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## Supt. addresses taxpayers

Dear Taxpayers: As most of you are aware, the State Legislature has not given much, if any, relief to the taxpayer. Although the home owners of the district will most likely receive some benefit from the exemptions approved by voters on Aug. 10, the requirement for revenue for the school district has not decreased, but continues to increase because of the state's failure to adequately fund education.

The Haskell CISD has been prorated \$34,000 thus far for 1990-91 (these are monies the district earned but did not receive because of the lack of funds at the state level), and it appears the district could be prorated as much as \$200,000 in 1991-92. These are difficult decision-making times for school boards and superintendents as they try to develop budgets and estimate revenue which they may receive, and at the same time be fair and reasonable to the taxpayers of the district.

The Haskell CISD Board of Trustees and superintendent want to assure the taxpayers of our district that as we develop a budget to adequately provide an excellent education for the children of the district, we will at the same time use good judgement in the raising of revenue to fund the budget. We shall strive to raise no more money than is necessary to provide the needed services to our children.

The board and superintendent also wish to commend the taxpayers and other community members for your most generous support of the Haskell CISD. Your concern for and dedication to our school is a positive reflection of your interest in the education of the children of our district. It is our goal to see that the students receive a dollar's worth of educational benefit for each dollar you invest.

## City Council meets tonight

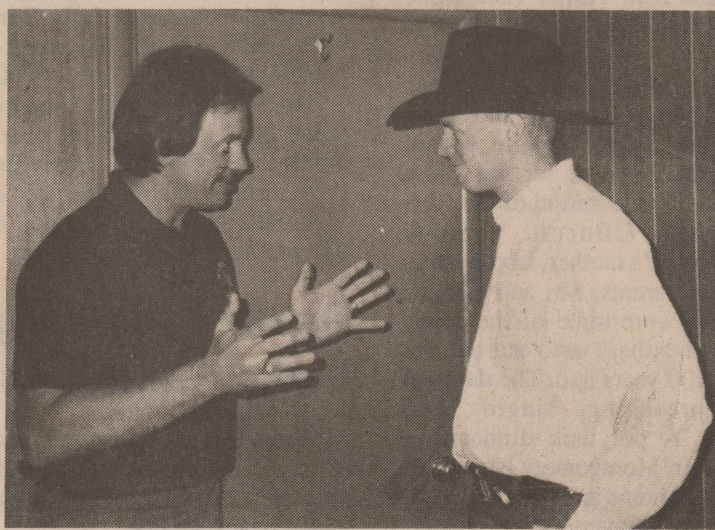
Abilene engineer Ken Martin will present a proposal for the new city hall to the City Council tonight (Thursday).

## Election Saturday

### Voters to decide on city hall financing

Haskell voters go to the polls Saturday to decide if the City of Haskell will be authorized to issue \$400,000 in certificates of obligation to finance construction of a new city hall.

All ballots will be cast at City Hall. Only registered voters residing within the city limits are eligible to vote.

Voters have been frequently reminded that Saturday's voting will be only to determine the method of financing construction of a new city hall. It will not be on whether to build a city hall.

Nevertheless, widespread opposition to a new city hall is making it apparent some will be voting against the mode of financing as a protest vote against a new city hall.

The City Council has indicated that a new city hall will be built, and issuance of the certificates of obligation is merely one means of possible financing. While the council feels that the certificates are the most practical route to go, other means have been suggested.

City officials maintain a new city hall is necessary. They contend the present city hall, built in 1926, fails to meet a number of state and federal regulations concerning handicapped accessibility, record preservation, building codes and

public safety. Mayor Greg Melton said that continued, willful violation of regulations subjects the city to possible legal confrontations with governmental entities and citizens alike.

The city considered renovation of the present city hall building, but rejected the idea when an engineer estimated that such a project would cost in excess of \$300,000.

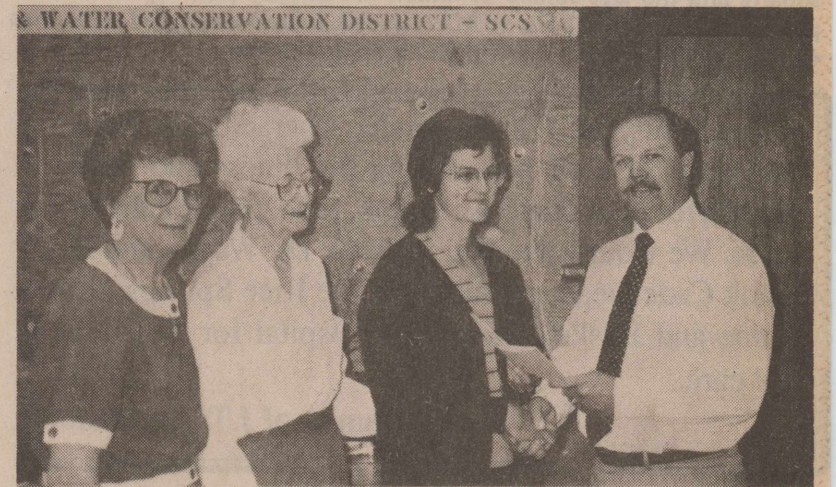
The City Council on June 27 authorized a contract with the First National Bank of Haskell to borrow \$400,000, secured by certificates of

obligation pledging ad valorem tax receipts as well as revenues from the water and sewer fund.

But on July 19, the date the council was to meet to issue the certificates, a dozen or so citizens appeared before the council after presenting a petition requiring the city to put the matter to vote.

The city then passed a resolution setting Aug. 24 as the election date.

Opposition forces at the meeting spoke mainly against a new city hall, not against the manner of financing.

### Dealers to charge battery, tire fees

Local dealers will be required to collect a fee on each battery sold after Sept. 1, in order to comply with a new state law.

A \$2 fee will be due on the sale of each lead-acid battery with a capacity of at least six volts, but less than 12 volts, and a \$3 fee for batteries of 12 volts or more.

And beginning Jan. 1, tire dealers will be required to collect a \$2 waste tire recycling fee on the sale of each tire. The tire fee applies to all tires sold for automobiles, light trucks or trucks.

Neither the battery nor tire fee is subject to the sales tax.

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### Notes From The Rolling Plains

(Note: The following is one of a series of stories by noted wildlife photographer Wyman Meinzer offered by Haskell Save-A-\$ for your enjoyment.)

As the dog days of August 1991 burn themselves into the diaries of our past, once more I sit in the shade of a mesquite tree and contemplate the arrival of a new Autumn season. The month of August stimulates the revival of past memories for me. All are good up to this point in life. During my teen years and the early 20's it was the month to make ready for the coming of another year of school. Now that I can look back on it, those years were some of the best in my life. New cloths, new books, and few worries of long term consequence. Mom and Dad were both here and life was one happy experience after another. I suppose some of the most memorable moments of Augusts past were those times spent cleaning the old shotgun, readying it for the coming of the hunting seasons but a few days away. What is it about great hunts of the past that seem to etch themselves forever in our minds? The actual taking of the dove isn't really what stirs the reminiscences of yesteryear for me. More than anything it was a combination of many factors, none of which override the other. The primal senses that speak of the coming of another season; Old Red, the golden retriever, standing by our side as Rick and I waited in the sunflowers by the old stock tank for the evening flight of dove. The recoil of the gun, the smell of burned powder, and the hoot of delight as Old Red splashes the water to bring a dove from across the tank. If I am destined to live to an age of old I think that these memories will forever walk with me. It is nearing that time of the year again and for those of us who appreciate the anticipation of what Autumn will bring, I hope that you will also remember that it is becoming more difficult to experience what I've described with each passing year. Unruly men and women barging into the field with no regard for landowners and wildlife are tarnishing the future of the Autumn experience for us and our children. I say enjoy the remaining days of August and the onset of another hunting season but please be aware of the responsibility that we all must share. Let's keep this Autumn anticipation alive for our children and theirs to enjoy.

## Public Notice

On July 22, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas for approval of two new optional services, Exchange Connection Service and Customer Alerting Enablement. Exchange Connection Service will permit a customer of the Telephone Company to provide voice messaging service, telephone answering service, or other services to itself or to patrons of the customer. Customer Alerting Enablement will permit residence and business lines to receive an alerting tone (intermittent dial tone) transmitted by an Exchange Connection Service customer. The proposed effective date for this offering is September 23, and will be available statewide where facilities permit.

The calling party's telephone number and other originating network call information will be delivered to the Exchange Connection Service customer when the calling number and the called number are served by the same switch. Additionally, the caller's telephone number and other originating network call information may be recorded and stored by the Exchange Connection Service customer. Customers may be able to identify the caller before the call is answered. All Exchange Connection Service customers will be required to sign a non-disclosure agreement prior to being provided service. In the agreement the customer agrees not to disclose the calling party's telephone number unless the customer has written permission from the calling party.

The Telephone Company estimates these new services will increase its annual revenues during the first year by approximately \$1.2 million. Providers of voice messaging service and telephone answering services and their subscribers are the types of customers likely to be affected by approval of these services.

Exchange Connection Service is provided to customers in two parts: Local Serving Arrangement, which provides access to the exchange network; and Optional Service Features. The proposed rates, for both Exchange Connection Service and Customer Alerting Enablement, including installation charges, are as follows:

General superintendents include Joey Kimbrough, livestock; Alice Yates, adult and youth; Melissa Roberson, adult; and Laela Martin, youth.

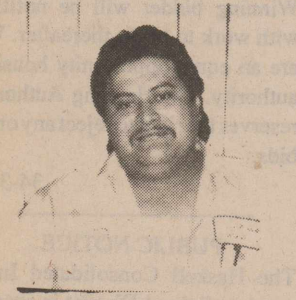

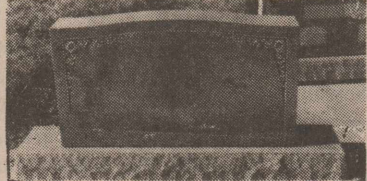

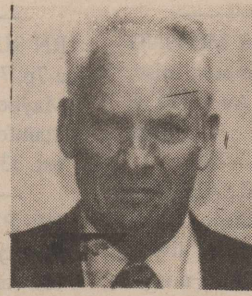

## PHARMACY TOPICS

Youngsters on a limited fat diet seem to grow as well as those on a standard U.S. diet, say researchers at Loma Linda University School of Public Health in California. Study compared students at public school with Seventh Day Adventist, who eat less meat and dairy foods.

New radiation technique to fight bladder cancer directs the radiation directly at the tumor without damaging the bladder, bowel or rectum. In this intra-operative radiation therapy, the bladder itself does not have to be removed.

High stress jobs do not seem to put pregnant women at higher risk of miscarriage, stillbirth or other childbearing problems according to a survey by the National Institute of Child Health and Human Development. The researchers compared women medical residents with the wives of male medical students.

Researcher at MIT is working on an anti-cancer material -- derived from shark cartilage -- that seems to inhibit the growth of the capillaries needed to supply the blood for tumors to grow.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of four women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

Guidelines For Screening Mammography Established by the American Cancer Society.

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.
