"Just a Drop of Water"

It was one of the hottest days of the dry season. We had not seen rain in almost a month. The crops were dying. Cows had stopped giving milk. The creeks and streams were long gone back into the earth. It was a dry season that would bankrupt seven farmers before it was through. Every day, my husband and his brothers would go about the arduous process of trying to get water to the farm. Lately, this process had involved taking a truck to the river and filling it up with water. But it was so expensive. Even the river was getting low. If we didn't see some rain soon, we would lose everything.

It was on this day that I learned the true lesson of sharing, and witnessed the only miracle I have seen with my own eyes. I was in the kitchen making lunch for my husband and his brothers when I saw my six-year old son, Billy, walking toward the woods. He wasn't walking with the usual carefree abandon of a youth, but with a serious purpose. I could only see his back. He was obviously walking with great effort. trying to be as still as possible. Auction Minutes after he disappeared into the woods, he came running out R.E. Howard again, toward the house. I went back to making sandwiches, thinking that whatever task he had been doing was completed. Moments later, however, he was once again walking in that slow purposeful stride toward the wood. This activity went on for an hour: walk carefully to the woods, run back to the house.

Finally, I couldn't take it any

longer, and I crept out of the house, and followed him on his journey (being very careful not to be seen, as he was obviously doing important work, and didn't need his Mommy checking up on him). He was cupping both hands in front of him as he walked, being very careful not to spill the water he held in them; maybe two or three tablespoons were held in his tiny hands. I sneaked close as he went into the woods. Branches and thoms slapped his little face but he did not try to avoid them. He had a much higher purpose. As I leaned in to spy on him, I saw the most amazing sight. Several large deer loomed in front of him. Billy walked right up to them. I almost screamed for him to get away. A huge buck with elaborate antlers was dangerously close. But the buck did not threaten him---he didn't even move as Billy knelt down. And I saw a tiny fawn laying on the ground, obviously suffering from dehydration, and heat exhaustion, lift its head with great effort to lap up the water cupped in my beautiful boy's hand. When the water was gone, Billy jumped up to run back to the house, and I hid behind a tree.

I followed him back to the house, to the spigot connected to an empty tank. Billy opened it all







But attending the sessions looking at the Texas connection in Robert E. Howard's writing in June whetted my appetite for reading Howard's westerns. I have just finished reading The Last Ride, which is a compilation of seven of Howard's short stories written in 1935 and 1936 just before his death and published in magazines that served the western fiction market. So much has been made of the Barbarian theme that it seemed to turn off people locally, and none here had ever mentioned his westerns that I remember. Billie Ruth probably did and it went over my head, but I was captivated by the first story title The Last Ride, but originally published October 1935 under the title Boot-Hill Payoff in the magazine Western Aces. Recently I reviewed Wheeler's Restitution for this paper, and I won-Howard. The Last Ride had the hero being the youngest son in a family of robbers whose duty during the robberies was to hold the horses, exactly the same role as the hero in Restitution. The majority of the damage in Callahan County was estimated in Eula Commissioner Bryan Farmer's Precinct #2. Farmer told the FEMA officials he had some 60 sites of damage sustained to the County Roads in his Precinct valued at \$700,000. Farmer said the majority of his County Road damage occurred south of State Highway 36 to the Coleman County line. "Dudley and Oplin took it the worse,' Farmer said.

Cross Plains Commissioner Charlie Grider estimated some 80 sites received damage from the runoff at an estimated value of \$240,000 in the Cross Plains Precinct #4.

Baird Commissioner Tommy Holland told FEMA officials his Precinct #3 had some eight projects in his Precinct valued at \$24,000.

Clyde Commissioner Harold Hicks's Precinct #1 was the only one of the four Precincts to receive no damaged County Roads from the rainfall runoff.

The Eula Commissioner said along with the damage to the County Roads, there were three bridges in his Precinct which received damage from the early morning storm system. Farmer said one wooden bridge was damaged and two other bridges with culverts received major washout damage. Farmer also reported the length of one County Road, CR 220, was washed out by the rainfall run-

Four representatives from FEMA and one official with the Texas Department of Emergency Management Agency met with the four Commissioners and County Judge Roger Corn to discuss the public assistance kickoff meeting Monday, July 29 at the Commissioners' Courtroom at the County Courthouse in Baird. The four officials representing FEMA were Marc Gross, R.G. Copeland, Joseph Laughery and Jimmie Trost. J.V. Hall, a Public Assistance Specialist for the State of Texas **Emergency Management office** in San Antonio was also in attendance. Gross and Winston Korth, who was unable to attend the kickoff meeting, will be working with the Callahan County Commissioners to inspect the damaged sites throughout the County.

Copeland, who was the Public Assistance Coordinator for the Monday meeting, said FEMA officials will view the damage to the County Road system and estimate the cost to bring the roadways back to a pre-disaster condition. Copeland said any road damaged from June 29 up until now will be included in the Public Assistance declaration for Callahan County.

The FEMA coordinator said Callahan County will also be able to apply for public assistance associated with the Sheriff's Department working the County Roads in an effort to close the roadways. Copeland said the County can apply for overtime and weekend pay for all those who worked the morning of July 6.

Cami Robinson, secretary to Judge Roger Corn, will be the paperwork coordinator for Callahan County. Copeland said the County will receive three percent of the total costs associated with the projects for administrating the paperwork.

Copeland said that if Callahan County had one site in which more than \$52,000 was sought, the funds would be paid out over a period of time, however County Commissioners said there probably would not be one project valued that high.

Funds Callahan County will receive will be direct deposited into a new account being established at First National Bank in Baird. Copeland said all documents associated with the public assistance program must be kept for three years, because the assistance program will be

FEMA official Joe Laughery discussed with County Commissioners the environmental impact associated with the debris left behind from the flood waters. Laughery said the County will be allowed to burn debris left in ditches and culverts, however the Commissioners must have the debris removed from creeks and streams and then burned at an approved site.

"We're (FEMA) looking forward to working with you," Copeland commented at the conclusion of the meeting with the Commissioners' Court.

One other agenda item brought before the Commissioners' Court included reappointing Doug Ford to the Betty Hardwick Board of Trustees. On a motion by Commissioner Farmer and second by Commissioner Holland, Commissioners voted unanimously to appoint Ford to the Mental Health/Mental Retardation Board.


