

Baptist revival to begin

A revival targeting the renewal of church people and the reaching of the unchurched gets underway Sunday at the First Baptist Church.

Walter K. Ayers, noted Texas evangelist from Garland, will preach and play the trumpet. Bill Funderburk of Immanuel Baptist Church in Odessa will be music director.

The five-day revival begins with a men's breakfast at 7:30 a.m. Sunday. Church officials said 150 men are expected to meet for an hour of praise, fellowship and worship. An all-church fellowship will follow the evening service on that day.

Monday night will feature a contest between the youth and the deacons to see which group can have the greatest number of people present. This will result in a treat by the losers to the winners at a later date.

A special children's night is planned for Tuesday. Youth director Randy McLelland says he will swallow a live gold fish if as many as 100 children are present.

On Wednesday night, there will be a giant fellowship for the youth following the evening service.

Rev. Ayers will give his life's story on the last night of the revival Thursday.

Noon services are scheduled each day and a meal will be served. Evening services will be at 7 o'clock.

Everyone in the community is invited, said the Rev. Jimmy A. Turner, pastor.

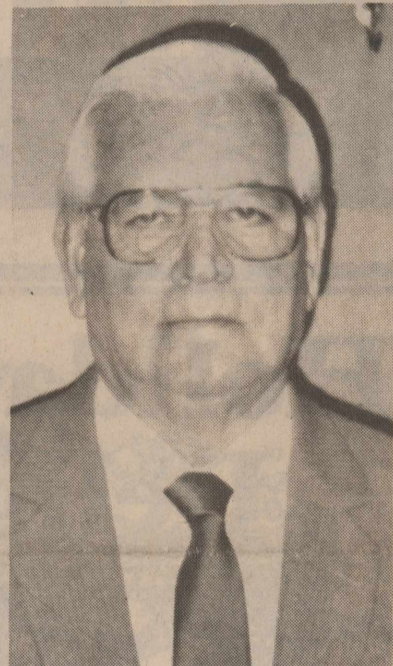

Albany Lions who ride atop the standings with a perfect 4-0 mark in league play and a 7-0 overall record.

The Indians (1-3 and 2-5) get their chance Friday night when they travel to Albany.

Albany owns non-district victories over Archer City, Baird and Knox City, to go with district wins over Hamlin, Anson, Stamford and Jim Ned. The Lions beat Hamlin, 30-14; edged Anson, 13-10; measured Stamford, 14-0; and last week bombed Jim Ned, 47-0.

The Lions will meet contender Winters next week, and if they are thinking too much about that game, they could be in for a surprise.

Although Haskell has lost three district games, the Indians have the district's second most potent offense, having averaged more than 20 points a game in four 7-2A outings.

Although Haskell lost, 20-6, to Hamlin last Friday, the Indians played one of their better games. Had a few breaks, which resulted in a couple of Hamlin touchdowns and a Haskell TD being called back, not gone against them, the Indians could have won.

Coach Walter Hargrove was disappointed only in the final score. He was especially pleased with the Indians' defensive effort which limited Hamlin to its lowest yardage of the year.

Death claims Tom Watson

Haskell lost one of its staunchest citizens last Wednesday (Oct. 17) with the death of Tom Watson.

Watson, 70, died at 8:50 p.m. in Rice Springs Care Home, following an extended illness.

Watson served as chief of the Haskell Volunteer Fire Department from 1959 until his death. He had been a member of the department since 1952.

Widely known and greatly respected as a fireman, he was chosen "Texas Fireman of the Year" in 1988. He also was chosen as Mid-West Texas Fireman of the Year. From 1971 to 1989, he was an instructor at the annual Texas Firemen's and Fire Marshal's Training School at Texas A&M University.

He served as president, secretary-treasurer and chaplain of Mid-West Texas Firemen's Association and served on the State Finance Committee for the Texas Firemen's Association. He taught classes three years at the Abilene Fire School.

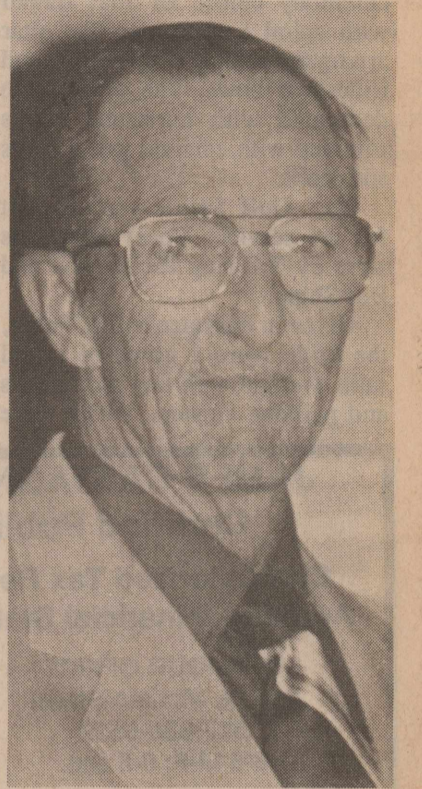
He was a past president of the Haskell Chamber of Commerce (1983-85) and served three terms on the board of directors of that organization.

Watson served on the board of the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority since its organization. He was first vice president and manager of the Haskell Memorial Civic Center.

He served 40 years as timekeeper for Haskell High School football games, missing only one game between 1946 and 1981.

A member of the First Baptist Church, he had been a member of the Business Men's Bible Class since 1945. He was a former member of the Haskell Jaycees and Noba Grand IOOF.

Watson was selected by the Chamber of Commerce as Haskell's "Outstanding Citizen" in 1985. In July of this year, the Chamber of Commerce honored him on a special day during which hundreds of friends and associates paid tribute to him. Earlier this year, the City

named its new fire training center at the airport the "Tom Watson Municipal Fire Training Field."

A veteran of World War II, Watson joined the Army in 1938, shortly after graduating from Rule High School. He spent the entire war in the Pacific, where he was a first sergeant with the 93rd Anti-Aircraft Battery.

Discharged in November 1945, he returned to Haskell and went to work as a route man for Mead's Bakery. In 1953, he established a Borden distributorship which he operated until he retired in 1982.

He was born Jan. 15, 1920, in Jonesboro, Texas, and moved to Rule when he was 7 years old.

He married Mary Brown in Haskell on April 27, 1946. She survives him.

Funeral services were Friday afternoon at the First Baptist Church with Dr. Troy Culpepper and the Rev. Jim Turner officiating. Burial was in Willow Cemetery.

Navy Ensign Lester D. Towell has completed the Officer Indoctrination School at the Naval Education and Training Center in Newport, R. I.

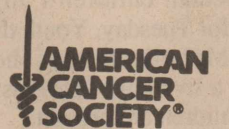
His wife, Shelia, is the daughter of Gerry Townsend of Rule.

Notes From The Rolling Plains

(Note: The following is one of a series of stories by noted wildlife photographer Wyman Meinzer offered by Haskell Save-A-\$ for your enjoyment.)

The winds of Autumn have already arrived bringing with them the cool sunrises we seem to welcome after a long hot summer. With these first northers comes the many migrations of creatures that we all associate with this season. Only a few days ago the monarch butterflies made their annual pilgrimage through the region, adding a myriad of fluttering colors to the broken badlands north of Benjamin. The hawk migration came through earlier in the month bringing hundreds of swainsons, rough legged, and other species of the winged mousers through our region. Only a week ago, late in the evening I caught the first calls of a flock of speckled belly geese headed south, no doubt for a winters stay along the Texas coastline. As a child one of the first sure signs of fall was the sudden appearance of the hundreds of thousands of crows which darkened the skies every evening until the bleak, cold days of winter pushed them on south. Sure enough, only a few days ago near Rhineland, I observed the first big flock of raucous raiders as they pillaged a wheat field by the thousands. The list can go on and on as many species of migrating wildlife use the central flyway on their way to the wintering grounds of South America, Mexico, and South Texas. Like the canada geese though, some stay over in north Texas because of the endless food supply afforded by the miles of open wheat fields. Although it might seem that the numbers of fowl reaching Texas from year to year is endless, bear in mind that the journey from the Canadian nesting grounds is long and perilous. Ducks for instance have been devastated over the past few years by both natural and man induced mortality factors. So few mallards and pintails are seen along the central flyway in recent years that wildlife officials have become concerned and some curtailment on hunting has been enacted. Wildlife belongs to everyone in Texas and we are responsible for the health of these populations. Let's take an active interest in the future of this natural resource and see that our children and theirs will also look forward to hearing the wild calls on the winds of autumn.

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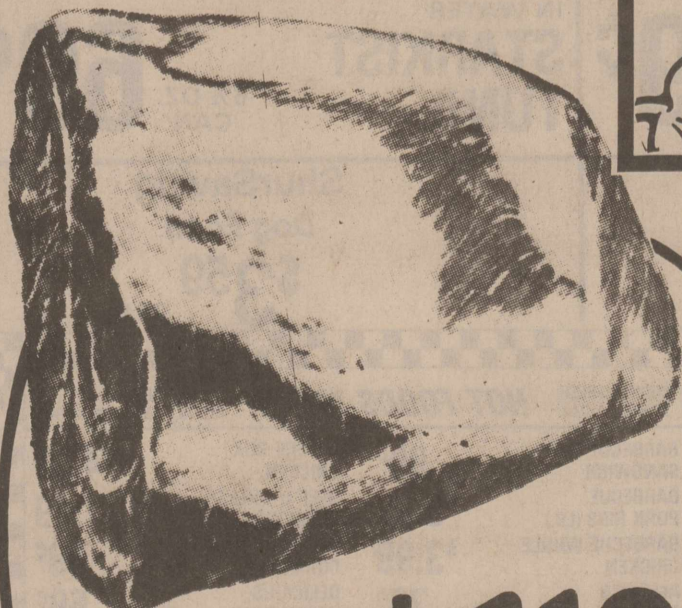


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Lives owed to butterfly

Once, a team of biologists set about to study the color variations in butterfly wings. No doubt, some people laughed at the apparently ridiculous nature of such a medical research project.

They aren't laughing now. This team of scientists first studied the RH factor in blood. Yes, the charting of color variations in

butterfly wings was the prelude to developing preventative medicine for mothers and babies . . . babies who could otherwise be stillborn or mentally retarded.

Today, children whose mothers have RH negative blood and whose fathers have RH positive blood owe their lives to this team of biologists and, to---of all things---the butterfly.

The team of biologists studying the colors of butterfly wings set out

to solve the mystery. They didn't know that the results of this research would eventually save the lives of thousands of babies each year. The basic biomedical research supported by the American Heart Association in Texas is also about solving mysteries---the mystery of heart and blood vessel disease.

It's a thrilling uplifting story involving life-saving accomplishments, but the story is unfinished because heart disease remains the No. 1 killer in America.

In 1985, there were 51,539 Texans who lost their lives to this disease. Almost 11,000 of them were under the age of 65. Chances are good that you've been touched by the harsh reality of this disease through the loss of a loved one. In Texas, 43.6 percent of all deaths were caused by diseases of the heart and blood vessels. We know that the results of medical research can ultimately save lives, but so far, we cannot cure coronary artery disease or stroke. Only research can turn the tide.

One hundred and ten young investigators are currently conducting research in Texas, supported by the American Heart Association. This work represents a \$2.6 million investment in basic biomedical research granted to 16 Texas universities.

A case in point involves the funding of Nobel Laureates Michael S. Brown, M.D., and Joseph L. Goldstein, M.D. When the American Heart Association began funding its work in the early 1970s, hundreds of thousands of AHA's research dollars had already gone to Southwestern Medical School, part of the University of Texas Health Science Center in Dallas, where Brown and Goldstein continue to conduct their research.

This pair of scientists explored the dark mysteries of cholesterol metabolism, discovering a tiny but complex molecule called a cell receptor. It was one of the most important molecules to be identified in the past 25 years, and their work won the Nobel Prize for medicine. The impact of their research on medical science and the following

benefits to mankind are incalculable.

In spite of a tremendous commitment to support basic biomedical research, the American Heart Association in Texas continues to experience a short fall in funds required to support all research projects deemed scientifically meritorious. This difference between the amount needed to fund all approved projects and the amount actually available for funding research grants is called the "critical funding gap." The American Heart Association pursues the goal of funding all research projects that have been judged scientifically meritorious. Achieving that goal would mean that every worthy research project would receive funding, and we would move closer to solving the mystery of heart disease. With your help, the American Heart Association will accomplish this mission that is life saving power for the future. Please help. We can't afford to lose this fight.

I have heard on numerous occasions that if the money were being directed to stay in Haskell County, people would be more readily amenable to donating. What you consider is the fact that Haskell County has benefitted in numerous ways and continues to benefit on a daily basis.

Please consider that it hasn't been that long since the cardiac monitors available in this community were not even available, and this was in part funded by research done by the American Heart Association.

Consider also that we have excellent paramedical support right here in this community, and that numerous lives have been saved

right here because of cardiopulmonary resuscitation which has been performed by both them and personnel in the hospital and that this feat has been learned in part by research done by the American Heart Association.

Consider also that in the treatment of acute myocardial infarction (heart attack), tremendous strides have been made in treatment of this killer. Currently, 80 percent of heart attack survivors can now return to work within three months. Part of this has been due, in fact, to advancements made in discovery of treatment modalities for heart attack.

The importance of time cannot be overemphasized. When a coronary artery gets blocked, the heart muscle doesn't die instantaneously; damage increases the longer an artery remains blocked. If the patient gets to an emergency room fast enough, a technique called reperfusion therapy sometimes can be performed. This involves injecting a substance which can dissolve blood clots, such as Streptokinase or tissue Plasminogen Activator (tPA), to dissolve a clot in the coronary artery and restore the blood flow.

As long as only two years ago, tPA was used only in highly specialized research centers. Both drugs are now available in this very community and have benefitted numerous patients from this county. So, are funds being left directly in Haskell County? No. However, the effects of the research definitely are here. The energies are also being extended in this county to educate our young people, starting from elementary school on, which is done in hopes of preventative treatment. After all, if we can teach our children how to

avoid the cardiovascular risk factors then they may never have to experience the need for the research that is being performed.

Please do not hesitate to support the American Heart Association. We are also in need of people to help with and further efforts of the American Heart Association in Haskell County. You don't have to have any knowledge of the organization or of heart disease, only the desire to help prevent this deadly killer.

Indians bow to Hamlin, 20-6

The Haskell Indians saw their playoff hopes disappear in the chilly breeze Friday night as they bowed, 20-6, to the Hamlin Pied Pipers.

It dropped the Indians' district 7-2A record to 1-3, and their season mark to 2-5.

The loss came despite one of Haskell's better efforts which saw them outgain the Pipers, 282-243, out-first-down them, 17-14, and generally out-play them throughout most of the game.

The final score was hardly indicative of the game as Hamlin scored its final touchdown and accounted for a big chunk of its 187 yards rushing on Anthony Hooper's 62-yard dash with 17 seconds to go.

The Indians had their chances early. After the opening kickoff, they moved from their own 23 to the Hamlin 10, only to see a fourth-down field goal barely miss the mark.

And the next time they got the ball, Jeremy Fuentes peeled off a 39-yard touchdown run, only to have it called back.

Hamlin broke the scoring ice 48 seconds before halftime when Jeff Bell passed 7 yards to Dee Marshall

and Stewart Jeffrey kicked the extra point. The scoring pass capped a 33-yard drive following a blocked punt.

That was all the scoring until the final period. Mike Ford's 39-yard punt pinned the Indians back to their goal. When Cody Josselet punted out to the 27, the Pipers moved in for a touchdown in six plays, Bell again passing to Marshal for the score, and Jeffrey again converting to make it 14-0 with just 4:50 left.

After the Indians couldn't move following the kickoff and punted, Jonathan Dever stripped the ball loose from punt returner Waylon McGee at the Indian 27, and Haskell began its lone scoring drive.

Passes of 26 yards from Rusty Stocks to Chris Tanner and 11 yards from Stocks to Craig Hanson, and an 11-yard run by Dever helped move the ball to the Piper 5, from where Dever went over with 57 seconds to go, to make it 14-6 and revive Haskell hopes.

After an onside kick on the Haskell kickoff was recovered by the Pied Pipers at the Hamlin 49, a 10-yard penalty against the Pipers

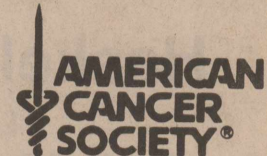

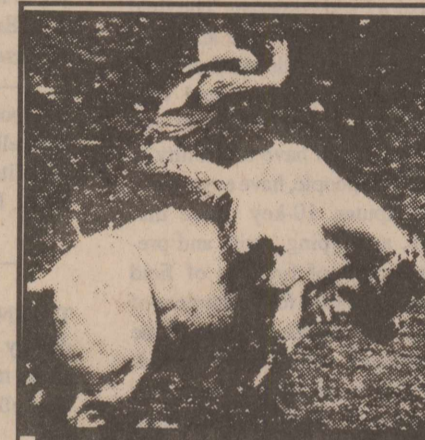
