### Elections set Saturday

Pampa voters Saturday will elect city commissioners for wards two and four and representatives for three places on the Independent School District Board of Trustees.

the ISD Trustees Board are up for election

Places one, two and three on

Only those residents on the 1977 voter registration list or on the current 1978 list are eligible

to vote. Persons who are on the 1977 list but who failed to return a 1978 voter registration card by the March 1 deadline will be permitted to vote in Saturday's elections. However, they must first sign an affadavit swearing to their legal residency.

Voting booths for both elections will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. For the city commissioners' race. Ward One

residents must vote at City Hall; Ward Two at the North fire department substation, 321 E. 17th: Ward Three at the Optimist Boys Club, 601 E. Craven; and Ward Four at the South fire department substation, 1010 S. Barnes.

The ISD Trustees election booth will be located in the music room of Pampa High School

Candidates for the Ward Two city commissioner race are Charles J. "Chuck" Eckelberry, an IBM service employee and corporate pilot for Cabot Corporation, and Coyle C. Ford. owner of a local automobile body shop. Joe B. Curtis, Ward Two commissioner, is not seeking re-election.

Ira Linden "Butch" Shepherd is running unopposed for the Ward Four commissioner's seat. Shepherd, an incumbent, is an employee of Panhandle Industries Corporation.

ISD. Board of Trustees

(incumbent) and Burley T. Owen, place one; Mrs. Billy Winningham and Darville D. Orr, place two; and Don Butler and Dr. Robert Lyle (incumbent), place three. David Crossman, place two trustee is not seeking re-election.

City commissioners serve terms of two years and ISD trustees serve three - year

Citizens of Lefors also will go to the polls Saturday to elect a mayor and three city councilmen.

### Group seeks new city pool

A group of Pampans want a new swimming pool to replace one they say was built "with baling wire and chewing gum." But the question seems to be

They plan to approach City Council in April for help in financing and construction of an Olympic-sized city pool, but also hope to count on donations from industries and individuals

Mack Wofford, city manager. agreed that the city pool at Kentucky and Deane is in poor condition, but said immediate construction on a new pool might require the passage of a bond issue

But representatives of the group said they are as yet making only "long - range" plans

Mrs. Lillian Esson, a member of the Gray County chapter of the American Red Cross board. and Mrs. Joyce Roberts, executive secretary, cautioned today that the group has only talked and could give no estimates on construction cost, time or location of the proposed pool

The women said the municipal pool at Kentucky and Deane was one of the oldest pools in the state still in operation.

The pool was built about 1935 and city government officials aren't "paticularly proud" of the dressing rooms and the rest of the pool Wofford said.

The city spent about \$3700 excluding labor for renovation at that pool during 1976, but problems stem from a poor

rooms, Wofford said. But a new pool could mean a local expenditure of at least \$150,000, he said, and to do anything immediately would require a bond issue.

The question is whether the old pool could be upgraded and how a new pool would be financed, he said.

"You can build Cadillac - type or VW - type pools," he said.

Wofford estimated the new pool cost at \$250,000, but said that was a figure he'd "plucked out of the air. Mrs. Esson and Mrs. Roberts

said they and two Pampa businessmen plan to ask City Council for the help of a city engineer to estimate cost. What we want is an Olympic

sized pool so we can get some swim meets in here and bring in some money for the city," Mrs. Esson said The women said they planned

to form a committee to raise funds through donations. And Wofford said commissioners might approve

city maintenance for such a "Why not, we're pool. maintaining one now?"

He said the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission might agree to finance not more than half of the construction cost

City council has discussed appointing a recreation study committee to study the need for facilities such as swimming pools, baseball diamonds, golf courses and tennis courts in Pampa, Wofford said.

### Bank robber debut nets raves and jail

DALLAS (AP) -- Melba Sue Bello was so excited about seeing her husband on camera for the 6 p.m. news, police said she was telling everybody about it.

Unfortunately, it was film taken by hidden camera that officers said recorded a robber leaving an Oak Cliff bank after a Tuesday robbery

'Why James, that's you," police said Mrs. Bello told her husband James Howard Bello as they watched the news.

Several hours later, the 41 year-old Bello was jailed in lieu of \$50,000 bond after being charged in connection with the robbery. Police investigator Steve Brasher said Mrs. Bello, 26, went around telling people near her apartment that her husband was the bank robber on television.

About an hour after the news program, the couple took their apartment manager to a Dallas hospital for treatment of minor injuries. While there, police said Bello asked to be admitted for a psychiatric examination. During the examination, Mrs. Bello told the psychiatrist her

husband had robbed the Oak Cliff bank and David Zook, a police officer assigned to the hospital, was notified, investigators said. Zook arrested Bello and the apartment manager directed officers to Bello's car where a note was found stating: "Just give

me your largest bills. I have a weapon." Bank employees said the robber never displayed a weapon. Officers said Mrs. Bello later led them to the couple's apartment, where they discovered \$1,159 - within \$10 of the amount taken in the robbery.

## Carter pushes rights in Brazil

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (AP) '- President Carter, risking the displeasure of his official hosts, met today with Brazilian champions of human rights who are critics of the military government. He said human rights improvements in Brazil are "very encouraging."

The president and his party left immediately afterward for Nigeria, where he will be the first American president to make a state visit to black Af-

The critics, including two Roman Catholic cardinals, spent 45 minutes exchanging views with the president. At the start of the session, in the presence of reporters. Carter talked about meeting with Brazilian supreme court justices Thursday in Brasilia

'The chief justice made a very clear statement toward dedication to human rights." Carter said. "He said they (the justices) were the most liberal elements in the court system. It was very encouraging for us.

"Since my last visit here. there has been, I think, great excitement building up (about human rights), and the people are expressing themselves very clearly," the president said. At that point, the reporters were ushered out

The meeting was held coincidentally on the 14th anniversary of the military coup which deposed a populist civilian government in Brazil. Afterward, the president was accompanied to the airport by one of the cardinals, who is archbishop of Sao Paulo, Brazil's most populous state.

Jose Mesquita Neto, a publisher and member of the group who met with the president. said to reporters: "We told the president that the Brazilian press and not only the Roman Catholic Church has played a major role in the defense of human rights conditions in Brazil.

"The president agreed and told us that the increase in freedom of the press existing now in the country represents an improvement in the human rights situation," Mesquita

said. "We told the president that the Brazilian newspapers are now denouncing the cases of torture and arbitrary arrest. A few years ago these things were mysteries.

Mesquita said Carter asked many questions about human rights, press freedom and the nation's economy. The publisher said the president also asked for opinions about political affairs in Africa.

After a seven-hour flight across the south Atlantic in Air Force One and a night's rest. Carter will confer with Lt. Gen. Olusegun Obasanjo, chief of state in oil-rich Nigeria. Obasanjo is expected to ask Carter to get tougher against white-minority governments in Africa.

Nigeria is the third developing nation on Carter's sevenday tour of South America and Africa. He has spent two days each in Brazil and Venezuela. The president, wife Rosalynn and 10-year-old daughter Amy will visit Liberia before returning to Washington late Monday.

Although not all of the six Brazilians meeting with Carter are outspoken critics of the Brazilian regime, most have opposed at least some government policies and are associated the human rights cause

Carter espouses. White House press secretary Jody Powell said that before Carter's final meeting with Brazilian President Ernesto Geisel on Thursday, the Ameri-

can president's human rights crusade and his opposition to Brazil's purchase of nuclear technology capable of producing weapons-grade uranium had "poisoned the atmosphere" between Brazil and the United

However, Powell, speaking for the administration, said two days of talks between Carter and Geisel, ranging far beyond the issues of human rights and nuclear non-proliferation, laid the groundwork for improved relations

Carter himself said in the presence of reporters that his meetings with Geisel had been "delightful and very produc-

### Bicycles, showerbaths and bureaucrats

What I like doing best with the words I fit together for this space is getting a chuckle or a smile from the reader of the resultant phrases.

Not your loud guffaws and strenuous belly laughs, that's a lot to expect. But a happy kind of feeling inside to aide the digestion or to help counteract some of the day's unpleasantries

That kind of writing isn't always easy to accomplish. Sometimes there's a necessity to comment on some serious matters that need attention. When that happens sometimes some readers don't agree with the views expressed. Sometimes a frown rather than a grin

And sometimes, even when a subject comes along with a potential for humorous development, I can't capitalize upon it.

Just the other day, for example, a story came over the Associated Press machine

Environmental Protection Agency officials who were in Houston for a day - long seminar on employee transportation. These EPA fellows told about 200 employer representatives attending the meeting that firms with 250 or more employees must begin providing "incentives for bicycle

The two bureaucrats indicated at one point in the program that providing shower facilities "might" be a necessary part of

commuting

such an incentive program. That's what I thought contained an element of humor. Reminded me of that bit of wisdom which emanated some months ago from OSHA. You'll remember the official report that informed farmers they should be careful about stepping in fresh cow manure because the stuff is slippery

But I couldn't get anything humorous fit together. I wrote false start after false start. Explored in some depth the entire realm of bicycling and sweating and smelling bad and wondered what the effect might be when the EPA shower rule butts head - on into the ERA can we expect future government regulations to endorse, encourage or enforce mixed group showers? Sounds ecological from a conservationist viewpoint. doesn't it?

The issue became too involved and bogged down to be light and enjoyable.

If businesses must provide showers and changing facilities for employees who wish to commute by cycle, how long will it be before businesses are government - forced to provide beds and sleeping facilities for workers who don't wish to commute at all?

And is it possible that the government, in trying to deal with the fuel crunch, decides we should all live at our places of employment?

Will employers be forced to build apartments and housing for employees? Will there be new volumes of federal regulations listing specifications

smokeless (EPA standards, you know) barbecue pits for employees who like to cook outside? What about workshops for hobbyists, golf courses for golfers, tennis courts, maybe a lake for fisherpersons and boaters? Where will it stop? How much is too much?

Showers for cyclists. Instead of making me laugh it made me angry, frustrated. Everything I tried to develop kept leading to the question: "When are those damn bureaucratic sycophants going to stop meddling in and messing up our lives?

The only answer that I can come up with is: "When we refuse to comply with their stupid regulations."

And that's just about what happened at that Houston meeting. A businessman in the audience asked the EPA representativas if a shower and dressing room would be required if only one employee wanted to ride his or her bike to work. And another questioner asked if a company president could go to jail if he simply chose to ignore an EPA order to



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

### Georgia skeleton in Carter closet

By CLARK R. MOLLENHOFF WASHINGTON — A federal investigation of mismanagement and favoritism in the Georgia State Energy Office could result in changing Billy Carter from a comic character into a symbol of serious embarrassment to

President Carter The investigation of proven irregularities and possible illegalities has been stalled for months in the Energy Department despite recommendations that it be sent to the Justice Department for criminal prosecution of state

and federal officials. Two senior Democratic members of the House Commerce Committee — Reps. John E. Moss of California and John D. Dingell of Michigan have recently asked Attorney General Griffin Bell to appoint a

special prosecutor to conduct the investigation. Although the alleged

illegalities and favoritism in the allocation of gasoline took place in the time when Jimmy Carter was governor of Georgia, there is no charge that he was personally involved in the decisions that resulted in his brother Billy Carter receiving as much as 25,000 gallons of emergency fuel a month through the Georgia State set - aside

In their letter. Moss and Dingell set forth the allegation that the state energy director at that time. Lewis C. Spruill, an appointee of then Governor Carter. "gave unwarranted and highly advantageous gasoline allocation from the State Set -Aside program to selected and favored jobbers and dealers, to the detriment of others who were not so well connected politically with the Director and

Moss and Dingell related that they have been told that some of these allocations "were in return for a variety of alleged favors." In the letter to Bell they did not enumerate the charges which included an allegation that one oil jobber supplied state and federal energy officials with For two and a half years the

investigation dragged on in the Department of Energy until March when the Department finally made a criminal referral of the case to the Department of Justice," Moss and Dingell said.

They noted that a "new dimension" had surfaced as a result of the work of two investigative reporters for the St. Petersburg (Fla.) Times. Patrick Tyier and Charles C. Thompson II.

A review of the files of the Georgia State Energy Office revealed that Billy Carter "was allegedly a recipient of large volumes of the State Set - Aside

Department of Energy officials told the subcommittee staff they missed the (Billy) Carter involvement because they failed to audit his supplier in the initial audits, although the information was in the files of the Georgia Energy Office.

Billy Carter has been quoted as saying that the extra allocation provided by Spruill "kept me alive" at his two pump gasoline station in Plains. Ga. He contended the extra allocations were "all above board" and arranged legally with Spruill.

"Hell, if I've done anything

illegal. I wouldn't try to hide it. I'd brag about it." the affable Billy Carter told reporters. The question of the legality or

illegality of the emergency allocations to Billy Carter probably cannot be determined until there is the full investigation by a nonpartisan prosecutor, congressional sources said. They noted that Spruill was

removed from the Georgia energy program because of irregularity and favoritism in the operations, and that it has been recommended the case against Spruill be sent to Justice for prosecution.

In asking for "an independent prosecutor not associated with any parochial interests." Moss and Dingell said it is essential to erase the public's perception of "politics as usual and the good

To assure that the Georgia 'good old boys' image does not cloud the decisions on the energy office. Moss and Dingell suggested that Bell, a Georgian,

In Pittsburgh as well as other parts of the Midwest and Northeast a coal strike has caused some disruption in businesses, commercial

activities and public events. Most businesses have cut back their use of electric energy from 25 to 50 percent. Many

thousands of employees have been laid off because of the reduced use of energy, which is normally supplied for various plants.

It has been estimated that about 50 percent of the coal production is from non - union mines. But union members have used violence and threats to force the non - union workers from their jobs.

Now the persons who pay the bill for this action are not the coal mine operators nor the coal mine employees. Those who pay the price are employees who have been laid off because of the shortage of electricity and coal - fired heat.

President Carter's call for more dependence on coal as an energy source rings hollow because it would only increase public dependence on the unions and coal mine operators. In the past the coal situation depended upon

supply and demand. But today, with the threat of force, coal mine union members can hold the public hostage to gain additional employment In the United Kingdom the coal mine unions

The individual should always keep in mind that a termination of an energy source by union or governmental power could cause severe problems for those who depend upon it. He should plan for a supply of multisource energy if

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

Italy won't free 15 ROME (AP) - The Italian government will not ransom kidnapped political leader Aldo Moro by freeing 15 Red Brigades terrorists on trial in Turin, the Christian Democratic

Party says. "It is not possible to accept the blackmail coming from the Red Brigades," the government party - of which Moro is president - said in response to a letter from Moro in which he hinted that freedom for the terrorists would be the price for his release.

The statement was issued after day-long meetings between Premier Giulio Andreotti and other party leaders. The government also denied a newspaper report that it was considering offering a reward of \$1.2 million for information leading to the arrest of the kidnappers.

Ask Dr. Lamb

DEAR DR. LAMB - I am a 26-year-old female. Eight weeks ago I was told I had a duodenal bulb ulcer. Then I had X rays and was told the ulcer had not improved at

For the entire eight weeks I stayed on my diet, took antacids and stayed on Valium with no results at all.

My doctor told me that I should wait three months and he-would run some type of scope test to see if anything else besides the ulcer is in the bulb. Could you give me some information on duodenal bulb ulcers and why one would not heal? I am a little nervous over going in for the scope test which I have been told is very pain-

DEAR READER - Despite all the facts we know about ulcers we still don't really know what causes them and there is plenty of disagreement about what has to be done to treat them.

We know that increased acid formation by the stomach is important; apparently the action of pepsin, the enzyme produced by the stomach to start the digestion of proteins as in meat, is important too. The excess acid-pepsin is squirted out of the stomach with stomach contractions and hits against the wall of the small intestine where it connects to the stomach. The small intestine makes a sharp turn there forming the duodenal bulb. The first part of the small intestine is called the

duodenum. The stomach is lined with a heavy mucous material which protects its lining from the digestive action of the acid-pepsin juice, but the duodenum is not lined. The acid-pepsin juice literally starts digesting the wall of the duodenum and the area that is eaten away is called

the ulcer crater. When an X ray is taken, the barium fills the hole of the ulcer crater and outlines it so it can be seen on the Xray picture. As it heals the crater contracts and may deform the duodenal area and that can be seen thereafter as evidence of a previously active ulcer even if it





He breathes filtered air, eats sterile food and has never felt the skin-to-skin touch of a loved

But while at home in late month, David put on the spacesuite and made a tour of his house and the yard.

Dr. Ralph D. Feigin, chair-

man of pediatrics at the Baylor College of Medicine, told a Wednesday news conference, 'he spraved people, plants and windows. He petted the two family dogs. He explored the house for the first time in his fe. He looked at family photos and played records and then finally said, 'What I really want to do is go back outside and play with the hose again."

Dr. Feigin said hope still existed that someday David

would be able to function as a normal child, "but until that day we must take every precaution to insure his safety.

The medical college scientists also reported that in January David swallowed two coins from his collection. This called for a normally simple oration to remove the coins from the esophagus. But, for David, it was not normal, nor safe.

The coins were removed by a team of 35 medical professionals, including several surgeons. David, described by scientists as "very bright" accepted the medical procedure and came through with no more problems than a normal child.

Dr. Feigin, answering some of the recent criticism from other scientists that David's plastic bubble existence was not

Other treatments have been evaluated a found unsuitable for David at this time. A bone marrow transplant offers the best hope, but of more than 10,-000 potential donors tested, none has proved a good

Dr. Feigin said, "David is exceptional in that he is not critically ill or suffeng from recurrent infections. Not only is he the longest surviving patient with this disease, but he is strong, healthy and has never had a sick day in his life.

### Town buyers plan

ROCKERVILLE, S.D. (AP) in a valley between the lanes of developed into a tourist attractsay, full of saloons and shops and the hustle and bustle that goes with a gold rush.

Today it is a sleepy little place - population 10 - an assortment of storefronts nestled

- Rockerville was quite a town a highway that takes the suma century ago, the local folks mer flood of tourists from nearby Rapid City to Mount Rush-

> Except for an ancient black pickup and faint strains from a radio, few signs of life greet the stray visitor.

But big things are in store for Rockerville, or so say the two men who bought the town at auction last October for \$550,000.

Banners proclaiming the sale are still plastered to some Old est buildings. They will disappear wth the overall facelift promised for Rockerville Gold Town in an effort to divert the tourist stream.

The owners of Rockerville Gold Town - Jon Cochran of Rapid City, a former car dealer, and Ken Andrews, a Phoenix, Ariz, land developer say they want to restore the town to its original Old West flavor without making it so historical that it would be dull.

The town was born when gold was discovered. By 1880 more than 1,000 people lived there. But water was needed to mine the gold, and when a plan to bring water to the mines died, the town slowly died, too. By the time Rockerville was

ion in 1953, little remained of the original boom town but an old log cabin.

The Gold Town is divided into three major parts along a single street - a cluster of rustic mining buildings, a business lane with turn-of-the-century storefronts and a restaurant and theater.

But most of the antiques for sale were bought by Andrews and Cochran, according to the real estate firm that handled the sale.

Andrews said one reason he bought the town is because of the ever-declining value of most everything but antiques. land and gold, "and I've got all three right here."

Andrews, interviewed at his home in Arizona, talks about the town with the enthusiasm of someone who has found a new

He said new storefronts are planned, vendors and artisans will be invited up from the Southwest and other areas, and shootouts will be scheduled for the main street every day.

Andrews said the costs of the improvements would push the total investment for him and Cochran to about \$800,000 for the first year.



Businessman Marvin Savage, 42. said he came to the farewell "to relive my childhood. I used to cut school to come down here." He said that 18 years ago he and his wife, Sandy, went to the Troc on Friday

### Hillside strangler suspect booked

LOS ANGELES (AP) - A 37year-old maintenance man has been booked on investigation of murder in two of the 13 hillside stranglings after his childhood friend told police he watched while the man killed three

"It is a major break," said Police Chief Daryl Gates, "and we're very hopeful that it will successfully conclude at least those two and perhaps more" of the slayings attributed to the Hillside Strangler in which the bodies of female victims were dumped onto roads and hillsides. Many were nude and sexually molested and all were

"We have sufficient information to believe that one or both of these suspects are involved in these murders," Gates said. Neither man has been charged. Los Angeles police arrested Beverly Hills maintenance man

Peter Mark Jones, 37, on

Thursday at his apartment. George Shamshak, 27, now in the men's prison on Los Angeles' Terminal Island, reportedly told police about Jones and the killings when questioned in February at Walpole State Prison in Massachusetts.

Shamshak had escaped on Oct. 24, 1977, from the state Correction Department's prerelease center in Shirley, Mass. He had been serving a four-to five-year term for armed rob-

He was recaptured in Cambridge, Mass., Feb. 9. Two days later, authorities said, Shamshak told Massachusetts state police in his cell that he

had watched Jones kill three Angeles.

Shamshak said one woman

#### Young lads charged in 'contract'

NEW YORK (AP) - Two boys, aged 13 and 14, have been arrested and charged with accepting a \$500 "contract" from a numbers collector to kill another reputed numbers dealer because of a territorial dispute.

Police said the victim, Elijah Smith, 36, was slain by a blast from a sawed-off shotgun in the back of the head at about 1 a.m. Wednesday in the first floor hallway of his apartment building in the Bronx. The shotgun was found nearby.

Police said the boys, who knew Smith, had hidden in a vacant first-floor apartment, waiting for him to come home. When he entered the hallway the boys shot him, police said.

At about 5 p.m. Wednesday, a detective from the Ninth Homicide Zone arrested the 13-yearold at his home. The 14-year-old was arrested at his home a few hours later. Their identities were withheld by police because of their ages.

Both boys were charged with homicide and held at the Spofford Youth House.

Police said Wednesday night they were seeking the unidentified numbers operator who wanted Smith killed because he believed Smith was cutting into his business. Police said Smith handled about \$10,000 a week in

Police said the man who ordered the killing gave each boy a \$50 "deposit," the rest of the \$500 to be paid when Smith had been killed

A year ago last December, our college son borrowed \$600 from us to buy a second - hand car. We wired the money to him and it cost \$3.00

### Pentagon nixes boob photos

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon, responding to protests from a Pennsylvania feminist, say "demeaning" pictures of big-breasted women have no place in a magazine for Army reservists.

As a result, editors of "Army Reserve" have been directed to "depict men and women in the same way, professionally," says Robert L. Nelson, an assistant secretary of the Army.

Nelson's directive was announced today by Sen. Richard Schweiker. R-Pa. The senator initiated the protest last September when he passed along concerns voiced by Carol Swaim, executive board member of the Pennsylvania chapter of the National Organization for Women.





with 24 points and Chones added 21 points and 16 rebounds. Larry Kenon had 18 points, including 12 in the fourth period, and Billy Paultz came up with 14 points and 15 rebounds for the Spurs.

LONG BEACH, Calif. (AP) -For a few golden hours this weekend, the national speed limit will no longer be 55 tedious miles per hour.

All of the X-band, K-band, multi-band scanning multi-directional, aircraft mounted. electrically calculated radar in the world won't make a bit of difference to Mario Andretti and a few of his friends as they roar through the streets of Long Beach at better than 180 mph.

Andretti and the Formula I crowd will impudently ignore all the traffic lights, turn lanes, stop signs, yield, no u-turn, two-way traffic and no right on red signal warnings as they

turn a 20-minute drive through two miles of downtown into an 80-second kamikazi flight.

The Long Beach Grand Prix, the only known legalized street racing in the United States this side of Burt Reynolds movies, comes to town for a third year riding a crest of popularity that has buried its history of financial disaster, spectator malaise, resident opposition and media hostility.

Andretti, a genuine Italianborn American folk hero who turned this race into a nationalist rallying point with a sterring come-from-behind victory a year ago, leads an interesting entry list of more than two dozen of the world's top drivers competing for a share of the \$400,000 purse. Only the Indianapolis 500 and Daytona 500 pay more.

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

Before fiscal '78 ends this fall. the federal government will have spent \$7.1 billion of our tax money on its agricultural commodities programs: price supports, deficiency payments. disaster relief, etc. Yet in the face of the awesome aid infuriated and frightener farmers recently demonstrated in cities ranging from Plains Ga., to Washington, D.C. occupied the Agricultural Department's lobby, sent a hearse to deliver piles of protest letters to Congressmen and others Why

Because the small and medium-size farms benefit relatively little from these income support programs, while the giant producers receive windfall subsides, say J.B. Penn, a senior economist with the Council of Economic Advisers, and William T. Boehm, an agricultural economist with Agruculture Department

Farm subsidies are not distributed according to income levels - poor farmers getting the most aid and rich farmers. the least - Penn and Boehm explain in a paper just published 'Agriculute Economics Research." Instead, subsidies tend to be distributed in proporation to the volume of each farm's production.

The more a farmer produces, the larger the amount of subsides he receives - an approach which shrugs off the central fact that a relatively few big farms produce the bulk of this country's food and fiber.

More specifically, about 19 per cent of the 2.7 million farms in the U.S. produce more than 78 per cent of the total agricultural output, according to the 1974 Census of Agruculture

These are the larger farms, with sales ranging between \$40,000 to more than \$100,000 annually.

In constract, small farms with sales under \$10,000 a year) make up the majority of U.S. farms (55 per cent) but produce only 5 per cent of total farm output and receive a fraction of U.S. funds

To smash it home to you, in the unusual year of '76 — with its worldwide food shortages. comparatively high farm prices, small U.S. outlays - farmers in the higher sales class of \$40,000-and-over received \$452

million in direct government payments. The average farm in this category received \$978.

Small farms in '76 - under \$10,000 a year in sales received \$110 million, The average per farm was a tiny \$65. Under the "target price" program, the government

supports farm incomes through target prices designed to cover most of a farmer's cost of production. Prices are based on national average production costs. Many farmers' costs are higher than the national average, some are equal, some way below

And which farmers have costs exceeding the national average? Studies suggest they are the smaller farms. The larger farms tend to produce more cheaply, at least up to a point.

Thus write Penn and Boehm: 'Target prices based on

national average cost of production would be expected to provide a windfall subsidy to the larger, more efficient farms who can produce below the national average. And such targer prices may not provide enough assistance to the medium-sized and small farms to enable them to remain economically viable,

Penn and Boehm then go on to suggest that the larger farms would use their windfall gains to buy more land, reports my Washington associate, Brooke Shearer. This increases the price of farmland and make it more difficult for smaller farms to expand as well as tougher for younger people to stay in or to enter farming.

The ultimate result: a smaller number of giant farms owned by fewer and fewer individuals. leading to what has been called a system of "public utility agriculture.

This is scarcely the first time a concern of this magtitude has been publicly expressed. Back in 1971, the Brookings Institute published a report, entitled, The Distribution of Farm
