A Look Back at the 1980s

The onset of the 1990s is a good time to take a look back at what suddenly has become part of our heritage: the 1980s.

America of the '80s was the Ronald Reagan era. The former California governor swept into the White House on a wave of patriotism in 1980 and didn't sweep out again until 1988, when his vice president, George Bush, became heir to the Reagan legacy.

During the '80s, America showed its strength as a peacetime nation. Through the Iranian hostage crisis, a failed assassination attempt on our president, the terrorist bombing in Beirut of the U.S. Marine barracks, the Challenger explosion, Hurricane Hugo and the San Francisco earthquake, the country stood together.

Women also stood together, and America took note. First for women in the '80s—Sandra Day O'Connor became the first female Supreme Court justice, and U.S. Rep. Geraldine Ferraro became the first woman vice presidential candidate to run on a major party presidential ticket.

In the music world, Madonna became the first woman to sell more than 5 million copies of an album, inspiring teen-age "wannabes" nationwide who imitated their idol's dress and attitude. Other musicians rising to superstar status included the one-gloved, moonwalking "Thriller," Michael Jackson, and "Born in the U.S.A." Bruce Springsteen.

The motion picture industry had its biggest decade ever with box office smashes like "E.T.," the Indiana Jones trilogy, "Back to the Future," "Ghostbusters" and "Batman." Did we forget a movie? That's OK, because in the '80s, VCRs allowed everyone to catch the ones they missed at theaters in the comfort of their own homes.

And the '80s saw scandals galore. Televangelists fell from grace. U.S. Sen. Gary Hart retired from the presidential primary after too much "Monkey Business." America couldn't decide if Oliver North was a villain or hero in the Iran-Contra affair. And "Black Monday," insider trading on Wall Street and the collapse of savings and loan institutions nationwide left America jittery about our financial future.

The decade also saw many notable anniversaries and birthdays. We celebrated 200 years of the Constitution. The Statue of Liberty turned 100. Mickey Mouse turned 60. Superman turned 50. And the 20th anniversary of Woodstock found many of the original "love-in" participants in the role they most loathed in 1969—the starched-shirt executive.

These "baby boomers" were turning 40 and raising families of their own. As their children played with Cabbage Patch dolls, Nintendo and Transformers, and watched MTV, they played with personal computers, compact disc players and car phones. And "microwavable" was becoming synonymous with "home cooking."

Life was not all that simple in America in the 1980s. We faced record homelessness, the spread of AIDS and a growing problem with drugs. But as the '80s drew to a close, superpowers leaders U.S. President George Bush and Soviet General Secretary Mikhail Gorbachev met in Malta. Their historic "summit at sea" reminded Americans that we remain the model of freedom in a fast-changing world that recently witnessed the fall of the Berlin Wall and the collapse of communist governments across Eastern Europe.

As we ring in the new decade, that freedom remains the most important part of our heritage. ll

Lane-Felker holdup recalled

(Last Saturday, Dec. 23, marked the 30th anniversary of the robbery of Lane Felker. The following story was reported in the Dec. 31, 1959, issue of The Free Press.)

A 35-year-old ex-convict was apprehended in Abilene shortly before noon Saturday, less than 48 hours after he had robbed the Lane-Felker ladies apparel store here at gunpoint, held a young woman hostage briefly in a stolen automobile, then eluded scores of officers after abandoning the stolen car.

The hold-up man, identified as William Raymond Daugherty of Electra, was arrested at a rooming

house in Abilene by Taylor County Sheriff J. D. Woodard and Abilene police officers.

Returned to Haskell by Sheriff Pennington, Deputy Moreland Glass and Haskell Chief of Police Barnett, Daugherty, who had served prison sentences for murder and for theft, readily admitted the hold-up and theft of an automobile belonging to Jack Pippin, Haskell druggist. In taking the car, Daugherty forced Mrs. Peggy Jones, employee of Pippin's Haskell Pharmacy, to remain in the car until he had driven about two blocks before allowing her to get out of the vehicle. Daugherty told officers his home was in Electra.

Daugherty was charged with armed robbery in two complaints

100 years Masons celebrate centennial

A centennial birthday was observed Dec. 9 by Haskell Lodge No. 682 AF&AM with a large crowd in attendance.

Officers introduced were District Deputy grand masters: Robert Home of district 8, Lonnie Boggs of district 75, Boddy Dunn of district 88, Lyndle Reeves of district 91; Grand Senior Deacon James F. Brumit of Dallas, Grand Tiler Leon Saul of Mineral Wells, Grand Chaplain James W. Jones of Wichita Falls and Grand Master A. D. Hanna of Wichita Falls.

First meeting was on Jan. 16, 1889, on the northeast corner of the square in the top part of the old W. M. Harvey building, which was the first brick building built in Haskell and still stands today.

The lodge met here until June 1891 when it went together with the Haskell National Bank in building a two-story building south of the square where it met until January 1892 when the building burned. (Haskell National Bank rebuilt, using the same brick.)

Masons then went to the east side of the square, meeting in the old S. E. Frost building which no longer stands. They moved to the west side of the square to the Fields Brothers building in April 1893, and then moved to a building located across from Pogue Grocery in 1906 and stayed there until 1964 when they moved to the present building at 608 S. 1st Street.

Recommended by Anson Lodge No. 575, the first Master of the Lodge while it was under dispensation was J. W. Evans. District Deputy Grand Master C. K. Strivling presented them with their charter on Dec. 8, 1889, with S. W. Scott as Master of the lodge with 32 members. Officers were elected Jan. 16, 1890. Haskell Lodge recommended Rainer Lodge on May 10, 1890, Munday Lodge on Dec. 29, 1900, and Rule Lodge on March 25, 1907.

A mystery to this day is what happened to the cornerstone in the old Haskell National Bank building when it burned. The cornerstone was retrieved from the building at a cost of \$20 (a considerable sum of money at the time), placed in a crate which was built for it and then disappeared. To this day, its whereabouts remain unknown.

Following a short history of the lodge, given by secretary H. B. Berry, Past Masters present were recognized: Harvey Simmons, Woody Frazier, Dr. J. G. Vaughter, Pete Mullins, Wallar Overton, Fred Brown, Gene Overton and H. B. Berry.

Grand Master A. D. Hanna addressed the group and presented a 100-year award in Masonry to the Haskell Lodge. The lodge meets the second Monday of each month at 7:30 p.m. and present Master of the lodge is Kenneth Patton.

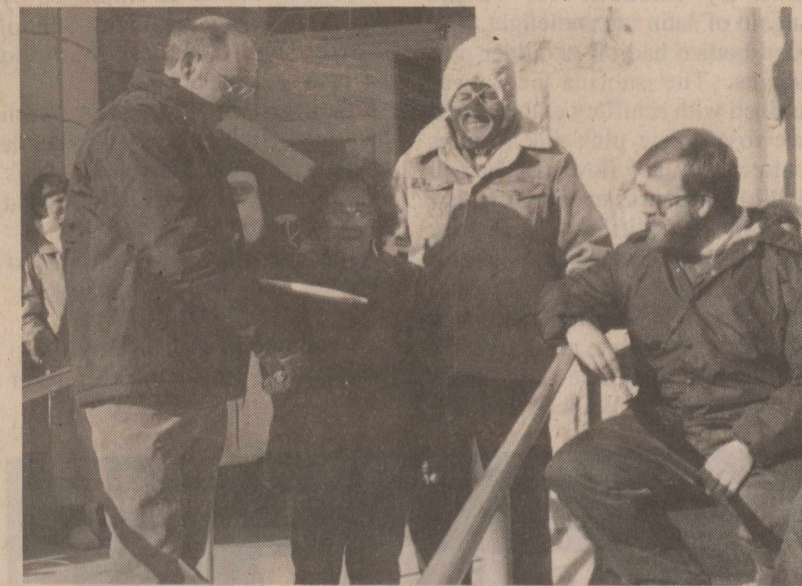

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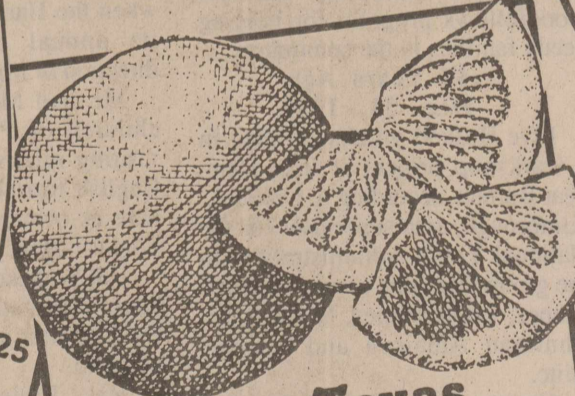

near Tuxedo, about 20 miles southeast of Haskell, where 50 or more lawmen had converged after the stolen car had been found abandoned there. He said officers' spotlights hit him several times but he fell to the ground to avoid being seen.

Daugherty related that he finally crawled under Fairview Methodist Church, within a hundred yards of an officer's car, about 4 a.m. and spent the remainder of the night and all day Thursday there, later making his way cross country and down the Fort Worth and Denver Railway tracks to Anson where he spent that night in a motel.

Early Saturday he started to Abilene. When he got to the E. T. Vincent farm home near Hawley about 9:30 a.m. he told Vincent he had wrecked his car on a dirt road and wanted a ride to Abilene.

The farmer said the man looked muddy and battered, and agreed to drive him to Abilene. After they had left, Mrs. Vincent recalled the newspaper description of the hold-up man fitted that of the stranded motorist, and notified the Taylor County sheriff's office. Later, the Hawley man directed officers to the point where he had let the man out of his car in Abilene and Daugherty's arrest followed quickly.

Robbery of the Lane-Felker store occurred around 8:30 p.m. Wednesday, and was un-noticed by persons passing the brightly lighted, glass-front store.

Owners of the concern, Mrs. R. A. Lane and her sister, Mrs. W. V. Felker, were in the rear of the store talking over Christmas plans after all the clerks had gone home, unaware that the front door of the store was unlocked. As they started toward the front they met the unmasked robber near the store's main office near the center of the building. Holding an automatic pistol in his hand, he ordered Mrs. Lane and Mrs. Felker to show him where the safe was located.

Telling the bandit he had just walked past the safe, that it was standing open just behind him, he then demanded they open the money compartment. They informed him that the bookkeeper had the key and they could not open it. The hold-up victims suggested they could telephone the bookkeeper. However, a cash register in the center of the store caught the eye of the robber.

He left the women in the office, warning them to stay away from the phone while he tried to open the cash register. Failing to open it immediately, he brought it back to the office.

He ordered the women into a small room adjoining the office where he set the register on a counter piled with gift-wrapped packages.

At this time, Mrs. Felker's 10-year-old son, Walter Viars, and a companion, Riley Couch, also 10, came into the store. As one of the youngsters started to say something, the robber, menacing his gun, ordered the boys to "get back" and stay with the women.

Unsuccessful in another try at opening the register, he slammed it to the floor and the money drawer flew open. The bandit then took all the currency, about \$200, from the register, leaving checks and small change.

Warning his victims not to "try anything" he tucked the gun in his belt and zipped up his jacket before

leaving the office and going out the front door of the store. He went around the north side of the building and down the alley.

About that time half a block away at Haskell Pharmacy, Owner Jack Pippin had asked an employee, Mrs. Peggy Jones, 19, to go to the alley behind the store and drive his car, a 1954 Buick, to the front of the pharmacy.

Just as Mrs. Jones reached the car, she heard someone running. Looking around, she was confronted by the man, brandishing a pistol. He ordered her into the car, as he pointed the gun toward her.

She followed his orders. The man started the car and whipped down the alley into the street turning north on Avenue F, while Mrs. Jones begged and pleaded that he let her out. Turning west on North 2nd, he stopped near the Vaughter Clinic and let her out, then raced west in the car.

Mrs. Jones, frightened and shaken by the ordeal, ran back to the drug store and related what had happened. In the meantime, Mrs. Lane and Mrs. Felker had called officers.

Pippin also reported the kidnapping and theft of his car, which bore a special amateur radio operator's license plate.

All local officers immediately started a search for the bandit, and area officers were alerted and given a description of the hold-up man and the stolen car.

Highway Patrolman Elmer Terrell, stationed at Anson, heard the pickup broadcasts and met the speeding robber on FM 1661 near Tuxedo, a few miles south of the Haskell County line. He turned around in pursuit of the car.

Minutes later, Patrolman Terrell came upon the stolen car abandoned in a field beside the highway, with the bandit gone. Other officers quickly reached the scene, and between 50 and 60 lawmen combed the area during the night in an unsuccessful search for the robber. The gun used in the hold-up, a .22 caliber automatic target pistol, was found about 50 yards from the abandoned car.

After his arrest, Daugherty told officers he "bailed out" of the still-moving car after turning into the field. Scratches on his face, and a slightly wrenched left knee resulted when he fell after leaping from the car, he told officers.

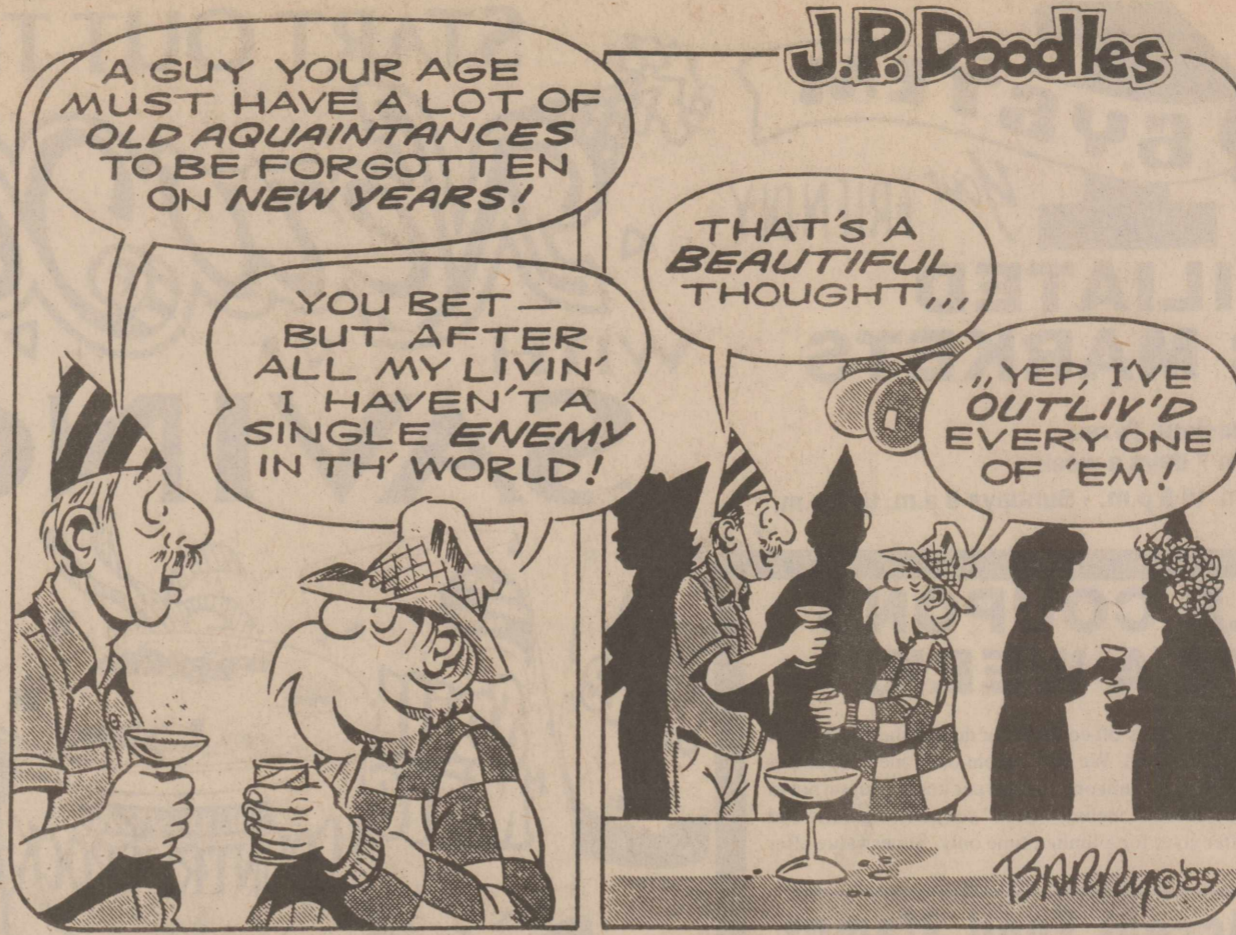

The Haskell Brass Band went to Goree last Friday, and played several concerts. The occasion was the sale of town lots at that place.

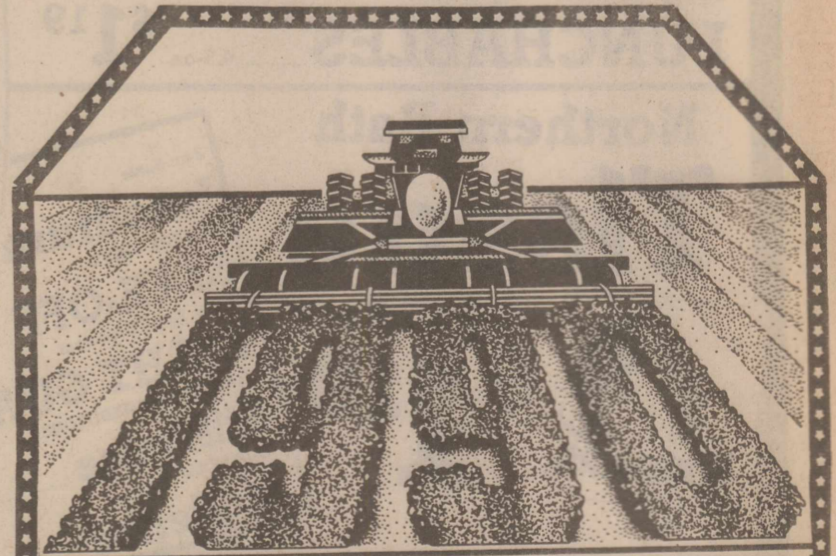

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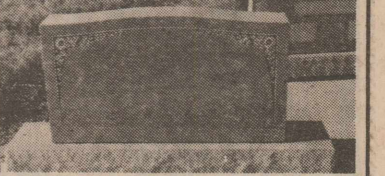
