This Month Last Chance To Plant Or Prune Shrubs

Ur Prune Shrubs As each month has its peculiar problems in the care and propaga-tion of ornamental shrubs. St. H. Yarnell, at Texas A and M. college, offers the following suggestions for their treatment month by month: February-This is the last chance to plant and prune. Penegranate, noneswack and crape myrule should be pruned rather severely to situn-tate production of flowering wood. Cut off at the crown old stems growing from the roots. Early shrubs should be fertilized. March – Pertilize established shrubs should be fortilized. March – Pertilize established shrubs early. Where available, barn ward manure to which superphosate has been added at the rate of five worked into the soil or placed in holes. When using a commercial tertilizer such as 6-12-6 place it in our to eight holes put down about 12 inches with a crowbar in ration of one to two pounds per hundred square feet. Space the holes even branches.
