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A Haskell woman's experience with a raging buck is the subject of a "This Happened to Me" feature in Outdoor Life magazine.

Ruby Butler's account of the experience is illustrated in a series of panel drawings, accompanied by a first-person report, in the magazine. It reads:

'My husband, Albert, and I were headed home from vacation and had decided to stop to stretch our legs. I walked down to a nearby creek, and on my way back, I spotted a buck. We stood looking at each other for a minute or so, then I continued back to our camper where Albert ws preparing a couple of cold drinks.

"I had walked just a short distance when I was hit from behind and knocked to the ground by the charging buck. I fell hard on my right shoulder. The buck tried to gore me and stomp me with his hoofs. Screaming for my husband, I tried to fend the deer off.

"Albert ran toward us with a stick in his hand. The deer ran a few yards then stopped. Albert helped me into the safety of the camper. I was shaken up, scraped and bruised. The buck managed to cut me twice---once with his antlers and once with his hoofs. I was lucky that Albert came when he did."



Ag surveys beginning this month

388 The Texas Agricultural Statistics Service will begin contacting farmers and ranchers across the state in late November for 1989 acreage. yield and production totals and endof-year livestock and poultry inventories.

"Adverse weather conditions this year have certainly had an impact on Texas agriculture, and these surveys should help us summarize where the industry stands at the end of 1989," explained Dennis Findley, state statistician.

"Information from these confidential surveys conducted by mail, telephone or in person will also help producers make their plans for the coming year.

"Sound production and marketing decisions require good, reliable information and some advanced planning, and our reports provide producers with solid facts and figures they can incorporate into their plans," Findley added.

As always, the Texas service will be trying to keep survey costs at a minimum, so Findley is urging producers to return their mailed

questionnaires as soon as possible to avoid followup contacts.

"Remember, these are sample surveys, so if you are contacted it is important to provide the requested information since one producer represents similar operations of the same type and size. Our estimates can be no better than the numbers producers provide," Findley noted.

Results of the survey will be published in early 1990. Anyone wanting a copy of the results can write Information Section, Texas Agricultural Statistics Service, P.O. Box 70, Austin 78767.

Cotton provisions outlined

A 12.5-percent acreage reduction and other provisions of the 1990 upland cotton program has been announced by the secretary of agriculture.

Clayton Yeutter, the secretary, said the announcement strikes a balance between the needs of the marketplace, budget considerations and producer concerns about surpluses.

The established target price will

be 72.9 cents per pound.

The loan level will be 50.27 cents per pound for the base quality of upland cotton, strict low middling (SLM), 1 1/16-inch, micronaire 3.5 through 4.9, at average U.S. location.

Plan B of the marketing loan program will be implemented. Under Plan B, 1990 cotton crop pledged as collateral for a price support loan may be repaid at the lower of the adjusted world price (AWP) or the loan level.

The AWP is determined for the base quality. It will be adjusted on the basis of quality and location using the 1990-crop price support program scheduled of premiums and discounts for grade and staple, discounts for micronaire, location differential and any coarse count adjustmnt in effect for the week in which the loan payment occurs.



Editor: It is in desperation that I write this letter to you in hopes that you can help me. I'm a 33year-old inmate in the Indiana Department of Corrections. Since my father died, I don't have any family. The "friends" I once had only stayed around while the times were good, so I don't have anyone writing or visiting me.

I've ben incarcerated since February 1983. In the past seven years, I've written to different people, anyone who I felt might remember some bond of friendship, but night after night passes without any response. I've been forgotten and it really hurts.

Quite honestly, this is a terrible and lonely place. Seeing other men around me getting letters or visits from family and friends makes it even lonelier for me. At times it's really depressing to be so alone. I am so lonely and it would mean so much if I had someone to correspond with and share things with.

I am a white male, 6 feet, 180 pounds and divorced. I am fair complected with light brown hair and blue eyes. I'm slim, muscular built and I'm easy going with a pleasant personalty. I enjoy dancing, swimming, music, camping and playing the guitar. To fight stress and stay in shape, I lift weights and jog as time allows.

Since I've been here, I have completed welding school at the vocational college here. Now I'm enrolled in the industrial maintenance associates degree program. I also take courses through Indiana University by correspondence

I'm not incarcerted for any hideous crime. I had a problem with drugs but with counseling, I've ovrcome that and realize my foolish mistake. I'm just trying my best to put my life in order again.

I hope you can find it in your heart to publish my letter somewhere in your paper. Perhaps it would spark an interest in

someone, anyone who may have known the pain of loneliness. I regret I cannot afford to pay for publishing because I only earn \$10 a month while going to school.

I want to thank you for your time and consideration. This is my only hope of reaching anyone, and I promise to promptly answer any and all who respond to my plea. Greg Smith #31429

By Gladys O'Neal The chrysanthemums are not yet fully blooming, but they will soon set fall gardens ablaze with color. All they require is adequate water to prolong their majestic blooming period.

It's time to start thinking about planting spring flowering bulbs when available. Mass the colors for effective display in a large area. If you plant tulips, a good combination is lavender "Cum Laude" and pink "Perry Como."

Some favorite small bulbs are the various colors of crocus. Be sure and follow the instrucitons carefully concerning depth of planting and refrigeration before planting.

Prepare the soil thoroughly; add liberal qualities of bone meal and peat moss. If possible, plant bulbs on a cushion of sand for best drainage.

It's time to dig, divide and replant perennials. They need time to get established and develop roots for early spring growth. Poppies, larkspur and cornflower seeds need sufficient cold, usually freezing, to break the rest period. Pulverize and moisten the seed bed; cover the seeds lightly and press around them with a board or hoe back. Water well with a light mist. Keep your beds well watered, for plants need to enter winter dormancy in top physical condition.







Haskell man heads national company

Bill D. Stewart has been named president of Thompson & Formby Inc. of Memphis, Tenn. He is the son of Ernest Stewart of Haskell.

He replaces Ken Evans, who was promoted to group vice president of Thompson & Formby's parent company, Lehn & Fink. Lehn & Fink is the consumer products division of Sterling Drug Inc.

Thompson & Formby manufactures Thompson-brand weatherproofing products and Formby-brand wood-refinishing products. The company employs about 300 people at its plant in Olive Branch, Miss., and at the Memphis corporate office.

Stewart, 47, has been vice president of sales for Thompson & Formby for the past four years. He previously spent 16 years with Richardson-Vicks, manufacturer of such consumer brands as NyQuil, Oil of Olay and the Vicks line of cough and cold products.

Thompson & Formby is in the middle of two expansion projects.

A \$3.9 million, 100,000-squarefoot addition to the Olive Branch plant is partially complete, and construction has begun on a \$5.3 million plant and warehouse on the Olvie Branch site that will produce Red Devil enamel coatings and wood finishings.

Thompson & Formby acquired Red Devil last May from Insilco Co. The plant should be completed by June, Stewart said, and will employ up to 100 additional people.

Thompson & Formby has annual sales of between \$150 million and \$200 million. Stewart said the company has grown at a 35-percent annual rate during the past four years in an industry market that has grown just 5 percent.

The unemployment rate in Haskell County in August was 4.1 percent, well below the state rate of 7.2 percent and the "Abilene area" rate of 7.4.

Figures released by the Texas Employment Commission showed 138 from Haskell County out of work from a labor force of 3,357, meaning that 3,219 are employed.


The total number of unemployed Texans was 607,700. The state lost more than 5,000 nonfarm salaried jobs in the past year, primarily because of of their nature.


Unemployment rates in neighboring counties included:

Of the state's 27 major metropolitan areas, Bryan-College Station had the lowest rate at 4.9 percent; followed by Lubbock at 5.6, Amarillo and Sherman-Denison each at 5.8 and Austin and San Angelo each with 6.0.

Highest rates were recorded in McAllen-Edinburg-Mission, 17.7; Brownsville-Harlingen, 13.2; Laredo, 11.3; El Paso, 10.5; and Beaumont-Port Arthur, 9.3.






