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Medicare enrollment period open

Citizens of Haskell County who dropped their Medicare medical insurance coverage or declined it when they were first eligible have another chance to sign up for it now.

The reminder comes from Glyn Hammons, manager of the Social Security office in Abilene which services the Haskell area.

The open enrollment period to obtain coverage will continue through March 31. Coverage will go into effect July 1.

Hammons said that some people who thought Medicare insurance was not for them might want to take another look at it this year. More extensive services will be covered, starting next January, because of recent legislation.

Among items of improved coverage are regular mammography screeenings and increased days of home health care. A cap is set on the total expenses an individual would have to pay in Medicare-approved charges. In 1990, that cap is \$1,370. Coverage of outpatient prescription drugs will be phased in over a fouryear period, beginning Jan. 1, 1990. In 1990, Medicare will cover home IV therapy and immunosupressive drugs. Coverage of all other prescription drugs will begin Jan. 1, 1991.

To pay for these services, Medicare medical insurance premiums will be increasing to \$31.90 per month in 1989, Hammons noted. In addition, all people eligible for hospital insurance will pay an annual supplemental premium based on their income tax liability and collected as part of their income tax. For tax year 1989, the rate will be \$22.50 for each \$150 of income tax liability, up to a maximum of \$800 per person.

Anyone with questions about coverage can call a special toll-free Medicare phone number, 1-800-888-1998. Questions about the supplemental premium should be directed to the Internal Revenue Service. Year's first sales tax check up by 10 percent

Haskell's first allocation of sales taxes in 1989 showed an increase of 9.75 percent over 1988.

This month's check to the city from the state comptroller was for \$9,710.21. Last January, it was \$8,847.60.

Only other Haskell County city to receive a check this month was Rule, which received \$1,235.36, a figure down sharply from last year's January check of \$1,943.65.

O'Brien, Rochester and Weinert did not receive checks this month.

Statewide, the \$64.1 million sent to 924 cities that collect local sales taxes at one or one and a half percent represented a 19.4 percent increase over last year.

The tax allocation to Stamford was down 11.12 percent, dropping to \$8,251.27 from last year's figure jof \$9,283.99.

Other Jones County cities suffered similar decreases, Hamlin falling 13.87 percent, Hawley 12.38 percent and Anson 3.64 percent.

To the north, Seymour dropped 1.96 percent, and Knox City and Munday rose 7.12 and 19.73 percent respectively. Aspermont took a 32.4percent dip and Albany climbed 6.03 percent. Throckmorton collections were down by 21.51 percent.

January checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in November and reported to the comptroller's office by Dec. 20.

The 10 honorees will be invited to the UT campus in April for a special conference and awards ceremony. In addition to the cash gift, each will receive a commemorative sculpture and an individually tailored VIP campus tour.

Challenges of youth **Teens need friends**

By Lou Gilly County Extension Agent Home Economics (Seventh in a Series)

All adolescents feel a need to take comfort with people their own age, so teenage "peer groups" develop naturally.

Peer groups and close friends can be instrumental in helping teens make the psychological move toward adulthood. They provide an arena in which teens can begin to become independent of their parents. They make it possible to have experiences which the family does not provide and to practice behaviors which might be inappropriate or emotionally difficult

to perform in a family setting--behaviors which help a person function as an adult.

Listed below are some important thoughts about teenagers and their friends:

--One of the main reasons friends are important is that friends help us develop our personalty.

--Friends often influence us in the way we spend our free time, in our choice of what to buy, and in the way we treat other people.

-- The main traits most people look for in a friend are considerate, cheerful and honest.

-- To be a good friend one needs to praise others when they do well, keep

promises to others, and be able to forgive and forget.

--Adolescents who have good relationships with their parents---who feel that their parents are helpful, understanding, willing to talk to them when they have a problem, fairly easy to talk to and "in touch"--- are most likely to be influenced by their parents rather than their friends.

--The majority of teens will continue to see friends even if parents do not approve. They think that parents' disapproval of a friend is because they are considered to be a "bad influence."

--Teens seldom perceive their friend as "pressuring" them into decisions. That is, they do not recognize peer pressure.

Friendships enrich our lives by what we give as well as by what we get. Friends make each other feel like worthwhile people. They accept each other. In so doing, they fulfill each

other's basic need for acceptance.

It is important for teens to have friends of both sexes as well as to have friends of all ages. Problems can arise when teens ban themselves together in a gang or a clique. They lose opportunities to form friendships among other interesting people.

It takes time to make a real friend. Friendship cannot be bought. Remember, friendships worth having are worth waiting for and working toward.


Girl Scouts sell cookies





TAXPAYER BILL OF RIGHTS In 1776, our country's forefathers thought it wise to have a Bill of Rights to protect the civil liberties of its citizens. Now over two hundred years later, Congress has decided to pass a "Taxpayer Bill of Rights" to assist citizens in their dealings with the IRS. This new law is part of the 1988 Technical and Miscellaneous Revenue Act ("TAMRA").

The "Taxpayer Bill of Rights" covers situations between the taxpayer and the IRS from the moment of contact through (if necessary) the sale of a taxpayer's property to pay a delinquent tax.

At the initial stage of contact by the IRS, a taxpayer must be given Publication No. 1, "Your Rights As A Taxpayer," which details a taxpayer's rights and the IRS's obligations in audit, appeals, refund and collection matters. Only in the case of a formal summons is a taxpayer required to be present during an audit. And, during the audit, if the taxpayer wishes to halt the process at any time, he or she may do so for purposes of consulting a tax advisor. A taxpayer has the right to make an audio recording of the audit interview, as does the IRS.

If the audit process fails to resolve the tax delinquency and the collection division gets involved, there are new rules that deal with liens and levies. First, the taxpayer's personal residence is generally no longer subject to levy, and the amount of other personal property and wages exempt from levy are increased.

Second, before the IRS can begin proceeding to sell a taxpayer's property for tax deficiency, it must now give a full thirty days notice in place of the former ten days notice. Last, the taxpayer may appeal to the IRS for a release of lien. In the event that the IRS fails to release a lien (where the tax is paid or bond is posted), the taxpayer may sue for damages.





The bridegroom is a 1983 graduate of Haskell High School where he was active in sports and FFA. A 1988




