WTU pays big tax bill in county

West Texas Utilities Company paid \$357,241 in ad valorem taxes in Haskell County for 1989.

Mike Martindale, WTU local manager in Haskell, said major recipients include five school districts, dividing \$198,219, and county government which received \$94,767. Cities and towns in the county received \$5,298 from taxes with the other taxing entities receiving the balance.

Throughout the 52-county service area, WTU's share of support to the taxing entities

amounted to \$8,869,225 for 1989, making the electric utility one of West Texas' largest ad valorem taxpayers.

Approximately 56 percent of that total went to school districts with the balance distributed among other taxing entities such as city and county governments and water, fire, hospital, drainage and road districts.

In addition to ad valorem taxes, WTU supports local governments by payment of gross receipts taxes and sales taxes where applicable.

Feb. 16 has been selected as the Jump Rope for Heart event at Weinert Schools.

Jumpers in 3-8 grades started collecting donations and pledges Monday. All donations must be turned in by Feb. 23.

Donations/sponsorships for the

jumpers go to the American Heart Association. The money raised will provide educational programs and materials to schools and fund research efforts to fight heart and blood vessel diseases, including stroke and heart attack.

Library improvements targeted by homemakers

Haskell Young Homemakers have recently involved themselves in a project to help repair the Haskell County Public Library.

Initially, the club had set aside funds for wallpapering the children's reading room, but upon visiting the library, discovered that repairs would be necessary before any redecorating could take place.

The building in which the library is located, on North Avenue E, was built in 1917 during World War I. It originally was owned by the Magazine Club, an education club for women organized by Mrs. J. U. Fields. The Magazine Club donated the building to Haskell County for use as the public library in 1973.

According to Joan Strickland, county librarian, the library provides many services to the community and has the potential for even greater service. Anywhere from 40 to 65 books are checked out daily. In addition, a person seeking certain books or magazine articles not immediately available at the library may obtain them through a nationwide system called the "Inter-Library Loan" system. The requested books are located at various system libraries throughout the United States and are sent to the Haskell library.

In addition to this program, the

library recently purchased a new set of encyclopedias, and hopes to obtain a photo copier for public use. And, foremost, the library hopes to soon be accepted for membership into the Big Country Library System. Membership will entitle it to more funds for new books as well as a new Apple personal computer.

However, before these new additions may be added, many repairs to the building are necessary. In 1962, a support wall in the building's interior was removed, enlarging the main room. The ceiling has since begun to sag and is in danger of falling unless measures are taken to provide proper support. Other needed repairs include re-sheetrocking moisture-damaged walls, painting, weather-stripping around doors and windows, and re-wiring to accommodate heaters and new equipment.

The Haskell Young Homemakers are challenging area clubs, organizations, businesses and individuals to help them raise the necessary funds for these repairs. In the past, Haskell County has simply not had enough money budgeted for such expenditures. Although it is currently appropriating more money for the proposed repairs, additional funds

are needed to cover a repair project of this magnitude.

An initial goal of \$2,500 has been set for sheet-rocking and painting in the children's reading room, and most urgently, for providing the necessary braces and supports for the library's ceiling.

The Young Homemakers have established a "Help Save Our Library" fund with \$250 at Haskell National Bank. They will hold a "Valentine Bake Sale" Feb. 10, to raise more money for the project. Concerned organizations and individuals are encouraged to donate to the fund. Also, any labor and/or materials donated to the project are welcomed and appreciated. Members feel that preserving and improving the Haskell County Library is something that should not be neglected. A new library board is in the process of being organized, and interested persons are encouraged to contact Joan Strickland at the library at 864-2757. The public is encouraged to go by and see what the library has to offer. It is open to the public on weekdays from 1 to 5 p.m. and on Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

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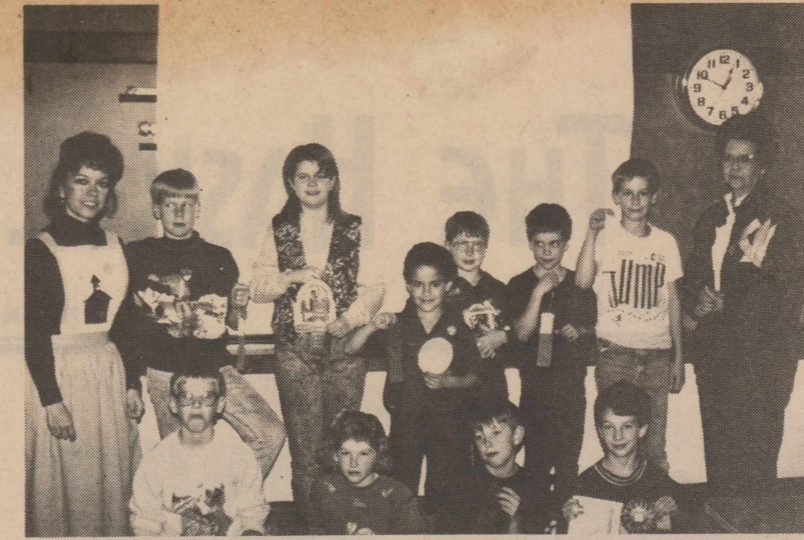

Carriker bill would dismantle career ladder

State Sen. Steve Carriker has filed a bill that would enable dismantling of the controversial career ladder with equal distribution of the money to teachers.

"Educators overwhelmingly agree that the career ladder serves no purpose but to inject more politics into our education systems and lower teacher morale," said Carriker, a Democrat from Roby.

Also, Carriker said since the state usually does not fund the ladder sufficiently enough to place all teachers on it, the result is either an increase burden in local tax bases or teachers being denied a promised reward.

"This bill is a permissive measure, providing that individual school districts may choose not to implement the career ladder program on a local option basis. If the district chooses to get out of the program, the funds allocated to the career ladder would be distributed equally among the districts teachers as a general pay raise," he said.

Carriker's bill, SB 3, was filed on the first day of bill filing for the special session which will begin Feb. 27.

300 census jobs to be available

The 1990 census could mean about 300 jobs for residents of the 17th Congressional District, according to Congressman Charles W. Stenholm.

Every 10 years, the Bureau of Census, which is a part of the U.S. Department of Commerce, conducts the census and issues official population counts that are used to decide everything from federal funding to political boundaries.

"An accurate census assures a community its fair share of government funding and representation," said Stenholm. "Every level of government uses the census figures to formulate public policies."

The Congressman explained that the federal government uses the figures to assess an area's need for public housing, child care and energy assistance, as well as deciding where grant money will be applied and to enforce fair lending practices.

The census data also helps state officials to direct aid to the elderly, the handicapped and to single mothers, plus to improve transportation systems, to organize school districts and to build hospitals.

"By answering the census questionnaire you will be helping determine where the needs are in every neighborhood in every community of our country," explained Stenholm.

In fiscal year 1984, the most recent year compiled, the government distributed more than \$31.4 billion based on information derived from the 1980 census.

"One of the main things folks should remember is that all information given to the census

bureau is confidential and will not be shared with any other governmental or private agency," explained Stenholm. "The census is used for population information and anonymous statistical analysis only."

The first census was taken in 1790. It is a function required by the U.S. Constitution.

About 565,000 people will be hired to help with the 1990 census. Residents of the 17th district who are at least 18 years old can apply for a variety of positions by contacting Don McInnis at the Abilene District Census Office, 147 Sayles Blvd., phone (915) 674-8600.

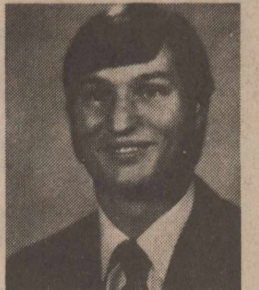

CONSIDER NEW TAX LAW IN 1990 PLANNING

On December 19, 1989, President Bush signed the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1989 which included tax provisions in a section called the Revenue Reconciliation Act of 1989.

The new law extends certain credits that were scheduled to expire, including the low-income housing credit, the business research and development credit, and the targeted jobs credit. The law eases the corporate minimum tax for certain industries. It also includes provisions for simplifying the tax penalty system.

The law did not cut the capital gains tax, nor did it change the rules for tax deductibility of IRA contributions. Both items may become issues again this year.

Among other provisions in the law are those that -

- Require that cellular telephones be used more than 50% of the time for business before any accelerated writeoff is permitted.
- Extend for a period the 25% tax deduction for health insurance premiums paid by self-employed individuals.
- Extend the exclusion from income for educational assistance provided by employers to employees.
- Make deferred income, such as pension contributions, part of the calculation for the social security tax wage base.
- Speed up collection of federal payroll taxes from large companies by requiring payroll tax deposits to be made within one banking day after federal taxes exceed \$100,000.
- Impose a tax that increases each year on ozone-depleting chemicals.
- Repeal a 50% income exclusion given to banks on interest from loans used to acquire securities for an ESOP, unless the ESOP owns more than 50% of the employer stock.
