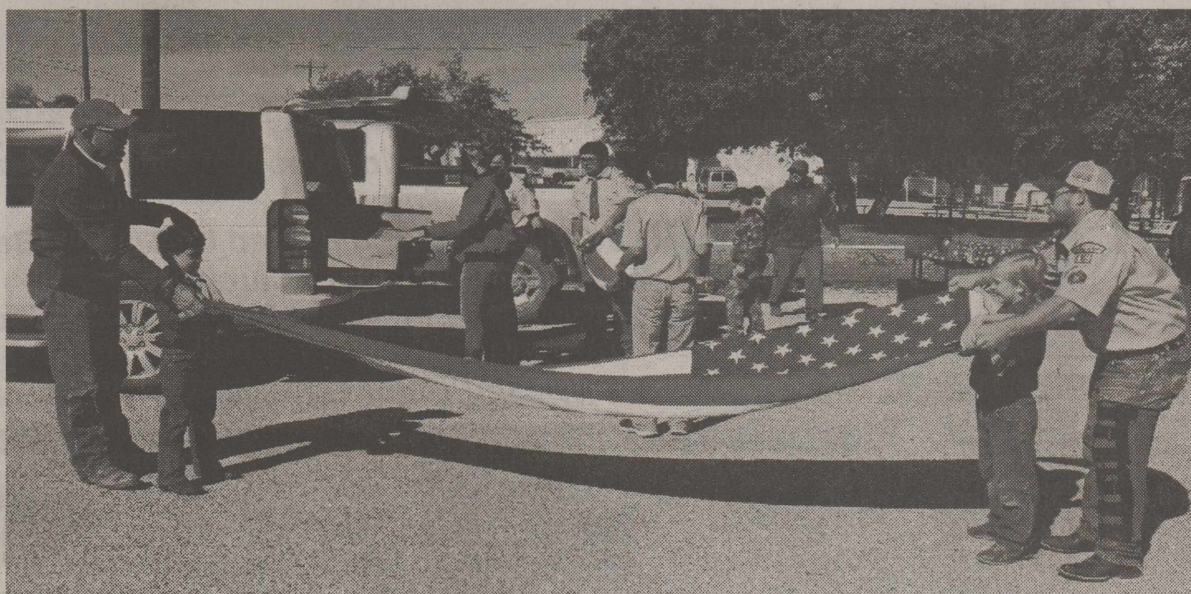
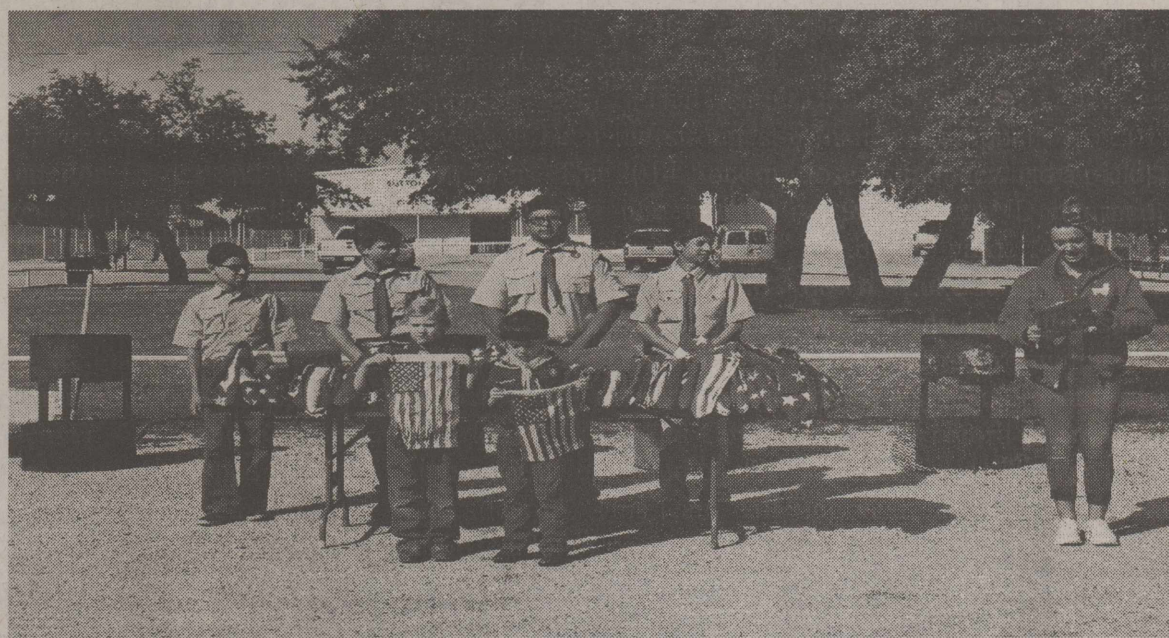

goods available at your local retail outlet and the cost of these goods is directly impacted by highways connecting your community to the world. The following excerpt is from the DRAFT National Freight Strategic Plan. "Our freight system moves approximately 63 tons of goods per American each year. As our population grows and our economy expands, demand for freight will grow as well, placing additional strain on an already challenged transportation system. U.S. freight demand will be affected by several trends:

- Freight will grow across all transportation modes.
- The changing nature of our economy and population will affect where and how freight moves.
- All else being equal, growth in overall freight demand will place increased pressure on infrastructure throughout the country, with particularly significant impacts concentrated in certain areas.
- Increasing domestic en-

ergy production will have profound implications for our transportation system." With no question that freight movement will continue to increase, the expansion of the Ports-to-Plains Corridor is critical. Stay tuned for regular updates that look at the Ports-to-Plains corridor from the viewpoint of safety, economic development and transportation funding. What's In A Feed Sack?
Ever try to read the tag on a feed sack and wonder exactly what the information means? It can be puzzling sometimes. Let's take a brief look at what some of that information means.

A Guaranteed Analysis on the sack might vary somewhat depending to the state in which it was manufactured. Minimum requirements are for statements of crude protein, crude fiber, and crude fat. These are expressed as percentages.

An ingredient list might list every ingredient in the feed, but more often is deliberately vague. One reason is that some feed formulas are designed to be variable, so that one ingredient (providing similar nutrition) can be substituted for another as grain market prices fluctuate. Secondly, many manufacturers prefer not to disclose the exact formula for their grain rations, for fear of being copied by the competitors. So, instead of specific ingredients like soybean meal or cottonseed meal, you might see "plant protein products". Instead of brewer's yeast, wheat bran, or corn gluten feed, you might see a listing for "processed grain by-products."

The percentage of crude protein expressed on a feed label is calculated from the nitrogen content of the grain. The word "crude" on the label is an indicator that not all of the protein included in the percentage listed will actually be digestible.

Crude fat also is expressed as a percentage on a feed tag; it refers to the total ratio of fats and oils contained in the product, including both saturated fats and unsaturated oils. Fat is energy-dense, providing almost 2 1/2 times as much energy, pound per pound, than do carbohydrates or protein; the higher the crude fat value, the higher the calories provided per pound of feed--so fewer pounds of grain might be needed for the same amount of energy and weight maintenance.

The crude fiber value of a feed plays a big part in determining the energy content of a feed. Generally, as the fiber percentage decreases, the calories per pound go up; and as fiber levels increase, the calories go down. Therefore, high-fiber feeds must be fed in larger quantities in order to maintain the same calorie intake per day. The word "crude" in the case of fiber describes both the digestible and indigestible fiber in the feed.

What's in A Feed Sack

Digestible fiber such as beet pulp, is more easily absorbed, while indigestible fiber, such as oat hulls, wheat chaff, or soybean hulls, generally is tougher in texture.

Of course labels contain much more. They can also include minimum and maximum percentages of calci-

um, and minimum values for phosphorus (expressed as %). Other mineral components expressed in parts per million (ppm) include copper, zinc, selenium.



AgriLife Extension Entomologists: Expect Invaders As Weather Gets Colder

DALLAS — With temperatures dropping, many Texas residents likely will be getting some unwanted guests in their homes around the holidays, according to Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service pest management experts. "This time of year, squirrels, as well as raccoons, will try to make nests in attics," said Janet Hurley, AgriLife Extension program specialist in integrated pest management, Dallas. "Also several species of ants will nest in the walls of homes for warmth and protection."

Hurley said another unwelcome guest people can expect to see more of as the weather turns colder is mice. "Rodents can infest homes, threaten public health and destroy property," Hurley said. She said the common house mouse, for

example, can eat or contaminate household foods, cause structural damage by building nests and gnawing on furniture and electrical wires, and can spread disease. Hurley said exclusion is an effective means of reducing the threat of rodent-borne diseases, allergens and other health threats. To help exclude mice and other rodents from the home, she recommended: — Seal gaps of 1/4 inch or more with steel wool or a foam sealant that expands. Fill large holes or cracks with concrete or stuff with an excluder cloth and seal them. — Seal around water, gas, electrical and other pipes and conduits. — Install brush-type or baffle-style door sweeps to seal exterior doors. — Seal gaps around eaves and the

frames of screens and louvers.

— Do not let trash, weeds or wood accumulate near or along exterior walls or doorways.

— Keep garbage cans covered and lids tightly closed.

— Store pet food off the floor and in airtight containers.

To control mice that have already entered the home, Hurley suggests using traps as opposed to poison baits.

"If there are young children or pets in the home, consider placing the traps inside locked box stations to avoid accidents," Hurley said. "The use of poison baits should be a last resort and is best left to the professionals since there could be risk to children and pets."

Anyone traveling during the holidays should be aware of the

potential for picking up bed bugs, according to Dr. Mike Merchant, AgriLife Extension urban entomologist for Texas A&M AgriLife Extension. Bed bugs are small, reddish-brown, oval-shaped insects that feed on human blood and are becoming more common in hotels and homes.

"Bed bugs are great at hitchhiking in luggage, and savvy travelers should know how to minimize their risk of bringing an unwelcome guest home from the holidays," Merchant said.

He noted that while the risk of encountering these pests in your travels is relatively low, bringing a bed bug home is definitely not a good idea.

"Suffering a few bed bug bites while traveling is not pleasant,

but it's much worse to bring them home where they can proliferate," he said.

Experts recommend avoiding setting luggage on or next to a bed or other upholstered furniture where bed bugs can easily stow away after feeding.

"This practice is an open invitation for bed bugs," he said. "Instead, put your stuff on the luggage rack away from the bed."

"It's just now starting to get close to freezing in the South Central Texas area, but in the next few weeks I expect to start getting calls about more insects coming indoors," said Wizzie Brown, AgriLife Extension entomologist for Travis County.

The Schleicher/Sutton/Val Verde County FSA Office will be having a holiday open house December 9th. Please come by and say hello, have refreshments and you can pick up information about the programs that we offer. This will be the day that the County Committee meets and counts ballots for the LAA 2 election that we are holding this year. You can also visit with our county committee members if you would like.

December 1st, 2015 – General CRP signup begins. The Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) is a program designed to give the producer the opportunity to take ground out of production while receiving annual payments to offset lost revenue. Contracts are 10 to 15 years and ground has to meet specific set criteria. A plan of operation will be written and the producer will be expected to follow this plan for the life of the contract. Cost share is available for seeding ground back to grass and for applying the practices that will be written into the plan. If you are interested please call and

make an appointment. 325-853-3535.

December 15th, 2015 – Final date to certify fall planted crops. All acres must be certified. Please contact the office at 325-853-3535 as soon as possible to set up your appointment. Cost to certify late will be a minimum of \$46.00 for each farm or ranch. Anyone participating in FSA programs MUST certify all acres carried under each farm and ranch number in this office. If grass was not certified for 2015 and payments were made for any disaster program there is going to be a minimum \$46.00 penalty for each ranch number that has to be certified late. Penalties will be paid or previous payments will be paid back.

October 1st, 2015 was the beginning of a new continuous CRP signup for grassland. The tree and brush canopy must be less than 10% on ground that will be considered for acceptance into this program.

We are having a County Committee election for LAA 2. This position represents the south 1/2 of Schleicher County. Ballots have been sent out to eligible voters for the LAA2 area. Ballots must be returned either via mail or in person at this office by December 7th, 2015. Please

take the time to vote for the nominee and remember write ins are welcome. The newly elected committee members and alternates will take office on January 1st, 2016.

For those of you who have had changes including but not limited to operator changes, ownership changes or if you have set up a trust, general partnership or corporation or had any changes in existing entities, please get your information to us so that we can be working on getting the changes completed. These changes can cause change in eligibility for program payments and paperwork my need to be revised so that future payments can be issued in a timely manner.
