





I thought it would be nice to give the people of Cross Plains a little taste of Bob Howard himself, talking about things that town residents might find of interest. So here is a selection of edited quotes from Howard's letters to friends and fellow writers. This is Robert E. Howard in his own

It is my belief that people who think Howard was "strange" or "crazy" might get a different impression from putting aside rumors and gossip, and instead listening to his side of the story told in his own words. Enjoy....

"I am a 100 percent American and proud of it. I think the United States is the finest country on earth, and I wouldn't trade a quarter section of it for the whole land of Europe.
