## PLANNING FOR THE MEDICARE TAX

Effective January 1, 1989, a new charge has been imposed on Medicare beneficiaries. This new charge, technically labeled a supplemental premium, applies to anyone eligible for more than six months of Medicare Part A hospital benefits. The surcharge is based on the beneficiary's federal income tax. For 1989 , the surtax will be $15 \%$ of the federal tax liability, with a maximum surtax of $\$ 800$ ( $\$ 1,600$ for joint returns where both spouses are eligible for benefis). This rate in
