

Local 'medicine man' comes up with winning 'formulas'

MAPLE - Herbal remedies are more than just one of the trends of recent years. For many Americans herbal remedies hold out the hope of curing or ameliorating effects of everything from arthritis to carpal tunnel syndrome to more specific health problems that plague millions.

And right in Bailey County is a growing business that produces three herbal sprays - one to ease arthritic pain, one specifically designed for health problems associated with women and another for health problems associated with men.

John Tucker is the manager of High Plains Natives. He didn't start out to find herbal remedies.

In 1988, Tucker started out growing grasses that could be used on CRP land. By 1992, he had switched over to wildflowers and forbs for CRP use. For those purposes he grows both purple and white clover, Maximillian sunflowers and Partridge

About the same time, he happened onto one use for Partridge pea - he was chewing on its seeds and found that it effectively calmed his perennially acidic stomach. This prompted his first investigations, calling

universities that were doing plant studies and sending samples of plants from his area for evaluation.

After that, it gets scientifically complicated. But suffice it to say, that continued study and research prompted him to come up with the three compounds sold by the Three Natives company, mostly via its Website: www.threenatives.com. Of course, he can be reached via phone at (806) 927-5545.

All three are released via an aerosol spray that is applied topically to the affected area.

One satisfied user is Kay Cole, who said that until she found the arthritis formula, the use of her hands had been "getting progressively worse for several years.'

"I began using Three Natives soothing formula in November, 2003, and found almost instant relief," she said. "Although I still cannot open jars, it no longer hurts to try." Cole uses the product twice a day and said it feels as if her arthritis has been







Change: Like It or Not, It's a Matter of Attitude

It finally happened. Last Friday at 1:47. Something I've been dreading for ten years or so.

I finally hit the optometric wall. Bifocals.

Every time I'd see the guy, once every year or two or whenever his nurse would strong-arm me into coming in for an actual appointment by refusing to get me more prescriptions for contacts without my actually seeing the man (he's a great guy; she's

tough as nails and thinks of contact prescriptions as pretty much the same as prescriptions for morphine), I'd been asking my eye guy how many good years I had left. And he usually said something like, "Several."

Not this time. 48 years old, and it's over.

I knew it was coming. I spent a good part of the last year playing carpenter, and I was surprised to find myself inserting screws by Braille. I could still read the fine print. It just took longer-and a lot more light. And, this is the humiliating part: it was a lot easier when I'd sneak around and steal a pair of my wife's reading glasses.

Until a couple of years ago when she hit the wall herself, my wife had never needed glasses at all. She still doesn't, except for the close-up stuff. You'd think the glasses she bought Friday would be cheaper because the top half of them is just clear glass. You'd be wrong. I thought maybe we should buy just one eye's worth and pay out the rest on time. Yes, her husband has for a couple of years been making fun of his bifocalled bride-rather unmercifully, I'm afraid."

Now I'm much more humble. And the least evil, it seemed to me, of the three relatively bad choices my doc offered me, is what he called "monovision" contacts, which so far means that I get to see half the world clearly. He says to give it ten days before I vote on it. Maybe by that time you get so frustrated that you poke out one eye, thus "monovision."

I have neither the time nor the patience for this complication. And the response to that last statement should be exactly the kind of thing a judge might say looking over her reading glasses at a fellow making excuses for running a stop sign: "Interesting, but irrelevant." This is the situation, Bud. Deal with it.

Change. It's the definition of stress. When I think of the changes that some folks I love have had to make recently, I realize that I need to quit whining. But I doubt I will.

And that last rather cynical statement reminds me that I need to be reminded often-it's not just the world and situation around us changing. No, we are ourselves changing.

Every day by the decisions we make and-here, I'm afraid, is the big factor-the attitudes we allow ourselves to adopt, we're being changed. The fact is that we're becoming each day more like the God-or god-we serve. We're being molded into creatures fit for Heaven, or creatures who choose for Hell. And the God of the universe pays us the wonderful-or quite fearful-compliment of letting us choose. Choose wisely.
