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# Spider mites cause damage to gardens

Spider mites are tiny, but they can cause big problems in home gardens.

These pests prefer tomatoes, beans and peas but will attack many other crops. They do most of their damage in hot, dry weather, said Max Stapleton, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Spider mites, also called red spiders, are only 1/60th of an inch in length and vary in color from white to green to red.

The tiny pests can build up

quickly and completely engulf plants, Stapleton said. Eggs laid on the underside of leaves hatch in four to five days. A complete life cycle takes three weeks, and as many as 20 overlapping generations can occur in a single year.

Mites spin a thin web which often can be seen on heavily infested

plants. They feed by inserting their mouth parts into plant tissue and sucking juices. While feeding, they inject toxic substances into the plant.

Infestations of spider mites can be identified by tiny white spots on plant leaves. Heavy infestations cause bleaching or yellowing, first along the main leaf veins and then throughout the plant. Heavy infestations cause plants to shed buds and small fruit. Spider mites can completely defoliate a plant if not controlled.

Control of spider mites is often difficult and requires two to four applications of insecticide at five- to seven-day intervals.

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

- When buying bulbs, remember that the lumen rating tells you the light output of the bulb. The watts are how much electricity is needed to produce the light output. And bulb life is the estimated number of hours the bulb will burn.

Can't hack college tuition costs? Go south of the border.

Annual tuition at the University of Mexico (UNAM) in Mexico City is 8 cents.

That's just one of the many unusual things about the largest university in this hemisphere.

Others:

--The school has 270,000 students and 35,000 faculty members. In 1953, enrollment was 15,000. Even though government troops killed hundreds of students demonstrating for political reforms in 1968, many student demands were met and enrollment jumped to 80,000 by 1970. It's been soaring since.

--The school was founded in 1551, only 59 years after Columbus sailed for the New World and 48 years before the English settled at Jamestown.

--Only seven percent of the applicants pass the entrance test, but those who fail are entitled to enter because of an open-admission policy. Seventy-five percent of undergraduates never complete their studies, and those who do take an average of eight years. Ninety percent of graduate students don't finish.

--Sixty-eight percent of the students come from families whose members earn the minimum wage (\$3.40 a day) or slightly above.

--Full professors earn about \$200 a week. (A humanities professor with three degrees from an Ivy League school said he earns less than \$4,000.)

--Radical students claim UNAM is trying to control admissions, not to improve education but to quash left-wing movements.

--Dozens of professors are legendary for missing classes and office hours. The faculty union says there are at least 5,000 "fliers", patronage laborers who descend on campus every two weeks to pick up their paychecks.

Intellectual Gabriel Zaid, in a recent book, wrote: "Nobody is going to kick out of UNAM the students who don't study, the teachers who don't teach, the janitors who don't clean, the functionaries who don't function, the investigators who don't investigate."

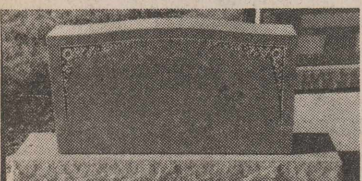
## State survey

## Guidelines help identify drug use

Are you concerned that someone you know may be using cocaine? To be sure, you need to know about the drug's effects. On one hand, you may have heard that cocaine brings euphoria, increased energy and mental capabilities, and sexual stimulation. On the other hand, you feel you know little of the negative behavioral changes associated with cocaine use.

The Texas Medical Association offers the following characteristics of cocaine use as a guideline to help target the problem early so that you can offer the needed help.

There may be a significant change in sleeping habits. Cocaine is a stimulant which interferes with normal sleep. Sometimes, users will stay awake for long periods of time when taking cocaine, then fall into extended periods of sleep.

The person may have frequent nosebleeds, a red, stuffy nose, or sniffles. Sniffing cocaine is the most frequent method used, so these signs could indicate cocaine use. Also, there may be injection sites on the inside hollow of each arm by the elbow if the person is "shooting up" cocaine with a needle.

There may be a sudden interest or specialized knowledge about the drug. People who are dependent on cocaine (or other drugs) often like to "show off" their knowledge about the different types of cocaine and the effects it has.

He or she may have lost a lot of weight. Cocaine decreases the appetite and many cocaine users either skip meals or eat poorly.

There may be rapid mood swings. Cocaine is very short acting and only produces feeling of euphoria and confidence for an average of 30 minutes for each dose, then is quickly followed by depression or a "crash". Being extremely moody may be a sign of cocaine use.

He or she frequently may be sick or late to work or school, and show decreased productivity at work or school. These changes may indicate that the person is staying up late using cocaine, becoming less responsible, or losing interest in normal activities because of increasing preoccupation with the drug.

The Texas Medical Association reminds you that these are just some of the early characteristics that might indicate a person may be abusing cocaine. If you know of someone who shows some of these signs, seek help by calling 1-800-COCAINE or contact your physician for advice. Don't wait until it's too late to get help. Chronic or daily use of cocaine results in hallucinations, delusions, extreme paranoia, and for many, incarceration in jails or institutions, and for some, even death.

## Weight limits waived

As of Sept. 1, a new annual permit allowing certain vehicles to exceed the maximum allowable weight is being issued by the highway department. The permit was authorized during the last regular session of the Texas Legislature.

The new law applies to vehicles carrying loads that can be "reasonably dismantled." Loads that cannot be broken down into smaller units are covered by current permit classifications.

Weight limits are set to protect Texas roadways from damage due to heavy loads. Permits allow heavier vehicles to travel designated routes upon payment of a fee, which helps cover road repair costs. The new law allows vehicles to exceed the maximum axle weight by up to 10 percent and the maximum gross weight by five percent. It applies to trucks operating on state highways, on county roads and bridges, and other roads designated by the counties. It is not valid on the Intersate system.

The law also allows agricultural commodities, shipped in their natural state, to exceed axle weight by up to 12 percent and gross weight by five percent without a permit or bond.

## Horse Club sets playnight

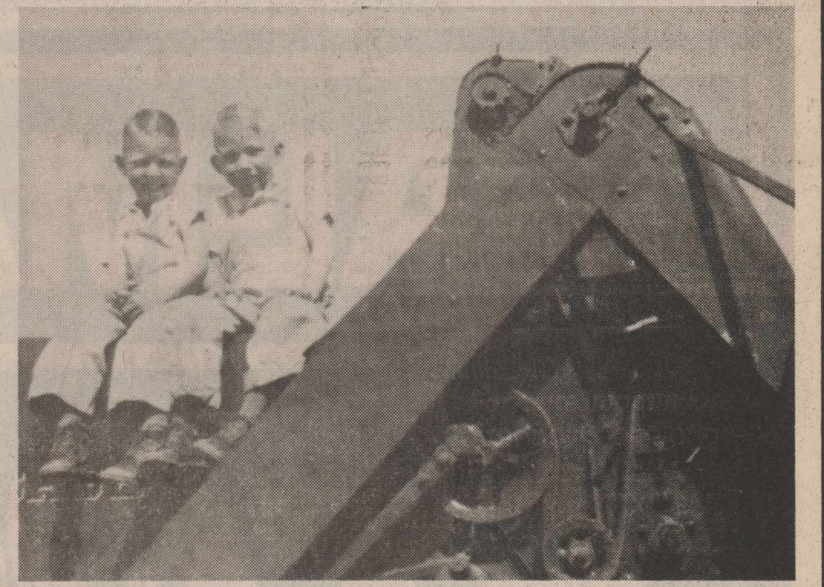
The Haskell Horse Club will sponsor a jackpot play night Saturday, beginning at 7:30 p.m. at the Haskell arena.

# Farming is dangerous

Farming is America's most dangerous profession.

Agriculture's accidental death rate is five times the national average for all injuries, said Thomas D. Valco, agricultural engineer for safety and mechanization with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. He said the Texas safety picture parallels the national scene.

"The summer and fall months typically are the worst for farm and ranch fatalities," said Valco.

A total of 82 fatalities occurred on Texas farms and ranches in 1988. "Most fatalities took place as a result of farm/ranch activities, but several deaths were a result of recreational activities such as hunting, swimming and horseback riding," Valco said.

He said the highest number of fatalities took place in July, with 13 deaths; while September followed with 12 and October with 11.

The age group between 20 and 29 recorded the highest fatalities with 15 deaths. About 47 percent of these were from gunshot wounds.

Next highest age category was between 60 and 69 years, with 12 deaths recorded. This group was followed by those 70 years or older, with 11 deaths.

Eight children under age 10 died as a result of farming accidents," Valco said. "Many resulted from youngsters riding on farm tractors that hit a bump causing the child to fall under the equipment. Tractors have only one seat, and extra riders should not be permitted.

He said tractors and associated machinery were the cause of 28 of all recorded fatalities. Forty-eight percent of the machinery accidents was the result of people being run over by the tractors and equipment. Another 40 percent of the fatalities occurred from tractor overturns.

"Simple rollover structures could have prevented most of these deaths," Valco said.

Fatalities involving firearms were the next most frequent killer with 14 deaths. Most happened while hunting, being shot by another hunter or mishandling a firearm.

"Many of these victims lived in urban areas," Valco said. "Ranch owners need to insure that visitors follow safe hunting rules and require

them to take firearm safety training.

High frequency accident categories also were fires and explosions with seven fatalities, three of which occurred during grass fires.

Other farm vehicles, including pickup trucks and all-terrain vehicles, and highway accidents resulted in seven deaths.

Three deaths occurred from falls, five involved animals, four resulted from drownings, five from being struck by objects, four from electric current, three from lightning and two from exposure and insect bites.

Valco said it is estimated that with every fatality, there are 100 permanently disabling injuries and 1,000 injuries that require hospitalization.

## State pays some costs of adoption

The state will reimburse up to \$1,500 of the cost of adopting a child with special needs, according to Charles Stevenson, acting commissioner of the Texas Department of Human Services.

"We will reimburse non-recurring adoption expenses, such as fees paid to licensed child-placing agencies, court costs, attorney fees, health and psychological evaluations, transportation and reasonable costs of lodging and food for the adoptive parent or child necessary to complete the adoption process," Stevenson said.

He said the federal Tax Reform Act of 1986 authorizes the reimbursements for adoption of "special needs" children. This includes children 6 years old or older; minority children 2 years old or older; children diagnosed as having a physical, mental or emotional handicap; and children in a sibling group who are adopted together.

The adoption must have been in accordance with Texas laws or the laws of the state from which the child was adopted.

Claims for the cost of adoptions since Jan. 1, 1987, require completion of an application which may be obtained from an adoption worker at a local office of the Texas Department of Human Services. Claims for reimbursement after June 13 require a written agreement prior to the adoption.

Wheat growers across West Texas should avoid early planting to reduce the threat of devastating wheat streak mosaic virus in this season's crop, warns a plant pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Several counties on the South Plains and in the Texas Panhandle were hit hard by the virus in 1989, said Dr. Harold Kaufman, the extension specialist. Potential losses from the virus were overshadowed in many counties by drought and freeze injury losses, he said.

The disease is spread by a wind-borne wheat curl mite which is most active in warm weather. Symptoms of the mosaic vary with wheat cultivars, time of infection and environmental conditions, the extension service specialist said. Infected plants are stunted with yellow- and green-streaked leaves.

"Fall infection is common and

most devastating," Kaufman said, "but symptoms rarely show until temperatures increase in the spring."

Control of wheat streak mosaic is achieved by destroying volunteer wheat, avoiding Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) land, planting later and planting resistant varieties, Kaufman said.

## Options for Health

**Q: What does it mean to be "out of breath" when you are exercising?**

**A:** The sensation of breathlessness with exercise occurs at very different levels of exercise intensity for different individuals. Some people who are "healthy" may feel breathless when they are walking rapidly. Others may have to participate in very strenuous prolonged exercise such as competitive jogging to experience breathlessness. Individuals who are "out of shape" and who have not been exercising will usually develop the sensation of breathlessness with low intensity exercise. With training, an individual can perform more exercise before feeling out of breath.

If you feel breathless while exercising, do not continue to exercise at the same intensity. Reduce the intensity of the exercise in order to be able to

breath in a labored but comfortable fashion. One rule of thumb to measure the appropriate intensity of exercise is to exercise at the "conversational pace." If you are exercising and can have a conversation with a friend who may be walking or jogging with you, then the intensity of exercise is probably not excessive.

The heart rate can also be monitored as a way to determine whether the intensity of exercise is appropriate to obtain maximal benefit. However, even if the heart rate is in or below the training zone, if you feel out of breath, you should reduce the intensity of your exercise.

If you feel that you are having breathing difficulty that is not normal for the intensity of exercise which you are doing, you should see your physician for a thorough evaluation.

**TAX PLANNING**

**EMPLOY FAMILY MEMBERS**

If you run a small business, whether incorporated or not, you may be able to reap a significant savings by hiring your spouse and children to work for you in the business. The wages must be reasonable and for work actually performed.

A sole proprietor employing his children who are under 28 years old avoids the payroll taxes on the wages he pays them. However, sole proprietors must pay payroll taxes on wages paid to spouses and their children 18 and older. This disadvantage may be mitigated where the wages qualify the spouse for a retirement plan contribution (IRA, SEP, Keogh). Opening an IRA for the child could also be considered.


Family wages reduce the income of the proprietor that is subject to self-employment taxes since part of the net income now goes to the children via wages. The drawback to this approach is that lower self-employment income may result in a lower Social Security benefit to the business owner. Additionally, contributions to other retirement plans (which are based on net income) may be reduced, resulting in a smaller retirement fund.

Incorporated businesses must pay payroll taxes on wages paid to all employees, the owner's spouse and children included. Take this factor into account in calculating the benefits of hiring family members.

Employing your children in your business can help you fund the children's college education with pre-tax dollars. Most states do not consider college education a support obligation of the parents. Thus, parents can employ their children with the understanding that the wages will be used to pay for the children's own college education. The savings to the parents from this approach should more than offset any associated payroll tax costs and the potential loss of the dependency exemption.
