This November's check from the state comptroller was in the amount of \$24,005.97, representing a 20.36 percent increase over the \$19,945.81

School considers contractors' bids

The School Board last Tuesday considered proposals from five contractors for the heating, ventilation and air conditioning project at the secondary school, but took no final action.

Bids for the job ranged from \$246,696 by Palco Mechanical Contractors of Wichita Falls to \$494,114 by James Lane Air Conditioning Co. of Wichita Falls.

The board instructed the superintendent to turn the proposals over to the contracted consultants to make evaluations recommendations for the Dec. 13 board meeting.

On another proposed contract, the School Board prepared a list of amendments for the new field house project in hopes that bidders will be able to get their bids within the previously approved cost estimates.

At an earlier meeting, five contractors entered bids ranging from \$223,000 to \$279,000 for the field house, all well above the board's estimate of \$140,000 to \$180,000.

The amendments, which the board feels will reduce the cost without lowering the quality or safety of the building, have been sent back to the bidders with a request that they resubmit bids on Dec. 7.

The board established a dyslexia program for the elementary school, which will be in operation at the beginning of the third six-weeks period Nov. 28. A recent study identified about 30 students in need of

Perry inspects rail system in Germany


State Rep. Rick Perry will return this week from Germany where he and other members of a Texas legislative delegation have been studying high speed rail technology.

The Haskell legislator and six other state legislators took a firsthand look at Germany's InterCity Express, a passenger train capable of speeds of more than 200 miles per

The Texas Legislature is expected next year to again view a proposal for similar service that would initially connect Houston and Dallas/Fort

Perry and other members of the delegation rode the German train and met with representatives of West Germany's Ministry of Transporation and German High Speed Rail consortium.

The consortium conducted a 1985 study that found a proposed high speed rail system in Texas is technically and financially feasible. The 1987 legislature authorized the Texas Turnpike Authority to conduct an expanded feasibility study.

Freeze kills leaves

U.S. Dept. of Agriculture The area's first freeze came in on the heels of 30 to 40 mph winds Tuesday. Although only a light freeze, it was sufficient to kill leaves on cotton in some areas. This should create an increase in receipts of cotton samples at the USDA cotton classing

office in 10 to 14 days. Receipts this week were 31,000 samples. To date, the Abilene office has classed 161,000 or approximately 32 percent of the prediction for this season.

With the season nearing one third complete, grades are holding steady with 73 percent in the white category, including 49 percent grade 31 or better. Average mike for the season is 39 with staple length average 32, with 43 percent staple 33 and longer, uniformity 79 and strength at 24 grams per tex. Samples reduced on account of bark were 12 percent.

There was no activity in the market this week. Cottonseed prices paid to the farmer ranged from \$105 to \$120 a ton, mostly \$120.





Perry to sponsor oil and gas tax cut

AUSTIN-While legislators prepare to convene in January, one Democrat departed radically from normal party rhetoric and called for a tax cut for the oil and gas

Meanwhile, with the election over, other officials took up business that could not otherwise



be conducted without controversy: • The feds started sending delinquent notices to some 3,700 Texas farmers facing foreclosure on Farmers Home Administration

• The state prison board relaxed the tough restrictions on prison furloughs which were quickly adopted last month after becoming an election issue.

Among those now eligible for furlough are inmates convicted of homicides, manslaughter and aggravated robbery.

How quickly postures change after an election.

Severance Tax Cut

Railroad Commissioner John Sharp, who headed the Dukakis campaign in Texas, announced his plan to cut the state severance tax to encourage Texas oil production.

The bill, which will be sponsored by state Rep. Rick Perry, D-Haskell, quickly drew the endorsement of Comptroller Bob Bullock as the best proposal lawmakers are likely to see.

Plaudits Deserved

Here's a Democrat calling for tax cut, and not just any Democrat: Sharp was the point man for Dukakis in Texas.

Moreover, his proposal has the backing of Bullock, the man who stood tall during the revenue crunch by returning unspent funds.

Skeptics might say this proposal is designed to please conservative businessmen. If that were so, it's still more than is offered by liberals who plead for a personal income tax.

Dukakis, the liberal's liberal, got thumped, and not because of any fault of John Sharp. In fact, some who knew Sharp as a conservative senator, wondered how he fit the Dukakis mold.

The answer, of course, is party affiliation. But unlike some in his party, Sharp apparently heard the voters' message. Whether the liberals hear Sharp's message remains to be seen.

Hightower vs. Gramm

One who apparently didn't hear the message is Agriculture Com-

missioner Jim Hightower, who holds the unapologetic far left position among statewide officials and was a Jesse Jackson supporter.

Hightower surfaced in Washington at an environmental group press conference to promote reduction of the use of oil because it pollutes, the day after Sharp called for increased production.

Such mixed messages may confuse Texans, but Hightower surprised no one by saying he will announce within weeks whether he will run against U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm in 1990.

Farm Foreclosures

Hightower also ripped the FHA for giving some 3,700 Texas farmers 45 days to work out debt problems or face foreclosure.

He thinks it's a heartless blow, and for Texas to lose that many farmers would be staggering, supercollider or no.

Certainly, this news coming in the same week that OPEC threatened \$5 oil is hardball indeed.

Alamo Battle

San Antonio state Rep. Orlando Garcia will ask lawmakers to put the Alamo and its budget, run since 1905 by the Daughters of the Republic of Texas, completely under state oversight.

'We're serving notice that the Alamo isn't their exclusive shop," Garcia said.

A DRT spokesperson said, "We don't argue with oversight. We've always filed an annual fiscal report with the governor. If the governor wants to come down and check our books, we'll welcome him-but not every member of the Legislature."

At issue is a \$1.8 million surplus from souvenir sales and what some feel is the lack of recognition for Hispanics who died at the Alamo fighting against Santa Anna.

Mailing Draws Fire

A Houston Republican drew fire from a colleague for mailing an office newsletter with a voter petition for a proposed remedy to a controversial school funding

State Rep. John Culberson denies he used state funds to illegally influence the fate of a legislative issue, but a crosstown Democrat, Paul Colbert, rapped Culberson's newsletter as one-

Culberson wrote that if the court ruling is upheld by the Texas Supreme Court, then "Judge Harley Clark will control the Texas public school system the same way that Judge William Wayne Justice now controls our state prison system."

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

way I can, trying to put my life in proper perspective.

Quite frankly, this place is terrible and seeing other men around me getting mail from friends or loved ones depresses me and puts me in some sad and lonely moods at times. I am very lonely and it would mean a lot to me if I had someone to correspond with.

I'm not in prison for any heinous crime. I had a problem with drugs and was caught. I now realize my mistakes and I have learned better since I've been paying my debt to society. I have a good nature and pleasant personality and I'm not bad looking.

College enrollment increases in state

Texas college and university enrollments are up this fall by more than 5.8 percent. Preliminary figures for the 1988 fall semester show that the combined enrollment at all institutions of higher education in Texas is 834,444, an increase of 45,916 students from last fall.

Enrollment at public junior and senior colleges and universities in Texas totaled 731,782, an increase of 6.5 percent or 44,875 students.

The foregoing comes from the Aug. 28, 1886, edition of the Haskell City Free Press.

Phil Schultz of Richardson came by the office last week to check the old newspaper files and to get a copy of the story. He describes himself as a Texas history buff and said he is building a library on Texana.

Schultz' wife is the former Catherine Davis, daughter of Tom and Frances Sherrill Davis.

I went ahead and got a short history lesson from the visitor. He said the buffalo disappeared in these parts after the big slaughters in the mid 1870s.

There was more of interest in that old newspaper, including this item:

"There is a heard (sic) of 500 sheep attended by a little dog wandering around over the prairie in this county. Mr. Fitzjerald fed the dog the other day and says he is nearly starved to death. After he had fed the dog he whipped him and made him take the sheep off his range."

"People who have hogs running at large had better put them up or they will be dealt with as the law directs." An ad for the Mail Hack read:

'The Mail Hack leaves Albany at 7 a.m. on Monday, Wednesday and Friday, for Haskell, carrying express. Arrives at Haskell at 7 p.m.; leaves Haskell on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday at 7 a.m., arrives at Albany by 7 p.m. Any person or persons wishing to pass over this line can always go on the Mail Hack cheaper than they can hire a buggy and team. I mean what I say. Try me and see. Respectfully, Oscar Cochran, Proprietor."

An ad for D. R. Gass, dealer in Dry Goods, Groceries, General Merchandise and Gents Furnishings. announces: "Prices have been cut down to suit the times. Goods sold on time where mortgages are given to cover the amount of indebtedness." The business was on the northwest corner of the public square in

"Haskell City." An ad for Wm. Harvey & Son advertised ladies shoes, hats, fancy goods, dry goods, canned goods, hams, bacon, onions, potatoes, cabbage, chickens, eggs, butter "and in fact everything the market affords."

The Delmonico Restaurant promised a "table supplied with the best the market affords." Proprietress was Mrs. C. Lively. John B. Bell of Abilene advertised

"the cheapest and best wagon yard and livery stable in Abilene, located at Sycamour and 2d, south side of railroad." Another ad by Hale and Gray,

Surveyors and General Agents, of Jackson, Texas solicited settlers to the new town: "Free Homes for All. We are

agents for town property in the new thriving town of Jackson, Stonewall County, and are authorized to donate residence and business lots to actual settlers for the next 60 days. The town is booming and parties desiring choice locations should apply immediately. We are offering choice ranch property in exchange for horses and cattle. Also mining property on all of the recently discovered silver and copper leads in Stonewall County. Very rich specimens of ore are on exhibition in our office."

The masthead of the Haskell City Free Press identified the publication as the "official paper of Haskell County." It was published every Saturday. Readers were reminded that the "terms" were \$1.50 a year, invariable cash in advance, and were asked to remit by registered letter, bank check or postal money order payable to Oscar Martin, editor and

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

Wheat fields surveyed

Extension Agent-Entomologist Most wheat fields surveyed recently have shown definite areas of moisture and nutrient stress. Very little insect pressure is evident with armyworm, white grub and cutworm problems diminishing.

Murphy's law tends to catch up with us. Not only are we suffering from dry conditions, but we have disease problems as well. Samples sent to Dr. Kaufman, extension plant pathologist in Lubbock, have been diagnosed to contain a fungal organism of Bipolaris genus (formerly referred to as Helminthisporium) which causes "Dryland Root Rot". Drought and warm weather favor this organism. Seed treatment and balanced fertility problems can reduce disease severity. Dr. Kaufman states that with the advent of cooler weather, the symptoms will become less apparent. A good two-inch ran would surely cure the majority of problems right

The early planted grain for early grazing is needed most years, but especially this fall due to drought and shortness of grass pastures. However, as with anything else, short cuts sometimes cost more than they are worth. A few pennies per acre for seed treatment and fertilizer may have eliminated some of the "Dead Plant Syndrome" now showing up in majority of wheat fields.

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Jessie Parmelly turns 95 Friday

Jessie Parmelly will celebrate her 95th birthday Friday (Nov. 25). She would enjoy havng old friends drop by some time during the day to say "Hello" or drop her a card to remind her she is still remembered.

Jessie Jackson came to Haskell County when a very young girl. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. O. Jackson, and an older sister, Lillie, built a stucco home at the base of Wild Horse Knob, an old Indian lookout for scouting for wild horses. The 7room home also boasted a bathroom and two closets. Closets were not usually built into homes in those days but Mr. Jackson yielded to the desires of his wife and daughters and two closets may be seen, one on each side of the house, jutting out from the wall about two and a half feet wide and so narrow that clothes hangers had to be placed sideways.

Wild Horse Knob is near the place where the once thriving town of Pinkerton stood. When we drive by the cotton fields that replaced Pinkerton, Jessie can point out once standing places such as the doctor's office, drug store, mercantile, blacksmith shop and homes of people she knew.

Jessie married Bryan Parmelly, a

dentist from Rule. Dr. Parmelly had his office at Wild Horse Knob for many years. They later built a rock home on their farm between Haskell and Rule. Jessie assisted the builders in placing rock, roofing, building the sidewalks and any other things that needed to be done. The dentist's chair was then moved to one end of a large living room. Dr. Parmelly passed away in December 1946.

Jessie moved her father from Wild Horse Knob to her home where he lived until his death at 86. Her mother had passed away at age 46 and her sister at age 18.

After her father's death, Jessie lived alone until the fall of 1985 when she could not see to cook. She then had someone come in to cook two meals daily until June 1987. At that time she fell on her old sidewalk, breaking a hip. Since then she has had to have someone with her at all times for fear of falling again since she can't see, except for large objects.
