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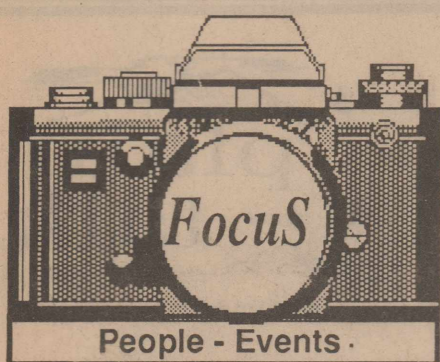

## Junior Livestock Show runs through Saturday

It's that time again. Animals for the annual Haskell County Junior Livestock Show begin arriving at the fairgrounds today (Thursday).

Beginning at 4 p.m. today, lambs and hogs will be weighed and steers will be measured.

At 9 a.m. Friday, judging of lambs, rabbits and poultry will get underway. Corky Wise, county agent of Wilbarger County, will judge the lambs. David Finley, county agent of Wichita County, will judge rabbits and poultry.

Beginning at 1 p.m. Friday will be

the hog show. Hogs will be judged by Carl Kent, vocational agriculture teacher of Pottsboro.

The steer show begins at 9 a.m. Saturday and heifers will be shown at 11:30. John Kuykendall, county agent of Llano County, will judge the cattle.

The annual premium sale begins at 2 p.m. Saturday. All area businesses and individuals interested in contributing to a very worthwhile youth project are encouraged to participate.

Approximately 85 of the top

animals will be in the sale. Auctioneer will be Doyle High. The 1988 sale netted more than \$43,000 for the youth of Haskell County.

All FFA and 4-H members in Haskell County are eligible to compete in the livestock show.

Grilled hamburgers will be sold during the show and the 4-H club will have a concession stand.

Members of the Haskell County Junior Livestock Association expressed their appreciation to all those who have given of their time and money to make the show and sale possible.

## Pinewood Derby to be Saturday

Scouts in Pack 136 have two days left to put the finishing touches or make last minute changes to their pinewood derby cars before the big race.

At 4 p.m. Saturday in the junior high gym, Tiger Cubs and Cub Scouts will put their handmade cars to the test in a double elimination derby.

"We're considering splitting the Webelos division into first year and second year scouts. Instead of the traditional four divisions, we'd have five: Tiger, Wolf, Bear, Webelos 1 and Webelos 2," said Jim Bob Mickler, cubmaster.

All scouts who participate will receive ribbons, and trophies will be

awarded for first, second and third places in each division.

Any body modifications, painting decals, etc. are acceptable as long as the car does not exceed 2 3/4 inches in width, 7 inches in length and 5 ounces in weight.

Each scout is given a car kit, complete with instructions, by the pack and all scouts are eligible to enter the race.

"We believe the derby is educational for the boys. It teaches sportsmanship, craftsmanship and competition," Mickler said.

Prior to the Saturday races, all cars will be measured, weighed and certified. This will be done on site by the derby committee.

Scouts can field test and practice with their cars at the Perry Motor Co. building on the corner of South 1st and Avenue C.

"The track is set up there, but will be moved the day of the derby. I have the key, and parents can get it from me," Mickler said.

The public is invited to attend this popular scout event. There is no admission charge.

The next derby for the scouts will be at 2 p.m. Feb. 5 in Stamford. This will be the district race.

## Jump rope for heart coming up

Students in Haskell County elementary schools will jump rope to raise funds for the American Heart Association in a "Jump Rope for Heart" scheduled in February.

The event will feature students who will jump rope as team members. Each team member will jump for a specified period of time and then pass the rope to another team member. The sequence is repeated for a maximum of three hours.

Prior to the event, each participant will recruit sponsors, family, friends and neighbors to make pledges based on each minute his/her team jumps.

Following the event, students will return to sponsors with a verified report of how long they jumped and collect the pledges. Pledges will be turned in to the Jump Rope for Heart coordinator at each school and forwarded to the local American Heart Association.

Citizens and businesses who would like to make 1989 Jump Rope for Heart a success may make a contribution for a particular student or school to Dr. Bill McSmith, AHA president, or Dr. Cliff Ray, vice president. "Any contributions, large or small, will be greatly appreciated not only by the local elementary students, but by the Haskell County American Heart Association," said Dr. McSmith.

The Jump Rope for Heart event is co-sponsored by the AHA, the Texas Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation and the Governor's Commission on Physical Fitness.

## Indians, Maidens keep rolling along

The Haskell Indians exploded for 37 first-quarter points and then coasted to a 98-47 victory over Jim Ned Tuesday night as they got their second half of the district 7-2A season off to a rousing start.

Keeping pace with them were the Haskell Maidens who Jim Ned, 56-40.

Both Haskell teams are undefeated in district play. Each posted a 6-0 first-half record. The Indians are 1-0 in the second half and the Maidens stand 3-0.

Dusty Meeks scored 30 points at

Jim Ned as five Indians tallied in the double figures. Brad Bevel had 18, James Rike 15 and Chan Guess and Rusty Stocks 11 each.

The Indians shot to a 37-10 first-period lead and stretched it to 54-26 by halftime. The win was the 19th for the Indians who this week retained their No. 5 state ranking.

The Maidens also had a rather easy time in disposing of Jim Ned. They led 16-13 at the end of the first period and 34-24 at halftime. Dala Harris was top scorer with 19 points, (Continued on page 3)

## Official disputes population estimate

Haskell's city administrator has questioned recent estimates that Haskell has lost 517 in population since 1980.

Robert Baker said the statistical data used by the State Data Center (SDC) in arriving at the figure "does not fit Haskell."

He claimed the estimates, based primarily on births, deaths and school enrollment, do not reflect the makeup of the population of the community.

He said city utility connections (water meter turn-ons) show that the city is more than holding its own. Last year, for instance, the city turned on 195 connections while turning off 157.

The SDC estimate placed the 1987 population of Haskell at 3286, compared to an official 3782 in 1980.

There have been ups and downs in Haskell's population ever since the first federal census was taken here in 1910.

Estimated population of the young town was placed at 800 in 1900. But 10 years later, an official census counted 2346, a staggering 193-percent increase over the estimate of 1900.

Apparently World War I curtailed the flow of settlers since the 1920 population of 2300 represented a

slight decline in the number of Haskell residents.

By 1930, the population had climbed to 2632 and the population of the county had hit an all-time high of 16,669.

In 1940, the federal census gave Haskell a population of 3051, although the population of the county (14,905) had begun a decline which continues to this day.

World War II obviously did not affect the town's growth as WWI had done since Haskell experienced its second greatest decade of growth between 1940 and 1950, the population increasing nearly 800 to 3836.

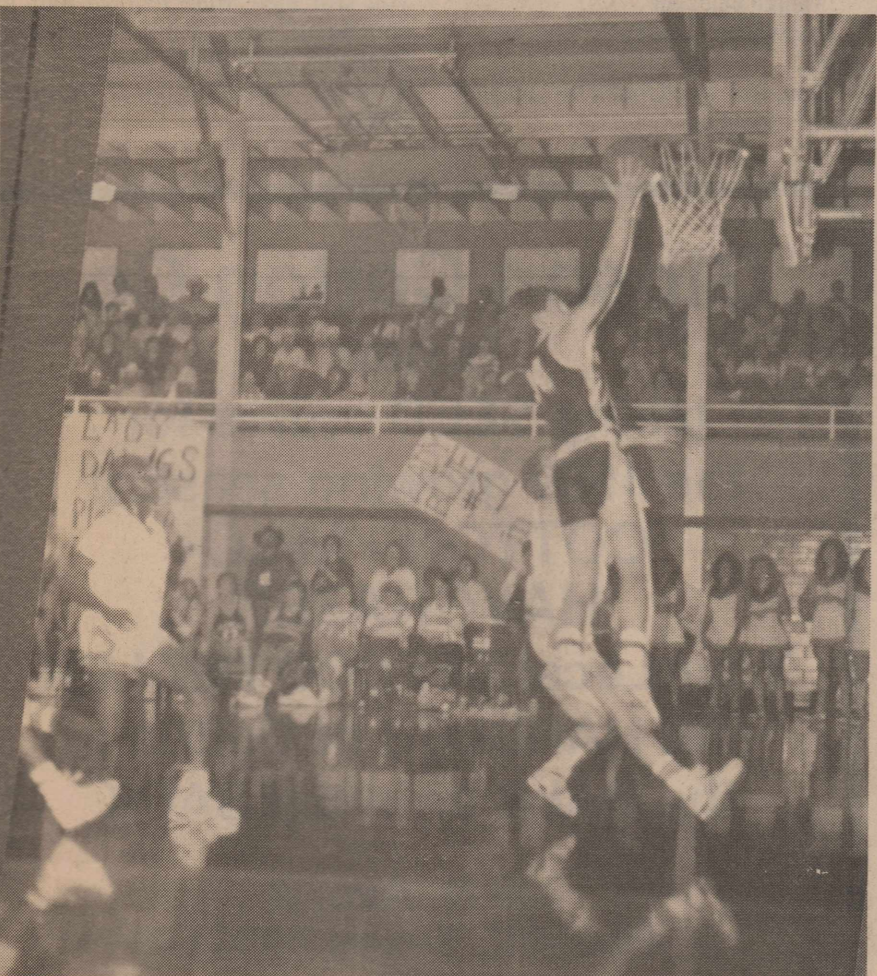
Growth continued at a slower rate, over the next decade but the 1960 census gave Haskell a population of 4016, still a record.

The population dropped to 3655 in the 1970 censuses, but climbed back to 3782 in 1980.

The population of Haskell County hit its all-time high in the 1930 census when the federal government recognized 16669 Haskell County citizens. It has declined steadily in every census since.

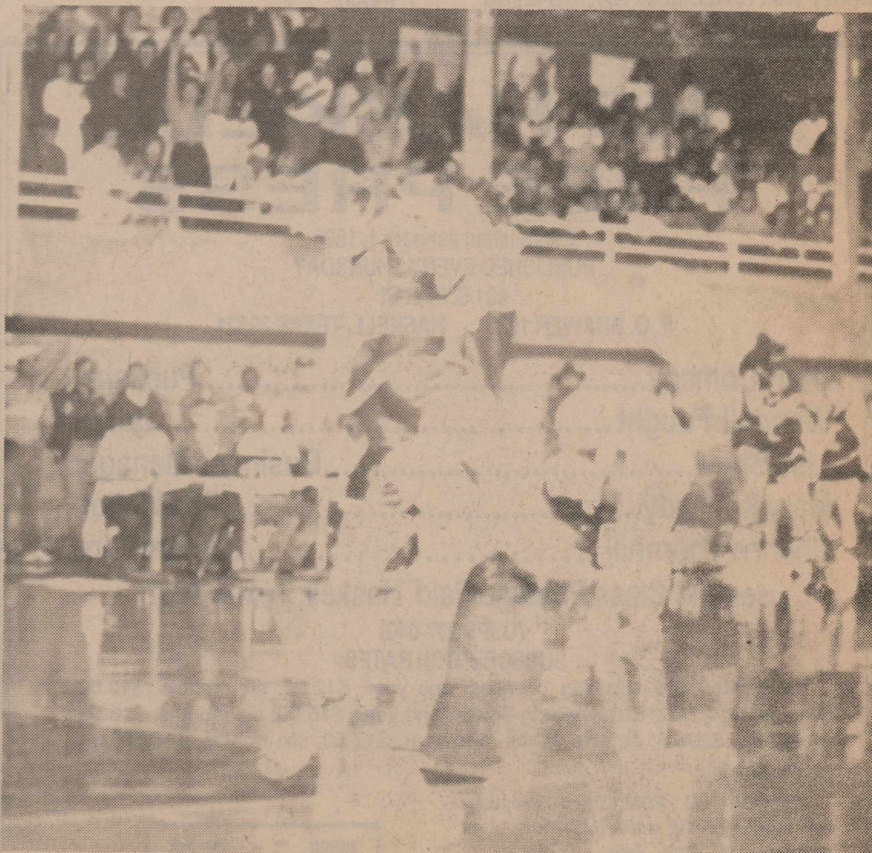
First head count gave Haskell County a population of 48 in 1880. By 1890, this had increased to 1665. The 1900 census was 2637. The next

## Mental health services offered

Services for persons with mental retardation in Haskell County are provided by the Community Services Division of Abilene State School, the designated mental retardation authority for this area. The services provided are designated to assist families in any way possible and are developed to meet individual needs.

Community non-residential services include diagnostic and evaluation services, case management services, vocational training, daily living skills training and family support services.

In Haskell, vocational services are provided through the Haskell Training Center which offers supported employment for mentally retarded persons who are not ready for competitive employment. They earn wages through contract work while also working on functional living skills.

Those in the program are being taught the skill of rag rug weaving. An Orco loom was purchased for this project and used clothing, denim jeans, blankets, sheets, etc. are being used as materials to create the rugs. Hand weaving allows for individuality and creativity as well as pride in accomplishment.

The center would like donations of used clothing or materials (cottons, cotton/polyester, denim). Double knit fabric cannot be used. The location of the center is 300 North 1st St.

Haskell Training Center is supervised by Abilene State School employee Betty Stocks. The board of the Haskell center is composed of Joel Fox, president; Willie Faye Tidrow, treasurer; Joe Cortez, Bob Baker, Sophia Hix, Ida Corley, B. O. Roberson, Ronnie Chapman and Larry McMillen. These Haskell

County citizens share time and ideas while serving in an advisory capacity to the program.

Early childhood intervention referrals also can be made by calling the offices in Sweetwater, (915) 236-6821.

## Orange pickers to depart soon

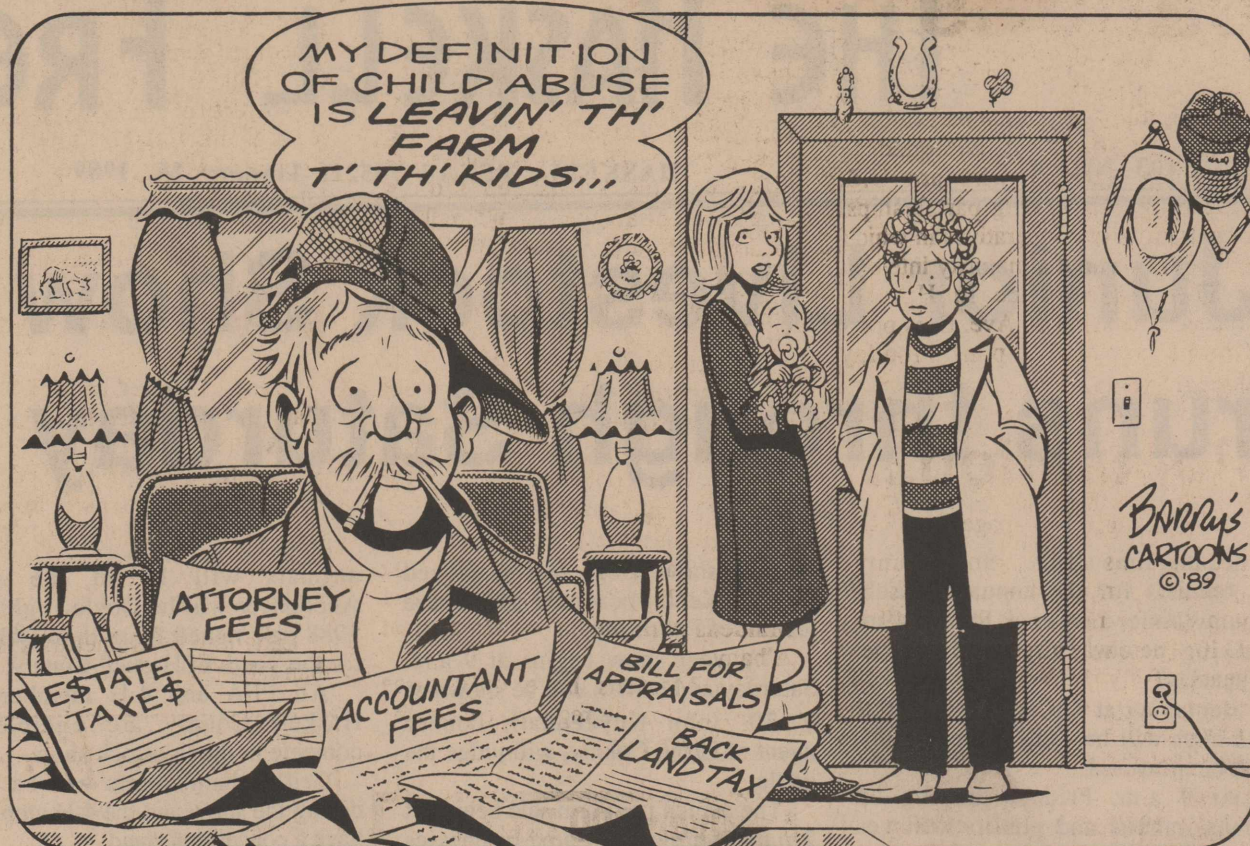
The annual Hardin-Simmons University Orange Picking Trip to the lower Rio Grande Valley will be Feb. 3-5.

## Child Welfare Board

The Haskell County Child Welfare Board met briefly Jan. 17, due to the illness of Linda Haynes, CPSS. Brian Burgess, chairman, and three other members were present.

Sue Miller, treasurer, reported on the Christmas funding projects. It was discovered that Pauline Couch, who had contributed at Christmas to help the board aid 44 families and 124 children, had not been listed as a donor.

A recent report from Children's Trust Fund of Texas stated that in 1987, there were 57,067 children, the number of confirmed victims of child abuse and neglect. From 1976 to 1986, the number of reported cases of child abuse in Texas increased 119 percent. Texas is not the only state

## plain talk

Deinstitutionalization. It's a new word which has been cropping up in the news of late. It's the practice of releasing patients from mental hospitals.

... The Cowboys may have the rights to the top college football player in the country, but apparently the oddsmakers are not impressed.

The day after Super Bowl XXIII, the boys who make the odds call the Cowboys a 100-1 shot to win Super Bowl XXIV. The Bucs, Chargers and Chiefs are listed at the same odds. But that's better than the Lions and Packers who are 200-1.

Early "favorites" for next year's Super Bowl championship are the Vikings, at 5-1. The 49ers, Bills and Bengals are 6-1 and the Rams are 7-1.

Next come the Giants, Bears and Saints at 10-1, Seahawks, Oilers and Eagles at 12-1, Redskins and Colts at 15-1, Browns at 18-1, Raiders and Patriots at 20-1, Jets at 40-1, Cards and Dolphins at 50-1, Steelers at 75-1 and the Falcons at 80-1.

... A couple of generations ago, I spent 731 days in the U.S. Army. I never once saw a general. Closest I ever came was when I saw a staff car, which supposedly carried the post commander of Fort Sill, a major general.

I can recall seeing only one bird colonel, but presume I must have seen at least two or three. I saw only a handful of lieutenant colonels and a few majors.

Today's military is full of high-ranking officers. Of 2,123,411 men and women in the armed forces, there are 14,507 above the rank of colonel in the Army, Air Force and Marines and the corresponding rank of captain in the Navy.

That's almost as many high-ranking officers as we had in 1945 when 12,123,455 men and women were in the service. Back then there were just 17,057 high-ranking officers. There was one for every 710 soldiers or sailors. Today there's a chief for every 146 Indians.

... George Bush, the 40th man to become president, is the 41st president. (Grover Cleveland is counted twice since his two terms were non-consecutive.) And he's only the 34th man to be elected president (Tyler, Fillmore, A. Johnson, Arthur and Ford were not elected).

... A Dallas restaurant now accepts orders by fax, guaranteeing them to be ready in 10 minutes. Guess you can call that fax food.

... Hope you didn't miss it. Monday was National Handwriting Day.

It's no coincidence that this day falls each year on Jan. 23 because that's the birthday of John Hancock, whose oversize signature on the Declaration of Independence is the best-known "John Hancock" in America.

But if you missed handwriting day, you still have time to take part in another of this week's big events. "National Back Health Week" started Monday and continues through Friday.

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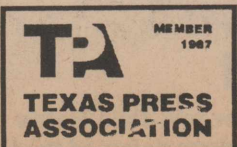
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# FmHA accepting loan applications

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by drought conditions are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office in Haskell, said Larry McDaniel, FmHA county supervisor.

Haskell and Trockmorton counties are two of 46 in Texas recently named by the secretary of agriculture as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought freeze.

McDaniel said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30-percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," McDaniel said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until Sept. 11, but farmers should apply as soon as possible," McDaniel said. "Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season."

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on

farmers for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Haskell, located at 1203 B S. Ave. E, is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

decade was the young county's greatest period of growth as the population increased to 16,249 by 1910. There was a decrease in the teen years of World War I as the 1920 count dropped to 14,193, but the 1920s saw the population climb to the record 16669 by the end of the decade.

By 1940, the population of Haskell County had declined to 14,905. It was 13,736 in 1950, 11,174 in 1960, 8,512 in 1970 and 7,725 in 1980.

In 1910, 85 percent of the county's residents resided outside the city of Haskell. By 1930, this percentage had declined only to 84. But by 1980, it had dropped to less than 55 percent. The Texas Department of Commerce's most recent estimate puts the current percentage at 51.




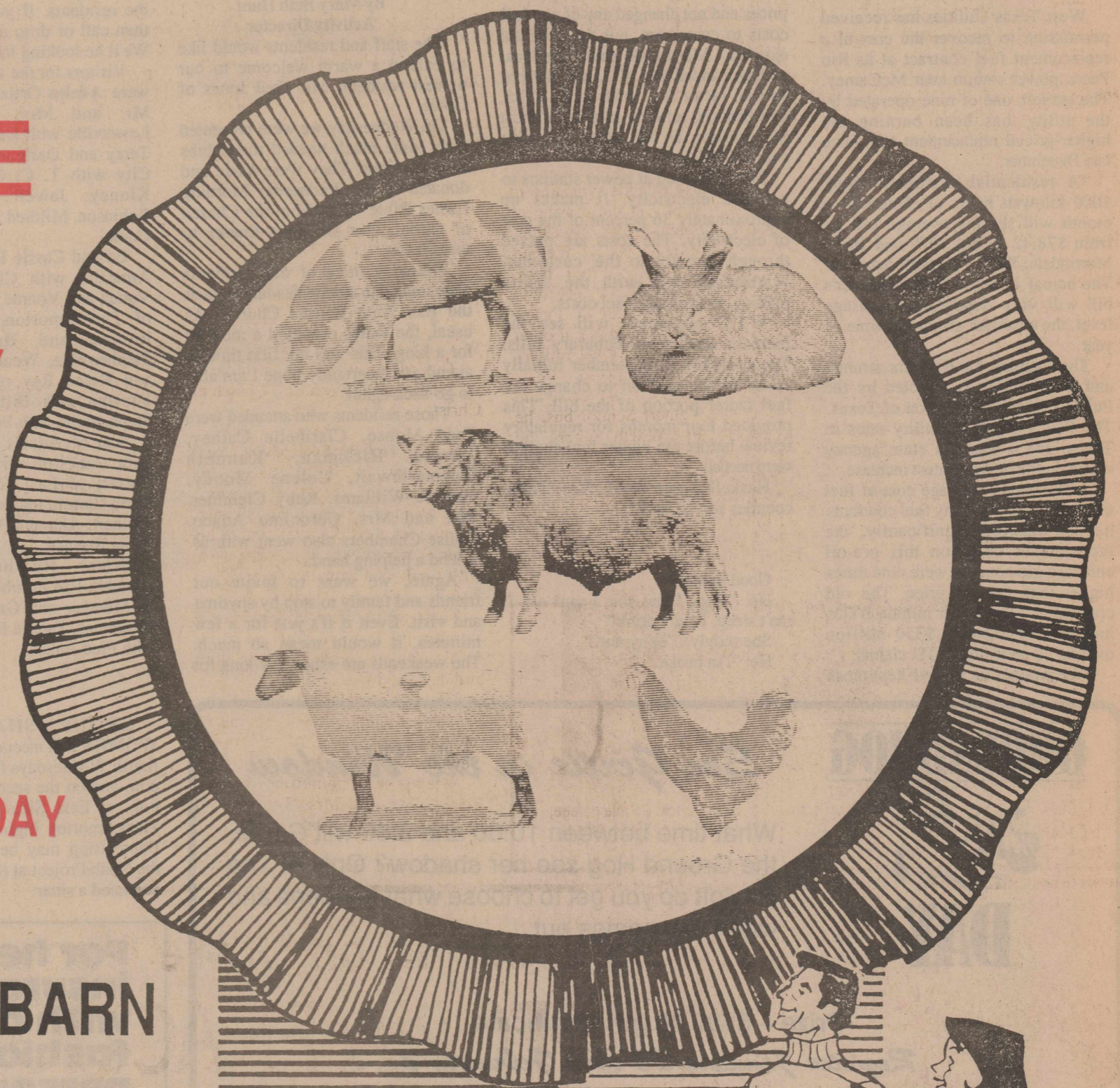

# WTU gets OK to increase rates

West Texas Utilities has received permission to recover the cost of a replacement fuel contract at its Rio Pecos power station near McCamey. The station, one of nine operated by the utility, has been burning the higher-priced replacement gas since late December.

"A residential customer using 1000 kilowatt hours of electricity a month will see his average bill go from \$78.42 to \$82.77," said Mike Martindale, WTU's Haskell manager. The actual increase in a customer's bill will vary depending on usage level, the customer group and time of year.

The company has different summer and winter rates as directed by the Public Utility Commission of Texas. The PUCT regulates utility rates in Texas, and it was this state agency which authorized the latest increase.

Although the average cost of fuel on the company's many fuel contracts has not changed significantly, the replacement costs on this pre-oil embargo gas contract were nine times higher than the old price. The old contract at 22 cents per million BTUs had saved customers \$350 million over its 20-year life, WTU claims.

"We would like to have kept those

prices and not changed any of our fuel costs to customers, but the contract expired," Martindale said. The local manager added that WTU has lowered its fuel factor five times since 1985, and had six refunds totaling almost \$50 million as the result of other contract changes.

Fuel is burned at power stations to produce electricity. It makes up approximately 36 percent of the cost of electricity. The costs are passed through directly to the customer, Martindale said, with the utility making no profit on fuel costs.

WTU customers will see the increase starting on February bills. The company in September initially asked for permission to change the fuel factor portion of the bill. This provided four months for regulatory review before the higher fuel charges were needed.

Haskell is one of 52 West Texas counties served by WTU.

# Cole Larned named to student Who's Who

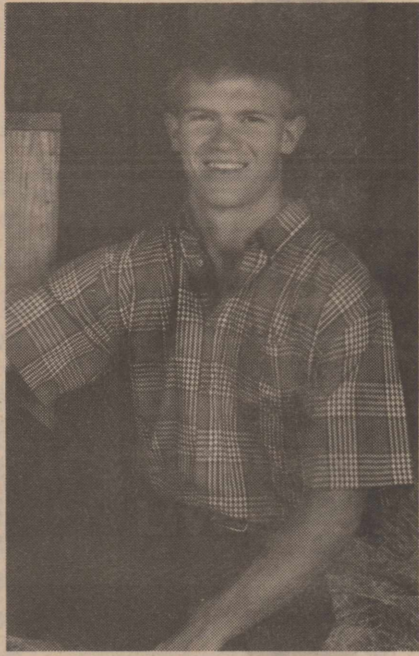
Robert Colbert (Cole) Larned of Haskell has been named to the 1987-88 Who's Who Among American High School Students.

# Brent Camp scholarship recipient

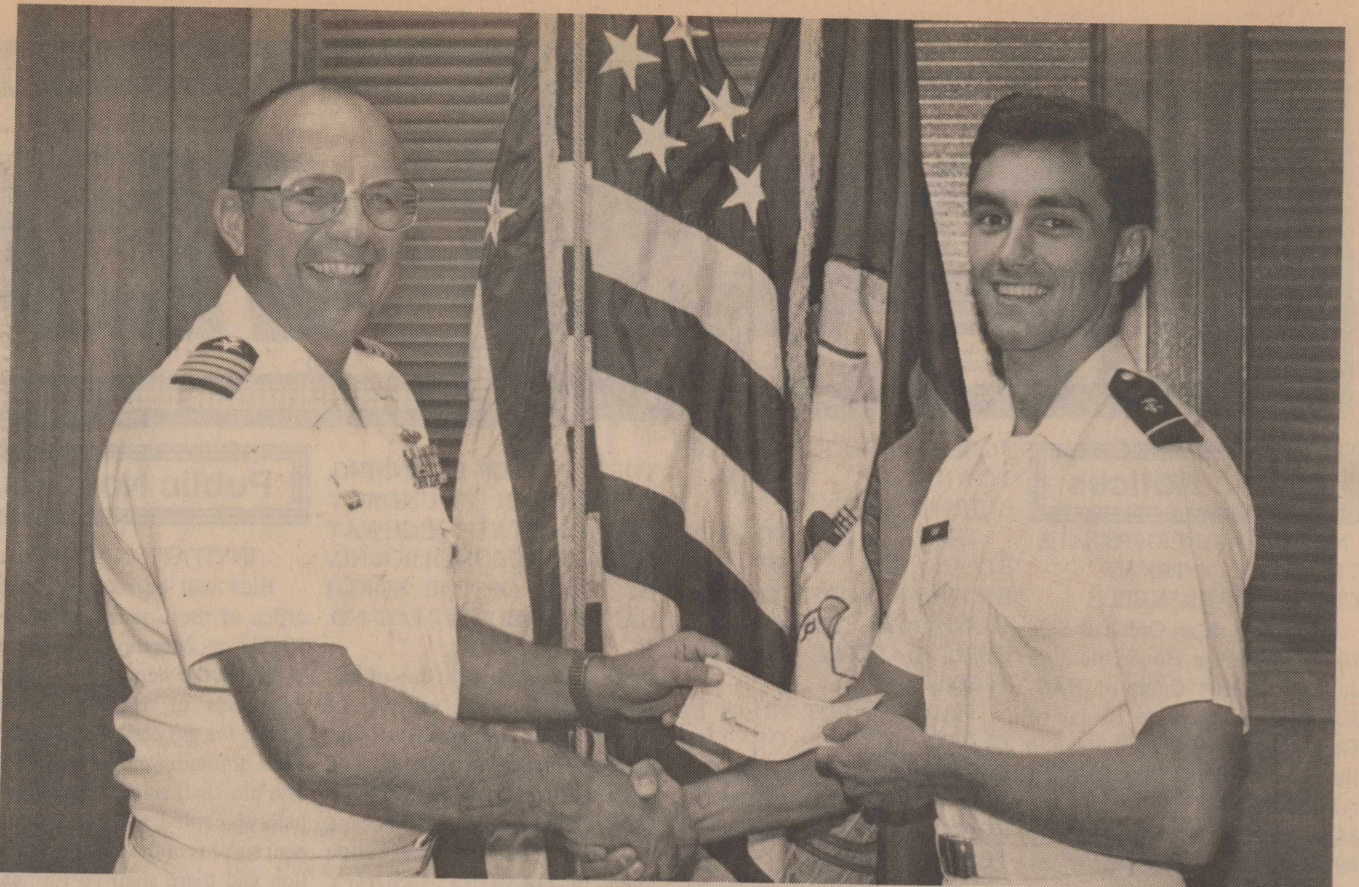
Brent Camp has been awarded a scholarship from the Armed Forces Communications and Electronics Association.

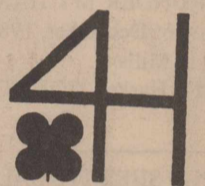

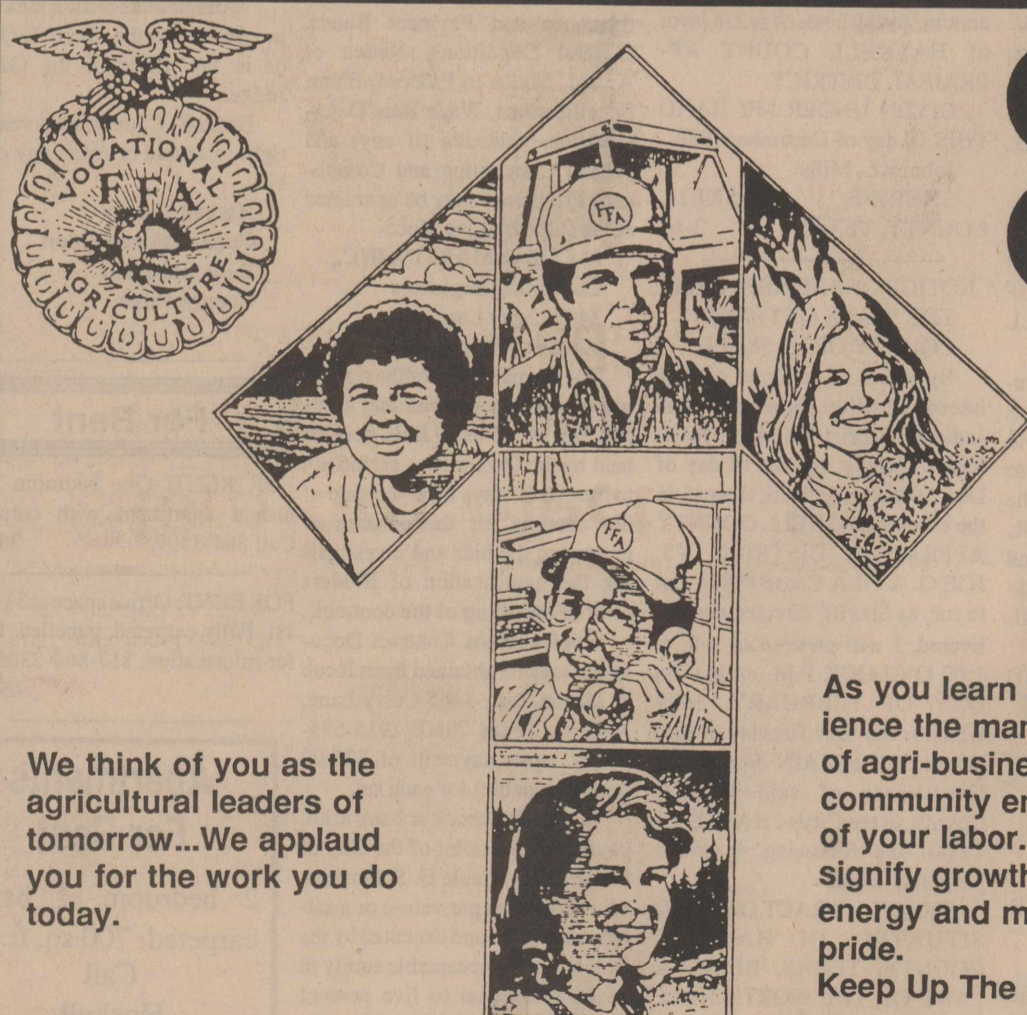
