Annual Smokeout takes place today

Haskell County members of the American Cancer Society are challenging smokers to "Leave the Pack Behind" during the Society's 14th annual Great American Smokeout today (Thursday).

Sponsored by the American Cancer Society, the Great American Smokeout is a fun-filled, lighthearted celebration held each year on the third Thursday in November to encourage smokers and tobacco users to quit the habit for 24 hours. The effort is the largest health promotion event in the country.

Last year's Smokeout triggered 10.5 percent of the nation's smokers---5.2 million Americans---

to give up cigarettes for 24 hours. One to three days later, according to a Gallup poll, 3.9 million were still abstaining from tobacco. According to the poll, 17.9 million smokers participated in the Smokeout by quitting or cutting down for the day.

Local ACS members are hoping the 14th annual Great American Smokeout will help many Haskell County smokers stop the habit.

The Smokeout helps advance the ACS's ongoing battle against cancer. Smoking is responsible for 87 percent of lung cancer cases, and is responsible for many other

Farmers reminded of cards

Haskell County peanut farmers have been reminded that they should return their marketing cards as soon as possible after marketings are completed for the farm, and no later than Dec. 15.

All peanut-producing farmers must report all marketings from their farm, as well as the amount of peanuts retained for seed or any other use, said Glenn R. Brzozowski of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Brzozowski said the computerized marketing cards should contain all sales transactions at buying points. Any marketings not made through an established buying point should be reported when the card is returned, he said.

Peanut producers receive a printout of all marketings on their cards. They are responsible for checking it to be sure that all marketings have been recorded properly.

"Our peanut price support program limits the number of pounds of peanuts that can be marketed by producers for domestic edible uses through poundage quotas," Brzozowski said. "Any peanuts not marketed against a poundage quota for a farm must be placed under additional loan, or marketed for export or crush in accordance with a previously approved contract entered into by the peanut producer and handler."

Price support on 1990-crop quota or additional peanuts will be available through warehouse-stored and farm-stored loans from harvest time through Jan. 31, 1991. Availability of farm-stored loans on quota peanuts will continue through March 31.

Desert troops respond to Haskell students' letters

Haskell Elementary School sixth-graders are doing their part to boost morale of U.S. servicemen and women stationed in the Middle

They began by writing three letters---one addressed to "Any Serviceman or Woman" in Operation Desert Shield, one to M/Sgt. Clarence Dukatnik (formerly of Haskell) and one to A/T Mark SoRelle, son of Frankie SoRelle, who is aboard the USS Kennedy.

So far, the class has received numerous responses from mailhungry servicemen. Many described their living conditions as being very primitive at first, but improving now that they have airconditioned tents.

They wrote about high temperatures (105 degrees during the day and 98 degrees at night), water consumption in the desert, protective suits in case of chemical warfare, and families back home.

Many of the men wrote students asking for continued support through letters and prayers. Several expressed the thought that they hoped war would not come, but that if it does, they are prepared.

One response came from an airman previously stationed at Dyess Air Force Base in Abilene.

The letter that teacher Debbie Earles received from S/Sgt. Steven G. Hitchcock closed with this thought: "Rest assured that those of us here, as any rational person would, pray for peace while preparing for war."

Three of the letters had Saudi Arabian money enclosed for the students to examine.

One soldier said the letter he received from Haskell was the first one he had gotten since being deployed a month ago.

Now, the sixth-graders have written their Middle East-deployed pen pals again. Some are including photographs, newspaper clippings and drawings. The class plans to send Christmas cards by the postal service's Nov. 26 deadline for Christmas delivery.

"The students really seem to enjoy hearing from our servicemen and women and knowing they have a real part in boosting morale," said

Anyone wishing to write one of the group's pen pals may get a name and address from Mrs. Earles or from Leatha Newton at the elementary school.

Haskell receives \$19,739 rebate

Perry's election please FB leader

"Mainstream agriculture and consumers across Texas won a major victory with the election of Rick Perry as Agriculture Commissioner," said Texas Farm Bureau President S. M. True.

True is also president of the Texas Farm Bureau Friends of Agriculture Fund (AGFUND), which endorsed Perry in May.

Farm Bureau and every other major agricultural organization in the state, with a few exceptions, threw their support behind the Haskell man in his challenge of two-time incumbent Ag Commissioner Jim Hightower.

When Rick Perry takes over the leadership at the Texas Department of Agriculture in January he will be a commissioner for all the people of Texas," True said. "Texas agriculture will again prosper as we head toward the 21st century. We now have a commissioner who wil work with farmers and ranchers fo agriculture."

Perry, a fifth generation farme

and rancher and a three-term stat legislator, won the race with approximately a 46,000-vot margin.

Perry has outlined a program for the agriculture department called the "Five M's":



The new items of service and equipment in this application have been added to meet the company's increasing 9-1-1 customer demands and to allow GTE-SW to compete more effectively in the 9-1-1 equipment market.

The product line in the new offerings consists of a mini-computer and specialized console package for larger communities, as well as a personal computer with Automatic Number Identification (ANI) display for smaller communities. (ANI displays a caller's telephone number on the emergency dispatcher's computer screen.) In addition, the product line will include ANI and Automatic Location Information (ALI) display units compatible with, and similar to, those offered by Southwestern Bell Telephone Company and other local exchange carriers in Texas. (The ALI feature displays a caller's address on the computer screen.) The rate charged existing 9-1-1 customers may be revised at the expiration of their contracts with GTE-SW if the proposed tariff is approved.

This filing has been assigned Docket No 9667. The hearing on the merits is scheduled for February 25, 1991, at the offices of the Public Utility Commission of Texas. The deadline to intervene in this docket is December 31, 1990.





TEACH YOUR CHILDREN ABOUT MONEY

Uncertainties in the job and financial markets make it imperative for parents to teach their children how to wisely manage money. This should begin at an early age. Three- or four-year-old children should be given small amounts and the opportunity to choose items to purchase. They will quickly learn their choice is limited to the amount they have available to spend.

A small allowance should be implemented by age six or so. This allowance should be unconditional; i. e., the responsibility to do their chores should not be tied to children's allowances. They should learn certain tasks must be done regardless. For extra work, they may be given the opportunity to earn more than their basic allowance. The weekly allowance should be increased annually. As children age, this increase can be tied into things they must assume responsibility for purchasing (e.g., their dates, entertainment, snacks, clothes, etc.)

When children become teenagers, start discussing longer-term goals such as college. As an incentive for children to save for the long-term, consider matching amounts they contribute to their savings account. Begin including them in family budget and financial discussions. Show them how your actions are based on the same principles they must use in budgeting their allowance. Encourage children to get jobs so they can appreciate the work involved in earning money. By age 18, children should be able to manage a year's expenses and be capable of saving for

Throughout this educational process, be supportive and try to avoid the tendency to criticize or control what your children do with their money. Teaching your children how to manage money may be one of the most important lessons you can give them.

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Notes From The Rolling Plains Note: The following is one of a series of stories by noted wildlife photographer

Until recently I had always thought that indescriminate hunting practices was a product of current times. At least within the past fifty or so years. I was researching some information a few days ago and found some interesting notes given by professional buffalo hunters over 115 years ago. It seems that the primary concern of the professional hide men was to kill and skin as many bison as humanly possible. Other wildlife, and there was incredible numbers of them, were left alone and even adopted as camp pets. One hunter whose camp was in the rolling plains loved to see the wild turkey as they fed into and about camp by the thousands. They were as tame as chickens and the grisly bison hunters regarded them as pets. As he put it, "a buffalo hunter would no more shoot a turkey than a quail hunter would shoot a snowbird." Then came the "Sportsmen from citites such as Ft. Worth and other settlements to the east. These city hunters chaffed the old buffalo men as the dudes rode out onto the range and shot everything that moved. Lying in wait under turkey roosts these city hunters would allow the turkeys to fly into the trees and then shoot until all the birds were either wounded or dead. In the morning they would return to the scene and boast over the dead, picking only two or three of the fattest birds to eat and leave the rest to rot. Returning to the settlements they would boast and brag of their deeds for months. Sadly enough, this has not changed much even in these modern, more enlightened times. I recently visited with a rancher who had some rather large whitetail bucks on his land. He charged a healthy fee for shooting one of the deer but getting a shot was aimost as easy as getting into your vehicle and driving to the store for a loaf of bread. He said that he has men call and want to pay almost any price just to fly down in an evening and kill the deer then be back home by nightfall. The "hunter" has a big deer to brag on and Lord knows what kind of hardship hunting story to go with it. We've had these people for a long time and suppose we'll continue to have them. It's just a sad fact that most of us will have to contend with.

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
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Club hears talk by writer, author

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



Haskell County was authorized as part of the Four Winds Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) program July 17. This was the result of efforts of the Haskell Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD), the City of Haskell and Haskell County.

The RC&D is a grassroots type of community or rural development program. The U.S. Department of Agriculture program was authorized in 1964. The Soil Conservation Service was authorized to administer the program in most states. The RC&D program is authorized for multi-county areas that have common resources and/or problems.

The Four Winds RC&D area was authorized in December 1973. This included the four counties of Childress, Cottle, Foard and Hardeman. In late 1989, Wilbarger County was added to the area. In July of this year, the counties of King, Knox, Baylor, Stonewall, Throckmorton and Haskell were added to the area. Motley and Dickens counties have asked to join

The RC&D program is designed to assist local people in finding ways to accomplish their goals for community development. This is accomplished by identifying and putting a priority on community needs, developing a plan or strategy to solve the problem, finding a funding source, and implementing the project.

Community leaders and representatives from sponsoring organizations such as cities, counties, SWCDs or other groups from each county make up the RC&D Council. The council members work together to assist in community development. It is this cooperation among leaders throughout the area that makes things happen.

The RC&D Council has scheduled a meeting for Dec. 3 in the Haskell National Bank Community Building, beginning at 6:30 p.m., to inform citizens more

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about the RC&D program and to identify some of the major problems and needs.

Citizens are being urged to make plans to attend this meeting. Details will be announced laer.


