City Council to meet tonight

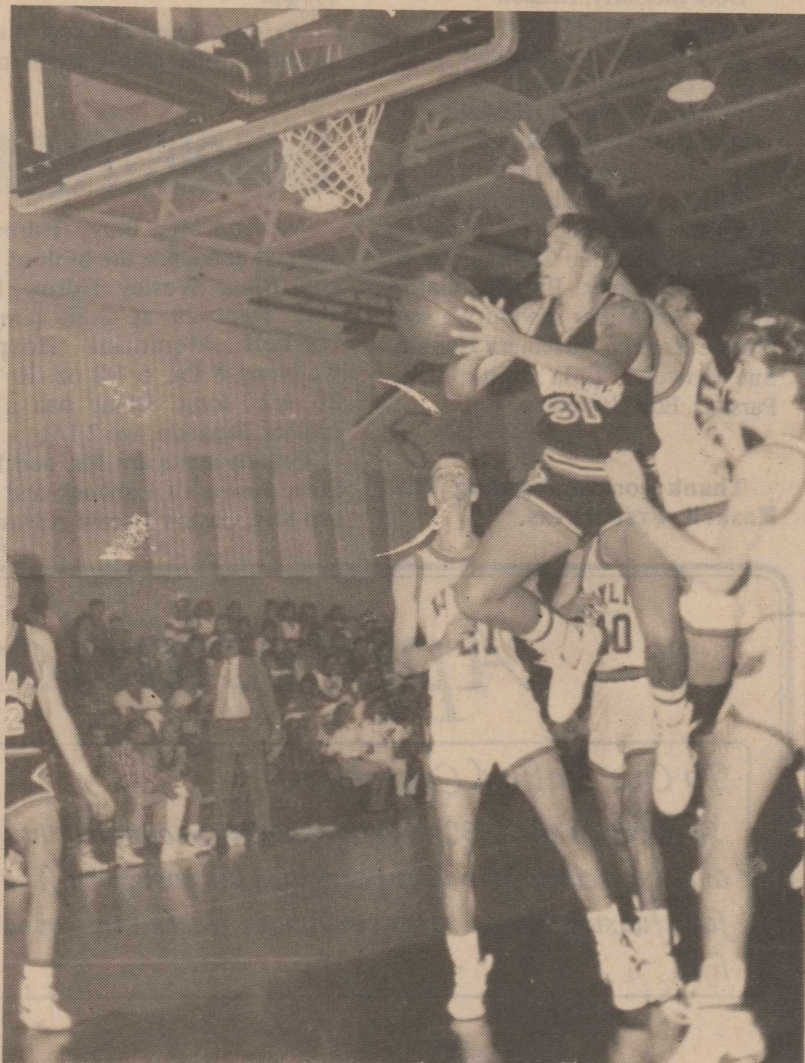
The Haskell City Council will consider a resolution on the park grant application when it meets tonight (Thursday).

Basketball teams eye district titles

Haskell Indian and Maiden basketball teams can wrap up the first-half district championships over the next few days with victories over Hamlin and Hawley.

They will meet Hamlin here Friday and will travel to Hawley next Tuesday (Jan. 16) to close out the first round of 7-2A play.

Both the Indians and the Maidens boast 4-0 records against district competition.

Second-half play in the district begins Jan. 19 when the local teams host Stamford. It ends at Hawley on Feb. 9.

The Haskell teams brought their district marks to 4-0 last Friday

with victories over Albany teams. The Indians won, 79-49, while the Maidens prevailed, 47-40.

Four Indians scored in double figures as they forged a 19-11 first-period lead, stretched it to 39-26 by halftime and then outscored the Lions 40-22 in the second half.

James Rike's 24 points paced the attack, while Harper Stewart pitched in 21. Shane Osborne scored 13 and Rusty Stocks had 10.

The Maidens went up by 8 points, 17-11, in the first period and maintained a lead of about that margin the rest of the way.

Top scorer was Missy Davis with 14, followed by Sheila Unger with 12.

No. 8 Indians get state ranking

The Haskell Indians, in midst of one of their best seasons ever, were ranked No. 8 among state 2A

schools this week in the first weekly Texas Association of Basketball Coaches poll of the season.

Coach Randy Stone's Warriors have won 13 games in a row while posting a 17-1 record. Their only loss was to 3A Merkel back on Dec. 1. Last year, when the Indians got to the regional finals before losing in the playoffs, they had a 15-3 mark after the first 18 games.

Top 2A team in Texas, according to the coaches' poll, is Farwell (15-1), the team which defeated the Indians in the regional finals last spring.

Abernathy, at No 5, was the only West Texas team, besides Haskell and Farwell, listed in the top 10.

No area team girls' team was listed in the top 10 of the coaches' poll, although West Texas was represented by Abernathy (second), and Wall (sixth).

The Wylie girls, who have defeated Haskell twice this season, claimed the No. 1 spot among the 3A teams. The Paducah boys were No. 3 in 1A and the Graham boys No. 9 in 3A.

Businesses eligible for loans

The U.S. Small Business Administration is accepting applications for economic injury disaster loans (EIDL) from eligible small business concerns and small agricultural cooperatives (without credit elsewhere) located in Haskell County and 38 other Texas counties.

The Secretary of Agriculture made a disaster designation as a result of adverse weather and in some counties rangefires which occurred in 1989.

Businesses in the affected counties have until July 17 to file applications with SBA. Applicants must have sustained substantial economic injury because of agriculture damages caused by the specified adverse weather or rangefires. Farmers and ranchers are not eligible for these loans. However, nurseries that are victims of drought disasters are eligible.

The EIDL program is intended to assist agriculture-dependent businesses and small agriculture cooperatives which sustained a substantial decrease in sales (or other forms of economic injury) directly due to losses incurred by farmers and ranchers to whom the business usually sells.

In some cases, this may include non-agriculture-related businesses which sustain a substantial economic loss directly due to the inability of the farmers affected by the disaster to purchase goods and services at their normal levels. Small businesses claiming to have been physically injured by the adverse weather or rangefires are not eligible for SBA economic injury loans.

The EIDL program is available only to businesses that are considered small by SBA size standards and do not have credit available from other sources. The interest rate for loans processed under this designation is 4 percent for small business concerns and small agricultural cooperatives without credit available elsewhere.

Loans are limited to the financial needs of the applicant based on the actual economic injury and may be made for up to \$500,000. A loan may extend to 30 years, depending on repayment ability.

Eligible victims seeking loan information and application forms may call 1-800-527-7735.

Tax rep to conduct seminar

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that a representative from his agency will be in Haskell on Tuesday (Jan. 16) to answer questions about Texas taxes and assist taxpayers with paperwork and problems.

"I don't want to see state taxes turn into a burden for folks who can't get to a field office," Bullock said. "Our visits are a service we're happy to provide to Texas taxpayers."

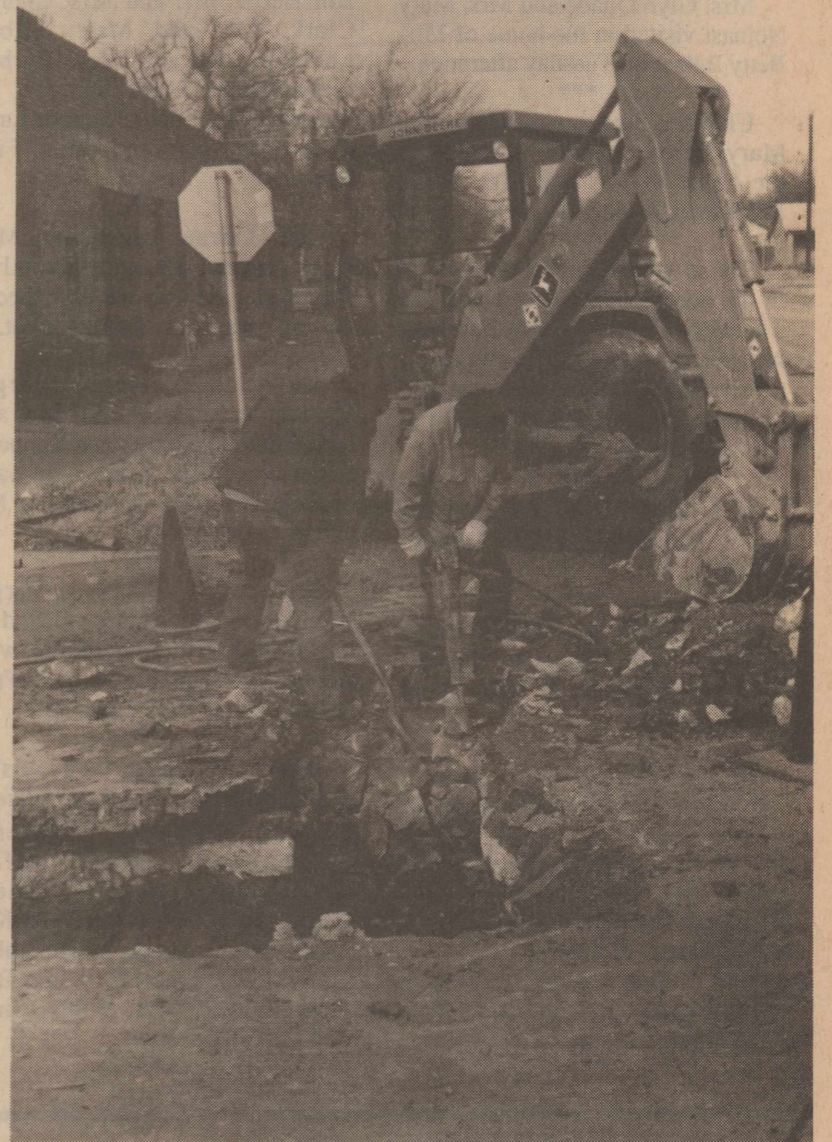

Water line repairs

City workmen are still repairing leaks in water lines caused by the severe weather the week before Christmas.

City stays busy fixing water leaks

City of Haskell work crews are still busy repairing the numerous water leaks in the city lines which occurred during the pre-Christmas cold spell.

City administrator Bob Baker said Tuesday that the repair work should be completed soon.

He said the sub-zero weather caused eight major leaks in lines of four inches or larger and about 20 leaks in lines of two inches or smaller.

For the most part, work has proceeded without having to cut off water to local residents. The water was turned off for a couple of hours

one day last week, and another cutoff was scheduled for late Tuesday.

Baker said some of the city water lines were installed in 1930, and while they are still in good condition, they can be easily broken by disturbance caused by freeze or by repair disturbance.

In addition to the city water lines, many homes in Haskell sustained broken water pipes during the spell.

The 6-below temperature Dec. 23 tied the all-time record low in Haskell. It was the lowest temperature ever in December

TAXES AND THE OLDER TAXPAYER

The tax law has some provisions that apply only to older taxpayers. One of these provisions affects those 55 or older, so that's a good age to begin your awareness of these special provisions.

Sale of Residence - Those who are age 55 or older who sell their residence (home, condominium, co-op) in which they have lived for at least three of the last five years may exclude up to \$125,000 of the gain on the sale. This is a once-in-a-lifetime election; give it careful consideration before you use it.

Standard Deduction - For 1989, the standard deduction is \$5,200 for joint filers and \$3,100 for singles. In addition, joint filers can add \$600 to the standard deduction if one spouse is over 65 (\$1,200 if both are over 65) and \$600 if one spouse is blind (\$1,200 if both are blind). Single-filers' additional amounts are \$750 for age 65 and \$750 for blindness. Tax law considers you to be 65 on the day before your 65th birthday. Thus, those who turn 65 on January 1, 1990, will qualify as 65 or over for 1989, entitling them to the additional standard deduction amount (\$600 joint, \$750 single).

Social Security Benefits - Social Security benefits are nontaxable unless one-half of the benefits plus income from all other sources (including tax-exempt interest) exceeds \$32,000 for joint filers or \$25,000 for singles. The amount of Social Security benefits subject to tax will not exceed 50%.

The Medicare surtax has been repealed. Taxpayers eligible for Medicare benefits were to pay a surtax of 15% of their regular 1989 tax liability up to a maximum of \$800 (\$1,600 joint). The 1989 tax forms were printed before the surtax was repealed. So you should ignore the 1989 tax return instructions on calculating and paying the surtax.

Insurance remains good on borrowed car

Texas' personal automobile liability insurance policies fully cover them when they are driving borrowed or rented vehicles, the State Board of Insurance says. The regulatory agency issued the statement to eliminate confusion over compliance with Texas' mandatory car automobile liability insurance law.

It has come to the agency's attention that many people with valid coverage have been ticketed and convicted for driving without insurance while operating borrowed vehicles.

"A personal automobile policy providing the minimum amount of liability insurance required by law is equally valid whether the policyholder is driving his or her own car or one borrowed from someone else," said Dan Collins, director of the State Board's Automobile and Miscellaneous Lines Division.

Problems have arisen when drivers presented their personal auto policy or proof of insurance card while driving a vehicle other than the one identified on their insurance papers. In some instances, police officers and judges have determined that this was insufficient as proof that the borrowed vehicle was covered.

The standard Texas Personal Auto Policy explicitly states that the insured is covered whenever he or she has an accident--without limiting coverage to the particular

Returning again this year will be Mel Tillis who has recently announced his retirement.

Other stars committed for this special 20th anniversary telecast include Rex Allen, Rex Allen Jr., The Moonmaids Plus One, Dawnett Faucett and The Reinsmen.

This special benefit has raised in excess of \$1 million for the West Texas Rehabilitation Center each of the last four years.

The center has an annual operating budget of over \$7 million. About 48 percent of the center's income is from insurance reimbursement, etc.. The remaining 52 percent comes from gifts from more than 80,000 donors.

The center provides its services without charge to patients and their families other than for hearing aids and braces.

During 1989, the 12,000 handicapped children and adults served by the center came from 110 counties in Texas, as well as surrounding states.

The West Texas Rehabilitation Center was established in 1953 and now has full service out-patient

facilities in Abilene and San Angelo.

Again this year, tickets for Rehab '90 will be \$10 each. There are no reserved seats. Tickets will be available the week of Jan. 8 at WTRC and the Abilene Civic Center.

Ask VA

Q: I am a woman veteran. Can I obtain gender-related medical treatment at a VA facility?

A: Yes, provided you meet the general eligibility requirements for medical care. Women veteran coordinators have been designated at each VA medical center and at many regional offices to counsel women veterans seeking treatment.

Q: May the current monthly rate of VA benefits received by a veteran be disclosed to a third party?

A: Yes. The monthly amount of benefits is considered public

information. However, information concerning the veteran's disabilities cannot be released without the veteran's prior consent.

Q: Will the VA release my new address to my estranged wife?

A: No. Your address is privileged information and may not be released to anyone without your permission.

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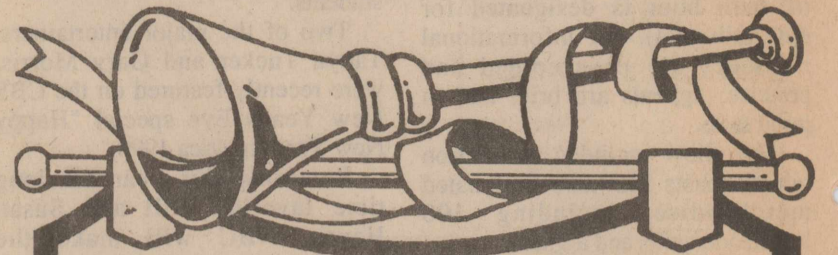
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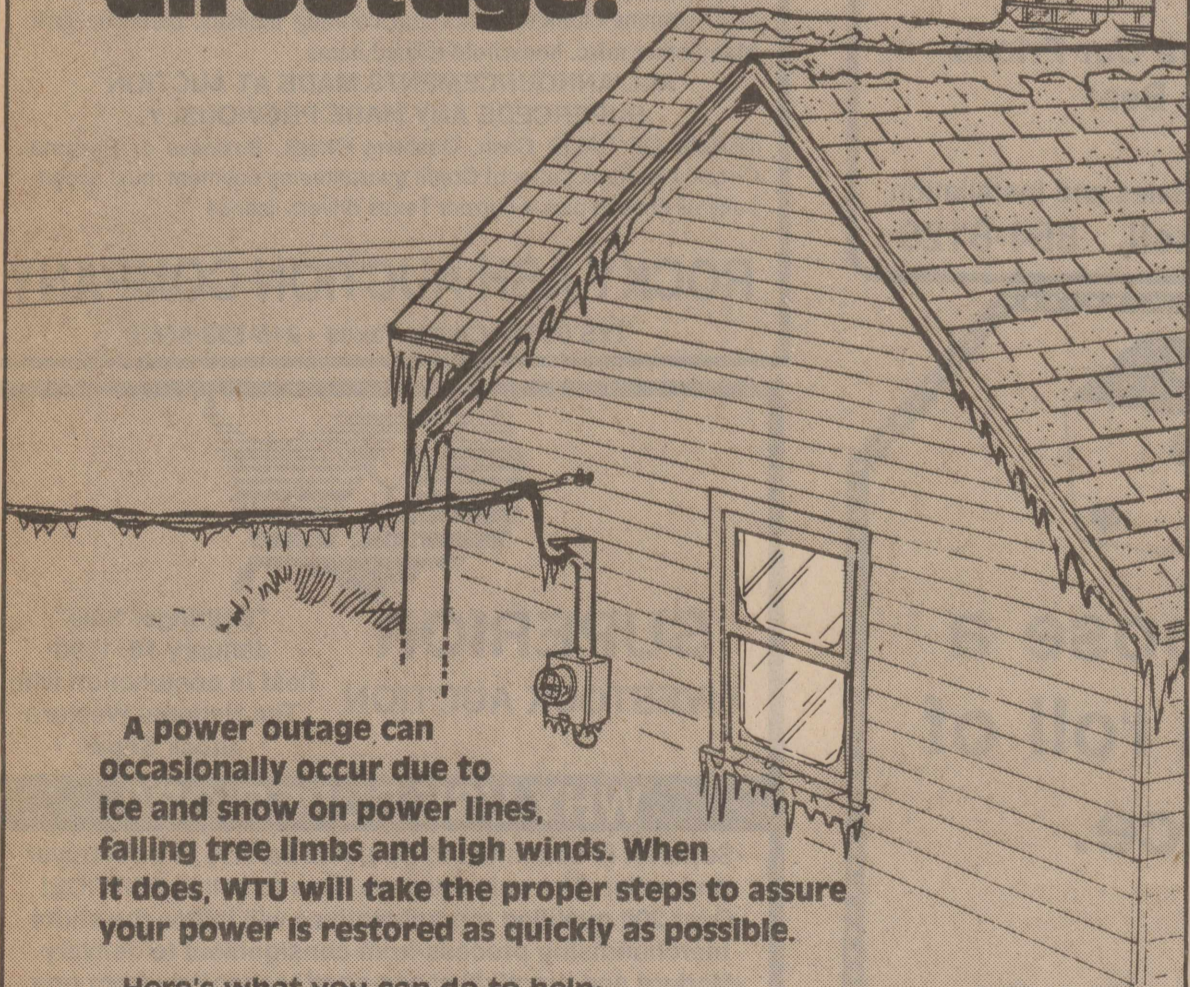
