Coaches expect the Greyhounds to be a more formidable foe than Roscoe was last Friday when the Indians held their first scrimmage.

But they were well pleased with the Indians' performance against the 1A Plowboys.

Haskell's first unit outscored Roscoe's first unit, 3-2, and the Indians' second unit was on the long end of a 3-1 score

Voters say 'No'

City hall financing arrangement rejected

Haskell voters said "no" Saturday to a proposal to give the City of Haskell authority to issue \$400,000 in certificates of obligation to finance construction of a new city hall.

The final tally showed 299 voting against the proposal, with 173 voting in favor. Percentagewise, the proposal was defeated, 63-37.

The special election was for the purpose of determining a method of financing the new city hall, not whether the structure is to be built.

Costs going up for traffic fines

Like a lot of other things, it's going to cost you more to break the

Beginning Sept. 1, court costs for traffic fines in JP court will be increased by \$5.50.

Justice of the Peace Buck Everett said the increase in court costs has been mandated by new legislation. All of the increase will go to the state.

Court costs on traffic violation charges will go up from \$17.50 to \$23, Everett said. That means that fines and court costs will range from \$40.50 to \$155 for speeding violations.

The \$40.50 is for speeding between 56 and 64 miles per hour. The cost increases in increments of \$5 for each additional 5 miles of

speed up to \$75 for speeds of 85 to 89 mph. Fine and costs for speeds of 90 to 100 mph are \$135.50 and for 100 mph or more the fine and costs come to \$155.50.

The \$5.50 extra in court cost also applies to all other traffic violations.

And beginning Sept. 1, those operating motor vehicles without proof of financial responsibility will be subject to fines of \$175, plus a \$75 added charge by the state, plus the \$23 court costs, for a total of \$273.

The new fine schedule follows on the heels of a new law in effect since June 1 which calls for a \$20 assessment, in addition to fine and court costs, for traffic violations in school zones. The \$20 goes into a state fund to promote child safety.



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Mary Kaigler: From the Inside Out

Idly glancing at the back-toschool flyer in today's mail--remembering the yearly thrill of having new "pointy" Crayolas and a new, red Big Chief tablet---I saw the picture of Elmer's white paste and I thought of James Anderson and my first day of school.

That morning Mama tied the sash of my new print dress, brushed my unruly red hair into long curls and then abandoned me at the door of Mrs. Shaw's room.

Whatever I expected of first grade, it didn't include seeing James Anderson eat his paste. Sitting across the aisle from me, he worked on it all day. It was the squeezetube kind and as it oozed up, finally curling over, he licked it off. By the end of the day he had squeezed out the last morsel and was peeling the wrappers off his new crayons, one by one. I watched expectantly, but he didn't eat them. (Later on, when he ate the paste that all teachers knew how to cook up and put into jars for class projects, it seemed a perfectly natural thing for him to do. We just all accepted that "James eats his paste.")

Sitting across on the other side was Gene Young who had already fascinated me by printing with chalk the town's name, ABERNATHY, down the side of Daddy's newly painted black Chevy. Greatly impressed, even if Daddy wasn't, I thought it was a brilliant thing to do, being such a long word.

Smart, witty and competitive, Gene completely deflated my timid ego that day by making "faces" at me every time I looked at him. My feelings were hurt, but I continued to look at him every chance I got and to secretly "claim" him anyway.

Mesmerized by these two nervous boys who were themselves trying to cope with the new situation called school, I hyponotically watched them; repulsed on one side, rebuffed on the other. One making my stomach hurt and one hurting my heart, while I spent the day not at all understanding of the sometimesstrange beginnings of friendships.

All through school James was one you just couldn't take seriously, even though he tried. The high school yearbook in which he painstakingly inscribed, "I could sit in study hall the rest of my life gazing into your blue eyes," belonged to my best friend, browneyed Merle Goebel. She and the entire freshman class thought this case of mistaken book-identity was hilarious. At the junior-senior Mystery Celebrity party James couldn't believe that we stumped everyone by coming as Mickey Rooney and Judy Garland. He must have felt exactly like short, blonde, unkempt Andy Hardy, but being almost six feet tall, having black hair and wearing a "found" tuxedo, he certainly didn't look the part to anyone else. It was fun to do, but I knew very well I didn't look like Judy. The year after graduation James came by John Halsey Drug in Lubbock, where I was bookkeeper. "Heard old Gene came by here to say goodbye to you on his way overseas," he said. "I couldn't let him get ahead of me. This is my last stop before I get on that bus to boot camp. I just hope we both get back."

Gene didn't get back. After one term at Abilene Christian College he was called into the service and sent to Germany, where he was killed in his first battle. As each generation of war-time youth does, we asked the unanswered question, "why?" and we grieved. We wondered what this one who had such potential might have done with his life had he been given the time, and we went on with our own lives while we had the time. One of the "good who die young", he will forever stay that way for me, "good and young."

James got back, thankfully. I didn't see him but I heard from him. In a small-world coincidence Tom gave him a ride from Lubbock to Abernathy early one morning right after the war, told him who he was, and James sent me a message. "Tell her I'm getting married, too," he said proudly. "To a nurse, a redheaded nurse. She knows I've. always had a taste for red-heads."

He was right, I knew he had it, but knowing his taste for paste, I never knew just how complimented to feel about it.

The boys in first grade---I guess you don't ever forget them.

New law tightens auto registration

Beginning Sept. 1, the simple matter of registering a motor vehicle in Texas will become a little more complicated.

As of that date, the owner of a motor vehicle must submit proof of financial responsibility with an application for initial registration, renewal of registration or transfer of registration. Also for the first time, Texans will have to show proof of insurance to receive or renew their

The change is a result of insurance reform enacted by the 72nd Legislature.

"Many states have found that tying these responsibilities to proof of insurance inceases compliances with mandatory liability law," said Arnold Oliver, engineer-director of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation. "But the Legislature was really responding to public pressure. Insured driver's--that's about 75 percent of us--wanted to tighten enforcement on the other 25 percent.

The most common evidence of financial responsibility is a liability insurance card issued to the policyholder by the insrurance company. Examples of other types of acceptable proof include insurance policies and binders, pool coverage documents, certificates of self-insurance and certificates of bond.

The new law applies to registration handled in person or by mail. The original or a photocopy of the evidence will satisfy the requirement of proof of financial responsibility. All original documentation will be returned.





(Note: The following is one of a series of stories by noted wildlife photographer Wyman Meinzer offered by Haskell Save-A-\$ for your enjoyment.)

I recently visited with biologist from South Carolina who told me of a wildlife commissioners meeting where a person was present who wanted to have the dove listed as a song bird. do you know what this means? Forget the future of dove hunting if people like this are allowed to get a foothold in the door. But do you know that we are closer than you might think to this very thing happening, especially with other game species that we have taken for granted over the years. And do you know who is responsible for this mentality perpetuating itself in our state? The answer is simple. Too many men, women, and children are allowed in the field who have no concept of the word sportsmanship. I am sure that we all know at least one person who is guilty of killing three limits of birds on the opening day of the season. I could make a list right now of the many so called "hunters" who annually take many times their legal limit of game. We as sportsmen and women must realize that our manners afield are being closely scrutinized by those who would like to see this age old privilege taken away. The hunting seasons of 1991 will soon be under way in the rolling plains. I urge you all to remember that hunting etiquette is critical to the survival of this annual ritual that we seem to now take for granted. Stop shooting when you've taken your limit of birds or deer. Please respect the landowners requests when excercising your privilege to hunt. Do not leave empty shell casings afield. Empty soft drink containers lying about only alienates the people who placed trust in you. Alcohol and firearms do not miss. Enjoy the outdoors in a natural state of mind. Leave the liquor for after hours. What we practice today could very well be our savior tomorrow...or our downfall. Wyman Meinzer
