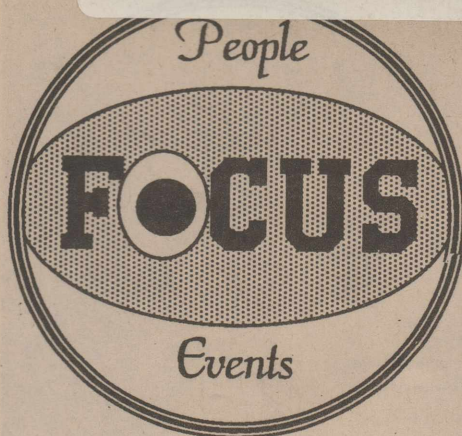

Non-employment income boosts economy

In understanding local economic resources and activity, it's easy to overlook non-employment income which accounts for nearly half the total income in Haskell County.

Non-employment income represents income from investments, pensions, social security and other types of government payments.

The U. S. Department of Commerce estimates that Haskell County residents received an annual average of \$41,751,000 in non-employment income between 1982 and 1986. That's 46 percent of the county's total income. No doubt, the figure for today would be considerably higher.

Non-employment income will become even more important in the future. Most of this income accrues to retirees. With increases in life expectancy and the aging of the "baby boom" generation, more and more dollars will be controlled by this segment of the population. Retirees, and their non-employment income, represent a growth sector that can have a substantial impact on local economies, particularly in smaller, rural communities.

Retirement income can create additional jobs in a community in the same way manufacturing plant payrolls do. Retirees spend dollars received from investments, pension

plans and social security payments for goods and services. This increases dollars flowing in the economy, stimulating economic growth and job creation.

In fact, research indicates that compared to other sources of income, far fewer dollars in retirement income are needed to generate one job. The reasons offered for the difference in effectiveness are that retirees spend more of their income in the local economy and less of this income is taxed than in the case of income earned by non-retirees.

Gregory S. Taylor, community development specialist at Texas

A&M University, notes, however, that these dollars must be spent locally to benefit the local economy. He says there are actions communities can take to insure maximum benefit is received from this vast source of spendable income.

More retirement dollars can be captured in the local economy if merchants cater to the unique needs of this population segment, says Taylor. A fairly simple market analysis can determine what goods and services are purchased by retirees. Many communities have met the needs of retirees through a variety of creative marketing efforts such as home

delivery of goods and services or housing developments specifically for this group.

Taylor also points out that retirees control a large pool of potential investment capital. With the appropriate mechanisms and projects, a portion of these could be invested locally to further enhance the local economy. In some communities, Taylor said economic developers have worked with bankers, investors and entrepreneurs, establishing local capital funds that increase the flow of investment dollars within the economy.

Sales taxes down this month

Sales taxes took a 5.38-percent dip in Haskell for February, but the city is still well ahead of last year's collection pace.

A check received by the City of Haskell this week from the state comptroller was in the amount of \$7,516.03, bringing the year's total rebates to \$51,994.22.

Although last year's April check (for February sales) was slightly higher at \$7,943.35, the year-to-date total is 12.48 percent higher than last year's figure of \$46,284.82.

Rule was the only other Haskell County town to receive a rebate check this month, it being for \$827.82.

William H. Stewart was chosen Monday night to be superintendent of the Haskell Independent School District. He will assume duties June 2.

Stewart, 41, was the choice of the School Board from a field of 41 applicants for the position which was vacated Feb. 3 when Dr. James A. Kemp's resignation was effective.

The new superintendent, who has been assistant superintendent at Connally ISD (near Waco) for the past 10 years, is by no means a stranger to this area. He grew up in Munday and graduated from high school there. He is the son of Dr. and Mrs. W. H. Stewart, who still live there. His father is a retired veterinarian. Mrs. Stewart (Lana) is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tommie Harper, also of Munday. Her father is John Deere dealer in that Knox County city.

They have a son, Harper, a junior, and a daughter, Shelly, a seventh-grader.

The new superintendent graduated from high school in 1966. He earned bachelor's and master's degrees from Baylor University and has also done post graduate work at Baylor.

He has been at Connally 12 years, being assistant principal and then principal the first two years before being elevated to the assistant superintendency. Earlier, he had been a math teacher and coach at Van (one year) and Robinson (two years).

Mrs. Stewart also is a Munday High graduate (1969) and holds bachelor's and master's degrees from Baylor with a reading specialist certificate.

She taught two years at Munday and 12 years at Connally. She is a freelance writer for *The Mailbox*, a magazine for elementary teachers.

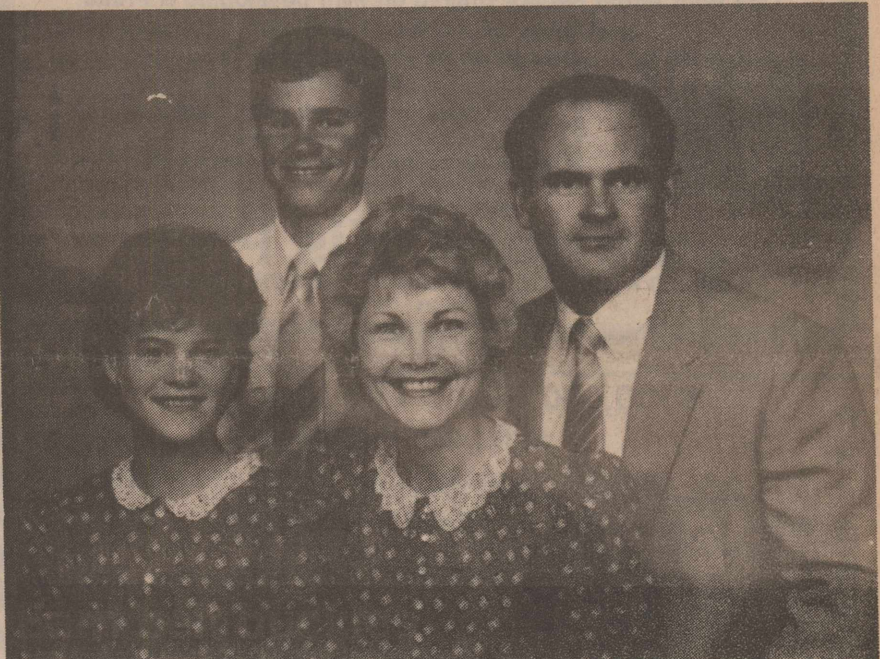
football and baseball and works as a bank teller on weekends.

Plastic bags can damage clothing

The plastic bag the dry cleaner uses is designed to keep garments clean while they are being taken home. Sometimes people store garments in these bags, perhaps for weeks, months or seasons. Consequently, garments may be damaged.

For instance, ink from the lettering on the bag may stain garments in the bag or those stored next to the plastic. These stains appear more often on leathers, suedes, vinyls and synthetic materials, but they can happen to any fabric.

The International Fabric Care Institute reports that considerable research has been done to find inks that will not transfer to fabrics. No ink has yet been found that is suitable for printing on plastic that will not transfer dye to fabrics.

For this reason, garments should not be stored in plastic bags from dry cleaners. Some bag manufacturers are putting warnings on the bags. But whether the warning is there or not, the best practice is to remove garments from dry cleaner bags as soon as you get them home.

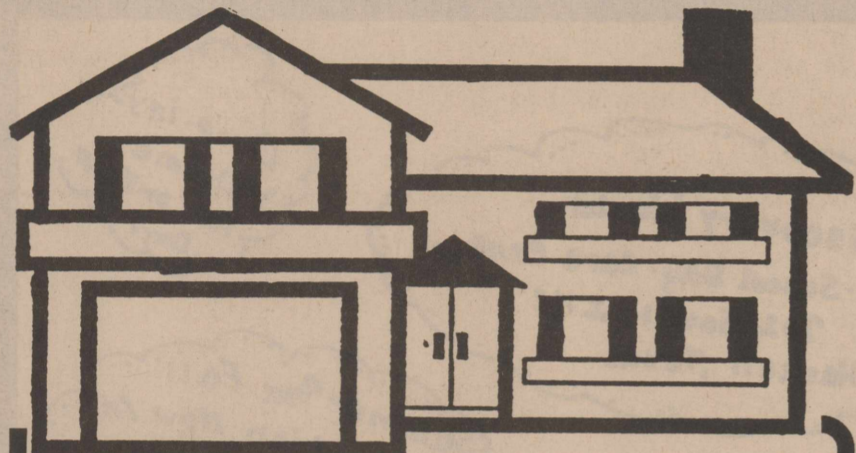

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Air show scheduled May 27

Once again this year, the skies around Haskell will be filled with the sounds of aircraft during the last Saturday in May.

At least, that is the hope of the Haskell Chamber of Commerce, which is sponsoring the second annual Haskell Fly-In and Pilots' Breakfast, to be held at the Haskell

Municipal Airport on May 27, from 7:30 until 11 a.m.

According to Jim Bridwell, project coordinator, a large group of volunteers is being assembled to insure a safe and smooth running program. The steering committee includes chamber president Buddy Lane, who is also in charge of finances for the fly-in, and Haskell city administrator Bob Baker, who will serve as liaison with the city.

Also serving on the committee are Don Comedy, operations and air traffic control; Dusty Garison, publicity; Elbert Johnson, registration; Mike Martindale, gate receipts; Gene Plunkett, ground traffic and parking; Joe Thigpen, hangar

setup; and Tom Watson, food preparation.

The fly-in was begun in 1988 as a way of attracting pilots and airplanes from across Texas and the southwest, especially those participating in the annual Breckenridge Air Show, which is held every year during the Memorial Day weekend. Owners of World War II aircraft, such as those featured during the Breckenridge program, are invited to bring their "warbirds" to Haskell. Awards will be given for the best warbird, oldest pilot and longest flight.

All pilots and their guests arriving by air will receive a complimentary breakfast. Those wishing to drive to the airport to view the aircraft will be charged \$2 admission per person, which includes breakfast.

Again this year, the city will sell aviation gasoline during the fly-in to visiting pilots at \$1 per gallon. This price will be good only for transient aircraft, and only from 7:30 until 11

"We'd like to invite everybody to come out that morning, see the planes and have breakfast with us," said Bridwell. "Last year, we had nearly 50 visiting airplanes, including 16 military aircraft. Pilots from as far away as Canada, New Hampshire and California were here, along with a big crowd of spectators, and we're hoping for another good turnout this year."

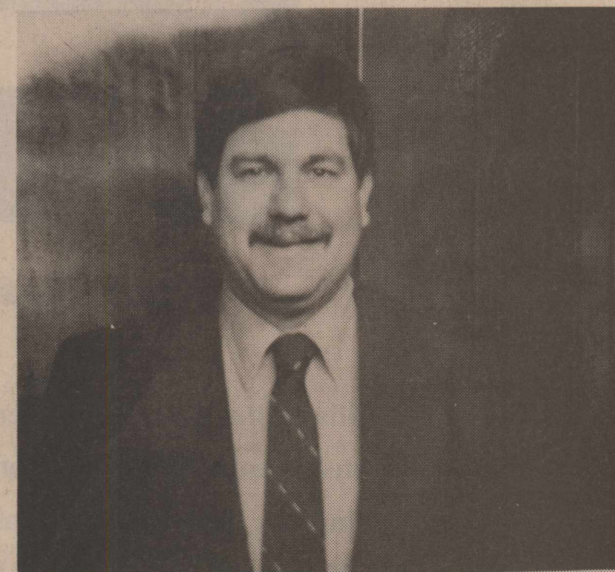

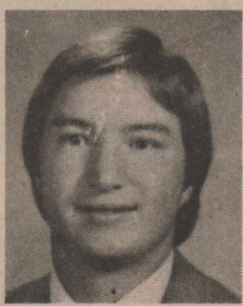

TAX CHANGES FOR 1989

The 1986 Tax Reform Act called for inflation adjustments on tax brackets, standard deductions and personal exemptions. Here are the 1989 numbers that you'll need for your tax planning.

Tax Rate	Taxable Income	
	Single	Married Joint
15%	\$ 0 - 18,550	\$ 0 - 30,950
28%	\$18,551 - 44,900	\$30,951 - 74,850
33%	\$44,901 - 104,330	\$74,851 - 177,720
28%	Over \$104,330	Over \$177,720

The 15% tax rate and the deduction for personal exemptions are phased out by imposing a 5% surtax on incomes above certain amounts. This creates a 33% tax rate on income in this phaseout range. The table above shows the 33% rate for singles based on one personal exemption, and for marrieds based on two exemptions. Increase the range of income to be taxed at 33% by \$11,200 for each additional exemption you take.

The 1989 standard deduction amounts are as follows:

Joint returns	\$5,200
Married filing separately	2,600
Head of household	4,550
Single	3,100

Taxpayers 65 and older get an additional \$600 standard deduction if married or an additional \$750 if single.

The 1989 personal exemption deduction is \$2,000. This amount will be indexed for inflation starting in 1990.

Individuals who are eligible for Medicare will pay a Medicare surtax of \$22.50 for every \$150 of 1989 federal income tax liability up to a maximum additional tax of \$800 per individual.

Social security taxes also go up this year. Rates remain the same (7.51% for employees and employers, and 13.02% for self-employed). The maximum wage base to which the rates apply, however, increases from \$45,000 to \$48,000, increasing the maximum tax to \$3,604.80 for employees and employers and to \$6,249.60 for self-employed.

The reasons for the proposed abandonment are that the line operates at a deficit, that prospects for increased revenues are poor and that the line's shippers have adequate transportation alternatives. - (v) Recommended provisions for protection of the interests of employees; and

Written comments and protests will be considered by the Commission in determining whether an investigation is needed to assist in determining what disposition to make of the application.
