






Live your life in such a way that when you die you'll at least be given the benefit of the doubt.





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


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No waking...

The sign said "Caution: Wake Zone." A few steps later, the next sign read

"Watch Your Wake." The boat ramp was full of cars backing their boats into the water for an afternoon on Puget Sound.

Peanut and I boarded the Jetty Island ferry with my sister (another sister-I have lots) for a day of fun on the beach. Yes, it was cloudy all day, even some sprinkles and minor drizzle.

Jetty Island is north of Seattle, a narrow strip of land created by the Army Corps of Engineers years and years ago to buffer the waves that would erode the shoreline where commerce and industry were developing. It was nothing but a jetty then, but birds landed there and salt grasses grew, and barnacles clothed the pilings that outlined the original pit dumping site when dredging first began.

Now it is a bird sanctuary, a saltwater-freshwater estuary on the leeward side where the Snohomish River empties into Puget Sound. That environment is considered as conducive to life as rainforest.

For seven weeks in summer, most of the birds are gone from Jetty Island. Seagulls are not included among the missing. Rangers allow people to swarm over the island during this period that doesn't interfere with bird nesting cycles.

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Tugboats, barges, sailboats ferries, and motorboats floated the waters of the Sound while we sauished sand between our toes and dodged seagulls. We searched for bubbles which are evidence of creatures under the sand at low tide, and watched the judging of a sand castle contest. We gathered for a nature hike. I learned, "Sedges have edges, reeds are round, and grasses grow close to the ground." The day was capped around a campfire where we roasted marshmallows for S'mores and played a team game, "Crack the Case." Our team was called "The S'mores." We won. On the return ferry, I saw the sign that read, "No Waking." The captain explained it was to protect property from shoreline erosion. All boats must creep past at a speed of very few




