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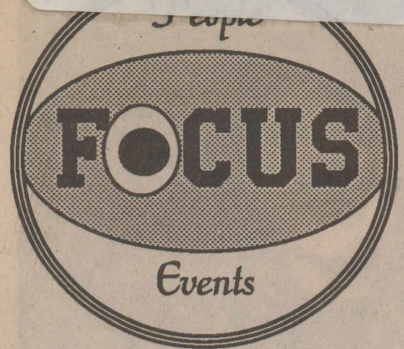

Haskell basks in spring weather

There wasn't much winter in Haskell during the month of February.

Lowest temperature recorded during the month was 25 degrees on Feb. 1, Sam Herren, weather recorder reported. The highest temperature was 81 degrees on Feb. 17.

Nor was there much rain. The moisture total for the month was a scant .04 of an inch, compared to a February normal of 1.03 inches.

But thanks to 3.32 inches of moisture received in January, Haskell's rainfall total for the first two months of 1991 stands at 3.36 inches, far above the normal of 1.84 inches.

Former student dies in stabbing

A Stamford woman has been charged with the Saturday stabbing death in Stamford of Freddie Shaw, 21-year-old former Haskell High School athlete.

Alicia Spells, 27, has been charged with his murder, said Lt. Eddie Gray of the Stamford Police Department.

The incident took place at the Stamford Place Apartments during a domestic quarrel Saturday afternoon. Gray said Spells apparently was Shaw's girlfriend.

Shaw was pronounced dead at Stamford Memorial Hospital from stab wounds allegedly inflicted by a six-inch paring knife, police said.

Spells is in Jones County Jail. Bond was set at \$100,000.

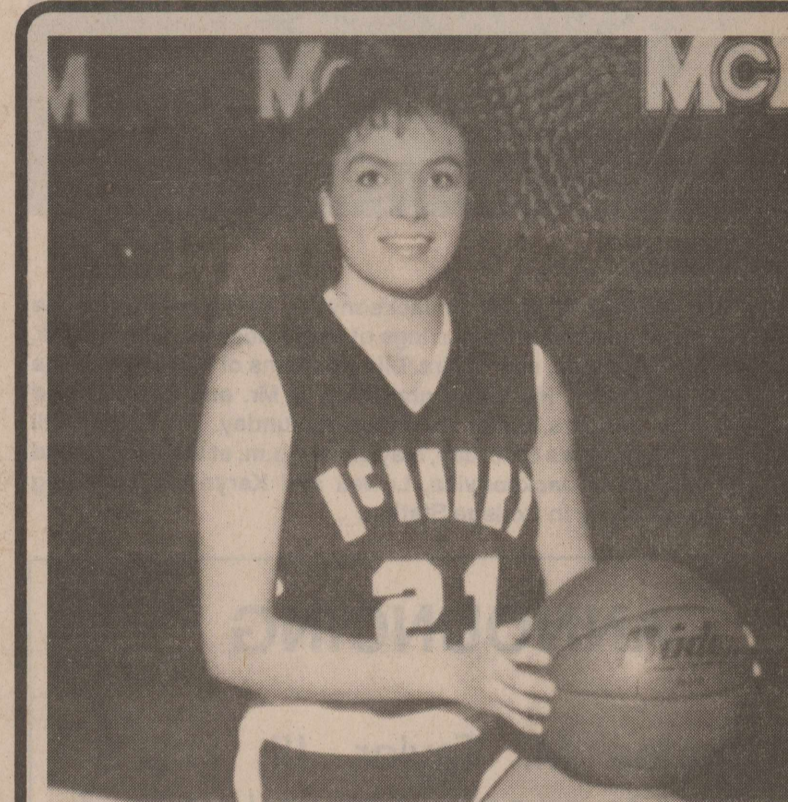

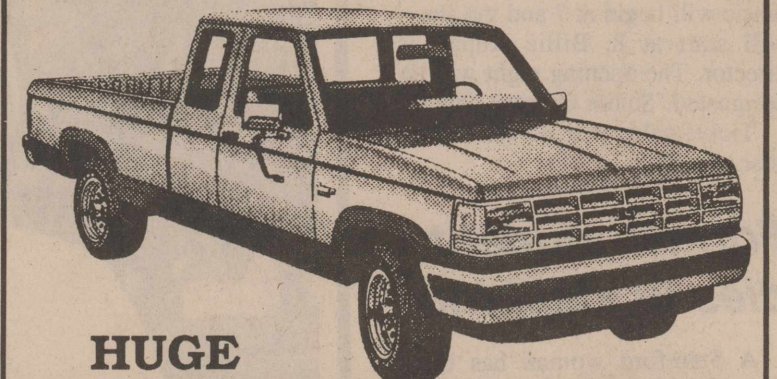

Rural uniqueness target of program

An innovative continuing education program for rural and small town religious leaders and other professionals in this area will start soon, according to the Rev. Bruce Adamson, pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church in Haskell, and James H. Sinclair, pastor at Paint Creek Baptist Church.

They have received certificates of completion from Texas A&M University to be study group facilitators on understanding the uniqueness of the rural community.

Discovering the uniqueness of rural communities through Rural Social Science by Extension was designed by a consortium of Texas religious representatives and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The program offers college level academic training for religious leaders in a hometown setting under the direction of a local facilitator.

Child abuse

Editor: All adults should be aware that the law (Texas Family Code, Chapter 34) requires child abuse, child neglect and child exploitation to be reported. The local school personnel have been made aware of this fact and have been instructed to report any suspected cases.

There are three kinds of child abuse: physical, sexual and emotional.

Physical abuse is inflicting bodily injury on a child. Sexual abuse is using a child in or exposing him to sexual activities, with or without his consent. And emotional abuse is demanding that the child do more than he is able to do, severely criticizing or humiliating him for not living up to a demand, or placing upon him such unclear requirements that the child cannot understand what he is supposed to do.

There are several kinds of child neglect. Physical neglect is failure to provide enough food, clothing, shelter or medical care. Failing to provide adequate education,

guidance, or supervision is also neglect. Emotional neglect is failure to give a child the love and affection he needs.

Similar to abuse and neglect, exploitation is forcing or unduly encouraging a child to participate in activities detrimental to his welfare, such as begging, stealing or working too hard for too many hours.

Stenholm co-sponsors repeal of earning test

Congressman Charles Stenholm has announced that he is co-sponsoring legislation to end age discrimination against senior citizens who continue to work after they reach retirement age.

The bill, known as "The Older Americans Freedom to Work Act", would repeal the Social Security earnings test, a depression-era practice that was designed to discourage older people from remaining in the work force.

Under earnings test restrictions, individuals over 65 who make more than \$9,700 per year must forfeit one dollar in Social Security benefits for every three dollars they earn over that limit. That means that a senior citizen making \$10,000 a year would face an effective marginal tax rate of 56 percent, which is nearly twice that of millionaires.

"It is high time this discriminatory law was repealed," said Stenholm. "We allow wealthier senior citizens to supplement their Social Security with income earned from interest and dividends, so how can we justify penalizing those who work to supplement their Social Security out of need?"

Stenholm added that the demography of the country is changing with more senior citizens and fewer young people joining or re-entering the work force. He pointed out that often this is out of necessity since Social Security was

not set up as a full retirement program in itself.

"We should welcome senior citizens into the work force, not drive them out," said Stenholm. "It's time to do away with this outdated earnings test."

Ask VA

Q: My mother receives a VA widow's pension and has recently lost her sight. Can the VA offer her any additional assistance?

A: Widows who qualify for death pension may receive increased benefits if they are blind, in a nursing home, or helpless or so nearly helpless as to require the regular aid and attendance of another person.

Q: As the widow of a World War II veteran, I received Dependency and Indemnity Compensation until my remarriage to a non-veteran. My second husband died recently. Am I entitled to restoration of VA benefits from my first marriage.

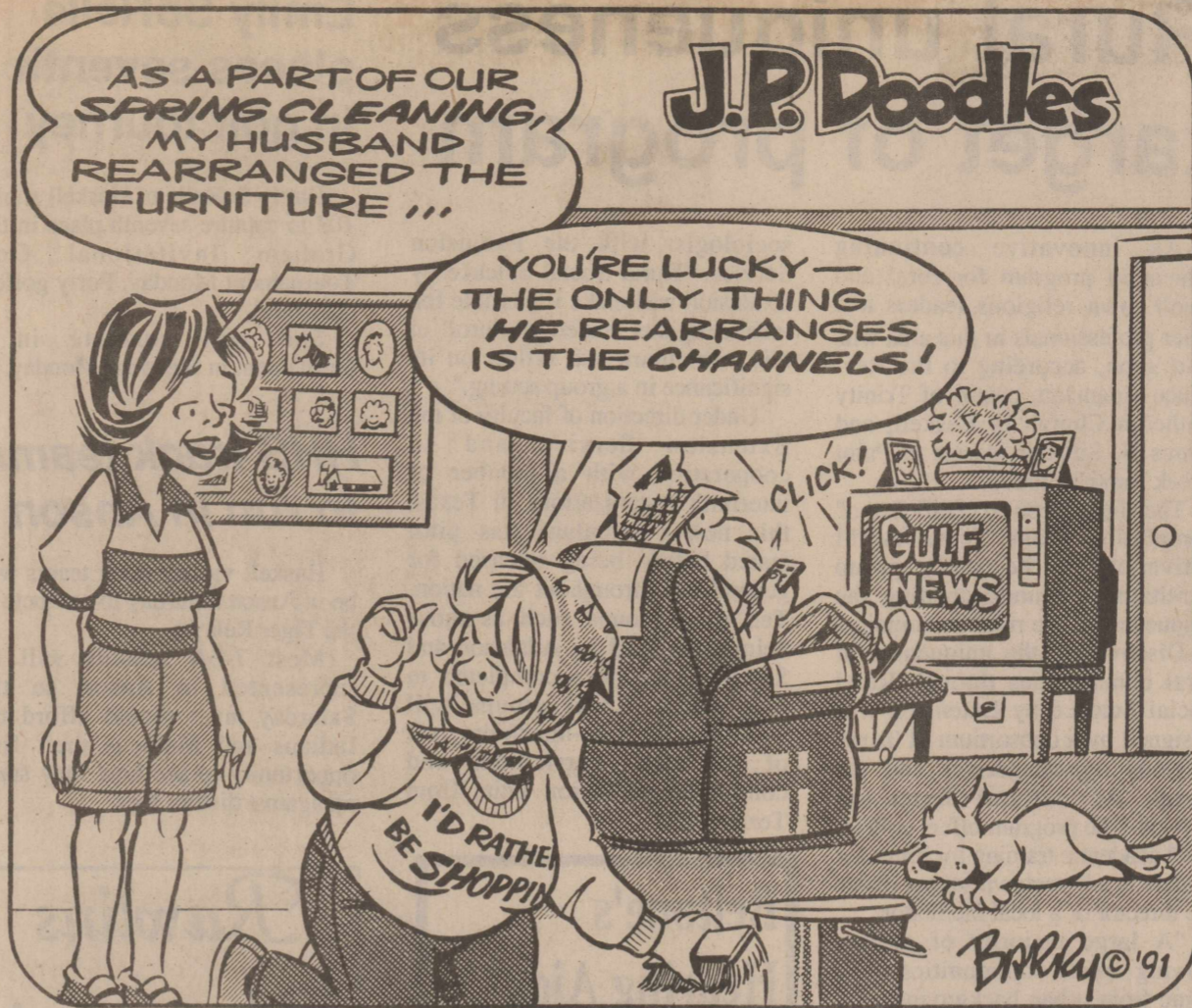
A: No. As of Nov. 1, 1990, a surviving spouse of a deceased veteran who remarries cannot have those benefits restored when the second marriage is terminated by death or divorce.

Q: I am not a veteran, but I am interested in purchasing a VA-repossessed home. Is this possible?

A: Yes. VA-repossessed homes are available for the general public to purchase. A listing of these properties is available at your local VA regional office.

Q: Can I use my VA-guaranteed home loan to buy land I plan to build a house on in the future?

A: A VA-guaranteed loan cannot be used to buy undeveloped land unless it is part of a package that includes the building of your home.

medical items and services not covered by the hospital insurance part of Medicare. For people who enroll now, medical insurance protection starts July 1. The basic premium rate this year is \$29.90 a month. It is increased by 10 percent for each year a person could have had it but was not enrolled. 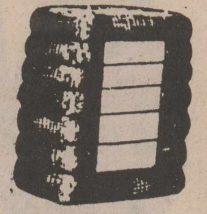

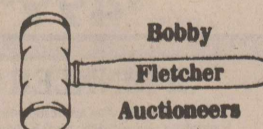

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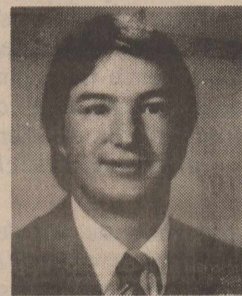

CHILDREN AND TAXES

What do children and taxes have in common? You will have them both for the rest of your life!

In past years, parents could shift some of their income to their children, and that income would be taxed at lower rates if the children were in lower tax brackets than the parents. But, alas, the IRS caught on and the passage of the "kiddie tax" curtailed the practice of transferring income-producing assets to utilize the children's lower brackets. If a child's investment income in 1991 exceeds \$1,000, the excess will be taxed at the parent's highest tax rate.

Your child must file a 1990 tax return if his total income (earned and unearned) is more than \$500. If your child has only earned income (wages), he or she will not have to file if wages did not exceed \$3,250. These amounts increase to \$550 and \$3,400 for 1991. Of course, a return should be filed if a refund is due the child.

Your child is responsible for filing his own return. If he can't file for any reason (such as age), it is your responsibility to file a return on your child's behalf.

If you can claim your child as a dependent on your tax return, your child cannot claim himself on his tax return. However, the child is still entitled to his own standard deduction. This amount varies depending on the nature of the child's income.

In cases of divorce, the custodial parent may release his claim to a child's exemption by signing a release form. This form must be attached to the return of the noncustodial parent claiming the exemption.

Finally, remember that you must have a social security number for any child age two or older if you claim the child as an exemption on your 1990 return. Effective for your 1991 tax return, a social security number is necessary for children age one or older.

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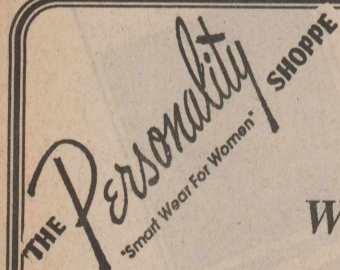

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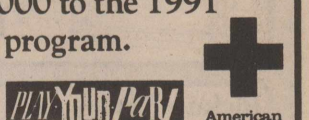

Editor: "My object all sublime, I shall achieve in time--to make the punishment fit the crime."

These words, written by Sir William Gilbert for "The Mikado," reflect why MADD (Mothers Against Drunk Driving) supports new legislation which makes the punishment for driving while intoxicated fit that serious crime.

Administrative License Revocation (ALR) allows quick and certain suspension of driving privileges for people who choose to drive drunk.

Currently, 29 states and the District of Columbia have passed similar laws. According to the National Transportation Safety Board, ALR is "the most important

step that Texas can take" to combat the carnage on our roads. In fact, if ALR had passed three years ago, 500 Texans who died in alcohol-related crashes could be alive today.

How would ALR work in Texas? If drivers fail or refuse a test to determine blood alcohol concentration, their licenses are suspended immediately. To ensure that "due process" rights are not violated, drivers are immediately issued a temporary driver's permit, valid for 40 days. This provides time to appeal the decision in court, if they choose.

If the drivers do not request a hearing or if the hearing officer upholds the revocation, the suspension takes effect when the temporary permit expires. ALR

would eliminate the possibility of probation and would require license suspension of 180 days for a first offense and one year for repeat offenses.

Of course, drunken drivers would also be subject to immediate arrest and detention, along with whatever criminal penalties a judge may impose. These may include fines, community service, treatment, or jail terms.

Currently, when drivers are stopped for DWI, they may be back on the streets within hours, with driver's licenses intact. Because of overcrowding, court action often is delayed for months. Even after a conviction, court-ordered license suspension is not mandatory. The net result is continued danger on our highways and discouragement to law enforcement officials whose efforts seem to be in vain.

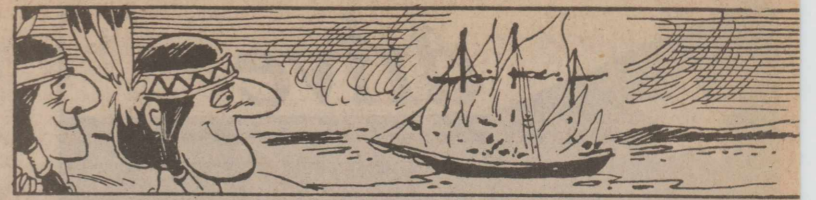
ALR not only addresses these shortcomings, but can actually pay for itself. License reinstatement fees, paid by offenders, help defray operating costs. In addition, passage of ALR would qualify Texas for a

federal alcohol incentive grant totaling \$16 million over five years.

The proposed law is sponsored in the Texas Senate by Judith Zaffirini, and in the House of Representatives by Hugo Berlanga and Parker McCollough. Already it has won the support of many organizations statewide, including the Texas Police Chief's Association and the Texas District and County Attorney's Association. The Texas Department of Public Safety also supports the ALR concept. But the bill stands little chance of passage unless Texans demand it.

If you want to help get drunk drivers off our roads, write your state legislators and tell them you support Senate Bill 228 and House Bill 4. For the names and addresses of legislators--or to check the status of a bill--call the Texas Legislative Library at 800-253-9693. The few minutes you spend writing a letter could save many lives. Maybe, even your own.

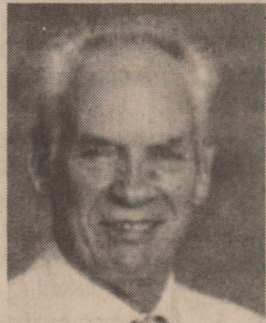

A few days ago I was sitting at my desk doing what I despise the most, paper work, when the phone rang. Hoping to hear the familiar voice of a friend with whom I might visit for a spell, I was not totally disappointed as the voice was that of a west coast gentleman who had read one of my articles in a hunting magazine and wanted to talk.

One of the finer things about my business is that I have the opportunity to meet lots of interesting people and this man was no exception. An international art dealer who comes to Texas frequently, John had read a piece I had written on hunting coyotes. Having hunted but little in the past, he was intrigued by the seemingly exciting life that some of us lead here in the rolling plains. As we visited, I began asking him questions about his life in Los Angeles. Once a lawyer, he got into the abstract art market on the international level and deals with lots of wealthy folks who love Picassos and the like. When asked about his work schedule, I learned that he spends lots of time in the major airports around the country and generally lives a life in the fast lane. When he asked me about the pace of the people in north Texas I obliged him with a few examples that really amazed him. He couldn't believe that we live in a place that allows such a leisure pace. Then he asked me what type of art I had hanging on my wall. After I described the bear hide, coyote skulls, buffalo skull, and some photos of Indian rock art, he chuckled and said that for a couple of million bucks he could fix me up really well. We both had a laugh with that one and he went his way and I continued my paper work for the day. In the evening my wife came in and suggested that we go for a walk in the badlands outside of Benjamin. The evening was beautiful and a wisp of clouds in the west promised a colorful sunset. With an salutary walk behind us we turned to the east and headed for the pickup a half mile away. The colors on the distant hills shown a hue of magenta as the last rays of sunlight skipped across the multicolored rimrock. A glance back into the west was cause for a moment of respite...to stand and experience those few seconds when nature offers, once more, a collection of her greatest works. The clouds, the after glow, and the badlands... I had to stand in awe at the sight. Here, only two miles from home, I stood looking at a priceless piece of art work that has been a part of our state for the milleniums. Art work that can change with each passing day, never allowing us to tire of her beauty, and never costing us anything more than a moment of our time.
