Eggs usually are deposited on tips of nuts. Examine nutlet clusters for greenish white eggs. Spray nutlet clusters thoroughly when egg hatch is occurring.

If additional treatment is needed, the interval between applications should be about seven days.

The Sagerton Hmecoming will be Saturday and Sunday at the Sagerton Community Center.



Many pilots expected for annual fly-in breakfast

The skies over Haskell will begin buzzing at 7 o'clock Saturday morning as dozens of airplanes start landing at the Haskell Municipal Airport for the fourth annual Haskell Fly-In and Pilots' Breakfast.

About 70 visiting airplanes, including a number of military aircraft, are expected to participate in the show which will continue until 9 a.m.

Pilots and their guests arriving by air will receive a complimentary breakfast. Local visitors showing up to view the visiting aircraft will be admitted to the grounds for \$2 per person, a charge which includes

The fly-in was initiated in 1988 as a means of attracting pilots and

airplanes form the area, especially those enroute to the annual Breckenridge Air Show, which is held during Memorial Day weekend.

As in the past, a special feature of the show will be the appearance of a number of old military planes ("warbirds").

As an incentive to pilots, the City of Haskell will sell aviation gasoline for \$1.25 per gallon. The price applies only for transient aircraft and only during the hours of the show.

The Haskell Chamber of Commerce will present trophies to the oldest pilot, the youngest pilot and to the pilot making the longest flight. Previous fly-ins have attracted pilots from as far away as Canada, New Hampshire and

California.

Bud Lane is this year's fly-in chairman. Conrad Roewe is president of the sponsoring Chamber of Commerce. Wanda Dulaney, Chamber manager, and Bob Baker, city administrator, have assisted in the arrangements.

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



The old house didn't look as big as I remembered it. And the white paint had been done over with a yellow coating. The wooden floor of the curved front porch had been replaced by concrete.

But it still stands. And there's still a touch of eloquence about it. And memories.

I drove by it three times before I got up the nerve to stop. A kid was in the yard. I asked who lived there now. He told me, but I can't remember the name of the family.

Back in 1906, my great-aunt, my grandmother's sister, had come to Oklahoma from Kentucky as a new bride and this was her first, and only, home. Years later after my mother died, Aunt Minnie, by then a widow, took in my dad and his seven kids. This was our home from 1933 until the last sibling went off to college in 1950. And it was still "home" to go back to until my aunt died in 1962. We sold the house to the president of the bank, who later sold it to someone else.

The teenager asked me if I would like to take a peek inside. I opted to look in the South Room. (All our bedrooms had names: South Room, East Room, Little Room and Back Room.)

The South Room was something special. It occupied the space inside a horseshoe-shaped front porch, necessitating its six sides. I don't know the dimensions, but it was massive. The room had two outside doors, but there was no door connecting it to any part of the rest of the house. A person sleeping there was totally isolated from anyone in the main part of the

The family didn't use the South Room. It was our guest room. And we "loaned" it out to neighbors when they had more company than they could handle.

It fulfilled another need when my two brothers and I reached high school age. Dozens of boys slept there. That was in the days when most kids lived in the country. Often after a ball game or some other school function, a boy, or two or three boys, would be stranded in town. They always knew they could sleep there if they didn't have a way to get home. The doors were never locked.

It was interesting. We never knew who we'd have as breakfast

My aunt loved it. She used to say that when she died, she wanted her pallbearers to come from the boys who had slept in that room. That wish was fulfilled.

But like the outside of the house, the South Room had changed. A door had been cut into the north wall, connecting the room to the East Room. The uniqueness had been destroyed.

The accomodating "tour guide" invited me to see more. I declined his invitation. I had seen enough.


Road crossover to be removed


State Highway Department employees will remove the crossover on US 277 just north of its intersection with SH 6 near Stamford.

Haskell senior Chris McGhee will join the photography staff at Texas Tech University as a participant in the 1991-92 apprenticeship program.


He was selected for one of two photography apprenticeships offered by the university's publications department.

Driving course scheduled

55 Alive/Mature Driving, an innovative, classroom driver retraining program designed to help older persons improve their driving skills, is offering an additional class in Haskell. A definite date has not been set, but it probably will be in early June.

Developed by the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP), 55 Alive/Mature Driving is the first comprehensive driver retraining course geared to the specific needs of older motorists.

The course material covers the effects of aging and medications on driving, basic driving rules, license renewal, local traffic hazards, adverse road conditions, energy saving, and accident prevention

Research shows that older drivers are involved in more accidents than their middle-aged counterparts when the record is based on actual miles driven. The physical changes of aging create difficulties for many older drivers when yielding the right-of-way, backing, turning, changing lanes and entering and leaving expressways.

However, research also indicates that older persons can improve their driving abilities through additional training, attention and practice, enabling them to maintain their driving licenses longer while driving more safely.

TV weatherman talks to Rotary

KTAB-TV weatherman Bill Chaney spoke to the Haskell Rotary Club last Thursday.

Chaney said his television station tries to air all adverse weather conditions in the Big Country in order to warn residents of possible danger.

"We get a lot of complaints from viewers in Abilene for the time we take to warn viewers in other areas of possible weather dangers," said the

Chaney said weather reporting has progressed greatly in the 25 years he has been in Abilene. When he first joined KRBC, he said he gave his weather reports primarily from a UPI map and an AP

temperature chart.

New equipment and great advances in weather forecasting have enabled today's reports to be much more informative and more

Chaney explained that tornados are rated F0 to F5 on a Fujita scale, with the most severe being an F5 rating when winds are 261 to 318 miles per hour and damage is incredible. He estimated the April 24 tornado in Haskell as an F3 (winds between 158 and 206 miles per hour with severe damage).

The veteran weatherman told of many more advances in weather reporting and predicted even greater advancements for the future.

Funeral services were Friday afternoon at the Anson Church of Christ. Burial was in Mount Hope Cemetery near Anson, directed by Lawrence Funeral Home of Anson.

Burleson represented the 17th District from Jan. 3, 1947, until his retirement on Jan. 3, 1979.

Born in Anson on March 19, 1906, Burleson attended public schools in Anson, Abilene Christian College and Hardin-Simmons University and obtained a law degree from Cumberland University in Tennessee.

He started his career as a lawyer in Gorman in 1929. He served as county attorney and judge of Jones County for eight years before becoming a special agent for the Federal Bureau of Investigation. He entered the Navy in World War II and served three and a half years with duty in the North Atlantic and South Pacific. He was discharged as a lieutenant commander.

Burleson was elected to the 80th Congress as a Democrat and reelected to 15 succeeding Congresses. His career in the House of Representatives saw him unanimously elected to the Ways and Means Committee in July 1909.

He served as chairman of the House Administration; a member of the Budget Committee; a member of the House Foreign Affairs Committee; chairman of the National Security and Scientific Developments Affecting Foreign Policy Subcommittee; chairman of the Joint Senate-House Committee on the Library of Congress; vice chairman of the Joint Senate-House Committee on Printing; a member of the House Foreign Affairs Committee; and a member of the Library of Congress Trust Fund Board. He held a 98-percent attendance record at roll call votes and was known as a progressiveconservative.

In 1970, he was named outstanding alumnus of the year at Abilene Christian College. He also was awarded honorary doctorate degrees from Hardin-Simmons University and Abilene Christian University.

After his retirement, his papers and desk were donated to ACU's library. In 1978, the post office and Federal building in Abilene was named in honor of him.

He was preceded in death by his wife, the former Ruth DeWeese of

Stewart, a traffic management specialist with the General Services Administration (GSA) in Fort Worth, saved an estimated \$17.7 million in fiscal year 1990 by negotiation of favorable motor freight rates.

'Stewart helped initiate the Standard Tender of Service (STOS) in 1989, then used it to negotiate rates with individual carriers which were among the lowest in the nation," said FEB Chairman Paul F. Larson. "His agency's zone led the nation in savings with an average cost reduction of 46.5 percent.

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
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Notes From The Rolling Plains

(Note: The following is one of a series of stories by noted wildlife photographer Wyman Meinzer offered by Haskell Save-A-\$ for your enjoyment.)

"The Lightning appeared to be playing about in the chasm far below us, Bring out, in Wild relief, its bold and craggy sides." George W. Kendallexplorer Tule Canyon 1841.

Can you imagine what those explorers felt as they stood on brink of the awesome canyon and watched as nature unleashed its wrath on the plains of Texas? Ray Penman and I can attest to the feeling of insignificance as we too experienced some of the very weather that the frontiersman in 1841 wrote about during his first sighting of Tule Canyon over 1 1/2 centuries ago. In shooting photos for a book on the water courses of West Texas, I had planned a trip to this fascinating canyon because of its being a Red River tributary with both historic and geologic significance. Ray and I had established a camp where Tule creek exited the very gorge that George Kendall described during his thunderstorm interlude. Although the weather forcast was "iffy", we decided to take the chance and hope the forcasted deluge bypased us during our two day and two night stay. The first night was unforgettable as the stars shown millions strong in the vast skies above. Coyotes howled their songs of old as the morning light revealed a light mist hanging low over the vertical sandstone cliffs. The day was eventful as we hiked up and down the picturesque gorge, skirting an irrate rattler and various other less trying reptiles that inhabitated the landscape. As nightfall settled in for our second sleep under the stars, an ominous rumble could be heard far to the northwest. Our camping gear packed, with the exception of our tents and sleeping bags, we were ready for a quick escape up to high ground in case of a flash flood. The dancing reflection of our campfire was not unlike the flash of lightening that glowed in the glowering thunderheads to the north. By midnight we had decided that the storm had mercifully passed us by, allowing us an escape to the summit by the light of day. But before the storm had abated, we were treated to natures drumrolls unlike one will hear on the plains above. Bombarded by the echoes from the towering cliffs, the thunder seemed to shake the very cliffs that stood guard over this high plains masterpiece. Standing in the glow of the juniper fueled firelight, we too felt the imputence with which nature displays its might during the clash of the weather systems high in the night





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



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






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Winners named in 4-H contests
