

Hasell firemen help battle huge range fire

Haskell Volunteer Firemen, joined by several area departments had spent about 10 days fighting what had appeared to be a large grass fire in southeast Haskell County when word was received of another fire farther south.

The new fire started near Clyde, just north of IH 20 and pushed by high gusting south winds was quickly moving toward the north. Abundant rainfall during the spring and early summer of 1987 had provided the moisture for grasses to grow to heights not seen in many years. The tall dry grass often burned in fire lines as much as 100 yards wide.

Plans were made to stop the fire along U.S. 380 between Haskell and Throckmorton, about 60 miles north of where it started. That plan proved to be only one of many that didn't work. As the wind changed to the west the fire started to race toward Albany on the north and Baird on the south with Moran directly in the middle. Men and equip-

ment continued to try to get in front of the fire and halt its advance, but changing winds continued to cause problems.

As more and more calls for assistance were issued, fire departments from farther and farther away started to arrive. Gov. Bill Clements issued a disaster declaration which set in motion the mechanism which would allow the State and Federal armed forces to assist. At the same time, both the Texas and U. S. Forestry Services were called in for assistance.

Wearied Haskell firemen who had spent much of the last 10 days fighting a grass fire on the Early, Bunkley, Rike and Frazier ranches responded to the new fire. The earlier fire had consumed an estimated six to eight thousand acres and was one of the largest fires in this area in the past 10 years.

During the three days following the beginning of the fire near Clyde, an estimated 300,000 acres of rangeland burned. An official with the Texas For-

estry service said Saturday that he had researched records which showed this fire was the largest in the State since the early part of the century.

The fire burned an estimated 75% of everything in a triangle from Clyde, north to Lake Stamford, southeast to near Putnam and back to Clyde. Early news reports indicated that numerous homes had been burned and many fire trucks had been destroyed. At about the time the fire was declared under control, officials could document only one house which had received more than minor damage and no trucks which had been destroyed. Several firetrucks were damaged and at least one had several tires burned.

According to State Rep. Rick Perry, the disaster declaration by the Governor is different than the declaration following the flood of 1978 in that no public property was damaged. Rep. Perry said that the County Judges in the disaster

Runoff to decide constable

There will be a runoff election for county constable between Coyt Hix and Troy P. Brown.

That was determined after an official canvass of the votes in last Tuesday's Democratic primary. In the unofficial tally, Hix had been presumed to be the winner without a runoff.

The official canvass left Hix's vote total at 996, but Brown gained 30 votes for a total of 488. He had 458 in the unofficial count. Greg Hearn's vote total was reduced by 2, from 307 to 305, while the 220 votes for Jim Wilkinson remained unchanged.

Hix and Brown will face each other in the April 12 runoff for the only office to be decided by countywide voting.

There will be two county commissioner races in the runoff. In precinct 1, challenger John L. (Bud) Grand faces incumbent T. C. (Tim) Burson and in precinct 3, incumbent J. R. (Ray) Perry will be opposed by Dennis (Eddie) Grand.

Donations asked for victims

County has new entomologist

Davis will be responsible for carrying out the pest management program in the five-county area in cooperation with the county extension agents and with extension entomologist Emory Boring.

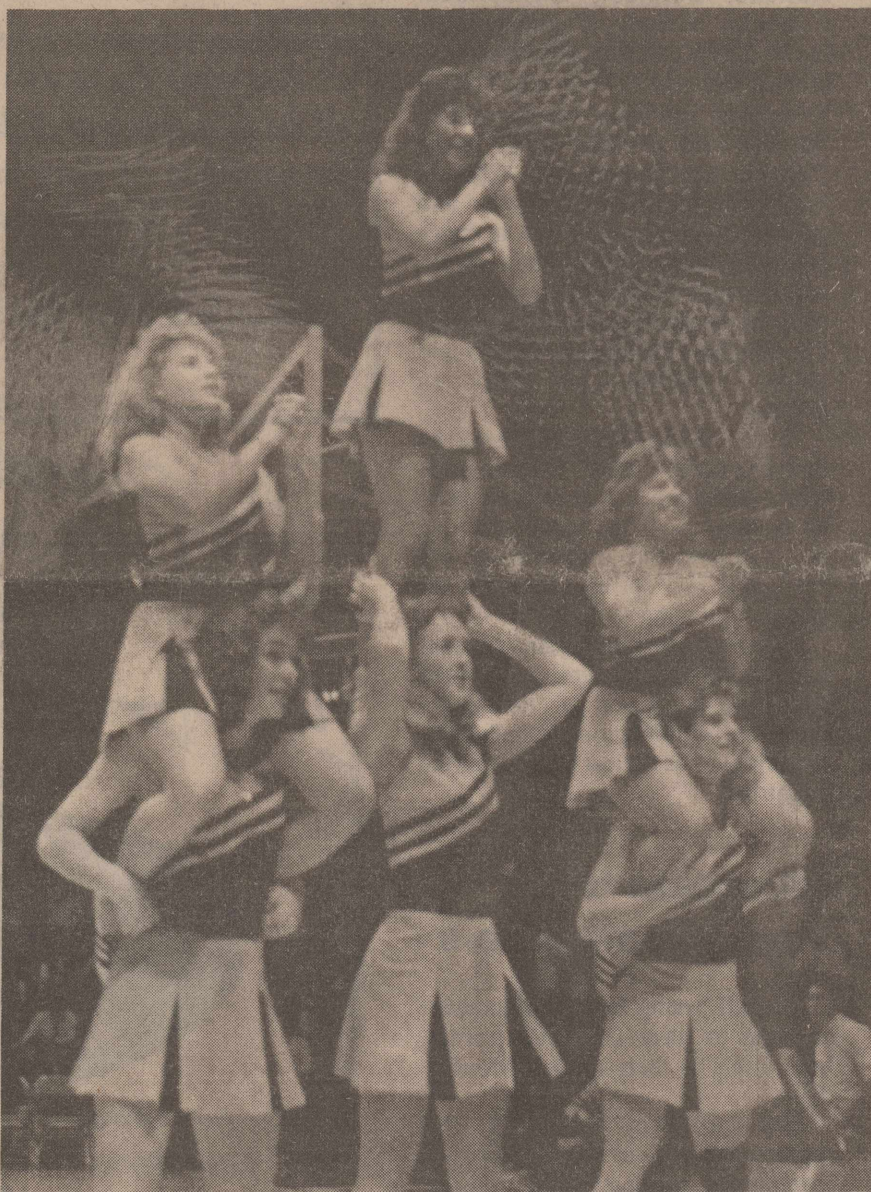

New GED tests to be more difficult

If you are thinking about taking the GED test, it might benefit you to take the exam sooner rather than later.

That's the advice of Marilyn Flournoy, adult education director for the Big Country Adult Education Co-op, who said the new 1988 General Educational Development test, or GED, will be more difficult to pass after May 20.

One June 6, the nationally administered high school equivalency test will be modified to include a written essay section, a more challenging mathematics section, and critical thinking skills for the reading sections, said Flournoy.

People are encouraged to take the test between now and the end of May because the teachers are familiar with the old test and know how to prepare their students for it.

One of the major differences will be the addition of an essay that goes with the writing skills portion. The essay section was added because of the lack of writing abilities among high school dropouts.

The mathematics section of the test will focus on arithmetic, algebra and geometry, but most of it will rely on the ability to apply the

mathematical process.

People without a high school diploma take the GED for a variety of reasons, but the end result is usually the same--a bigger paycheck. Job promotions are an incentive to many people who opt to take the GED, and, in some cases, passing the GED is a requirement in order to keep a given job. Many employers are using the test as a gauge for promotion or employment. Some people may be all right for a while without a GED, but if they change jobs, they may be required to pass the GED test.

Greater numbers of high school age people are taking the GED. It seems that as the economy goes down, the number taking the test goes up.

GED tests are administered in Abilene on Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Those interested may call 915-673-6585 to make an appointment.

For those who feel they need to study before taking the GED, there are GED classes currently being offered at Haskell High School from 6 to 8:15 p.m. on Mondays. They are held in room 106. For information, contact Melodee Christian, 864-2891 or 3004.

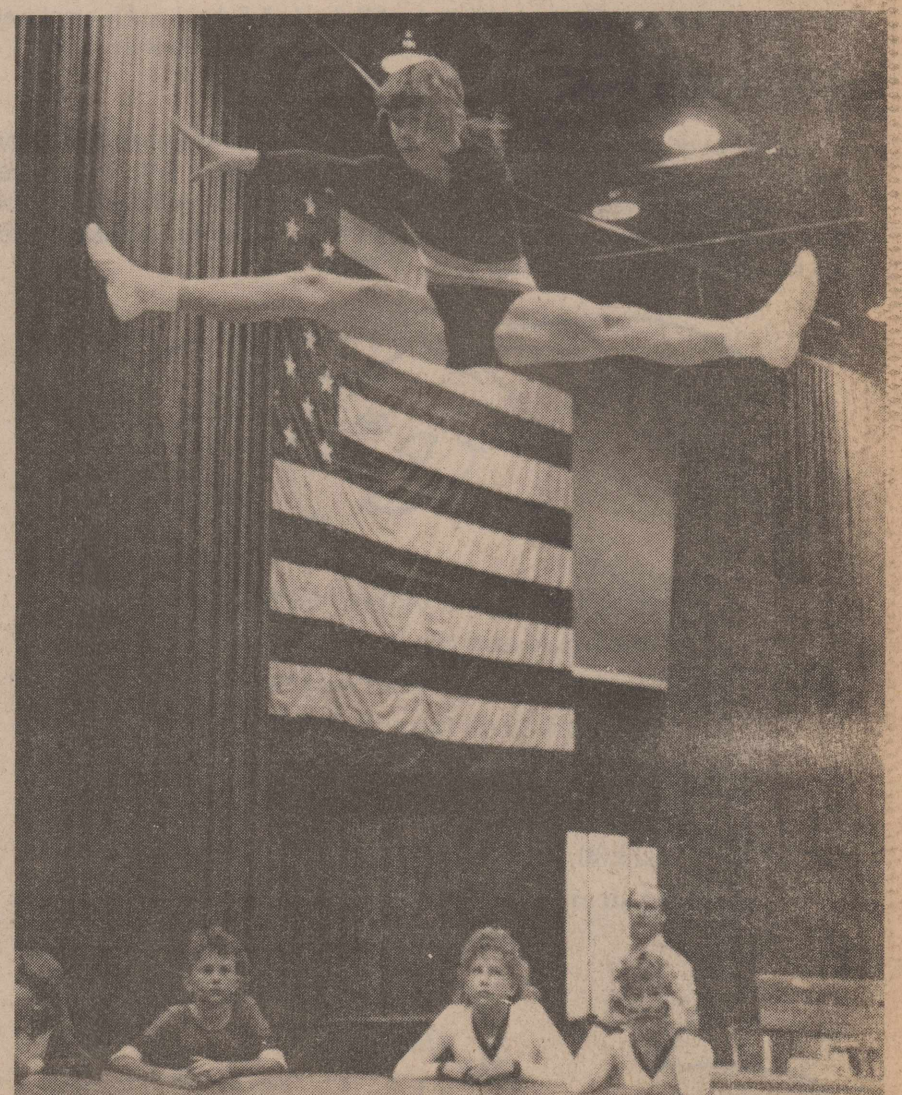
Chris Villareal sustained severe head injuries when his bicycle was struck as he was returning from a store near his home.

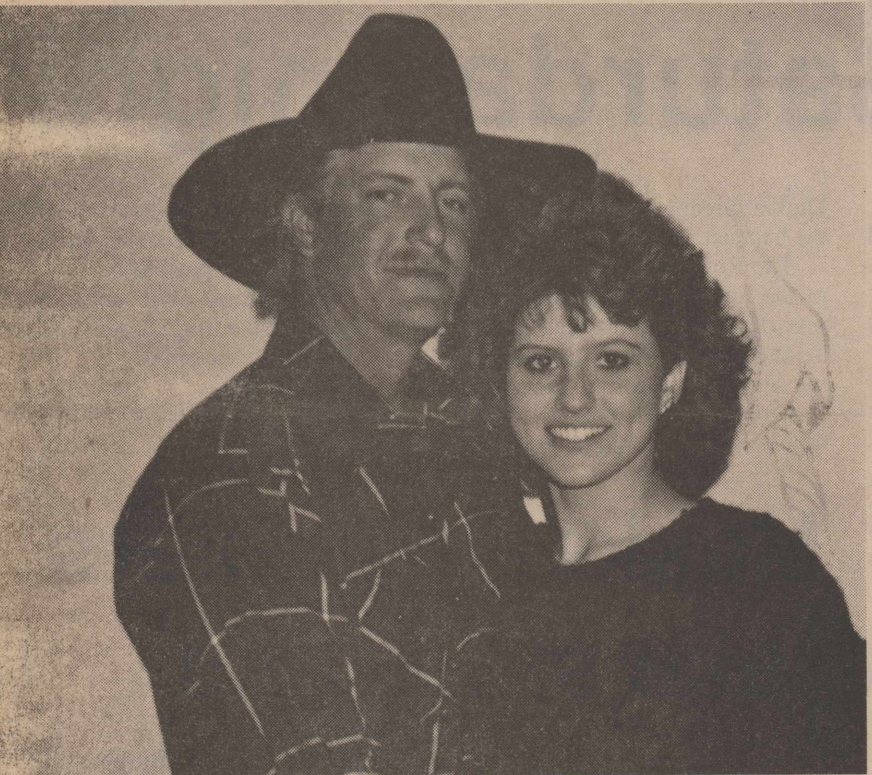
Adams, Leach to wed April 30

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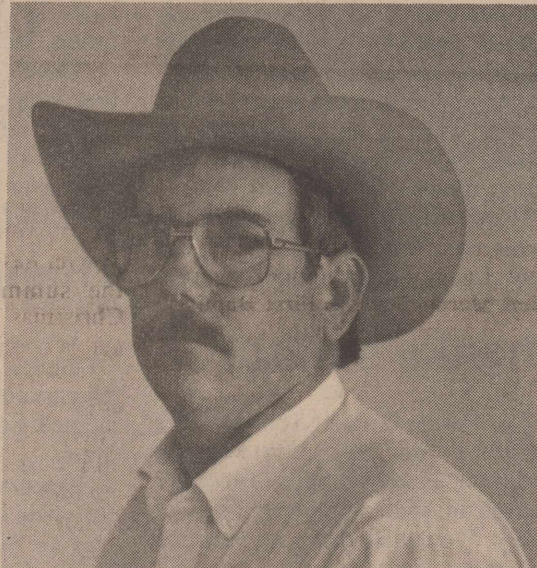
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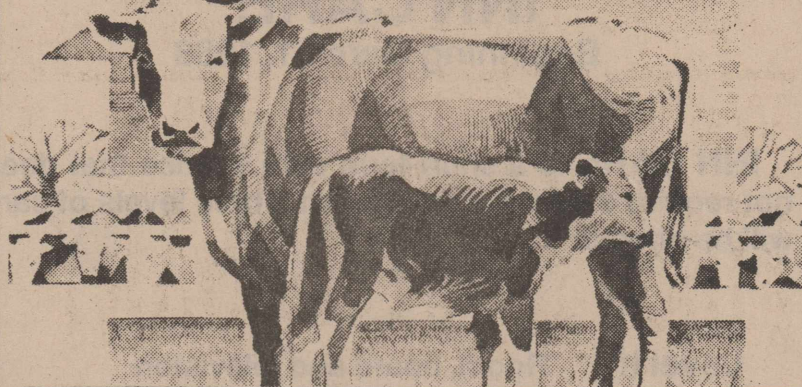

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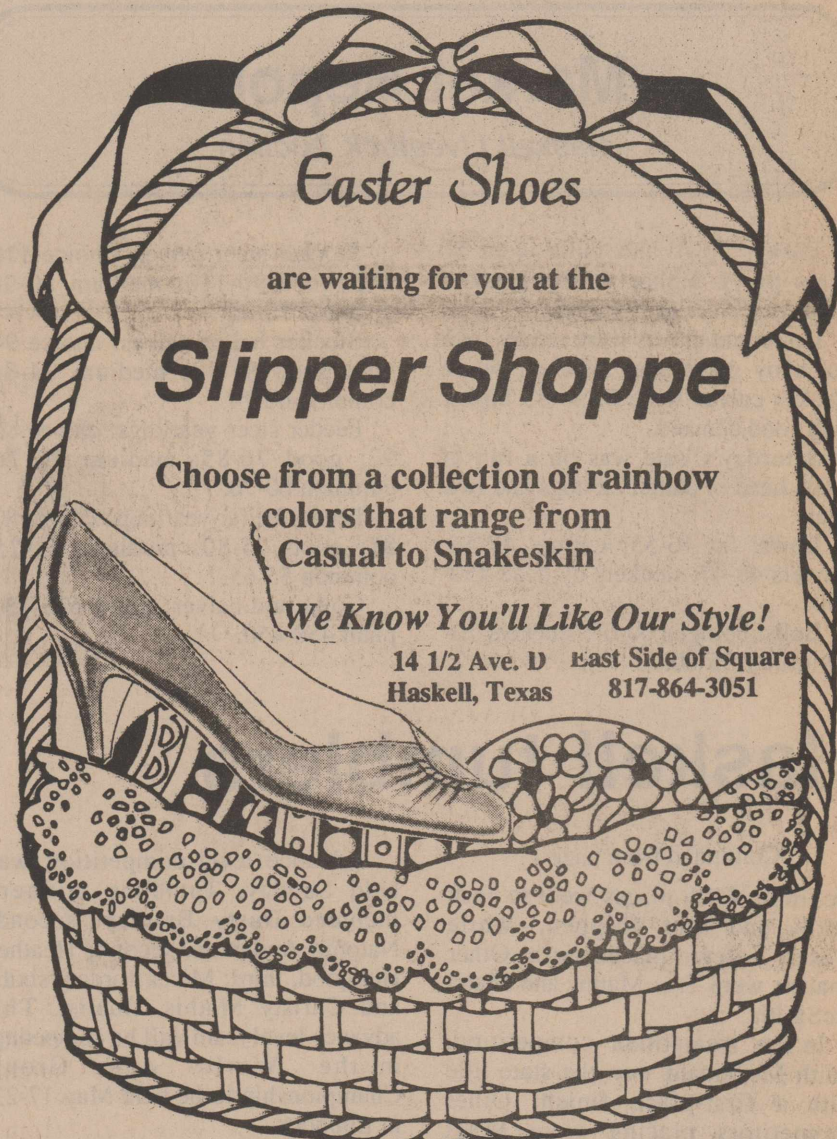

area were scheduled to meet with the Governor Thursday afternoon and more details would be available after that meeting. In addition to the Governor's declaration, Perry said he intended to request that Congressman Charles Stenholm seek a Presidential disaster declaration which could possibly make low interest federal loans available to property owners in the affected area.

The Texas Forestry Service placed a small trailer on the lawn of the Shackelford County Courthouse and set-up operations as a mobile command post. As the firefighting started to wind down Saturday afternoon, the area around the trailer took on a different atmosphere. As exhausted firefighters from all over the state arrived to see what else needed to be done, many longtime friends from State Fire conventions and Texas A&M fireschool saw each other for the first time since arriving at the fire. While attending the convention and school, firefighters often discuss local fires and techniques used in their departments. This fire was a first for many of the firefighters to work together on the same fire.

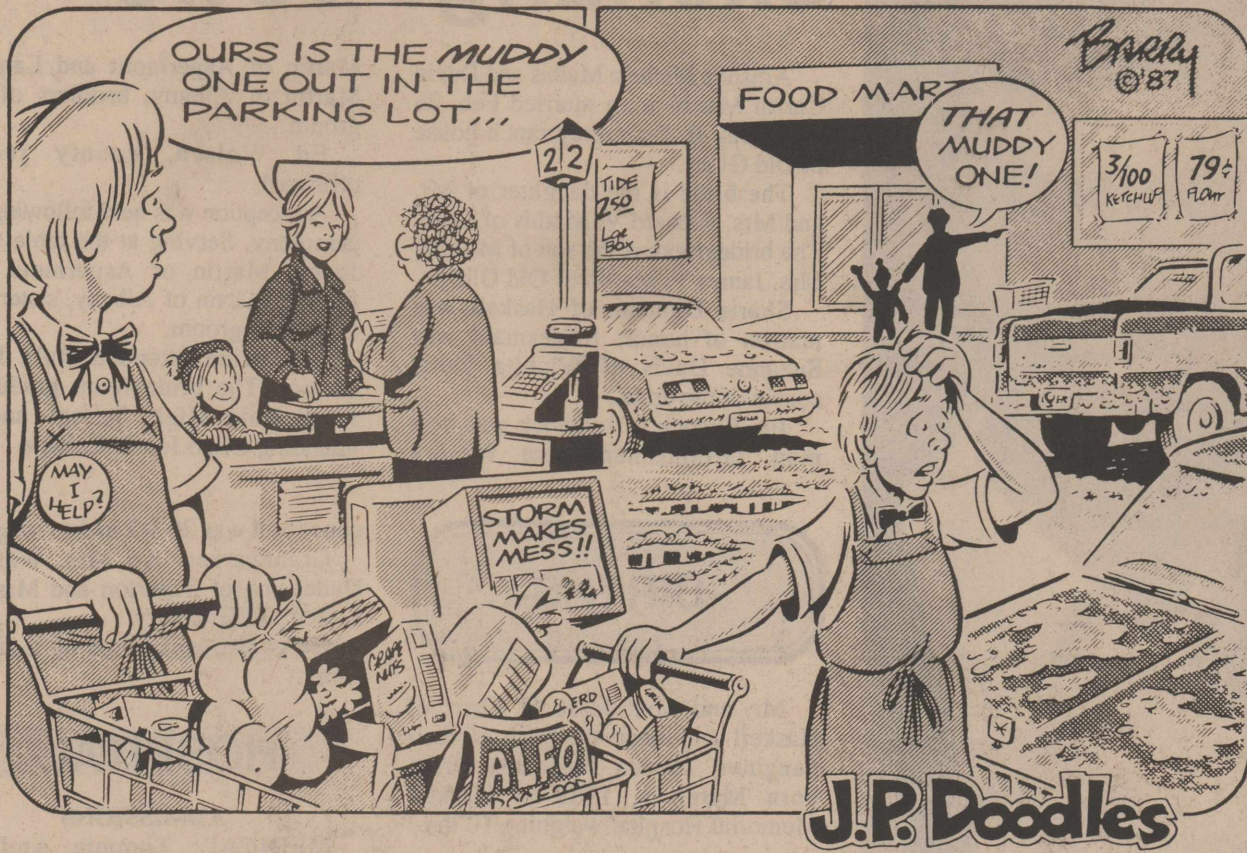
In this area, firemen from Haskell, Throckmorton and Lueders see each other regularly while fighting grass fires and lifelong friendships have been created while sharing a few moments of rest, a sandwich and cold drink. Almost as if by prearranged plan, the departments which had worked together in the past found themselves teaming together

to fight this fire.

At the same time, firefighters from departments located farther away entered a strange territory and fell-in beside the "locals" to get the job done.

Ranchers in the affected area were busy repairing fences and locating livestock even before the fire was controlled. No estimates were available concerning the miles of fence which had been destroyed or the number of cattle killed or injured. Most ranchers agreed however, that the loss of livestock could have been much greater.

For area residents the fire will always be remembered as a nightmare, but for the firefighters, accustomed to long days and nights of grass fires, the memories of this one, like many others will be the humorous stories. Like the young man from a nearby rural department who arrived at a small ranch house in a remote part of Shackelford County only to see a giant City of Fort Worth fire engine. The young man exclaimed, "Wow, look at that truck". The driver answered with, "Now son, you can go home and tell your mother you've seen a REAL firetruck". Only minutes passed before the fire topped a nearby ridge and tall rushing flames lined much of the horizon. The veteran Fort Worth firefighter exclaimed, "LOOK at that FIRE!" And the native youth immediately replied, "Yeah, and now you can go home and tell your mother you've seen a REAL fire."

The current presidential campaign might well go down as the one with the simplest names on the ballots.

Before all the dropping out, no fewer than six major candidates had names spelled with four letters-- Bush, Dole, Kemp, Haig, Gore, Hart.

If one of them is elected, he will be the third White House occupant to be called a four-letter word, legitimately--joining Polk (1845-1849) and Taft (1909-1913).

Despite what presidential candidates tell us about how valuable their experience is, history does not bear them out.

Truth is, no particular experience qualifies a man to be a good president.

Dwight Eisenhower, who had absolutely no political experience, was an excellent president. U.S. Grant, on the other hand, came to the presidency with no experience and was a weak president.

No one ever ascended to the presidency with better credentials than Richard Nixon--congressman, senator, vice president and a previous presidential candidate (not to mention his race for governor of California). He then almost destroyed the office of president.

Lyndon Johnson was not far behind Nixon in credentials, and actually had a longer political career. He let Vietnam destroy him.

One of Jimmy Carter's biggest selling points was that he was not a Washington insider, having served only as governor of Georgia. He was totally ineffective as a president. Voters replaced him with yet another non-insider in Ronald Reagan, who gets extremely high marks as an oval office occupant.

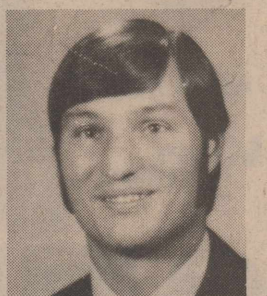
Government scholar James Madison, architect of the constitution, is not considered one of the strong presidents, while Andrew Jackson, who ignored the constitution if it interfered with his desires, is rated highly effective by historians.

We never know who will be a good president. Quite frankly, we've been pretty lucky.

REVENUE ACT OF 1987

On December 22, 1987, President Regan signed our newest tax bill into law. There are four new items which may have a direct effect on your individual income tax return.

- * Mortgage and home-equity interest
- * Mutual funds
- * Dependent care expenses
- * Estimated tax

The law gives us two new terms in reference to home interest deductions. The first is "acquisition indebtedness"; the interest deduction on acquisition indebtedness is limited to \$1,000,000 of debt. The second term is "home-equity indebtedness" the interest deduction on home-equity indebtedness is limited to \$100,000 of debt, regardless of the use to which the money is put. There are some exceptions to these interest limitations that can create traps for the unwary.

The law provides temporary relief for shareholders of certain mutual funds who are taxed on "phantom income." The 2% floor on the miscellaneous itemized deductions of individuals will not apply to the expenses allocated to mutual fund shareholders until tax years beginning in 1988.

Effective for 1988 and later years, you will not be permitted a dependent care credit for sending children or other dependents to overnight camps.

The increase from 80% to 90% of the current year's tax liability that must be paid by individuals in order to avoid penalty will take effect for tax years starting after 1987. The Tax Reform Act of 1986 was to have made this effective for 1987 tax returns.

By far the most significant item in this new tax law has to do with your new home interest deduction. Seek professional assistance before financing or refinancing any residential property.



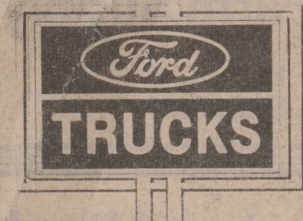

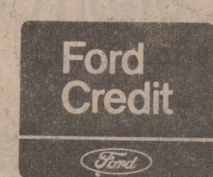

Farmers are efficient producers

U.S. farmers today produce over 80 percent more crop output on an acre of land than did their fathers. Today, one hour of farm labor produces 16 times as much food and other crops as it did in the 1919-21 period.

New technology has made these gains possible. The productivity of the land now depends upon the skill and knowledge with which capital is applied. The bigger the volume that farmers can raise and sell, the lower the product cost per item. So U.S. consumers gain from the increase in farm production efficiency.

The following chart on productivity indicates how labor requirements have changed since the beginning of the 19th century.

Yield per acre were 15 bushels for wheat, 25 bushels for corn, and 154 pounds for cotton.

In 1790, 3,000 bales of cotton were produced. With the advent of the cotton gin in 1793, production rose to 73,000 bales by 1800. Other crops produced at this time include 160 million bushels of grain products, 22 million bushels of wheat, 107 million pounds of tobacco, and 300 million board feet of lumber.

Food prices rise less than other consumer prices

Food prices rose 3.2% in 1986, slightly higher than the 2.3% increase in 1985, according to the Consumer Price Index.

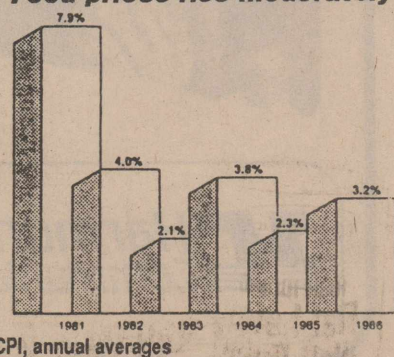
The farm prices of food products, that is, the value of the farm goods that go into the food product, went down for a second consecutive year making the 1986 farm value of food the lowest since 1979. Following a 7.1% decline in 1985, the farm value of food fell 1.3% lower.

The farm value averaged 30% of the retail cost for a "market basket" of foods purchased in grocery stores, down from 31% in 1985 and 34% in 1984.

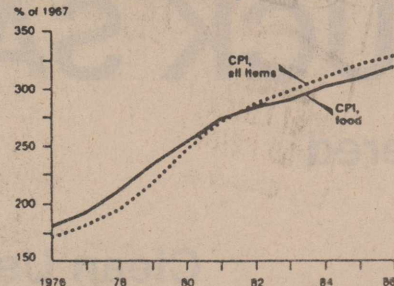
The farm share of the food dollar has declined recently because abundant food supplies have held down farm prices while rising costs to processors and distributors have boosted retail prices.

About 25 percent of last year's food spending went back to farmers, who received about \$89 billion. This share is lower than the 30 percent farm value share for the market basket of food because it includes the much lower 16 percent farm share for away-from-home food spending.

An American farmer provides food and fiber for 114 people.

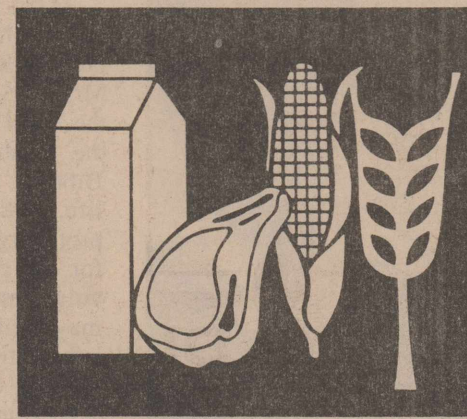

AGRICULTURE IS MORE THAN FOOD

We depend on farmers for our food - and a lot more besides.

We count on farmers for obvious non-food items: wool and cotton for our clothing; leather for our shoes, belts, luggage, and other "leather goods"; pulp for paper and wood for our homes, other buildings, and furniture; and fiber for sacks, bags, and boxes. The American Paper Institute reports that paper and paperboard production averaged two pounds per person per day in January 1986.

Farmers produce our tobacco, another nonfood product. The greenhouse and nursery business, which is predominantly nonfood agriculture, has grown in dollar volume until it generates more cash farm income, \$5.8 billion, than either the \$1.9 billion for tobacco or the \$2.7 billion for cotton. Forest products add \$1.4 billion to farm cash income; wool adds \$55 million.

Agricultural mining is an \$18 billion industry directly employing more than 100,000 people.

Then there are common non-food items we might not readily think of as "agricultural": there's grass seed for lawns, bird seed for the birds, and how about pet food for dogs and cats? People spent \$6 billion last year for dog and cat food, nine and one-half billion pounds of it, says the Pet Food Institute.

The more exotic agricultural products are something to contemplate as you relax and go fishing, maybe to bait your hook with a worm or other bait from a bait farm. That's an agricultural product, too. You'll find agricultural products in gasohol fuel, industrial alcohol, adhesives, cosmetics, fragrances, soap, candles, paints, chewing gum, utility poles, lead pencils, and pesticides containing substances such as nicotine and pyrethrum.

Next time your doctor gives you a shot, try to take your mind off the needle by concentrating on the fact that the vaccine may have been cultured in an egg, (an agricultural product.) About one-fourth of all prescription drugs contain agricultural products.

We've come a long way from old nonfood agricultural standbys such as straw mattresses, feather dusters, mustard plasters, leather chaps, and six-shooter holsters, but nonfood agriculture is still all around us. It's big business, not to be swept under the rug, especially if the broom is made from broom corn. Yep, that's agriculture.

Food and fiber industry

There are 21 million people working in agriculture. Each additional \$1 billion of agricultural or food and fiber demand creates 30,000 to 35,000 additional jobs and adds a total of \$2 billion to the Nation's Gross National Product.

Each \$1 billion earned from farm exports in 1986 created another \$1.51 billion of output in the U.S. economy, for a total of \$2.51 billion. In 1986, 0.8 million (or 781,000 full-time jobs) related to agricultural exports. Nearly 450,000 of those were non-farm jobs assembling, processing, and distributing farm products for export.

Facts on agriculture and the hungry

The U.S. is the world's largest food donor.

In 1985, the U.S. exported \$1.3 billion under PL 480, the Food for Peace program. African drought relief accounted for this higher-than-usual level of food aid. In 1986, world food needs weren't as great. Weather still drives world agriculture, however, and is increasing estimates of world food shortages for 1988. Severe drought in India and Ethiopia and inadequate rainfall in many African countries have increased world food needs to 26 million tons.

A growing portion of the USDA budget goes to feeding the hungry in America.

The number of Americans facing hunger in 1986 was 20 million, according to the Physicians Task Force on Hunger. That number continues to grow. More and more families are standing in soup lines, whereas in the 1970's the hungry was largely made up of single men. Although many programs were cut in 1980, USDA costs for these programs have increased 42% (not adjusted for inflation). The total cost for various food distribution programs was 20 billion in 1986. Programs include: the Food Stamp program, Women, Infants and Children program, Child nutrition programs and other. Funding is also provided by private organizations and some state and local organizations mostly in the form of "emergency food assistance."

The food problem in some Third World countries has prompted Lloyd Timberlake in his book *Only One Earth* to remark that "the average British cat eats twice as much animal protein every day as the average African citizen." Further, the estimated cost of maintaining a British cat is \$260 per year; a figure that is "more than the average annual income of the one billion people who live in the world's 15 poorest nations," he says.

We can't attest to the cost of feeding a cat in Britain. The British spend about \$900 per person annually on their own food, beverages, and alcohol. To take nothing away from the desperate need of poor countries for protein, it still can be said that the kind of animal protein in cat food wouldn't cause very many people to salivate, nor would it likely send very many to the stump to advocate that we kill the cat and send the cat food to the "poor people around the world."

Indians bow in state semifinal

The Haskell Indians will have to settle on just being the greatest basketball team in the school's history. There will be no state championship this year.

The disappointing end of a fantastic season came Friday morning in far-away Austin when the Indians fell to the Archer City Wildcats in the semifinals of the state basketball tournament.

The final 70-54 score is not at all indicative of how the Indians battled the eventual state 2A champions. They led throughout most of the first half and they trailed by a mere 4 points as late as the fourth quarter.

But in the end, it was an inability to score in the waning minutes that spelled defeat for the Indians. They mustered only 4 points in the final period, although they had numerous shots before Archer City went into a stall to preserve, and add to, its lead.

Going into the last quarter on the short end of a 56-50 score after James Rike hit a 3-pointer with a half minute to go, the Indians saw their hopes rise when Mark Young hit a jumper to narrow the gap to 56-52 just 28 seconds into the final stanza.

As it turned out, though, that was to be the Indians' last score until Young hit on a 5-foot turnaround halfway through the period, and that

shot was to be Haskell's final score of the game. Archer City scored 14 fourth-quarter points, 6 of them coming on free throws as the Indians fought for the ball.

The game started fine for the Indians. They led by as many as five points in the opening quarter and ended the period with a 19-16 advantage.

Archer City captured the lead, 33-31, on a pair of free throws by Matt McLemore at the 1:31 mark of the second period. A shot by Tony Pollock made it 35-31 and a layup by Nicky McCorkle stretched it to 37-31 before Brad Bevel's layup reduced it to 37-33. Pollock's two free throws completed the first-half scoring and

gave the Wildcats a 39-33 at intermission.

The Wildcats led by as many as 11 points in the third period, but the Indians narrowed the margin to 3 points, 56-50, on late baskets by Dusty Meeks and Rike.

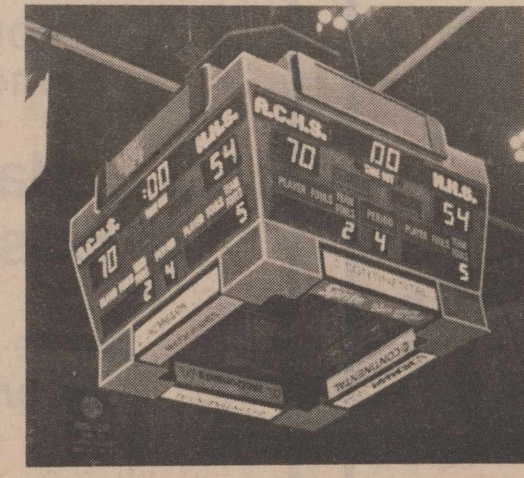
But after Young's basket to open the final period, the Indians cooled off and were unable to find the scoring range.

Bevel wound up as the Indians' top scorer with 14 points, one more than Young and Meeks.

Archer City's talented McCorkle was the game's high scorer with 28 points, including 4 for 4 from 3-point range. Pollock and Eric Powell each had 14.

Indians put two on all-7-2-A team

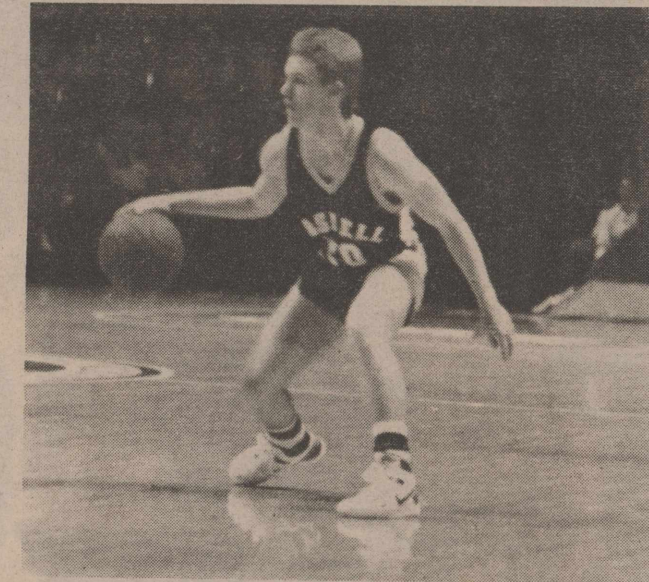
Haskell's champion Indians placed two players on the all-district basketball team. Two more Indians were on the second team and four others on the honorable mention list.

Junior Brad Bevel and sophomore James Rike were on the first team. Voted the most outstanding player of the season was Anson's Douglas. Also on the first team were Terry Allen and James Cooley of Hawley

and J. R. Garcia of Albany.

Senior Mark Young and junior Dusty Meeks were on the second team, along with Hamlin's Rodney Douglas and three Stamford players, Eric Jones, Eddie Hall and Dirk Martin.

Senior Patrick Perez and juniors Derrick Billington, Chan Guess and Paul Harvey of the Indians received honorable mention.

The Indians attempted 71 field goals, but connected on only 23. The 32.4 percentage was far below their season average of 44.53.

From 3-point range, Haskell connected on only 4 of 25 for a mere 16 percent. For the season, they were 68 for 188, or 36.17 percent. Guess had two 3-point goals, and Young and Rike had one each.

Archer City shot 55.6 percent from the field, 25 for 45. The Wildcats were 4 of 6 on three pointers.

From the free throw line, the Indians were 4 of 7, all of them in the first half. They got no free throws in the second half. Archer City connected on 16 of 22. The Wildcats committed only eight fouls, the Indians 17.

Haskell held its own in rebounding, despite the superior height of Archer City. They were credited with 35 rebounds while Archer City had 42. But the Wildcats had a lot more opportunities at defensive rebounds as the Indians shot 71 times from the field while Archer City put up the ball only 45 times.

The Indians held Eric Powell to 14 points, little more than half his season average. But Nicky McCorkle had a field day. He made 12 of 15 field goal attempts, including all four 3-pointers he tried, to wind up with 28 points. Oddly, he never did attempt a free throw.

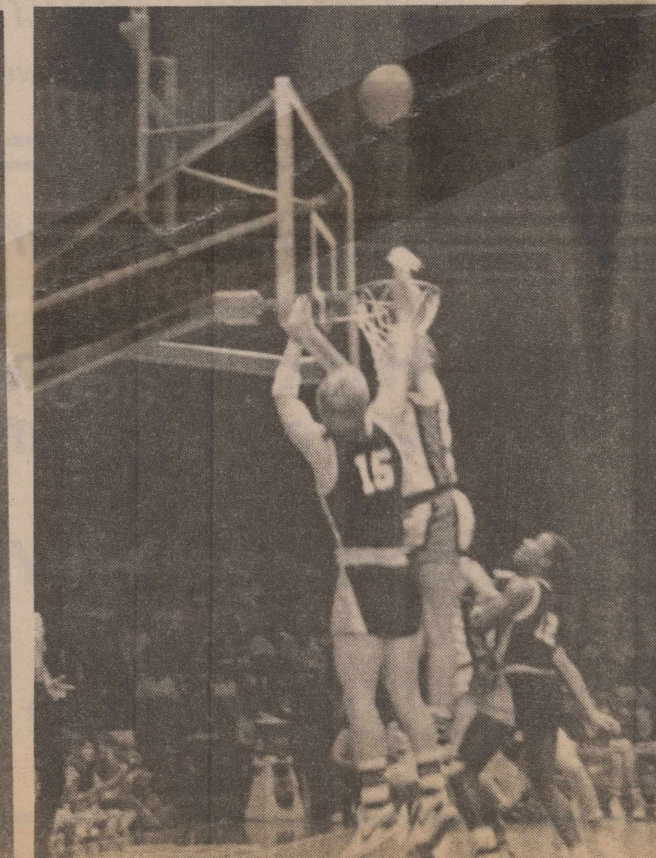
Archer City wins state title

Buddy Lane has been re-elected to a third term as Chamber treasurer and is serving a second three-year term as a member of the Board of Directors.

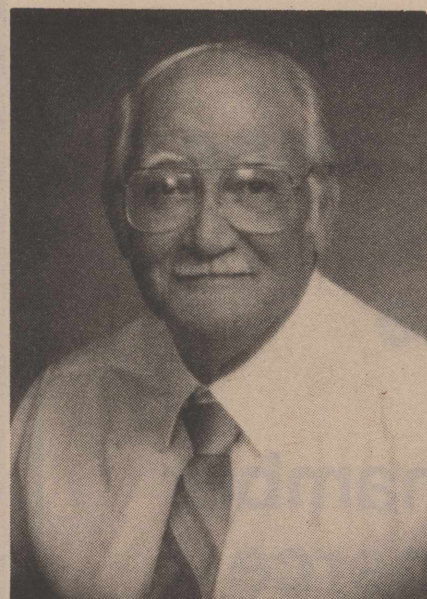

He has served as president of the Kiwanis Club, Haskell Youth Basketball Assn., Little Dribblers, etc.

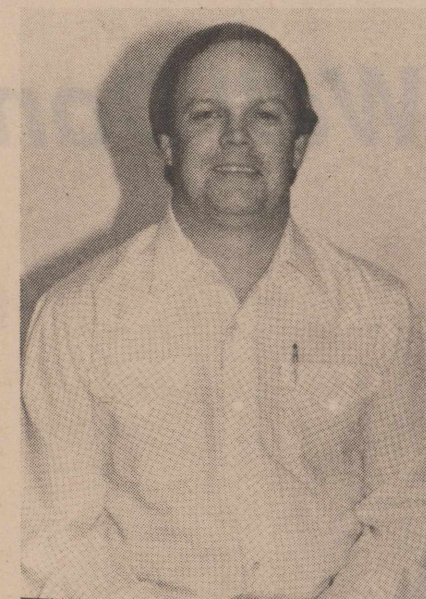

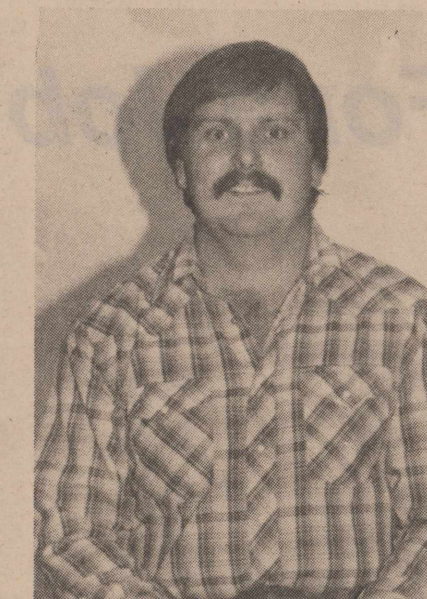

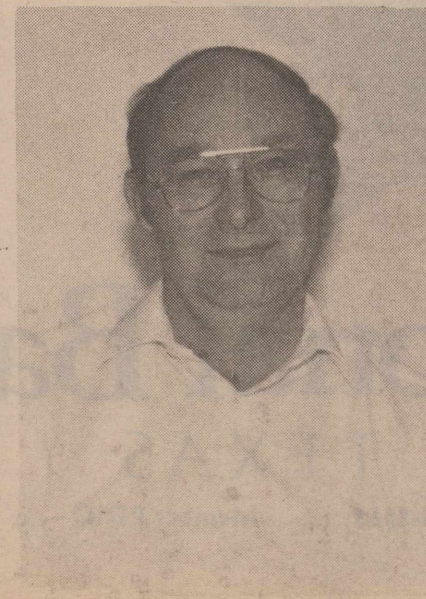
