

## Schools contribute to project

As part of the Beautify Haskell project, the planting of shrubs around the elementary school made April 25 an exciting and unusual day for the third-grade classes of the Haskell Elementary School.

This event involved 56 children in the rooms of Mrs. Melodee Christian, Mrs. Pam Gibson and Mrs. Jean Raughton. The teachers came to school prepared by wearing their blue jeans and old shoes.

The children in the third grade had saved aluminum cans for two months to earn money in the amount of \$161.46. Other elementary students donated \$48.72 to complete the cost of buying the shrubs--30 Asian jasmine, 10 nandinas and eight boxwood. The school had previously prepared the flower beds by having the beds tilled and the surface smoothed.

Martha Toliver, president of the Josselet Extension Homemakers, went to Abilene and purchased plants and also helped to plant and supervise the planting. Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Browning, remedial reading teachers, were very helpful by locating the tools needed, by mixing the dirt and peat moss and by mixing the plant starter and water.

The three third-grade teachers helped to distribute the plants, one plant to two children, and helped to supervise the children and the actual planting of the shrubs. Most supervisors actually became "hole-diggers" as the project unfolded. The children, even with the excitement of the event, were very well behaved and cooperative.

Several days later, Mrs. Toliver received a "thank you" from the third graders, thanking both her and the Josselet Extension Homemakers for their part in this beautification project.

## Payne, McMillin winners

Claude Payne was re-elected to a second term on the City Council and Larry McMillin won the other council seat in Saturday's city election.

Payne topped the vote-getters among the three council candidates, being the choice of 327 voters. McMillin got 308 votes. A third candidate, Nathan K. Patterson, was the choice of 111 voters.

Mayor Greg Mayor was unopposed for mayor, receiving 348 votes.

Councilmen and the mayor were elected to two-year terms. They will be sworn in at Thursday night's City Council meeting.

McMillin will succeed Kenny Watson who did not seek re-election to a third term.

## Going for the Gold

### Track teams compete in state meet Saturday

Haskell should be one of the best represented schools in the state Saturday at the state track and field meet in Austin.

Indians and Maidens will be running in no fewer than eight events as Haskell sends its best up against the best Class 2A performers in Texas.

Three individuals and two relay teams will represent Coach Jimmy Lisle's Indians as they shoot for the first team state championship ever for Haskell High School. The Indians narrowly missed the championship last year.

Coach George Martin's Maidens

also have high hopes in the state classic. Two individuals and a relay team will carry the Maiden colors.

Mark Young of the Indians, who won the state 800-meter championship last year with a time of 1:54.3, will be out to duplicate that accomplishment. He won first in district and regional.

Young also qualified for the 400-meter run by coming in second in the regional.

Stephon Brockington, district and regional champion in the 200-meter dash, will be returning to Austin in hopes of bettering his third-place

finish there a year ago when he was clocked in 22.4, a time he has bettered several times this season.

Also representing the Indians will be the 400- and 1600-meter relay teams, both of which captured first places in district and regional.

Making up the sprint relay team are Rodney Johnson, Fred Shaw, Derrick Billington and Brockington. Jimmy Billington is alternate. The sprint relay team won third in the state last year when it was composed of Derrick Billington, Brockington, Shaw and Joel Torres.

The 1600-meter relay team is made

up of Louie Torres, Brockington, Shaw and Young, with Josh Reid as an alternate. Shaw, Brockington and Young, along with Johnny Castillo, were on the 1600 team last year that finished second in the state.

The Maidens are led by junior Joy McKeever, who missed last year's championship meets due to illness after making it to state in the 100-meter hurdles as a freshman. A district and regional champion, McKeever turned in a sparkling 14.7 in the hurdles at last Friday's state qualifiers' meet in Abilene.

Another individual performer for

the Maidens is Regina Dever, who will be competing in the 400-meter run. She qualified by coming in second in the regional.

Big hopes also ride on the Maidens' 1600-meter relay team which won first in district and regional. Team members and alternates are Leiza Morales, Teresa Unger, Sheree Dumas, Shelia Unger, Dever and Teresa Rodriguez.

Class 1A and 2A running events all will be Saturday, beginning at 9 a.m. with the 3200-meter runs and concluding about 1:30 p.m. after the 1600-meter relay events.

Each rodeo performance will be followed by a dance in the Corral Building on the fairgrounds with music by the Willow Creek Band.



"Aunt Sallie" Homsley moved to Haskell from Fort Griffin on Jan. 1, 1913. She began visiting and teaching in homes. On March 2, 1913, Sterlin and Carrie Edwards opened the doors to their home and had the first full gospel service in their living room.

In the early fall of 1913, Rev. H.

W. Wray came and rented a skating rink to conduct services in. Rev. Bennie Condron conducted services in 1914. A building was rented in 1916 and Rev. Oscar Jones came and conducted services. In 1918, Rev. Miles and Jody Thomas came and held a tent meeting.

Sister Jesse Kaye (pronounced Coye) came in 1921. In 1922, the presbyter Bert McCafferty was called and the church was set in order at First Assembly of God. Sister Kaye was elected as pastor. J. L. Reid Sr.,

The Weinert Home Extension Club met for its re-scheduled meeting on Wednesday, May 4, in the home of Myrtle Plemister. Because of a conflicting workshop, Mrs. Gilly could not be present on Tuesday, the regular meeting day.

Nine members answered roll call by naming a "cut of meat." The hostess brought the devotion, using Proverbs 15:15 as the basis for her thoughts. A poem, "Ezra Bedell's Thanksgiving," was read and the TEHA prayer was said in unison by the group.

In the business meeting, the club voted to donate \$100 to the Haskell County Mental Health, Mental Retardation Center. Also \$100 will be given to the 4-H scholarship that Haskell County Extension Council gives annually.

The club will donate \$90 to the

handicap ramp being built at the extension center, which will benefit the county agent's office, the home demonstration office and Double Mountain Coach's office which is located just east of the extension office and provides clothing and food for the underprivileged.

The 4-H Fashion Show will be held June 5, and girls age 9 through 19 are eligible to enter the 4-H sewing. Mrs. Yates and Mrs. Crump will be adult leaders for Weinert.

Mrs. Lou Gilly gave a program entitled, "Dynamic Beef---Lean and

Safe." She said lean beef offers fewer calories and more nutrients than any food, and should be listed in each well-balanced diet of lower-caloried food choices. She used a poster, cut in the shape of a cow, with outstanding points emphasized with shapes of colored poster board.

Three categories of meat are "prime," "choice" and "good," so named according to the marbled fat contained in the carcass of the beef, with prime and choice being the most expensive but not necessarily the best in nutrition.

### Picky panda

Of the 20 bamboo varieties, the giant panda eats only five. And only certain parts of those plants at certain times.

According to International Wildlife magazine, only bamboo stems are on the menu in spring. At other times, pandas prefer the leaves and shoots. Researchers believe the animal alters its diet because of seasonal changes in the parts of the plant that are most nutritious and taste the best.

## Haskell farmers may be eligible for loans

Some Haskell County farmers may be eligible to apply for low-interest loans to help recover from the freeze of 1987.

U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm has announced that family farmers unable to obtain credit through normal channels may apply for loans at below-market interest rates through the U.S. Farmers Home Administration.

Primary counties of the affected area are Coke, Falls, Karnes and Throckmorton, but Haskell County is


one of the contiguous counties.

The areas were designated as eligible for disaster assistance by the FmHA, Gramm noted, due to freeze and flood damage between March 28 and April 3, 1987.

Farmers and ranchers may apply for low-interest, multi-year loans to help cover up to 80 percent of their actual losses, the senator said. Maximum loan available will be \$500,000.

## Finnell pledges open door



### Big bird

The first fossil of what scientists believe to be the biggest seabird ever discovered has been unearthed on the Atlantic coast.

According to National Wildlife magazine, the fossil was encased in a 30-million-year-old block of stone excavated in Charleston, S.C. Early speculation is that this enormous bird is a distant relative of today's pelican. Scientists believe the bird weighed 90 pounds and had a wingspan of almost 18 feet.

A couple of graduate students in geography at Rutgers University would give our country "back to the Indians," so to speak.

Writing in "Planning" magazine, a journal for professional planners, Deborah Epstein Popper and Frank J. Popper, make a case for turning the shortgrass country of the Great Plains into a Buffalo Commons, uninhabited by man or beast.

They describe the shortgrass country as lying between Denver on the west and San Antonio on the east and covering the major portions of Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska, Wyoming, Montana and the Dakotas.

"They have the nation's hottest summers and coldest winters, greatest temperature swings, worst hail and locusts and range fires, fiercest droughts and blizzards, and therefore its shortest growing season," the Poppers write.

The article goes on: "We believe that over the next generation the Plains will, as a result of the largest, longest running agricultural and environmental miscalculation in American history, become almost totally depopulated. At that point, a new use for the region will emerge, one that is in fact so old that it predates the American presence. We are suggesting that the region be returned to its original pre-white state, that it be, in effect, deprivatized."

The authors paint a pretty grim picture of us: "The region's farm, ranch, energy and mineral economies are in deep depression. Many small towns are emptying and aging at an all-time high rate, and some are dying."

They say we are running out of water, soil, oil, money, energy and hope—all at the same time.

... but private interests have proved unable to last for long on the Plains. Responding to nationally basked market imperatives, they have overgrazed and overplowed the land and overdrawn the water.

"And a few cities—Lubbock and Cheyenne, for example—may hold steady as self-contained service providers. But the small towns in the surrounding countryside will empty, wither and die. The rural Plains will be virtually deserted. A vast, beautiful, characteristically American place will go the way of the buffalo that once roamed it in herds of millions."

... the only way to keep the plains from turning into an utter wasteland, an American Empty Quarter, will be for the federal government to step in and buy the land—in short, to deprivatize it.

"If the federal government intervenes late rather than early—after the desertion instead of before—the buy-back task will, ironically, be easier."

"The government will take the newly emptied plains and tear down the fences, replant the shortgrass and restock the animals, including the buffalo. The federal government's commanding task on the plains for the next century will be to recreate the 19th century, to re-establish what we would call the Buffalo Commons—the world's largest historic preservation project—the ultimate national park."

Commenting on this idea, James Roberts of the Andrews County News, writes:

"We would carry the Poppers idea one more step. At the point that the rest of the nation wants to return us to a Buffalo Commons, we could save Uncle Sam a lot of money by simply seceding and forming our own nation. We could export oil, cotton, wheat, natural gas and cattle at a premium price to a nation suddenly missing its vital one-quarter."

"In our geography book, none of those items are produced in New Jersey—only graduate geography students."

A 15-year-old study of America's energy needs has presented a sobering vision of the future.

It predicted the nation's energy use would rise almost 20 percent by the late 1980s. But according to International Wildlife magazine, energy use in the U.S. has actually fallen.

The effects of energy conservation are being felt worldwide as well with savings totaling some \$250 billion a year.

## Watching Washington



About 1,778,000 veterans live in Texas. Only two states have more.

These men and women have served our country well, and we have commitments to them. I want to make sure we keep them.

At a time when the veteran population is dropping nationwide, the number in Texas is increasing. And these veterans are getting older: The median age of the nation's veteran population is about 53 years now and projected to be 62 years in 2020.

As our veterans get older, they'll be needing more medical care, and we need to make sure that they get it.

In addition, survey after survey has shown that our nation's veterans cemeteries are inadequate. We must change that.

There are 110 veterans cemeteries nationwide, but 45 of those are now closed. Texas has veterans cemeteries at Fort Bliss and Fort Sam Houston and in Houston that remain open. Veterans cemeteries in Kerrville and San Antonio have been closed.

Counting spouses and certain other dependents, more than three million Texans are eligible for burial in a veterans cemetery.

It's clear, as Veterans Administration officials said in a recent report, "Substantial demands will be placed on the National Cemetery System in future years. These demands are beginning to be felt now but will significantly increase in the future."

We must act now and begin our preparations for securing more cemetery space. In my estimation, those preparations should include plans for another veterans national cemetery in Texas.

Clearly, the need is there. Dallas-Fort Worth, in part because of the attraction of the VA Medical Center there, is ranked seventh nationally on the VA's list of areas most in need of a veterans cemetery. Thirty-one percent of Texas' veterans live in that area.

Special care must be taken to insure that a potential cemetery site is appropriate, so planning for a veterans cemetery is a lengthy and complicated process. First of all, a site must be selected, and VA practice has been to use only land that can be donated or transferred from another federal agency. After that, an environmental impact study is required.

I have notified VA Administrator Thomas K. Turnage that I will work with him to develop a veterans cemetery in Texas. As I said in a letter to him, "I believe that the Texas veterans deserve this honor, deserve recognition by their country."

America's veterans were there when we needed them. Our country must be there when they need us.

## Third-graders beautify elementary school grounds

The activities of students and teachers in the Beautify Haskell campaign have been particularly noteworthy, chairman Bobby Hobgood pointed out this week.

"Dr. James Kemp and Greg Melton have given excellent leadership as members of the Beautify Haskell Council which has resulted in fine programs involving the schools," Hobgood said.

In the Waste-in-Place program, approximately 450 students were taught in the elementary schools with 96 teacher-hours involved. Several grades intend to incorporate parts of it into their regular curriculum next year.

Two hundred and fifty students saw films on litter prevention.

The third grade conducted a three-month drive to collect aluminum cans from all over town. The cans were then sold and proceeds used to construct a large flower bed around the flag pole in front of the elementary school.

Some 280 secondary school students were involved in the community-wide anti-litter program.

At the beginning of the secondary school year all students were asked to institute a campus-wide "Trash Patrol" to pick up at least one piece of trash each day. Over 90 percent of the students accepted the challenge.

Litter laws of Texas highways were discussed and students were required to exhibit a mastery of this knowledge.

At a cost of more than \$2,000, six men spent some 100 hours cutting down trees on a four-block campus area and removing mistletoe from 60 trees on school grounds.

The industrial arts class built a picnic table for the front porch with 10 people spending 12 hours and \$100.

Two extra personnel were hired to keep the grounds, clocking about 400 hours at a cost of \$1,340.

On their own, students entered the slogan contest, poster contest and essay contest.

The first grade had a song which they sang on a radio program for KVRP.

School participation is indicative of the community-wide cooperation in the Beautify Haskell project.

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### TAX PLANNING

### NEW HOME INTEREST RULES

The Revenue Act of 1987 gives us a completely new set of rules for interest deductions on personal residences. Everything you've learned about the home interest deduction rules can be thrown out.

The new rules can be very complicated, and it's difficult to cover all the aspects in this short column. However, here are the basics.

The new law states that the interest on "acquisition indebtedness" is deductible on loans up to \$1,000,000 on your first and second residences combined. The second rule states that interest is deductible on "home-equity indebtedness" on loans not to exceed \$100,000. A home-equity loan must be secured by the fair market value of your home, and the interest is deductible regardless of how the money is spent.

Example: Suppose you purchased a home several years ago for \$50,000 and the home is now worth \$200,000. Assume that your original mortgage has been paid off, and you now want to borrow \$150,000 against your home. The interest on the first \$100,000 will be deductible as home-equity interest. The balance will be treated as personal (consumer) interest subject to reduced deductions (none after 1990). For home-equity loans taken out before October 14, 1987, the \$100,000 limitation does not apply; the interest will be deductible as mortgage interest.

Acquisition indebtedness is defined as "indebtedness incurred in acquiring, constructing, or substantially improving the principal or a second residence and that is secured by such property." It is reduced as the principal is paid, and it cannot be increased by refinancing. Therefore, the \$150,000 new mortgage in our example will not qualify as acquisition indebtedness.

The new interest rules go onto effect on January 1, 1988. Check the tax consequences before arranging residential loans.

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
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# MURDER IN STAMFORD

Owner of the business is Guy Spikes, who for the past three years has been employed at Heads or Tails Western Wear in Haskell. He is being assisted by his wife, Donna.


In addition to repairing boots and shoes, the new business will make and repair other leather goods, including custom made boots.

When the present pastor came to preach for members of the First Assembly of God in December of 1972, he told members, "I have a vision of a new church here, and if you don't, then I'm not the man you're looking for." Six months later the building program vote passed and a building fund was started.

In April 1978, four and a half years after the vote was taken, the new church was dedicated, beginning

with a week of special services.

Assembly of God members and members from other churches donated labor and money. Many businessmen and individuals not associated with the church donated supplies, materials, fixtures and money. The construction of the building was completed with only about \$3,000 of hired labor. All other construction was done by church members, the pastor and friends of the church. The total investment for the 5,300-square-foot total electric building was only \$50,000.

The building, fixtures and land have an appraised value of approximately \$180,000. In addition to the sanctuary which seats 230, there is a kitchen and rooms for eight classes and a nursery.

Church members and the pastor worked on other contracted jobs and turned in the proceeds to the building fund. Women of the church raised money by making and selling approximately 110 dozen donuts per week. Therefore, the church started services in its new building with only a total indebtedness of \$33,000. This debt has now been paid approximately three years before the original note was due.

Since many of the people who shared in the dream of the new building are no longer living in Haskell because of job changes, the church decided to have a homecoming in addition to the note burning ceremony.
