

Headstream Center

The month of May has been designated as National Mental Health and Chemical Abuse month.

In conjunction with this proclamation, now is an ideal time to call attention to the tri-county mental health facility located in Haskell.

The Headstream Memorial Center, located at 1301 N. 1st, opened in 1970 as the first outreach center affiliated with Vernon State Hospital. Aubrey Headsream served as its first director. Aubrey and his wife, Marjorie, were instrumental in the center's success.

In September 1987, the Vernon State Hospital programs merged with the Wichita Falls State Hospital programs and the Headstream Memorial Center became one of 13 outreach centers covering a 20-county area. The center has a concerned, qualified staff consisting of three fulltime and four part-time personnel. In the past 19 years it has served more than 2,000 people from Haskell, Knox and Stonewall counties. Currently there are 80 cases from these three counties. In addition, there are an average of 25 monthly screenings and referrals to other resources

The goal of Headstream Memorial Center is to provide mental health services close to home and to prevent, when possible, psychiatric hospitalization. The charge for these services is figured on a sliding income scale. However, no one will be turned away because they are unable to pay.

The Headstream Memorial Center provides the following services to the people in Haskell, Knox and Stonewall counties: psychological testing, state hospital screening, alcohol and chemical abuse counseling, behavorial, relationship, family and marriage counseling. Group therapy programs, case management and psychiatric consultation are also available.

This facility's services are offered for all ages, ranging from chilldren to the elderly. Anyone with a problem or a concern about any of the above areas may request help or information by calling 864-2472 in Haskell.

On March 14, 1989, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas an application which proposes to revise its Toll Restriction Tariff in Section 21 of the General Exchange Tariff. The Commission received the application as Docket No. 8700.

The application proposes to reduce the monthly rate for Toll Restriction residence service from the current \$15 a month to \$5 a month per residence access line. This proposed application will affect approximately 2,487 residence customers who presently subscribe to toll restriction. It is estimated that the proposed rate schedule will reduce the Company's annual revenues from this service by approximately \$298,000, which is less than one percent of the Company's total intrastate revenues. If the application is approved, the effective date of the rate reduction will be set according to the Commission's Order.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible. A deadline to file motions to intervene has been set for May 30, 1989. 
PLANNING FOR THE MEDICARE TAX

Effective January 1, 1989, a new charge has been imposed on Medicare beneficiaries. This new charge, technically labeled a supplemental premium, applies to anyone eligible for more than six months of Medicare Part A hospital benefits. The surcharge is based on the beneficiary's federal income tax. For 1989, the surtax will be 15% of the federal tax liability, with a maximum surtax of \$800 (\$1,600 for joint returns where both spouses are eligible for benefits). This rate increases to a maximum 28% by 1993 with a ceiling of \$1,050 (\$2,100 joint). For 1989, the surchage will be paid when the 1989 tax return is filed. Beginning in 1990, it must be included in quarterly estimate calculations.

With the surchage based on federal tax, the only way to reduce it is to lower your federal tax. Brokers are pushing tax-free instruments as a means of avoiding the surtax. However, if tax-free instruments were not good investments for you prior to this surtax, the outlook will not change merely because of it. The higher yields of taxable investments may provide a better after-tax return than tax-free investments, even considering the new surtax. If you decide tax-free investments are worthwhile, consider no-load mutual funds. Such funds provide professional management, reduced risk, and liquidity. Otherwise, commissions and investment charges may substantially outweigh the additional tax you are trying to avoid. As always, tax considerations should not be the sole determinant of investment selection.

A study by the American Association of Retired People indicates over 80% of Medicare-eligible recipients will owe less than \$250 of surtax, and less than 6% will pay the maximum \$800 surcharge. Your 1988 tax liability will help you gauge the impact the 1989 surcharge may have on you and enable you to discuss options with your advisors.
