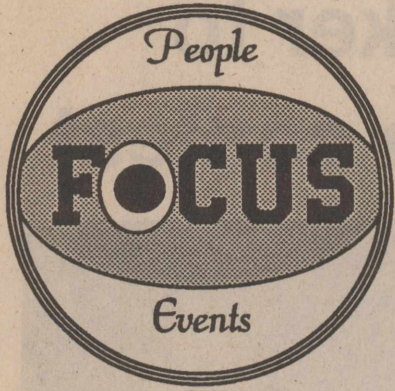

Meetings on sex education scheduled by committee

The Haskell County Home Economics Committee is sponsoring a series of four meetings centered around "Sex Education: The Parents' Role." The meetings will be on Monday nights, April 1, 8, 15 and 22. Meetings will feature information from well-known authorities in the area of sex education and will be conducted by Lou Gilly, county extension agent/home economics.

Each meeting is free of charge and is open to all people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap or national origin.

There is no advance registration, and you may attend any one(s) you choose. Each meeting is a complete meeting in itself and does not require attendance at the previous meeting.

The first meeting will be Monday night, beginning at 7:30 in the Haskell National Bank community room in Haskell.

Topic for the meeting is "What's Going On?" Guest speaker will be H. Stephen Glenn by means of video. Mr. Glenn is a noted psychologist who speaks to thousands of people each year. He has been a featured speaker at the White House and is a noted expert in helping parents find ways to make their children capable people. Participants will learn why our society is the way it is and discuss ways to deal with everything that is going on in their child's life.

April 8 will be the date for the second meeting. It will begin at 7:30 p.m. and will be in the First National Bank meeting room in Haskell. "Helping Kids Beat the Odds" will be the topic of this meeting. A workshop presented by Carol Cassell, PhD, will be

highlighted by Lou Gilly, CEA-HE. Carol Cassell is a noted author of books for parents dealing with sexuality. She has been featured on numerous television programs giving her realistic advice to help children become sexually sane and sensible people. Participants will learn how to help young people make more responsible decisions about sexuality.

The third meeting on April 15 will feature Dorothy Taylor, extension family life specialist, addressing the topic, "Helping Parents Cope." Ms. Taylor specializes in family relationships, values clarification and stress management. She will help participants find ways to cope with the problems parents face in dealing with sex education in the home. This meeting will be in the Haskell National Bank community room, starting at 7:30 p.m.

Eight men file as candidates for School Board

City Council candidates unopposed

Eight candidates will be vying for three positions as trustees of the Haskell Board of Education in the May 4 school election.

Only three candidates will be on the ballot for three positions as city councilmen in the city election on the same day.

Among the school candidates are two incumbents, Terry Blanks and Bill Perry, each seeking a second term on the board.

A third incumbent, Anita Perry, did not file for re-election.

Other candidates are Tiffen Mayfield, Lupe Guadalcazar, Steve

McGuire, Tom Hairgrove, Jack Cline and Jerry Stocks.

Unopposed candidates for City Council are Kenny Watson and Tony Burson, incumbents, and Dickie Greenwood. Incumbent Jerry Stocks did not file for re-election.

While there will be no contested races on the city ballot, there will be two propositions. One calls for a half-cent city sales tax to be earmarked for industrial development and the other calls for a half-cent city sales tax to be used to reduce property taxes.

Incumbent Marshall Brown, whose term is expiring, did not file for re-election.

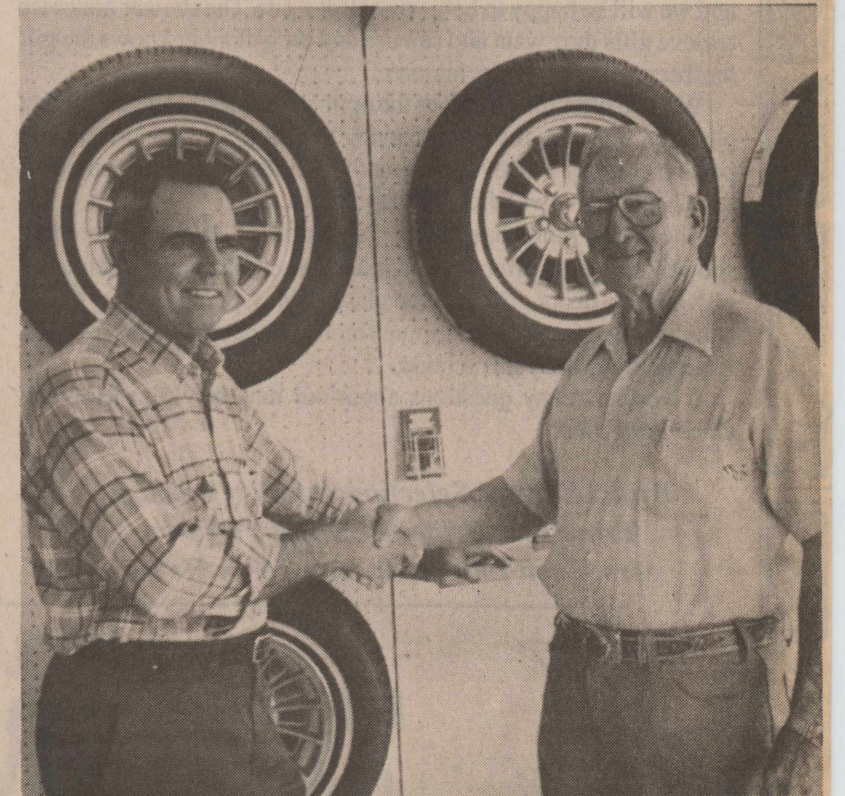

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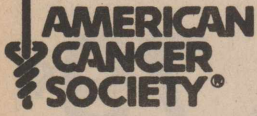
Rule chamber banquet April 4

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company ("Southwestern Bell") submitted an application on January 4, 1991 to the Public Utility Commission of Texas ("Commission") requesting that the central office-based PBX/type service market be declared subject to significant competition pursuant to the Commission's Substantive Rule §23.27. If this proposal is approved, Southwestern Bell intends to provide service to this market segment via its PLEXAR-Custom service, which provides for contractual rates and charges to be based on an individual customer-specific basis.

PLEXAR-Custom is a central office-based service which provides switched voice and/or data communications similar to a customer-premises PBX. PLEXAR-Custom service is currently being provided on an individual customer-specific basis via Southwestern Bell's Customer Specific Pricing Plan Tariff for central office-based telecommunications systems of 200 stations or more. If Southwestern Bell's application is approved, the PLEXAR-Custom service tariff will be revised to also include central office-based telecommunications systems which require between 75 and 200 stations.

Centrex and Plexar-II services are currently priced according to a standard tariff regardless of the customer's geographic location in the state. If this application is approved, customers needing 75 to 200 stations will be able to obtain this service priced on an individual customer-specific basis rather than under a standard tariffed rate.

Southwestern Bell's application proposes that the service market for PBX/type systems of 75 stations up to 200 stations be declared subject to significant competition statewide in all of the exchange areas served by Southwestern Bell and in which the central office capability to provide the service exists and/or can readily be made available.

Persons who wish to intervene, protest, or comment on this application should notify the Public Utility Commission of Texas by June 21, 1991 at 7800 Shoal Creek Boulevard, Suite 400N, Austin, Texas 78757. 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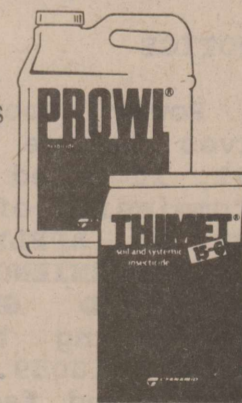

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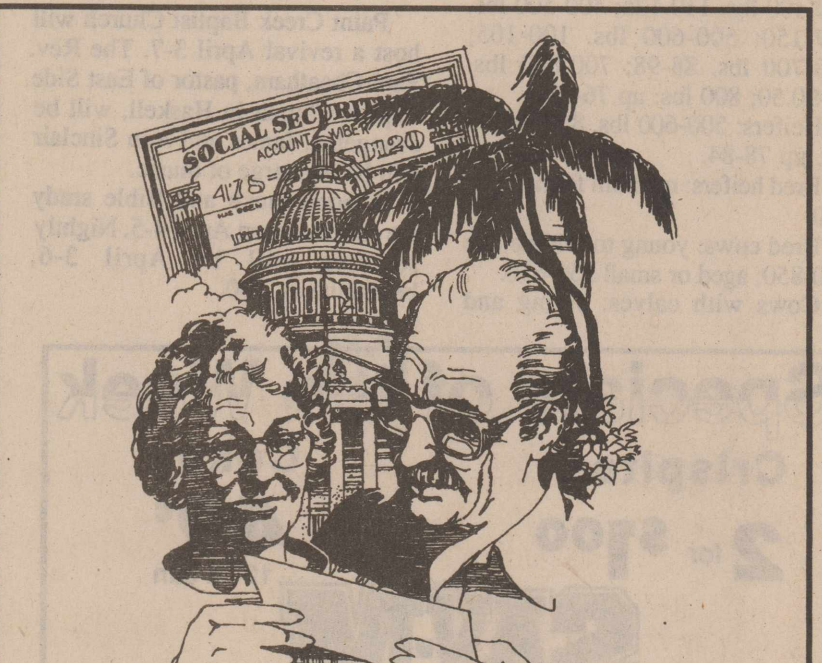
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Notes From The Rolling Plains

(Note: The following is one of a series of stories by noted wildlife photographer Wyman Meinzer offered by Haskell Save-A-\$ for your enjoyment.)

From the sandstone corridors of Los Lingos narrows I stepped into the light of morning, embracing the new sounds that greeted me. Water, only a few yards away, bubbled from the canyon floor as erosion severed a vein from the Ogalla aquifer, releasing its cool, fresh liquid to the delight of countless creatures which call Los Lingos their home. Continuing my walk I catch the faint rattle of rocks and see a large raccoon trekking along a crystal pool of fresh water. Maintaining a steady pace I am soon standing by a small water fall coming from a side canyon into Los Lingos. The water rushing over a rock embankment, mingling with that of The Tongue, and meandering on through the canyon. Dwarfed by the columns of sandstone above me, I round the bend in Los Lingos and stop momentarily. It is true. I hear the splash of water ahead, the sound of Los Lingos falls as it ascends its 12 foot drop into the crystalline pool below. No doubt these falls have known the faces of many people during the past two centuries and before. Stepping to the rocky edge I watch as the cold water, born from the depths of the earth, spills over the sandstone ledge, falling in a glittering spray in the light of morning. Tracks in the sand tell of night creatures who come to this canyon pool, drinking and perhaps capturing the minnows that dart about. I sit under a great overhang and listen to the flowing waters, wondering how many men and women in the past have sat in this exact spot, pondering their future, however bright or bleak it may have been. With photos taken and the morning sun climbing higher in the sky, I gather my gear and head west leaving behind the falls of The Tongue, but taking with me this experience of spiritual solitude.

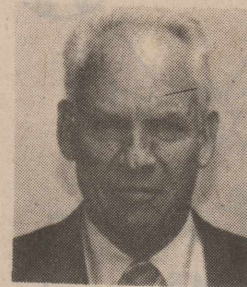
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PHARMACY TOPICS

Spices like cinnamon and cloves may increase the effect of insulin in the body and may lower heart disease risk, new research from the USDA in Beltsville, Maryland, suggests. In a test tube, foods with these spices seem to triple the hormone's ability to metabolize glucose.

Even infants may have migraine headaches, say researchers at the Arkansas Children's Hospital in Little Rock. Those with parents and siblings with migraine are most likely to get them. The most severe symptoms seem to respond to antidepressants and antihistamines.

Researchers in high-tech companies in Silicone Valley are designing new "delivery" systems for retinoic acid, the vitamin A derivative said to smooth away wrinkles. Microsponge version slows down the dose to minimize dryness, stinging and redness.

Dental procedures should be accompanied routinely by antibiotic coverage for people with abnormal heart valves or artificial joints, the American Journal of Medicine reports.

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
