

Rick Perry co-author of HB1

State Rep. Rick Perry of Haskell announced last week that he has signed on a co-author of House Bill 1, the Workers' Compensation Reform Act of 1989.

HB 1, authored by State Rep. Richard Smith of Bryan, is the final product of 18 months of public testimony, research and investigation by the Joint Select Committee on Workers' Compensation Insurance on which Perry served.

Without a doubt this legislation is the most important bill we will consider this session," said Perry. "It will have more impact on the future economic development of Texas than any other issue we will face. Any member of the legislature should be proud to co-sponsor and vote for this eminant bill.

The work of the committee produced the most comprehensive study of Texas workers' compensation system in 75 years, Perry said. The most significant of the findings is that currently, the state's workers' compensation system is ranked as the third most expensive in the nation in cost to businesses while ranking below average in benefits paid to injured workers.

Recognizing the severity of the problem, Gov. Bill Clements, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and House Speaker Gib Lewis have all stated that workers' compensation reform is one of their top priorities of the 71st legislative session. In his State of the State address Jan. 31, Clements said, "The current law is a disincentive for attracting and expanding business in Texas. If ever a law needed change, this is the one.

HB 1 is a complete rewrite of the existing statutes and will make a broad range of reforms, including restructuring and renaming the agency which governs the Texas workers' compensation system. Other

Hawley's Lady Bearcats sent the district 7-2A championship race into overtime when they handed the Haskell Maidens a 45-34 defeat here Tuesday in the final regular game of the season.





Lawmakers set sights on Rains

V STIN Some of Gov. Bill Clements' Republican appointees are facing tough times from Democratic senators angry at his exclusion of minorities and women.

But this controversy is lukewarm compared to what some law-



makers want to do to his secretary of state, Jack Rains.

Incensed at what they considered Rains' partisan meddling in November elections in South Texas, three Hispanic lawmakers want his office to no longer oversee elections in Texas.

Alex Moreno, D-Edinburg, Juan Hinojosa, D-McAllen, and Renato Cuellar, D-Weslaco, want to create a three member elections panel to oversee state elections, saying Rains has taken partisanship to new heights.

Rains, you may remember, ordered election inspectors to take a close look at South Texas boxes, orders he withdrew after Valley officials such and charged racism. Campaign Reform Proposed

If Rains backed away then, he's in more deeply than ever now, chairing a campaign reform panel as the governor's man.

The panel seeks to limit the size of campaign contributions for all offices, not just the Supreme Court races which brought the issue to a head amidst allegations of justice for sale

Rains said the present system is a "daisy chain" which allows ploys of shifting and hiding money and compared it to Columbian drug money tactics.

He and others want Clements to loosen up and make more minority appointments.

Only time will tell whether these three hostages die politically during negotiations with Clements.

Clean Air Package

Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro presented his clean air package to legislators, supported by a host of oil companies, labor unions and environmental groups. One bill requires the state to convert thousands of state vehicles, school and mass transit buses, and private fleet vehicles to compressed natural gas or other clean-burning fuel.

Supporters say the program saves money while it builds the natural gas industry and increases jobs.

Another bill prohibits burning fucl oil in certain utility and industrial boilers during part of the year in 21 polluted cities.

Insurance Tax Lawsuits

Some senators last week questioned whether Attorney General Jim Mattox is aggressively pursuing insurance tax lawsuits which they say is holding up \$730 million in state money.

The state has the money but Comptroller Bob Bullock says lawmakers can't spend it because it is earmarked to pay pending lawsuits.

Senators want to spend it this session, and want Mattox to clear the cases, but Mattox said that may not be the best strategy. He will issue a more detailed report next week.

No School, No Wheels

High school students who drop out might find themselves losing their wheels, if a South Texas legislator's bill is passed.

"I don't believe that public relations campaigns alone can effectively discourage students from dropping out," Rep. Eddie Lucio, D-Brownsville, said.



Eighty-seven percent of the 254 counties in Texas (221) allow mixed drink sales in some form. And mixed drinks are available in 437 Texas cities.

State taxes totaling more than \$43 million were collected by the state during the fourth quarter of 1988. Of this, \$10.5 million was rebated to the cities and counties. The state collects a 12 percent tax on drinks sold and then rebates 12.5 percent of the 12 percent to the counties and also 12 percent to the cities where mixed drinks are sold.

In Haskell County last quarter, the state collected \$875.04 and sent the county \$109.38. This is one of the lowest figures of any county, exceeding only Knox County (\$95.45) among the counties in this area. (Throckmorton County does not have drink sales.)

Rebates of other counties in the area included Stonewall \$138.07, Shackelford \$234.984, Baylor \$604.85 and Jones \$759.39.

Visitors like Texas, state survey finds

Two or three people zipping down a smooth highway, enjoying the scenery, and recalling the friendly people and good food at their lunch stop. That's the typical party of visitors to Texas, according to a yearlong survey of more than 13,000 motorists.

Respondents to the highway department's "Auto Visitor Survey" during 1988 rated Texas friendliness first, followed by scenery, good roads and food as what they enjoyed most during their visit.

"The first full year's count on our newly expanded survey doesn't show any big surprises," noted Don Clark, director of the department's Travel and Information Division. Adjacent states, the large population centers of California and Florida and the Midwest sent Texas the most visitors.'

Oklahoma, California and Louisiana sent the most visitors, while Minnesota, Michigan and Illinois residents topped the list of people staying 30 days or more.

San Antonio was the most popular destination, and a remarkable onethird of respondents visited the Alamo. "San Antonio, with big draws like the Alamo, the River Walk and Sea World, is a real asset to the

state because auto visitors have to travel a long distance across Texas to get there." Clark said.

Dallas and Houston were also popular tourist destinations. Other highly rated attractions included the Lyndon B. Johnson ranch, the Confederate Air Force Flying Museum and South Padre Island.

What did tourists do during their stay? What they did most was shop. Other popular activities were touring historic places and museums, camping, bird-watching and taking photographs to record their visit.

Most U.S. visitors stayed an average of a week in the state and spent more than \$560 per party on food, lodging, vehicle expenses, shopping and entertainment. Foreign visitors spent a similar amount per day but stayed a few days longer.

"With the reasonable prices prevalent in the state, and the many diverse attractions here, Texas is an outstanding travel value that the entire world is noticing," Clark said.

The tourist report was prepared from a 17-question survey completed by out-of-state travelers who stopped at Texas tourist bureaus for routing information and travel literature. The bureaus serve as Texas' front door, and travel counselors extend hospitality to visitors arriving from all directions. Many travelers surveyed said information they received from the bureaus prompted them to visit more places, enjoy Texas.

The heart and how it works

The normal heart is a strong, muscular pump a little larger than a person's fist. It pumps blood continuously through the circulatory system to all parts of the body. Each day the average heart beats (or expands and contracts) 100,000 times and pumps close to 2,000 gallons of blood. In a 70-year lifetime an average human heart beats more than 2.5 billion times.

The heart is divided into four chambers. The upper two chambers are the atria, and the lower two chambers are the ventricles. Blood is pumped through these chambers, aided by four heart valves that open and close to allow blood to flow.

The four valves of the heart are: 1) the tricuspid valve, located between the right atrium and right ventricle, 2) the pulmonary (pulmonic) valve, between the right ventricle and the pulmonary artery, 3) the mitral valve, between the left atrium and left ventricle, and 4) the aortic valve, between the left ventricle and the aorta. Each valve has a set of flaps, also called leaflets or cusps. The mitral valve has two flaps; the others have three.

To understand how the heart works, think of it as a pump. First, the right atrium receives dark blue venous blood that has circulated through the body. (This blood is low in oxygen and high in carbon dioxide

because, as it circulated, the body's tissues removed oxygen and nutrients and added carbon dioxide and waste products.) This low pressure chamber empties blood into the right ventricle through the tricuspid valve.

The right ventricle pumps the blood under low pressure through the pulmonary valve into the pulmonary artery and to the lungs where the blood receives oxygen and discharges carbon dioxide. After the blood receives oxygen it's bright red. The blood now returns by the pulmonary veins to the left atrium where it then enters the left ventricle by passing through the mitral valve.

The left ventricle pumps the red, oxygen-rich blood out through the aortic valve into the aorta, which takes blood to the rest of the circulatory system.

The circulatory system is the network of elastic tubes through which blood flows as it carries oxygen and nutrients to all parts of the body. It begins at the heart and lungs and includes arteries, arterioles (small arteries), and capillaries (minute blood vessels). As blood returns to the heart and lungs, it flows through venules (small veins) and veins. There are about 12,400 miles of arteries, veins and capillaries in the human body.

The circulating blood brings oxygen and nutrients to all the organs

and tissues of the body, including the heart itself. It also picks up waste products from the body's cells. These waste products are eliminated as they're filtered through the kidneys and lungs.

A small bundle of highly specialized cells in the right atrium acts as a natural pacemaker and controls the pumping action of the heart. These cells coordinate the contractions of the heart by generating electrical impulses.

While blood tends to flow into the right and left atria at a relatively constant rate, when the heart relaxes there's a change in pressure and blood flows from the atria into the ventricles. At this time the valves between the atria and ventricles are open.

Conversely, when the ventricular muscle receives an impulse to contract, the valves between both atria and the ventricles shut. Then the pressure from the contraction forces blood from the heart to the lungs (in the case of the right ventricle) and to the rest of the body (in the case of the left ventricle). The pressure generated during contraction opens the aortic and pulmonary valves. These valves close automatically when the ventricles relax.






Forehand accepted to pharmacy school



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Rule committees work on memorial


