NEW BILLS WOULD PUT STATE ON BUSINESS BASIS

ABILENE, March 31.—The 47th Texas legislature is making an unprecedented showing in speedy disposal of major legislation. Officials of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce said today it is clearing the way for early general debate and action on pending measures sponsored by the regional chamber and described as 'something that is being done for the taxpayer, a completed on HB-42 and SB-190, by respectively. The bills provide for fiscal control, financial planning and reorganization reforms in budgelary practices and a merit employment system, in the state government. 
