They did it!

Indians run to state track championship

Mark Young and Stephon Brockington won gold medals and the two relay teams came in second as the Haskell Indians won the Class 2A track championship in Austin

It was the first team state championship in any sport in Haskell's history and climaxed one of the school's finest years in athletics.

Young repeated as state 800-meter champion, turning in a time of 1:55.9 to add a second gold medal to his personal collection.

Brockington took first place in the 200-meter run, posting a time of 21.7. (He was third in state last year.)

As satisfying as those two individual victories were, it took a couple of fine performances by the 400- and 1600-meter relay teams to give Haskell 52 team points, six more than runnerup Mart's 46.

Brockington ran on both the relay teams and Young ran on the 1600.

The sprint relay team ran a 42.3, just behind Mart's 42.2. Rodney Johnson, Fred Shaw and Derrick Billington, along with Brockington, comprised the team.

The 1600 relay team of Louie Torres, Brockington, Shaw and Young posted a 3:20.2 time, just

behind Buffalo's 3:20.1. Haskell went into the 1600 relay, the meet's final event, trailing Mart 46-36 and needing at least a thirdplace finish to take the championship since Mart did not have a relay team.

The second-place finish gave the Indians their 52 points, while Mart remained at 46. Buffalo came in third with 33 points while Eastland and Groveton tied for fourth with 26 points each.

The state title by the Indians completed a clean sweep of championship meets. The Indians had won both the district and regional





Western Texas College has given this pre-entrance test to students on its main campus for the past year in response to state requirements. Texas will be requiring placement testing for students enrolling in math and English courses starting with the 1989 fall semester.

Medicare regulations affect doctors, too

Hospitals aren't alone in their confusion in deciphering and following Medicare regulations.

Doctors have their problems, too. Dr. Wayne Cadenhead gives an

"Except in unusual circumstances (who knows what they are?) patients are allowed only four reimbursable doctor visits per month. Unless the doctor has the patient sign a form saying the service may not be covered by Medicare, the doctor has to pay back any payment he collects if it is later determined the patient has

exceeded his allowable four calls. "The doctor has no way of knowing how many doctors a patient

Medicare fees are set at allowable charges. These are set forth in a publication listing each doctor's maximum allowable acceptable charge (MAAC). The charges are determined by what the doctor was charging in previous years.

In the case of the Haskell Clinic, the fees were frozen at the fees prevailing in the period from May through July 1984.

Although Medicare allowed a 75cent increase in the charge for an office call in 1988, Dr. Cadenhead points out that clinic overhead (mainly supplies) increased \$26,000

between 1985 and 1986. Malpractice insurance premiums increased 50 percent during the same period and another 100 percent in 1987. Except for the recently approved 75-cent increase, office charges remain fixed.

Dr. Cadenhead also points out that in the last six months, the clinic staff has spent six hours in meetings, plus \$200, attending sessions dealing with Medicare's "myriad of unending, confusing edicts." Another \$670 was spent for a consultant to "help us understand and deal with MAACs and

Physicians are reimbursable for only one nursing home visit per

month per patient. Dr. Cadenhead says that if a doctor sees more than one patient on a trip to a nursing home, the doctor is paid at a lower rate although each visit does count toward the once-a-month allowable. Any subsequent visit during that month is not covered by Medicare.

All lab work is now done on assignment. The lab is told what to charge. No leeway is given for location or ease of having tests done. "In our lab this has been a financial hardship," said Dr. Cadenhead. "Purchases of new equipment that would be a great benefit to our patients have been indefinitely

postponed due to Medicare's changing moods on what will and will not be paid for. It's difficult to plan for the future when rules and reimbursemments change monthly. With each change the confusion

What disturbs Dr. Cadenhead most is the fear that medical services are being lowered simply because the government cannot deliver on the promises made to the elderly.

"Instead of bowing out and leaving private enterprise alone, the government insists on commandeering control and lowering standards," he said.

Sales tax collections increase

Sales tax collections in Haskell are up by 5.38 percent over what they were a year ago.

The city's latest check from the state comptroller was for \$21,462.76. This compared to \$18,159.05 received last year for the same period.

For the year to date, Haskell has received \$67,747.58, compared to \$64,287.31 for the same period in

Checks reflect the one-percent city sales tax collected by the state.

Rule received a check for \$3,463.31, bringing its collections to date to \$11,667.85, more than 25 percent more than the \$9,308.33 collected at this time last year.

Also receiving checks this month were Rochester, \$1,203.64; Weinert, \$740.12; and O'Brien, \$266.82.

Combined, the five Haskell County communities have collected \$83,605.96 this year, an increase of 4.97 percent over the \$79,647.92 collected last year.





Court decisions impact lifestyle

AUSTIN-In an otherwise quiet week, several controversial court decisions came down recently which will impact the Texas lifestyle, including:

• The Texas Supreme Court ruled unconstitutional the cap on medical malpractice damages set by the Legislature during the tort reform session.

• The high court also backed Attorney General Jim Mattox's



claims that he can continue to represent both sides in certain telephone rate cases before the Public Utility Commission, and

• A Harris County judge said it's unconstitutional to use an intoxilyzer machine to determine whether a motorist is drunk.

Meanwhile, the bizarre news of the week came when police arrested a former Libertarian Party congressional candidate for allegedly trying to contract the murder of San Antonio Mayor Henry Cisneros and other possible targets, including Comptroller Bob Bullock, a candidate for lieutenant governor.

Murder Plot Foiled

The murder-for-hire plan was foiled after IRS agents tipped off the local district attorney, who planted an undercover policeman as the hit man.

The act was apparently planned to draw national media attention to the suspect's grievances against the tax system. When Bullock went out of town, the target was

The Libertarian Party said the suspect, Parker Abell, was disassociated with them in 1985.

Malpractice Cap Struck

In the malpractice law case, justices voted 7-2 for the argument that the cap on damages violates a state constitution provision guaranteeing citizens the right to seek legal remedies for injuries.

The majority opinion criticized the Legislature's effort to limit damages "in a speculative experiment to determine whether insurance rates will decrease."

But one dissenter, Justice Raul Gonzalez, said the court majority was improperly trying to replace the Legislature.

A spokesman for physicians said their problem of obtaining affordable malpractice insurance will worsen.

Telephone Rate Clash

Consumer advocates hailed Mattox's victory against the PUC in a

March 3, 1870.

bitter clash. The high court overturned a previous ruling which held Mattox was in conflict of interest if he represented both a state agency and the PUC when they were opposed.

The case arose from a suit filed against Mattox by PUC members, and the two sides exchanged choice words in news reports.

Unified Primaries Urged

The Texas Secretary of State's office last week asked a panel of lawmakers to consider using same locations to hold primary elections, but the chairwoman of the House Elections Committee expressed doubts it would be wise.

Holding elections in the same building, but in different rooms for each political party, would save millions in state election aid, according to Secretary of State Jack Rains.

Rep. Ernestine Glossbrenner, D-Alice, said voters might feel intimidated if they have to ask for the ballot of a particular party.

Mark White Returns

Some observers say he's launching his comeback bid for the governor's mansion, but for whatever reason, former Gov. Mark White spoke out last week against old nemesis Gov. Bill Clements' plan to legalize the current school funding formula with a constitutional amendment.

White defeated Clements in '82, but was trounced in an '86 return match. His supporters say he will make one more bid for a second term in '90, joining the list of possibles that includes Mattox, Treasurer Ann Richards and Land Commissioner Garry Mauro.

Other Highlights

• State Rep. Dan Morales, D-San Antonio, predicts that an unexpected \$1 billion revenue shortfall will prompt tax reform in 1989. Morales is a member of the Select Committee on Tax Equity, which will make recommendations to the Legislature late this year.

 Texas Republicans are searching for a replacement for state party chairman George Strake, who will give up his gavel at the state convention in Houston next

One announced candidate is former Dallas county chairman Fred Meyer, and some are speculating that former Houston State Sen. Mike Richards may decide to make the race.

• Supreme Court Chief Justice Tom Phillips, a Republican, received the endorsement of former Dallas DA Henry Wade, who won his own elections as a Democrat.

• Businessman Al Hughes of Austin, resigned from the State Board of Pardons and Paroles last week amid praise from his colleagues for his work during an era marked by court-ordered prison reforms.

PAYROLL TAX CHANGES FOR 1988

Here are some important 1988 payroll tax changes:

The federal unemployment (FUTA) tax rate for 1988 remains at .8% (.008). Employers should not use the .006 rate shown in the January, 1988, Circular E (Employer's Tax Guide) and other IRS publications.

2. Employers are now required to withhold social security tax and pay the employer's share of social security on wages paid to their children aged 18 and over and wages paid to a spouse.

3. Premiums on group term life insurance in excess of \$50,000, which are includable in an employee's income, are now also subject to social

4. Employers must now pay social security taxes on cash tips reported to them by their employees.

5. There is a new test for determining when farm wages are subject to social security taxes. The former 20-day test is eliminated. It is replaced by the "\$2,500 test." If the employer pays at least \$2,500 in a year for all farm labor, wages paid to all farmworkers will be subject to social security tax. If the \$2,500 test is not met, the old \$150 per employee test continues to apply.

6. Employers should be aware that employees are not required to submit a new W-4s for 1988, but some will do so if changed circumstances necessitate an adjustment in the amount withheld from their wages.

7. Employers must send the IRS copies of Form W-4s from employees who claim more than ten exemptions or who claim exemption from withholding and their wages normally exceed \$200 per week. No other W-4s are to be sent to the IRS unless the agency specifically requests them.
