## Schools are big business in Haskell

Last year, trustees in the 1,047 Texas school districts voted a billion-dollar increase in school budgets. Local school property taxes were increased by half a billion dollars. School budgets totaled \$15.3 billion expended for the 3,377,223 children enrolled last October, for an average of \$4,524 per pupil.

The figures come from the latest issue of Bench Marks 1990-91 School District Budgets in Texas, an annual publication of the Texas Research League, an Austin-based, educational corporation engaged in governmental research.

An average of \$3,775 per student for current operations was budgeted last year plus \$316 for repayment of debt and \$433 per student for capital outlay.

Haskell CISD's budget provided \$3,858 per student for current operations, \$22.22 for debt service, and \$929 per student for capital outlay based on the 765 students enrolled in October 1990.

The average base salary for classroom teachers paid by Haskell CISD in October 1990 was \$25,574, plus supplements for the career ladder. The average for administrators was \$39,110, and the average for other professional support employees (librarians, counselors, nurses, supervisors, etc.) was \$27,565.

Four dollars in each five were spent for salaries. Statewide payroll expenses averaged \$3,087 per student, as compared to \$3,011 in Haskell CISD. Payroll expense is determined by salary levels and staffing patterns.

Taxpayers provided one teacher for 14.4 students in Haskell while the statewide pupil-teacher ratio was 16.4 to one. Because of the existence of small classes, especially at the high school level, and abbreviated teaching schedules, many classes have more than the average number of students.

The average school district in Texas imposed a property tax at the rate of \$1.088 per \$100 of appraised value, which value averaged 98 percent of market value (selling price). The "true tax rate" was \$1.066 (\$1.088 times 98 percent) statewide. Locally, the Haskell CISD imposed a rate of \$.982 while property was appraised at 103.3 percent of its market value, making the true rate \$1.04 per \$100 of market value.

The report points out that the calculation of a true tax rate based on market value rather than on appraised value is necessary to make a valid comparison of tax levels with other schools.

The tax on a house that would sell for \$80,000 in Haskell CISD would have been \$787. If the homeowner were eligible for homestead exemptions, the tax would have been \$737, and if owned by a person 65 years or older, the tax on an \$80,000 house in this district would have averaged \$639, or less if subject to a tax freeze. That compares with statewide average tax bills of \$871, \$771 and \$586 respectively for an \$80,000 house.

Last year, Haskell CISD's revenue from the property tax increased by 2.7 percent for 1990-91 as compared to an 8.7 percent increase statewide. Local property taxes plus state aid totaled \$4,406 per student in Haskell CISD as

compared to \$3,661 statewide.

Under the new school finance system, the state and the new county education districts will fund the total cost of the foundation program, which averaged \$2,458 per student last year and was \$3,233 in Haskell CISD.

Local school districts can levy property taxes to enrich the foundation program. Enrichment last year averaged \$995 per pupil to which the state added an average of \$207 per student to guarantee the tax yield in property-poor districts. Enrichment by the Haskell CISD was \$530; the state guarantee added



Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households should fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available at the Principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials.

For school officials to determine eligibility, households receiving food stamps or AFDC must list the child's name, their food stamp or AFDC case number and the signature and name of an adult household member. Households not receiving food stamps or AFDC must list: names of all household members; Social Security numbers of all adult household members or a statement that the household member does not possess one; total household income and the amount and source of the income received by each household member; and the signature of an adult household member certifying that the information provided is correct.

Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced price policy Haskell ISD will review applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on the informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal may make a request either orally or in writing to Haskell ISD, P.O. Box 937, Haskell, Texas, 79521 or telephone at 817-864-2602 for a hearing on the decision.

Households that list a food stamp or AFDC case number must report when the household no longer receives these benefits. Other households approved for benefits are required to report increases in household income of over \$50. per month or \$600. per year and decreases in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for benefits if the household's income falls at or below levels shown above.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for school meal benefits. If a household wishes to apply for benefits for foster children living with them, the household should contact the school for more information.

The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for purposes of determining eligibility and verifying data.

In the operation of child feeding program administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age or handicap. If any member of a household believes they have been discriminated against, they should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

## TAX **PLANNING**

### MANDATORY IRA WITHDRAWALS

Like all good things, the tax deferral opportunities of an Individual Retirement Account (IRA) eventually come to an end. Reaching age 70 1/2 is the event that triggers the beginning of the end. Mandatory withdrawals must begin no later than April 1 of the year following the year in which you reach age 70 1/2 (withdrawals may start as early as age 59 1/2). For example, if you reach age 70 1/2 in 1991, mandatory withdrawals must begin by April 1, 1992.

At age 70 1/2, you have three options: withdrawing the entire balance in your IRA, taking smaller amounts annually over the rest of your life, or taking a large sum plus annual payments. If you elect to take periodic payments from your IRA, you will be subject to the minimum distribution rules.

Calculating the amount of the minimum distribution is quite complex, but it generally works this way: Take the balance in your IRA account at December 31 and divide it by your remaining life expectancy (determined by actuarial tables provided by the IRS). The result is the minimum amount you must withdraw from your IRA each year. Fcr example, if the actuarial tables indicate a remaining life expectancy of 16 years, and your IRA balance is \$62,416, you must withdraw 1/16 or \$3,901 annually. The minimum withdrawal can be adjusted annually.

Distributions must be made each year, beginning in the year you turn 70 1/2. However, the initial distribution can be deferred until April 1 of the following year. If you defer the first distribution, you will be taxed on two distributions in that year.

If you fail to withdraw the minimum distribution each year, you will be assessed a 50 percent penalty.

Someone has said that a man is as old as his arteries, and certainly physical reality can prove this true. But the comfort of it is that we are not just the sum-total of our bones, skin, hair and teeth (or what's left of them). The real "we" are the spirit and soul housed inside all of these temporary things, the part that doesn't have to be affected by aging and withering.

How refreshing it is to see a 90year-old lady with all the usual, natural wrinkles on the outside, whose inner being is as fresh and beautiful as a young girl's. Cicero said that an old man in whom there is something of the young, may grow old in body, but never in mind. That is the surprise bonus package of old age that we need to unwrap and enjoy as long as we

Jane Coston's 98-year-old mother, Mary Meadows, sister of the late U.S. Congressman George Mahon, is an amazing example of this kind of youth-into-age. She keeps up a lively interest in news, entertainment, family and world happenings; alert, neat, independent minded and aware of others.

In Rhineland, Theresa Claus, Georgeen Meadors' 93-year-old mother, embodies an outlook and attitude that anyone might envy and do well to emulate. Each night, preparing for bed, Theresa expresses her youthful spirit. "Well," she asks, "haven't we had a perfectly wonderful day? What do we have planned for tomorrow?" A joy and inspiration every day for those around her, and even for those who meet her only once.

There are some ways of looking at life that we seem to fall into in our older age that are not as commendable or well received. Old people like to give good advice. Perhaps this is done, as La Rochefoucauld sarcastically wrote in "Reflections", "as solace for no longer being able to provide bad examples." Maybe we do it because we honestly want to save others time and trouble. Whatever the reason it is a common vice. We are too often, in our geriatric, long-inthe-tooth stage, too intent upon our own interests.

In the Westminister Abbey bookstore in London I ran across a parchment beautifully printed in calligraphy with the prayer of a 17th century nun. It addresses many

of the tendencies that we senior citizens develop so well we almost elevate them to a state of art. The witty, aging, anonymous lady squarely hit a lot of nails on the head, showing that human nature hasn't changed much. I've hung it over my desk, hoping to goodness to continue reading it as a daily reminder to myself. Since no credit or copyright was given I feel safe in sharing it by reprinting it here.

A 17th Century Nun's Prayer Lord, thou knowest better than I know myself that I am growing older and will someday be old. Keep me from the fatal habit of thinking I must say something on every subject and on every occasion. Release me from craving to straighten out everybody's affairs.

Make me thoughtful, but not moody; helpful, but no bossy. With my vast store of wisdom, it seems a pity not to use it all, but thou knowest Lord that I want a few friends at the end.

Keep my mind from the recital of endless details; give me wings to get to the point. Seal my lips on my aches and pains. They are increasing, and the love of rehearsing them is becoming sweeter as the years go by.

I dare not ask for grace enough to enjoy the tales of other's pains, but help me to endure them with patience.

I dare not ast for improved memory, but for a growing humility and a lessening cocksureness, when my memory seems to clash with the memory of others. Teach me the glorious lesson that occasionally I may be

Keep me reasonably sweet, I do not want to be a saint. Some of them are so hard to live with-but a sour old peson is one of the crowning works of the devil.

Give me the ability to see good things in unexpected people. And give me, O Lord, the grace to tell

Amen, Sister, amen.

## Rail crossings made safer

Texas railroad crossings lacking an active warning device will have reflective strips added to them under new rules adopted last week by the State Highway and Public Transporation Commission.

Editor: I am a subscriber to The Haskell Free Press. I came across an item that might be of interest to you. Enclosed is a copy of the book "Circle of Courage" by Mr. Al Chamberlin.

This is a story of some of the combat experience of one platoon during the Korean Conflict. What is unusual about this book is that the characters in the book are real and Mr. Chamberlin uses their real names. One of the persons, Jack Neathery, his wife, Carol, and son, Joey, live in Haskell County, east of Rochester (this is Jack Neathery Jr.; his father died two years ago).

Jack is my cousin and we both grew up in San Pedro, Calif., so I knew something about this before, but without the details. Jack won the Silver Star and Bronze Star for valor in combat. Nevertheless, because of the interest in Operation Desert Storm this year, and because this is a local person, this story does have some human interest. ## **Pearl Harbor** veterans to be honored

The Department of Defense wants to honor veterans of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor nearly 50 years ago, and has launched a nationwide search to locate them, says U.S. Sen. Phil

"Sailors and soldiers who served at the naval air station and at the airfields and other military facilities on the island of Oahu on Dec. 7, 1941, are eligible for a bronze medal commemorating their service," the senator said.

Under a bill approved by Congress last year, Gramm noted, Pearl Harbor veterans, including civilian employees of the Navy and other services, or their families may be awarded the medal.

An estimated 100,000 service personnel were stationed in the vicinity of Pearl Harbor when the massive air attack that pulled America into World War II occurred, killing more than 3,000.

Eligible veterans or next of kin may apply for the medal by calling the Navy Awards and special Projects office at 1-800-545-4052, or writing to the Chief of Naval Operations, Room 5E589, the Pentagon, Washington, DC 20350.

Last week my brother-in-law and I made our annual pilgimage to the old buffalo hunting town site of Rath City. Since Bob and I both share a passion for the buffalo history of our state we were excited about the prospects of once more retracing the steps of those wild, grizzled hunters of 1876-79. A cool breeze had kicked up when we arrived at the open field where the sod and picket buildings sat over 114 years ago. The rock monument placed on the site of Rath's store is the only object which might lead anyone to believe that the spot was anything other than open pasture and now a wheat field. Standing 300 yards from the old town site I glanced to the northeast and saw the blue forms of Double Mountain rising into the summer sky. As we neared the location of the dance hall and saloon traces of evidence lay scattered in the freshly plowed field that told of a time when men and women lived for the ecstasy of one wild night knowing not if morning would bring the hiss of a Comanche arrrow and the hideous scream of dying men. Broken whiskey bottles spoke of a superficial escape from the uncertainty these men knew with the dawn of each day. A dip in the soil with the spade unearthed a huge lead slug, probabily dropped from the cartridge belt of a liquor dazed hunter as he stood at the back of the crude saloon and cafe, dreading the dawn when he would point his wagons and men to the west and another month of solitude on the buffalo range. Rotten shell casings from the big killing guns known as the Sharps sometimes appear between the weed stalks, encrusted with a century of dirt and mud. As the morning wore on I retreated back to the pickup and what little shade that a lonely mesquite offered. Heat waves were now slithering into the sky above the town site, making Bob appear as a willowy choreographer reenacting the steps to a dance that died with the town in 1879.

## Fuel tax changes opposed

Texas farmers and ranchers are alarmed by what they understand are alternatives being considered in the Texas House of Representatives regarding taxes, according to S. M. True, president of the Texas Farm

"Proposals to increase the state fuel tax by 13 cents to a total of 28 cents a gallon is bad enough for all Texans," True said. "But, changing the off-road exemption for tractors and other production equipment to a once-a-year refund---as proposed--substantially increases producers' up-front production costs.'

The president of the state's largest general farm organization said the damage becomes even more severe with the concept of allowing the refund to equate to only 75 percent of the charge.

"That would result in a new 7cents-per-gallon tax on fuel used for food and fiber production," True said. "That is unacceptable and intolerable. We strongly urge that the entire concept be dropped."

The farm leader said another proposal floating in the Texas House of extending the state franchise tax to farm and ranch enterprises is no more than an "income tax in disguise."

Texas Farm Bureau has expressed support for streamlining government, increasing the state sales tax by one percent, and a voter-approved state lottery, True said. All of these actions would affect farmers and ranchers the same way as all citizens of the state, he explained.

'The fuel tax proposal and the franchise tax extension are grossly unfair, as agriculture is the only industry that cannot pass along taxes to consumers," True said "The proposals are not the prope means to address the budge





## License plates to feature new wording

The eyes of Texas may think they're seeing things begninng next spring. But deep in the hearts of Texans, they'll know it's true.

That really will be "The Lone Star State" written across the bottoms of Texas license plates on passenger cars.

"Texans have made their pride plain, to the point of making it the object of legislation," said Arnold Oliver, engineer-director of the State Department of Highways and Public Transpsortation. "We obviously have a lot to be proud of, and our newest license plate, with its flat and 'The Lone Star State,' couldn't trumpet that any more loudly."

The State Highway and Public Transportation Commission approved the new design in its July

The HASKELL FREE PRESS -- Thursday, August 8, 1991 -- Page 7 meeting. The new tags will begin appearing when all the current plates are issued, probably by early spring, said Lawrance Smith of the Division of Motor Vehicles.

Two years ago, the slogan surfaced as an alternative to using the proposed "The Friendship State," rejected by the commission after Texans said they didn't like the idea. ("Friendship" is the state's official motto.) The commission opted not to mess with Texas plates except to add the Texas flag on the upper left.

This spring, the Texas Legislature passed a resolution suggesting the department consider adding "The Lone Star State" to redesigned plates.

"Though the resolution conveyed a suggestion, we agreed it was time to put Texas' unofficial but bestloved label on the plates, Oliver



## What is election about?

There has been much confusion about the Aug. 10 election(s). The following information has been prepared by John Hannah Jr., Secretary of State:

During the last session of the legislature, a school finance bill passed which radically alters the way school property taxes are collected and distributed.

The bill created 188 county education districts (CEDs) composed of the school districts in each county. Those county education districts will levy a property tax which will be distributed equally among school districts within the county education district.

The election to be held Aug. 10 will enable taxpayers in the county education districts to avail themselves of certain exemptions on their homesteads as well as open up the possibility of taxing certain tangible personal property.

What is on the Aug. 10 ballot?

There will be two elections held that day---a state constitutional amendment election and a school district election.

The state election involves two constitutional amendments: (1) Proposition 1 to allow certain property tax homestead exemptions and taxation of certain tangible personal property by the county education district; and (2) Proposition 2 which allows the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board to issue up to \$300 million in general obligation bonds to fund student loans.

The school districts will conduct a local option election on behalf of

the county education district concerning the issues addressed by Proposition 1. The school ballot will be in three parts: (1) Whether to adopt a homestead exemption of 20 percent of market value; (2) Whether to adopt an additional exemption of \$10,000 for the elderly and disabled; and (3) Whether to tax non-income producing tangible personal property.

What happens Proposition 1 fails?

If this constitutional amendment fails statewide, the school district election whereby the voters authorize the exemptions will be disregarded. However, the governing body of the CED might adopt these exemptions under existing proviisions of the constitution.

Does each school district have to approve the three ballot propositions for them to pass?

The results of each question will be added together for the county education district as a whole. If the question fails in one district, but passes the CED as a whole, it is still adopted by the CED.

Is a vote against Proposition 1 a vote against taxing tangible personal property by the CED?

Yes, but it is also a vote against voter-authorization for the CED to use homestead exemptions and elderly and disabled exemptions. As stated previously, the CED governing body might adopt these provisions following procedures set up under current law.

What items would be taxed as tangible personal

Perhaps tangible personal property can best be described by what it is not: It is not real property; it is not household goods. which are exempt from taxation by the Texas Constitution; it is not intangible property, such as stocks or bonds; and it is not incomeproducing property. The most obvious targets are cars, boats, airplanes and RVs.

Where do I vote?

Haskell County voters will cast their ballots on the constitutional amendments in their regular voting precincts. On the school questions, residents of Rule, Rochester and Paint Creek school districts will vote at the schools. Those in the Haskell school district will vote at the Haskell National Bank community room and the Weinert

Q: I recently heard that the VA home loan guarantee fee increased. What are the new amounts.

A: The Budget Reconciliation Act of 1990 increased loan funding fees for veterans making no down payment from 1.25 percent to 1.865 percent of the loan amount. For those veterans making a down payment of 5 percent, but less than 10 percent, the loan funding fee went from .75 percent to 1.375 percent of the loan amount. Veterans making a down payment of 10 percent or more saw the loan funding fee go from .5 percent to 1.125 percent of the loan amount. These increases are effective for loans closed between Nov. 1, 1990, and Sept. 30, 1991.


## Free markers for veterans

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) is still providing government headstones and markers to identify the graves of veterans at no cost to them or their survivors.

Although Congress has recently changed some monetary reimbursement benefits available to veterans, there was no change in the program that authorizes the headstones and grave markers.

Approximately 465,000 veterans died between Oct. 1, 1989, and Sept. 30, 1990. The families of about half of them requested VA headstones or markers.

Recycling and reusing the material in tin cans reduces related energy use by 74 percent, air pollution by 85 percent, solid waste by 95 percent and water pollution by 76 percent---yet only five percent of tin cans are recycled.

## Firemen attend training school

Three Haskell firemen were among 5,000 firefighters from 25 countries and across Texas who attended the 62nd annual Texas Firemen's Training School on the campus of Texas A&M University.

The school, hosted by the Texas Engineering Extension Service and sponsored by the State Firemen's and Fire Marshal's Association was held July 15 to Aug. 2.

The Haskell group, consisting of Eddie Klose, Bill Steele and Scott Alves attended the classes held July 22-26.

Students practiced battling real fires on mock-ups of warehouses, automobiles, trucks, heater-treaters, rail cars and loading terminals. Firefighters attended basic and advanced courses depending on their level of expertise and previous training. Classes were conducted for Spanish-speaking firefighters as well as firefighters from industry, municipalities and those who work with hazardous materials.

Suppressing fires isn't the only concern of Txas firefighters who attended the municipal school. "There is a growing interest in agro-rescue," said Roger Fields, director of emergency services for the City of Friona. Fields was the instructor-in-charge of the "agrorescue" course.

An accident on a farm outside of Bryan recently claimed the life of a well-known Texas A&M professor. According to Fields, these accidents make it necessary for firefighters to be trained in agricultural rescue.

Students practiced on a grain elevated storage tank, combine, hay swather, hay baler, brush cutter, tractor and auger trailer. Fields said the 30-hour course, which is designed to save lives, drew many volunteer firefighters from rural communities.

Other rescue courses also were taught. One involved high-rise rescue where participants rappel from a five-story building.



## Bids sought from local contractors

Local contractors will have an opportunity to bid on the new city hall construction if they choose to participate in the bid process, City Administrator Bob Baker explained this week.

Baker said that state law requires that any renovation or new construction project of a public building costing more than \$35,000 be by a bonded contractor.

"This should not be a problem for our local contractors," Baker said. "A bond runs about one or one-and-a-half percent of a project. Contractors simply include that cost in their bids, which enables them to more than recover the cost of the bond. The law also allows the council to give preference to local contractors and it is not required to take the low bid."

Baker said the city will advertise for bids and no one can be barred for reasons other than a poor performance record or bad credit.

"Local contractors are encouraged to bid on the construction and the council will give preference to them," Baker said.

The law also requires that all public building plans be drawn and supervised by an architect or an engineer. "We do not have anyone in Haskell; therefore we have had to go outside the city to secure this type of service," Baker said.

## City taxes due to drop by 4%

City ad valorem taxes (property taxes) will be reduced next year, even with the construction of a new city hall, City Administrator Bob Baker said Tuesday.

Baker said taxes will be decreased

He said a home owner with a house appraised at \$40,000 will see his city property taxes reduced from \$114.52 to \$110.

Baker said records at the Haskell County Appraisal District office reveal that the average home in Haskell is appraised at \$23,000. Taxes on an average home last year were \$65.84. These will decrease to \$63.25 next year.


