The recording is for the purpose of giving information only, and can not be used for excuses or exemptions.

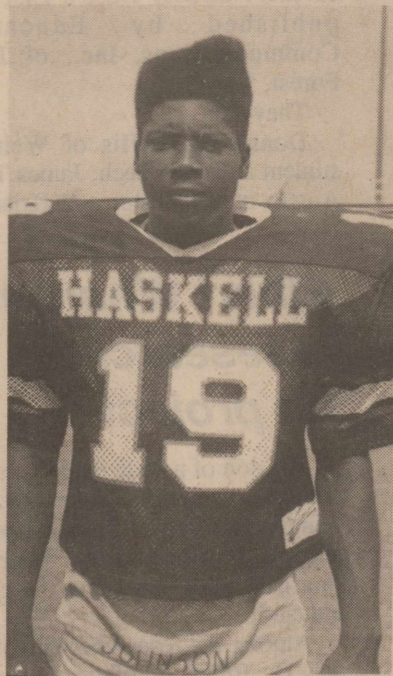
Mrs. Reynolds said it is sometimes impossible to contact all jurors by telephone when a change occurs and jurors need to be notified.

Rainfall lags behind normal

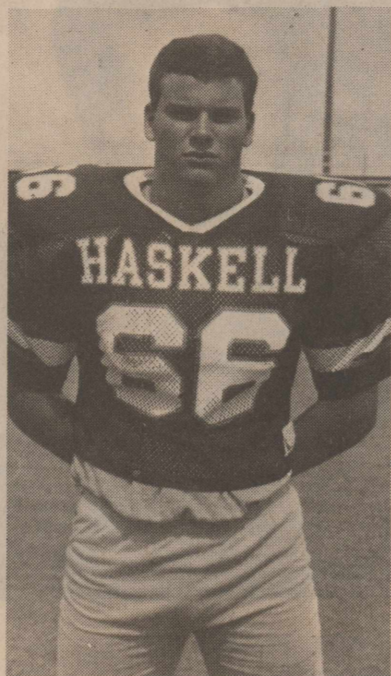
Rainfall in Haskell during the first 11 months of 1989 was nearly one-third below normal.

Sam Herren, official weather recorder, said the 11-month total stood at 16.46 inches, compared with a normal 23.24. Only .02 of an inch fell during the month.

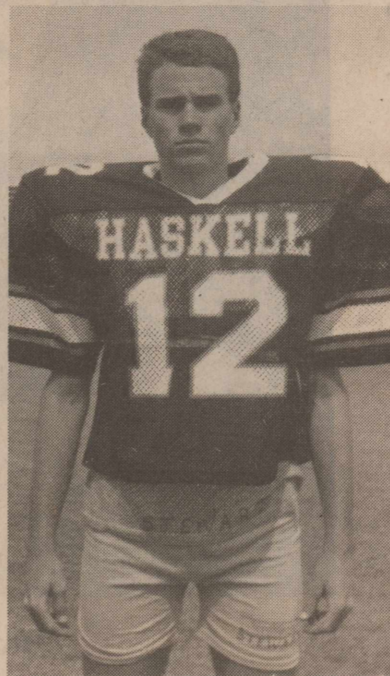
Temperatures in November ranged from a low of 28 degrees on Nov. 23 to a high of 86 on Nov. 6.

All-district Three Indians on first team

Rodney Johnson, Roger Roewe and Harper Stewart of the Haskell Indians were placed on the 1989 all-district football team announced this week by 7-2A coaches.

Johnson and Roewe each made both the offensive and defensive all-district teams.

Johnson, a 5'-9", 180-pound fullback and linebacker, was a unanimous selection on the defensive team. Stewart, 5'-11", 150 pounds, was a unanimous selection as a split receiver on the offensive team. Roewe, 6'-0", 200

pounds, earned honors as a lineman on both offense and defense.

Only other Indian player to receive mention was Jeremy Fuentes, who was on the second team as a defensive back.

Winning the Fighting Heart award from the Indians was Davis Chapman. One player from each school is selected for this award, which honors the player who contributes most to his team in spirit and competitiveness.

Denney Faith, who led Albany to the district championship, was named Coach of the Year.

Haskell dentist returns from India

A month ago, Dr. Cliff Ray didn't know much about Bangalore, India. And Bangalore didn't know much about him.

But today, the Haskell dentist has a first-hand knowledge of Bangalore, and a good many of the 5 million citizens of that third world city know something about him.

He returned Nov. 19 from a 10-day assignment where he "helped a lot of people, had a lot of fun and met a lot of nice people."

He volunteered to go there and provide dental services to the poverty-stricken residents of that Indian city. He paid his own expenses, including his traveling costs.

In Bangalore, he was assigned to a hospital. The people came in off the streets to get dental services. For those who couldn't pay, the service was free. And this was just about everybody since 90 percent of the people in India are illiterate and 70 percent of the country's 800

million inhabitants live on less than \$1.50 a week.

While the Haskell dentist feels good about the service he was able to provide, his most lasting experience was the observance of the people in the primitive country. "They are just super people," he said, "even though they have nothing."

"The people are real warm and they make you feel like you did something good for them," Dr. Ray said. "I never felt uncomfortable walking the streets of the city, although the poverty was unbelievable."

Dr. Ray volunteered to go to Bangalore after he contacted the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board and expressed a desire to offer his services in a remote area of the world. He did not request India, but he was pleased when he learned of a chance to go to Bangalore.

He left here Nov. 10, flying to Abilene, then to Dallas, New York,

Seven county offices to be decided in primary

Filing period remains open through Jan. 2

Filing period opened Monday for candidates for seven county offices which will be determined in next year's Democratic primary election. It will remain open through Jan. 2.

County offices to be decided in the 1990 primary are: commissioner of precinct 2, commissioner of precinct 4, county clerk, county treasurer, county judge, justice of peace of precinct 1 and district clerk.

Candidates for these offices must file with county Democratic chairman Sharon Mullino by 6 p.m. Jan. 2. They may file in person or by mail, but the completed filing documents must be in the hands of the county chairman by the deadline.

Applications are available from Mrs. Mullino or from the county clerk.

The first contested primary race to develop is one for the office of county clerk where incumbent Woodrow Frazier is being opposed by former county clerk Rhonda Moeller. Although neither had filed as of mid-morning Tuesday, both had notified The Free Press they are running.

Four other incumbents have

announced their intention to file. This group includes C. A. Turnbow, commissioner of precinct 4; Ronnie Chapman, commissioner of precinct 2; Willie Faye Tidrow, county treasurer; and Carolyn Reynolds, district clerk.

Other incumbents whose offices

are up for election include B. O. Roberson, county judge, and Roy T. Everett, justice of peace.

The 1990 primary will be held March 13. The runoff will be April 10. The general election will be Nov. 6.

Perry to seek state ag office

Calling for a return of the agency to its traditional role, State Rep. Rick Perry of Haskell announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination as state agriculture commissioner in a press conference in Austin Wednesday.

The Haskell legislator promised to provide the leadership in a campaign of reform and mainstream values.

"I am running because Texas farmers and ranchers deserve to have

one of their own as agriculture commissioner," said Perry. "I am a fifth generation rancher and farmer. I will be the first agriculture commissioner in 40 years who is from agriculture, of agriculture and for agriculture."

Perry emphasized his conservative philosophy, as opposed to incumbent Democratic commissioner Jim Hightower's well-known liberal philosophies.

In business decoration competition, first place went to the Aladdin House. Boggs and Johnson

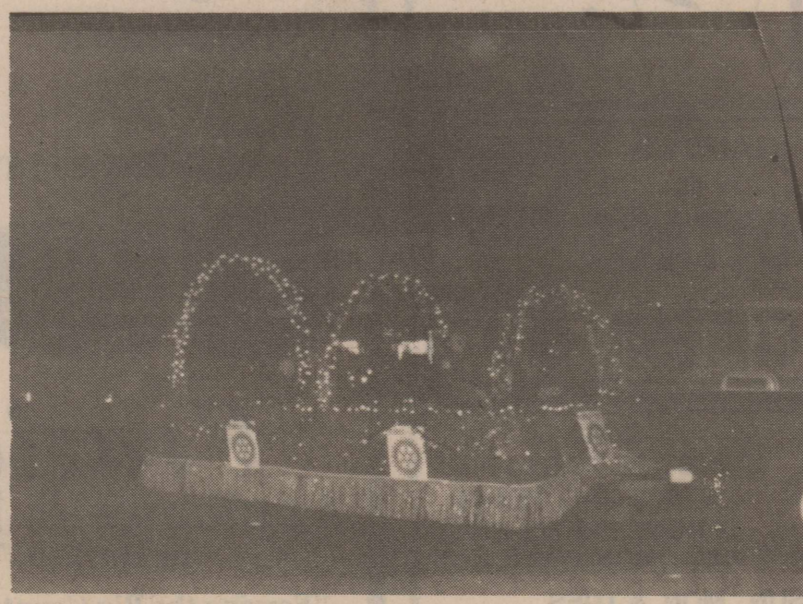
was second and The Hayloft took third place.

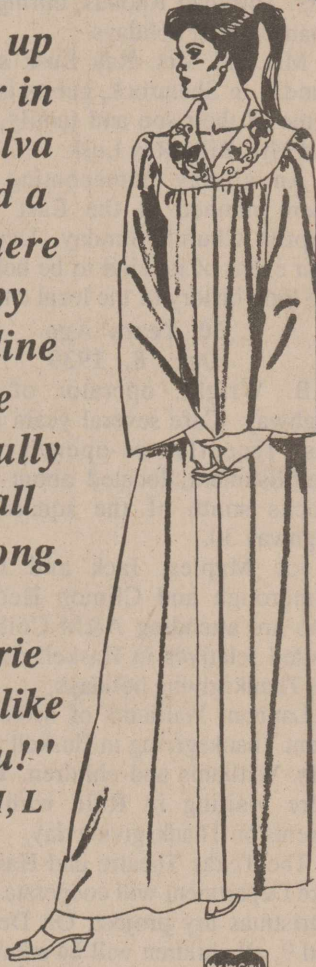

Millions took part in Smokeout

According to a nationwide telephone survey of 1,201 men and women aged 18 and over, the Gallup organization estimates that the 1989 Great American Smokeout results were as follows:

+35.9 percent of the nation's 50 million smokers participated in the Smokeout. The total number was 17.9 million.

A good part of his announcement had to do with attacks on the present agriculture commissioner.

He mentioned a number of the alleged improprieties which have recently come to light, including credit card abuse and payment to the son-in-law of the state AFL-CIO president for a report of questionable value.

Although Perry's remarks were zeroed in on Hightower, he first must win the Republican primary before contesting Hightower in the general election, assuming Hightower is re-nominated. Two other Republicans, Ken Boatright of Hamilton and Gene Duke of Brownfield, have announced they will run in the primary.

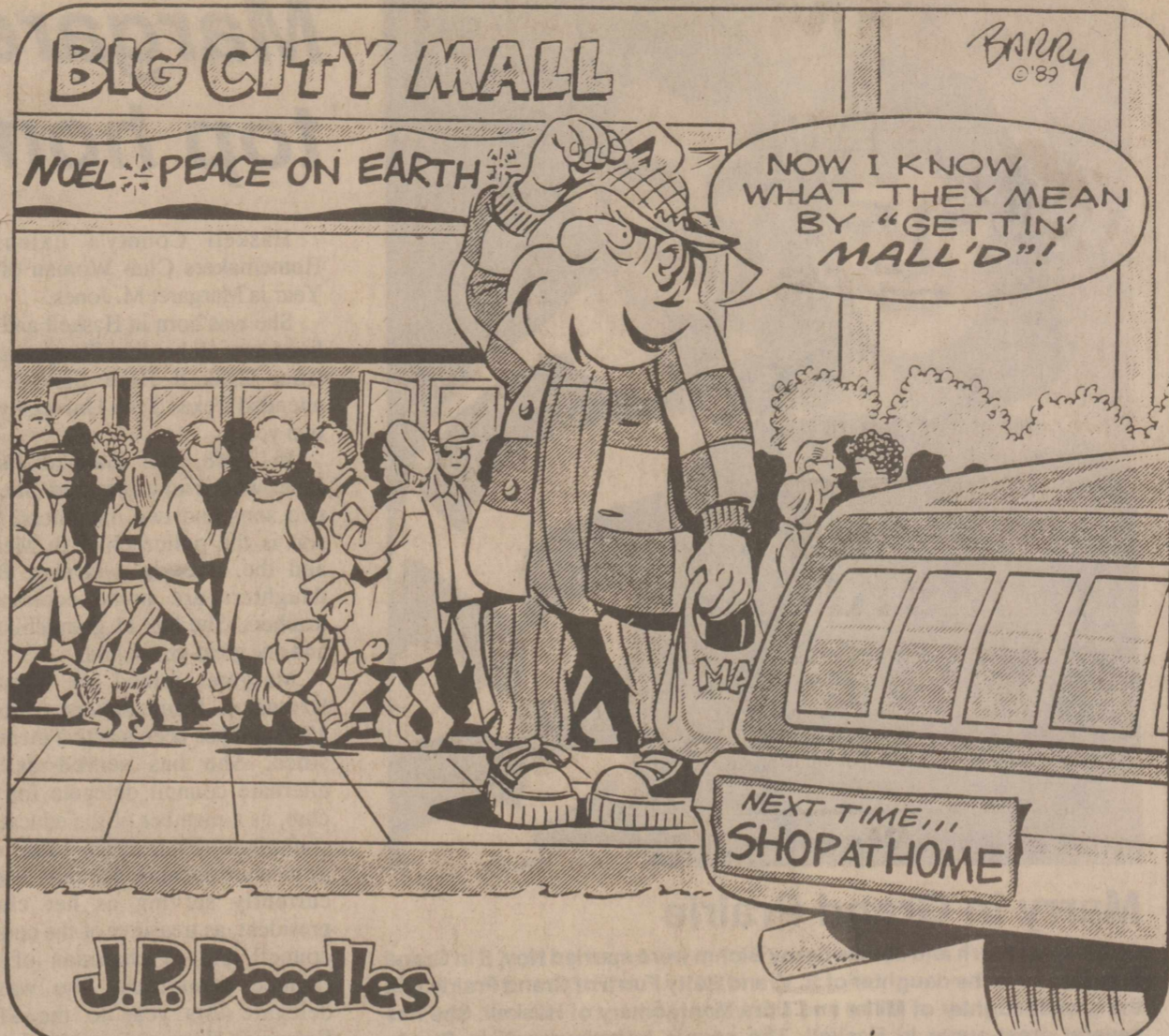
Indians, Maidens off and running

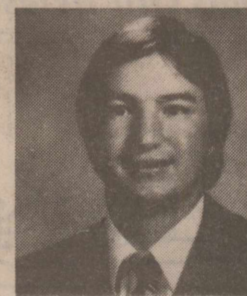

TAX ESTIMATES

Tax estimates are quarterly payments of the total tax you expect to owe for the year. These payments are due April 15, June 15, September 15 and the following January 15. Tax estimates are generally required if you expect to owe at least \$500 when you file your return.

Most individuals pay their taxes via wage withholdings. Because they generally have the flexibility to adjust the amount withheld during the year, these people do not usually need to concern themselves with tax estimates.

Estimated payments primarily apply to you if you have significant income from sources not subject to withholding; i.e., interest, dividends, capital gains, pensions and annuities, self-employment earnings, prizes and awards, unemployment compensation, and some Social Security benefits. Self-employed individuals must consider the self-employment tax as well as the income tax when calculating their estimate payments.

Ignorance is not bliss if you fail to make required estimate payments. The IRS will assess both penalties and interest on delinquent or insufficient estimate payments. These calculations are done separately for each quarter. Thus, overlapping for one quarter will not avoid the penalty for underpaying a previous quarter.

There are two ways to avoid the penalty on underpayment of tax. You can either pay in (through withholdings and/or estimates) 90% of your current year's income tax liability.

Recent retirees who have had withholding throughout their lives are usually not aware of the estimate requirements. If you are recently retired or receive significant income which is not subject to withholding, contact our office to determine if estimates are necessary.

Reminder: The final quarterly estimate for 1989 taxes is due January 15, 1990.

It makes about as much sense, and is just as informative as a lot of other surveys:

It is "The First Really Important Survey of American Habits." Done by Mel Poertz and Barry Sinrod of New York, it tells you everything you ever wanted to know about American behavior, but were too polite to ask.

For example, only seven percent of Americans admit looking behind a closed shower curtain when visiting a friend's house. Thirty-eight percent clean their belly buttons daily; 20 percent say they never do. Six out of 10 Americans say they would wear torn underwear.

But before the ink is dry on that report, one comes out by David Grimes of the New York Times News Service with these startling revelations:

+45 percent of Americans pick their nose while waiting at stop lights.

+89 percent of Americans prefer bad TV over good TV.

+53 percent of American men think there's nothing wrong with wearing brown shoes with a blue suit.

+69 percent of Americans think they're better looking than they really are.

+72 percent of Americans don't realize they dress funny.

+82 percent of American men say they like their wife's new hairdo when they really don't.

+58 percent of Americans talk with their mouth full.

+79 percent of Americans have moldy leftovers sitting in their refrigerator.

+81 percent of Americans like people to think they're busier than they really are.

+62 percent of Americans lean whichever way the wind blows.

+29 percent of Americans had it but lost it.

+47 percent of Americans bit off more than they can chew.

+71 percent of Americans didn't have anything to do with it.

+89 percent of Americans have heard that money can't buy happiness, but are willing to give it a try, anyway.

And on a different subject:
The People's Religion: American Faith in the 90's by pollster George Gallup Jr. tells us that nine in 10 Americans say they have never doubted the existence of God, 88 percent believe God loves them, nine in 10 pray and eight in 10 believe they will face God on Judgment Day.

American Jews have the largest number of "unchurched" members--56 percent, says the author. But he cautions this figure may be misleading since many Jews identify as Jews ethnically, not religiously. "Unchurched" Americans are identified as those who are not members of a church or synagogue.

Among Christian groups, Methodists have the most unchurched members (32 percent), followed by Episcopalians and Baptists (28 percent), Lutherans (27 percent), Catholics (21 percent), Southern Baptists and Mormons (20 percent) and Presbyterians (17 percent).

Other revelations:
+One Roman Catholic woman in five prefers a lifestyle that does not include having children and Catholics today are more likely than Protestants to be childless.

+Presbyterians are more likely to say they are church members, but less likely to say they actually attended church in the past week.

+Americans who have no college education are more likely to believe in angels (58 percent) than are college graduates (42 percent).

The U.S. Postal Service is test marketing a self-adhesive postage stamp. There are 18 25-cent stamps in a folding sheet priced at 5 bucks. That's 50 cents above face value.

The Postal Service expects these stamps to appeal to customers willing to pay extra for the product. Further profits are expected from those who will buy the sheets and not use them.

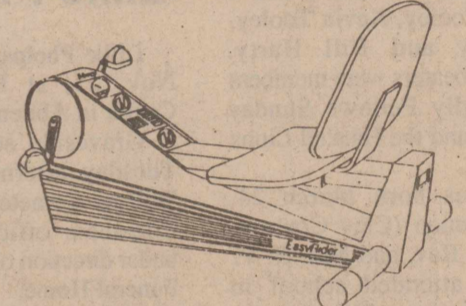

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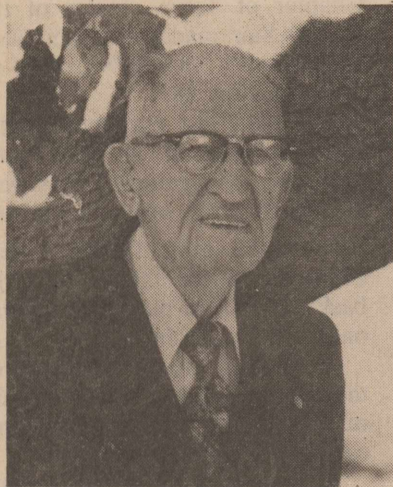

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Emergency loans offered by FmHA

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by drought conditions are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office in Haskell.

Haskell and Throckmorton counties are two of 31 Texas counties recently named by the secretary of agriculture as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought.

Larry McDaniel, FmHA supervisor, said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business, or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30-percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," McDaniel said. Farmers

participating in the PIK or federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from these programs in determining their losses.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until July 17, but farmers should apply as soon as possible," McDaniel said. "Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly run over into the new farming season."

The FmHA office in Haskell is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Funds available

The Texas Housing Agency has made available \$48 million in below-market home financing on to assist first-time homebuyers in their quest for home ownership.

Borrowers must purchase a house which has been foreclosed upon by a lender or acquired by the Texas Housing Agency.

The business session covered the final two days of the meeting. The last order of business was the election of True as president.

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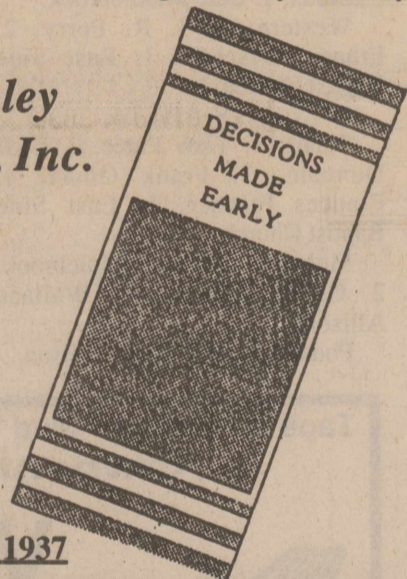
