On to Austin!

Indians open state tournament against Archer City

Super Tuesday wasn't the main topic of conversation in Haskell this week. Not by a long shot.

All eyes pointed toward Austin and the Haskell Indian basketball team which will be making its first appearance ever in the state tournament.

By virtue of their conquests over Canadian and Coleman in last weekend's regional tournament in Big Spring, the Indians go to Austin as the representative of West Texas

The opening round gets underway at 9:30 Friday morning when Coach Randy Stone's Warriors go up against the big, talented and experienced Archer City Wildcats, who will be making their third consecutive appearance in the state tournament.

Should the Indians get by that hurdle, they will meet the winner of the Liberty Hill-Troop game for the state championship at 2 p.m. Saturday. (Liberty Hill and Troop play at 11 a.m. Friday).

But before thinking too much about the finals, the Indians must concentrate first on Archer City. The Wildcats are 32-3 on the year. Losses have been to 4-A Graham (by 2 points), to 3A Decatur (by 6 points) and to the mighty Paducah Dragons in a warmup game preceding the

Leading the Wildcats is 6-foot-6inch senior Eric Powell, who sports a 23-points-a-game average. In addition to being a terror under the boards, he is an excellent outside shooter. Powell made national headlines last year when he scored 70 points against Jacksboro.

Other starters on the team which lost in the state tournament to champion Morton last year are Tony Pollock, 6-5 senior; Nicky McCorkle, 6-4 junior; Matt McLemore, 5-10 junior; and Chad Adams, 5-9 sophomore. Ken Schreiber, a 6-3 senior, also sees a lot of action.

Haskell will counter this

aggregation with a well-balanced lineup featuring no particular standout, just a bunch of solid performers. Dusty Meeks, averaging 13.3 points per game, is the Indian scoring leader, but two other performers are in double figures and another pair just below.

Brad Bevel sports a 10.7 average and Mark Young is at an even 10. James Rike averages 9.3 points and Chan Guess has a 7.3 average.

Not far behind these leaders come Paul Harvey (4.5), and Patrick Perez and Derrick Billington (4.3 each).

All eight of these performers see plenty of action in Indian games, as Stone is not at all hesitant to substitute freely without fear of weakening his team.

Rounding out the Haskell squad are Sam Beakey (2.6 average), Michael Mendoza, Cole Larned and Cayce Reed.


The Indians have a 29-5 record. Losses have been at the hands of Vernon and San Angelo Lake View

Fires blacken large range area

More than 3,000 acres of Haskell County range land were blackened last Tuesday in a lightning-caused fire which was visible from as far away as Throckmorton.

Dozens of ranchers, farmers and citizens joined fire department personnel from Haskell, Stamford, Lueders, Throckmorton and Rule in fighting the fire until 2 a.m. Wednesday.

The land burned was part of the Brook Early, Bunkley and Frazier ranches. Ray Perry, who operates the

Bunkley ranch, said three sections of his ranch land were burned. He said he also lost three newborn calves in the

Firemen were recalled to the area of 27 local voters. Monday afternoon and fought new fires until early Tuesday morning. They were called out again Tuesday. The latest fires burned another 3,000 Hudson, giving him 633 votes, to to 5,000 acres of ranch land.



Speaker opposes aging agency plan



Dr. Lewis Lemond of Abilene, director of aging with the West Central Texas Council of Governments, addressed a luncheon audience of senior citizens at the Experienced Citizens Center in Haskell.

Lemond said a house bill in the past legislature called for appointment of a committee to study the desirability of combining several agencies into one.

He cautioned that such a move could very likely change the priorities which the present department has established. "We like having one agency working only for us," he said.


The speaker briefly outlined the Older Americans Act of 1965 which provided for communities to set up centers where older people can come

together, enjoy tellowship, have meals and participate in other

Funding was provided through an appropriations act, but local communities were to provide the building and states were required to put up at least 5 percent of the funds. Texas, said Lemond, has always provided the minimum of 5 percent, while some states have put up 15, 20 and 25 percent.

In addition, local communities were to put up 10 percent matching funds. "If only 10 percent was put up locally, you wouldn't have this center in Haskell," said Lemond. He pointed out that local funding has averaged about 32 percent, through meal contributions, volunteer help and various fund-raising projects.

Through meal programs, such as the one operated in Haskell, senior citizens are not charged for meals but diners are encouraged to contribute the approximate cost of the meals.



A timeshare, or purchasing a unit gives you a simple interest in the property, providing title, deed and title insurance. You can sell your share of the property, will it or give it away. "Right-to-use" timeshares offer no equity in the property. You're given the right to use a specific unit for a certain period of time, after which possession reverts to the developer. This type of timeshare may also be called a vacation license, lease or club membership, she

"Contests and gifts have been used to induce people to visit a site where unscrupulous sellers then apply heavy pressure," the specialist says. "Texas laws protect consumers by allowing a three-day cooling off period, during which you can back out of a contract and get a refund," notes Piernot.



State officials study vote fraud

AUSTIN-While Democratic and Republican candidates last week were making a final push for the Super Tuesday primary, state officials were investigating complaints of vote fraud.

Officials of the Texas Secretary



of State's Office said they have received between 20 and 30 reports of irregularities in absentee voting from across the state. Many of the complaints have come from South Texas, the officials said.

Assistant Secretary of State Randall H. Erben said the complaints have involved absentee voting by both personal appearance and by mail.

Erben said election inspectors were being deployed in areas where complaints were reported.

This year, for the first time, Texas voters can vote absentee without showing cause why they cannot vote on election day. That change was expected to produce a record number of absentee votes.

Citrus Ban Lifted

While most attention was being focused on the primary elections, state agriculture officials were in federal court trying to defend their quarantine on Florida citrus fruit.

A federal judge lifted the 30day ban the Texas Department of Agriculture had enacted to prevent Florida citrus from entering the

The Texas ban was imposed last month after the U.S. Department of Agriculture lifted a threeyear-old federal quarantine that prevented Florida citrus fruit from being brought into states with their own citrus industry because of Florida's citrus canker problems.

The Texas quarantine was lifted by U.S. District Judge James Nowlin on the grounds that the recent federal action takes precedence over state rules.

Agriculture officials here said the ban was needed to protect this state's \$65-million-a-year citrus industry. That industry still is trying to recover from a devastating freeze in 1983.

Texas officials said they now will seek an injunction against the new federal rule, which allows Florida citrus that meets certain standards of other citrusproducing states to be shipped into those states.

Racing Tax Fight

Opponents of pari-mutuel wagering lost last year's referendum on legalizing betting on horse and dog races in Texas, but they are waging a new fight to keep the state from giving track and horse owners a larger share of the bet-

Leaders of both Texans Who Care and the Christian Life Commission last week told members of the Texas Racing Commission that the public trust would be eroded if the state's share of betting proceeds is reduced.

Under the pari-mutuel law, the state will receive five percent of all wagering proceeds. Even though legalized betting has not yet begun, many horse owners have complained that their share of the betting proceeds is too small to attract quality horses to Texas. Racing promoters also say the track owner's share is too small.

Under the present rules, owners of successful horses get five percent of the betting pool, while track owners get eight percent. The remainder-minus the state's five percent share—is returned to

Some states with legalized betting have reduced their take on wagering to as low as 3.5 percent.

Wagering opponents told the commission that "integrity in the industry" cannot be maintained if the state's share is cut.

Any change in the distribution on betting proceeds would have to be made by the Legislature, not the racing commission.

Bullock Seeks Opinions

Comptroller Bob Bullock is prepared to seek a series of legal opinions from Attorney General Jim Mattox regarding questions he has about the Texas Racing Commission's actions in its first two meetings.

Meanwhile, Mattox's office admitted its lawyers erred when they failed to stop commission members from discussing details about the executive director's job during a 90-minute closed session last

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



Canned vegetables should be rotated on the shelves, and not be stored over one year, while frozen foods should be used within six months.

Coffee and tea should be refrigerated after opening, to preserve freshness and flavor; mustard and mayonnaise must also be refrigerated.

Canned foods and bottled drinks should not be stored in cabinets where water pipes pass because of the excess moisture created there, and potatoes stored with onions will cause the onions to sprout because of the moisture in potatoes.

As best as can be figured, this year was the fifth district championship for Haskell. The Indians won in 1958, 1983, 1984 and 1985, in addition to this year.

They were bi-district champs in 1984, but lost the first game in the area tournament. This year's team was the first to reach the regional.

His teams have won three district, three bi-district, two area and one regional championships.

Stone graduated from Haskell High School in 1971. He recalls that in his three years on the varsity, the Indians won 5, 6 and 10 games. His senior year was the only winning season when the Indians went 10-9.

Archer City will be making its third consecutive state tournament appearance. Last year the Wildcats lost out in the first game to eventual champion Morton.

The year before that, the Wildcats were in 1A. They reached the finals before bowing to Nazrath.

Archer City is coached by Nat Lunn, who began his coaching career there six years ago.

James Rike has scored 27 3-point goals for the Indians this season. Chan Guess has added 14 3-pointers.

Top rebounder is Dusty Meeks, who has hauled in 97 offensive rebounds and 178 defensive rebounds for a total of 275 and an average of 8 per game. Rike has 184 rebounds and

Mark Young is team leader in assists with 126. Guess is next with

Young has seen action in 132 of the 136 quarters the Indians have played. Meeks and Guess have played in 131.

As a team, the Indians have attempted 2,023 field goals, making 901 for a 44.53 percent average. They've made 428 of 716 free-throw attempts for an average of 59.77.

Through 34 games, the Indians averaged 67.58 points per contest.



PARTNERSHIPS VERSUS CORPORATIONS

The 1986 Tax Reform Act makes a partnership the preferred entity for

many businesses.

By using a partnership, you avoid the possibility of double taxation which you may have in the corporate form. The regular (C) corporation pays taxes on its earnings, and the shareholder pays taxes again on those earnings when they're distributed to to him as dividends.

Perhaps the single most important change to come from the 1986 Tax Reform Act is the change in tax rates. The maximum rate for individuals is lower than the maximum rate for corporations. This means that partnership earnings (which are passed through to the partners) are taxed only once, and they're taxed at a lower rate.

Some corporations qualify to make an "S" election. S corporations are treated very much like partnerships in that the earnings and losses are passed directly to the shareholders' individual tax returns.

Here are three significant reasons why a partnership may be a better tax entity than an S corporation. First, the partners in a partnership may agree to a special allocation of income and deductions. Second, if a partner is liable for the partnership debt, he or she is able to deduct losses in excess of the amount of cash or property contributed to the partnership.

The third item which makes the partnership attractive is that the liquidation of a partnership is normally nontaxable. Because of death, disability, or disagreement, most closely-held business ventures will terminate sooner or later. The ability to get out of a joint venture with little or no tax problems is

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



Judge denies writ by Ellis tax group

A district judge has ruled against an Ellis County group which filed for a writ of mandamus requiring county commissioners to order a rollback election. The Ellis County suit was similar to one filed Feb. 18 by a taxpayer group in Haskell County.

A docket entry over the signature of District Judge David Knize read:

"Suit has been brought requesting this court to issue a writ of mandamus to require the Ellis County Commissioners Court to order an election to determine whether or not the tax rate adopted by the commissioners should be reduced to the limits prescribed by Section 26.07 of the Tax Code.

"It has been stipulated by the parties that the tax rate adopted by the commissioners is within the maximum limits authorized by Article VIII, Sections 1a and 9 of the Texas Constitution.

"It has also been stipulated that the tax rate adopted by the commissioners is in excess of the minimum limit which would subject the tax rate to the provisions of Section 26.07 of the Tax Code.

"Therefore Section 26.07, if applicable, limits the authority vested in county commissioners by the Texas Constitution.

"A statute cannot authorize the assessment of a tax which the Constitution prohibits nor can a statute prohibit the assessment of a tax authorized by the Constitution.

"The Texas Constitution plainly gives the commissioners the

authority to annually assess ad valorem taxes in an amount not to exceed the limits set by the Constitution. Since the tax rate adopted by the commissioners is within the Constitutional limits, this court is without authority to order an election to reduce the tax rate.

"Plaintiff's argument that refusal to order the commissioners to call such an election is the equivalent of denying the citizens their right to petition the government for redress of grievances as guaranteed by the Constitution is not the point.

"It has been stipulated by the parties that 7,000 citizens did in fact, by petition, present their grievances on this subject to the commissioners. It is within the discretion of the commissioners elected by the people whether or not to redress that grievance. It is not within the authority of the court to question the wisdom of the exercise of that

"The court finds that Section 26.07 of the Tax Code is not applicable to the taxes authorized by Article VIII, Sections 1a and 9 of the Texas Constitution.

"It is therefore ordered that the request for writ of mandamus is
