In reaction to the Supreme Court decision, the Haskell County Taxpayers Association issued a joint statement which read in part:

"Taxpayers in each of the 254


Texas counties should prepare for the worst now that the Texas Supreme Court has refused to enforce the Texas Bill of Rights. Unless the highest Texs court changes its position, there will be no county rollback elections until taxpayers obtain a constitutional amendment to restore the right which. was first obtained during Governor Clements' first term.

"Taxpayers should turn out in force for both budget and tax rate hearings this year. As long as the required notices are given and hearings held, county commissioners can increase tax rates by more than 8 percent without fear of a rollback election."

Earlier, a petition calling for a rollback election had been filed in district court here. It was later withdrawn when a number of the signatories said they did not want to be involved in a suit.

The attorney for the taxpayer group then filed a petition in the Texas Supreme Court.



Worms feed for the first day or two on leaf tissue and at the base of of small squares in the terminal area or around where the initial egg-lay occurred. It is at this time that they are most vulnerable to predators or chemical control.

With good growing conditions, such as we are experiencing, a phenomenon called "Growth Dilution" occurs in cotton. Plans that have been treated for five days will have fresh growth on top that has had no chemical applied to it.

This allows small worms to feed on untreated cotton for a few days if eggs are deposited in the terminal. This phenomenon, in conjunction with sheer numbers of worms, explains the necessity for checking each field on a three to four day schedule throughout the remainder of the season.

Fleahoppers are still a problem in younger cotton, espcially in cotton that is just beginning to square. These young fields are few and far between on an area-wide basis but they should still be watched closely until bloom. All cotton at this time no matter what the age has an

extremely good potential.

There have been instances where chemical applications have been made against label directions. These aerial applicators are not only jeopardizing their reputations but are also ieopardizing their customers' livlihoods. It is every farmer's right to know exactly what is being applied to his crop and every farmer should demand to know what is applied and what he is paying for. It is also the grower's responsibility to read and follow label directions no matter who is applying the chemical. Rates of chemicals that are applied below label rates will possibly promote insect resistance to those chemicals and is a waste of money in crop production. With times being what they are it would seem to be a needless waste.

I appreciate all the people who have kept up with the boll weevil counts and would appreciate a further continuation of the future boll weevil counts. It would have broadened my knowledge of area-wide boll weevil counts if all of the findings would have been reported. The counts received were very helpful.

Harry Koehler and Alton Middleton will represent the local organization in the drive.


The 160 state lodges, located in 143 cities and towns of Texas, have 80,000 members.



AUSTIN-Texas Democrats were big winners at the national convention, and now eyes turn to the Republican convention scheduled next month in Houston.

His health is even more pivotal at this time, because of the rule allowing U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen to run for two offices at once.

Should Clements, a Republican, step down from office for any reason, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, a Democrat, would replace him.

That would mean a Democrat, not a Republican, would be able to make the chain-reaction appointments that could result if the Dukakis/Bentsen ticket takes the White House.

Such an event would set the Texas Republican Party back 25 years, a happening about which everyone has some kind of opinion

Senator Lloyd Bentsen Watching Washington

90 Years Ago July 30, 1908

The great reunion of the Texas Cowboys Association which opened Wednesday was a grand success.



Our country's border with Mexico both unites and divides our two nations.

That border is the only place in the world where a major industrialized country shares a boundary with a developing nation—and that single fact compounds all of the problems that confront people who live along the border in Texas.

Why?

Consider the effect on Texans' health when cities on the Mexican side of the border pump tens of millions of raw sewage into the Rio Grande River every day

Consider that there is only one doctor for every 1,150 patients along the border-compared to 600 patients per physician in the rest of Texas. That makes it a lot tougher for us to cope with increased health hazards.

Consider the fact that unemployment along the border is higher and the per capita income is lower than anywhere else in Texas, as well as most of the rest of the United States.

And consider that the border is the third fastest growing region in America. The population is projected to double by the year 2000, which will compound the magnitude of the problem and the difficulties in dealing with it.

The Valley is my home. I was born there, and my father and many members of my family still live there. And I want to use my position in the U.S. Senate to help solve these problems.

Earlier this year, Congressman Ron Coleman of El Paso and I proposed a major, dramatic initiative to offer Texans who live along that border a bigger share in the American Dream.

Our legislation would establish a U.S.-Mexico Border Regional Commission, modeled after the Appalachian Regional Commission. The President would appoint two members; the Governors of Texas, Arizona, California and New Mexico would be members; and two Senators and two House members would serve.

The Regional Commission would funnel funds to help the border. The way I see it, the Commission would help direct financial, human and other resources toward efforts to improve education, public health and public facilities. It can be the catalyst that sparks investment and business interest in an area that is rich in opportunity but in need of a helping hand.

This proposal is a classic example of how our public and private sectors can work together to solve the problems and challenges facing our state and our country.

Here's how. The Commission can get the ball rolling by building up the infrastructure and developing human capital along the border. Then it will be up to the private sector to move in, broaden the tax base, create jobs, help train people, and seek markets on both sides of the border.

No one is suggesting that this Commission will have the power or the ability to single-handedly make that border prosper. But I am convinced that it can help set the stage for economic development, help us solve problems and realize the potential of the region.

The U.S.-Mexico Border Regional Commission can be an engine of prosperity and opportunity for millions of people who live along our border with Mexico.

I'll be taking the point in the Senate, working hard to make that Commission a reality.

Jimmy Carter was referred to as a Georgia peanut farmer as if there's something humble about that. Carter was a peanut farmer by choice, and a successful one. A graduate of Annapolis with an engineering degree, he gave up a promising career as a Navy officer to take over the family farm.

When you get down to the nuts and bolts of today's politicians, you have to have most respect for Lloyd Bentsen. He came from a wealthy family and he became wealthy himself (with a hearty assist from Big Lloyd). But he probably would have made the big time without help from his family. Anyone who can get 10 grand for a couple of scrambled eggs with hominy grits deserves the attention of all.
