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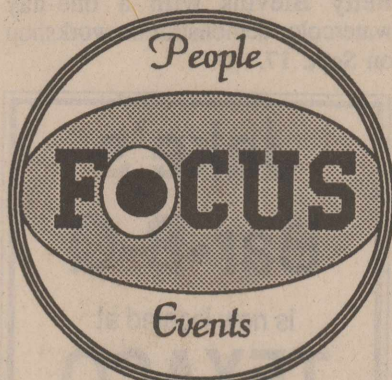

## City lowers taxes 41 percent; hikes utilities \$3.50 per month

A tax rate of 16.85 cents has been proposed by the Haskell City Council for the new tax year beginning Oct. 1.

The proposed rate, adopted at a meeting of the council last Thursday, represents an 11.78-cent decrease over this year's rate of 28.63. But because of last spring's passage of an additional half-cent city sales tax, the new rate is 2.33 cents above the effective tax rate, an increase modest enough to exempt the city from a rollback.

City administrator Bob Baker said the decrease in city property taxes this year is 41 percent. He pointed out that the average homeowner in Haskell will see his/her city taxes decrease from \$65.50 to \$38.48, based on an average home appraisal of \$22,900.

A public hearing on the 1991-92 city budget and tax rate is scheduled for 7 a.m. next Thursday (Sept. 12).

## Banana split

## What a 'split'!

It may not qualify for the Guinness Book of World Records, but no one will dispute Randy McLelland's claim that it was the biggest banana split ever prepared in Haskell.

McLelland listed it officially as 99 feet and 8 inches in length.

The huge concoction was fabricated last Wednesday as an incentive to attract young people to a back-to-school get-together at the First Baptist Church.

It worked. Youth attendance was 128. And 35 or 40 adults also attended.

McLelland, the church's youth director, said 10 10-foot sections of guttering, stretch-

ing diagonally across the family activity center's gym, were used for the container. The guttering was lined with aluminum foil.

First, a case of bananas was used. Then came 60 quarts of ice cream, 10 cans of whipped cream, six large bottles of chocolate syrup, 300 or 400 cherries and "gobs" of pecans.

Then the kids were turned loose. After various games, such as a pig-out contest, the entire thing was consumed in short order.

In calculating the length, McLelland said he subtracted four inches from the 100 feet of guttering to allow for the overlaps on the two ends.

## Football

### Indians open season at Munday

Opening of the new football season Friday night means the same thing it has meant for years--the Haskell Indians will meet the Munday Moguls.

Indian Coach Walter Hargrove will send his young, inexperienced charges against another Munday powerhouse. The game will be played at Munday, with kickoff scheduled for 7:30.

The Indians will field a starting offensive lineup containing three seniors, three juniors and five sophomores. On defense, the starting lineup will come from five seniors, four juniors and three sophomores.

But Hargrove said the Indians are ready. "Our attitude is real good and the boys think they can play with Munday."

The Moguls, who lost last year in the state finals, are led by 190-pound tailback Bobby Dockins, one of the top 1A players in the state. Hargrove said the Moguls don't have the speed they've had in recent years, due to the departure of Terry and Perry Collier, the twin terrors who are now playing for the University of Oklahoma. "But they have a lot of good players, tradition and great coaching," the coach said.

Sophomore Mart Guess will lead the Indian offense from the quarterback position. He has been impressive in the preseason and shows signs of developing into a good passer. His chief targets are Jonathon Tatum, sophomore; Johnny Rodriguez, senior; and Tony Isbell, junior. Fullback Jason Torres, sophomore, also is expected to be a prime receiver.

Tailback Cody Josselet, a junior, will probably carry the biggest running load. Other starting backs are fullback Torres and wingback

Robert Huff, a sophomore. Isaac Swann, senior, also will see action at tailback.

Up front, the offensive starters will be Heath McMeans, senior, at center; Mike Layland, senior, at right guard; Edgar Nava, junior, at left guard; Jimmy Johnston, senior, at right tackle; Will Duniven, sophomore, at left tackle; Isbell at tight end; Tatum and Rodriguez at split ends.

The defense will find Layland and Nava at tackles; Johnston and McMeans at ends; Josselet at middle linebacker; Torres and Isbell at outside linebackers; Tatum and

Swann at safeties; and Johnny and Joseph Rodriguez (junior) and Robert Huff at the corners.

Hargrove said that last Thursday's scrimmage at Knox City proved beneficial. "We did a lot of good things," said the coach, "and did some things wrong we didn't expect. But we improved as we went along."

Hargrove said he thinks the Indians can match the Moguls in talent man-for-man, except for Dockins. "And our boys can play and they believe they can win. They are determined not to have another 2-8 season."

The Drug Store will have an open house from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Friday. The public is invited to come by and meet the Merediths.

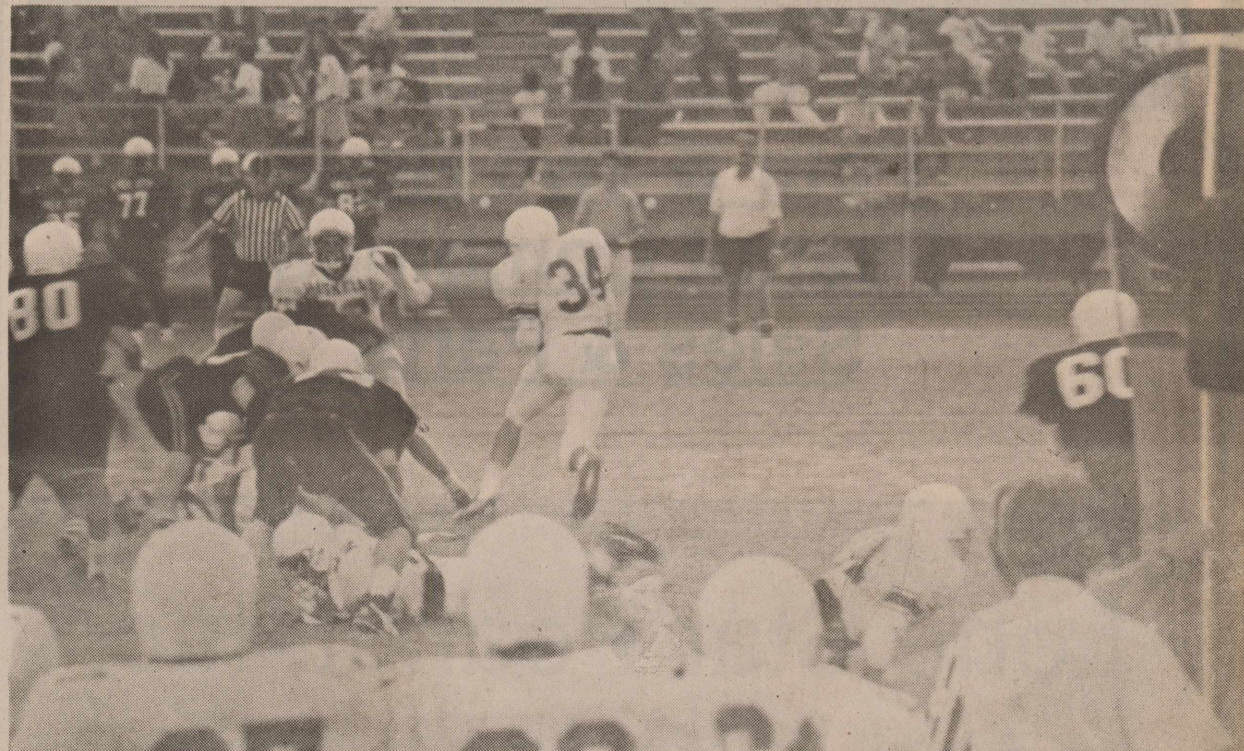
## Greenwood turns in his resignation

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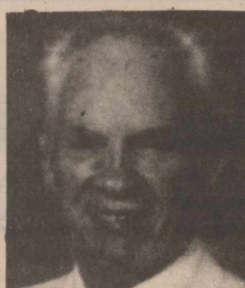

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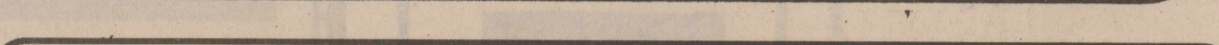
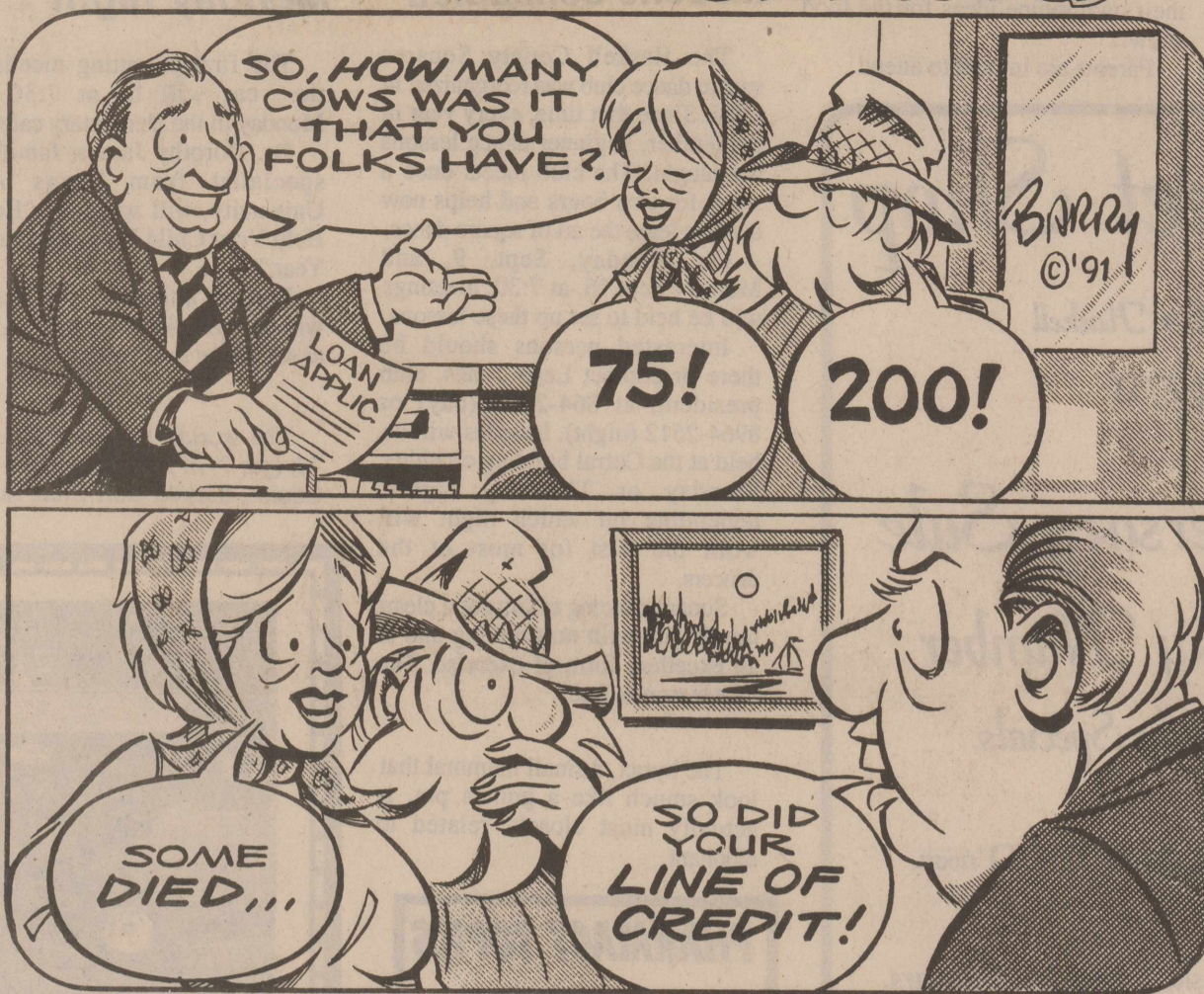

### Why not donate?

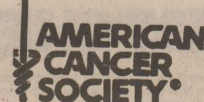

## Mary Kaigler: From the Inside Out

"The smallest worm will turn--- being trodden upon," said William Shakespeare. He's probably right, but do you suppose that Shakespeare ever saw as many worms needing to be "trodden upon" as we're experiencing this year? With most of them being in places that can't be troddeth, we have been just about up to our tatus in them.

For such an unlikely little creature to wreak so much havoc and cause so much anguish is inconceivable and can only be explained by "strength in numbers."

Sprayed, flayed and probably prayed over they have flaunted their hedonistic lifestyle in spite of it all, right here in River City, munching their way through two crops of mulberry leaves with countless other vegetation going down for dessert. In desperation, trees have been silver-taped, greased and shampooed with detergent, only to have the beasties re-emerge refreshed, fluffy-clean, crawling with confidence on little Vaseline, chap-free legs, ready for another pig-out orgy on new-crop tender leaves.

They're back! The Fuzzy Peril, the new Haskell Rascals. They haunt dreams and cause otherwise stable grown men to lose their cool, utter four-letter words and take to the streets, sidewalks and driveways with vengeance and brooms in one-on-one confrontation with them. Frustration prevails. And yet another generation of prolific moths is predicted before frost.

What a conversation piece this crisis has given us! It's discussed at every gathering and meeting of citizenry---planned or chance. No one knows how to successfully deal with it but everyone knows the problem. How can there be time for concern about Russia's fight for freedom or other world-shaking problems when there is this tempest in our own teapot of having to fight both webworms and City Hall in the same summer? Neither shows signs of letting up. Is there no respite? No rest for the weary?

If things continue unabated we may have to institute a weekly support group for victims and survivors of these local wars. Maybe it would be helpful for us to form a "Whacking Organization to Remove Marauders", or WORM (for short), conceivably covering a wide spectrum of problems; or toward a more specific crisis a "Seniors Holding Against Future Taxes", or SHAFT. Each could be a sort of group therapy session; an all-inclusive Crawlies Anonymous to help those suffering from either Woolly-Worm-Willies or We-Know-What-We-Need-And-This-Ain't-It Trauma, or heaven help them, from both.

During a different war Ernie Pyle said, "I write from the worm's-eye point of view." In this local war, from their little black eye's point of view the critters are each day only doing to the fullest the thing life equipped and intended them to do--- to consume their environment from around themselves with no thought for their kind's future. We may not learn how to efficiently stop them, but we might learn the larger lesson of how powerful a force for good we could be if we each day did to the fullest the thing life has equipped and intended us to do. Certainly it isn't to undermine our own existence by using up in unthinking consumerism our natural and economic resources; jeopardizing a sound future tomorrow by unwisely affording ourselves the luxury of a beautiful "mulberry leaf" today.

Can you imagine the power for greater good in providing better services and helps for daily living that could be generated if people pooled their highest resolve and best motivations the way the webworms do their wanton "me"ism. Talk about "strength in numbers!"

Maybe the worm needs to turn, in more ways than one.

### MANAGING IN A RECESSION

Although some forecasters see glimmers on the horizon, most agree that recovery from the current recession will be slow. The key to your company's survival in a recession is to respond quickly to the downturn, and choose the RIGHT response for your company's situation.

Most companies work from a prepared business plan during periods of growth. But few have a plan prepared in advance that helps them manage in a recession. Having a strategic plan in place during a downturn will help you make changes rapidly and adjust proportionally to decreased demand. Here are some steps you can take to get your plan in place now.

**Institute "zero-based" budgeting.** Resist the easy, across-the-board cuts, and develop a budget from scratch recognizing the relative productivity of each department. You'll end up with a plan for downsizing that cuts nonproductive areas and saves those that contribute the most to profitability.

**Take stock of your inventories.** Is it time to convert inventories to cash, even if it means reducing the sales price and gross margin?

**Revise credit policies.** Loose credit in a recession increases your risk of bad debts, further depleting cash reserves.

**Shore up relationships with suppliers and customers.** Make contact with important customers and vendors to solidify relationships and work out plans to survive the downturn.

**Manage your cash.** Lack of liquidity is a key factor in most business failures. Some effective cash management techniques include: reducing receivables, speeding collections with early payment discounts, making payment on payables no sooner than the due date, lowering excess inventory, and investing excess cash.

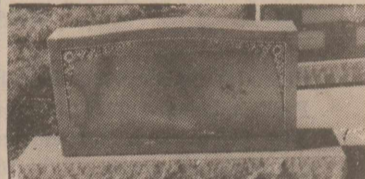
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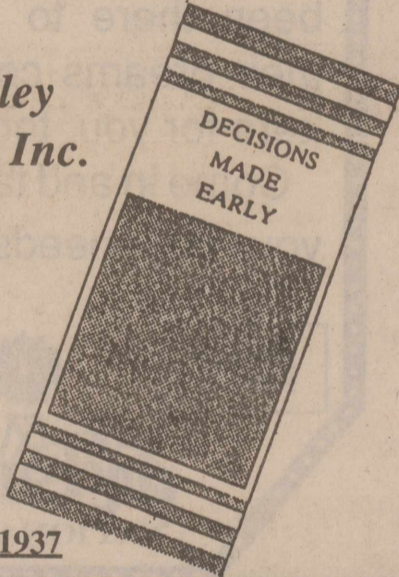

On June 28, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Southwestern Bell) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) to add a new optional service offering for business Private Branch Exchange (PBX) Trunk customers called Digital Loop Service. The application has been assigned Docket No. 10461.

Digital Loop Service provides digital transmission of circuit switched voice and data communications between the customer's premises and the central office. This service allows the customer to use a 1.544 Mbps facility capable of delivering up to 24 line terminations. Southwestern Bell will provide Digital Loop Service within the customer's serving central office where facilities are available.

If approved by the Commission, the rates for the Digital Loop Service facilities will be \$445 per month for each digital transmission loop arrangement which provides a capacity of up to 24 line terminations, plus \$3 per month for each line termination and \$9 per month for each channel termination. The proposed rate for the unlimited use of the central office varies from \$12.25 up to \$18.90 per month for each line termination depending on the rate group classification, determined by the customer's location. Southwestern Bell estimates revenue of \$2.1 million from this offering during the first year.

As proposed by Southwestern Bell, customers who currently receive digital loop compatibility through facilities installed under a special construction agreement will have the option to receive their current digital loop arrangements pursuant to the Digital Loop Service Tariff or continue to pay their current charges until they make a change of location or account. Any increase in the number of line terminations to a customer's current digital transmission loop arrangement will be provided pursuant to the proposed Digital Loop Service Tariff; however, the customer will continue to have the option of paying current charges for the existing digital transmission loop capacity. Southwestern Bell's proposal to "grandfather" existing digital loop facility arrangements is subject to review and approval by the Commission.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible, but not later than October 15, 1991. 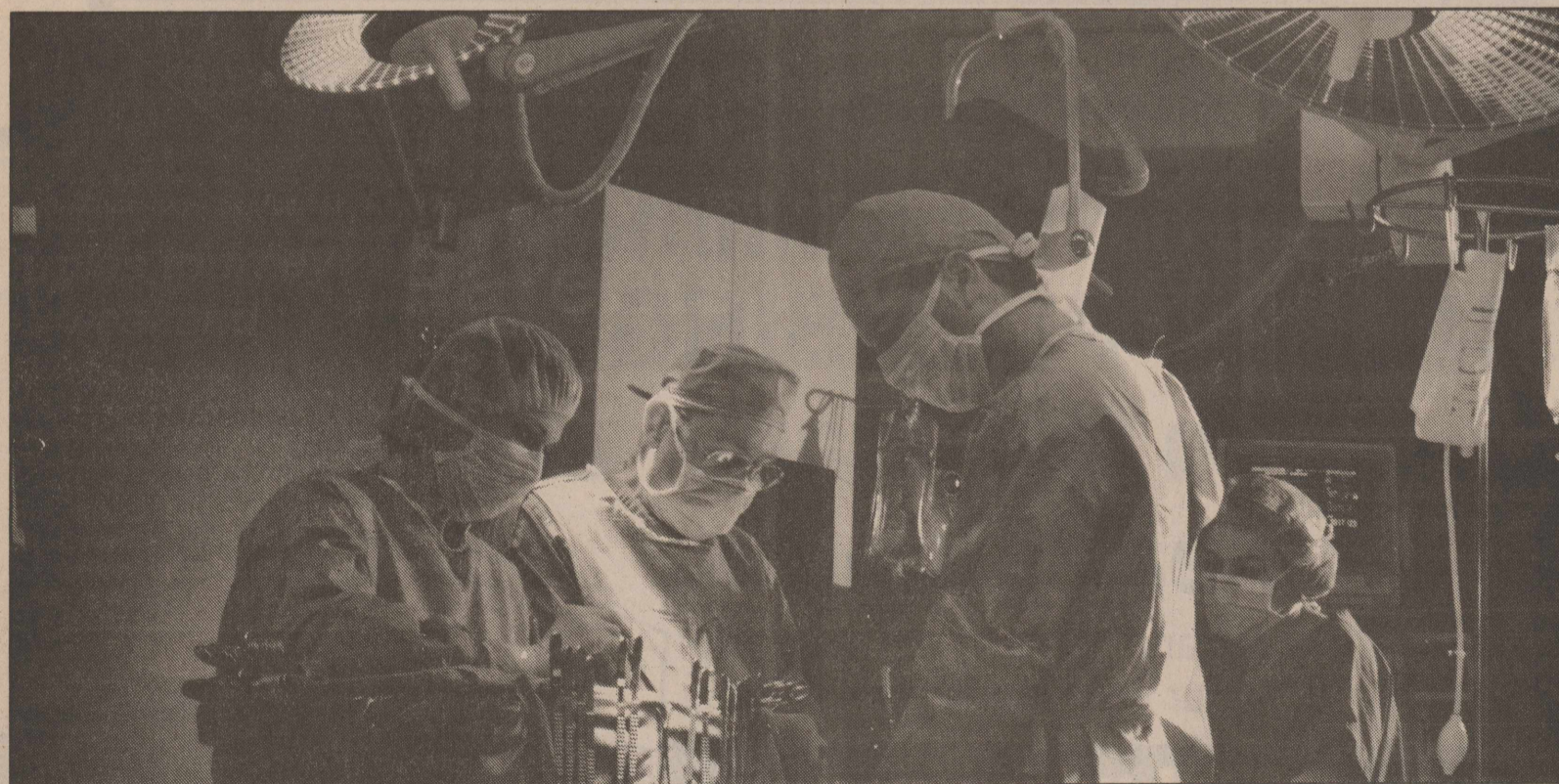

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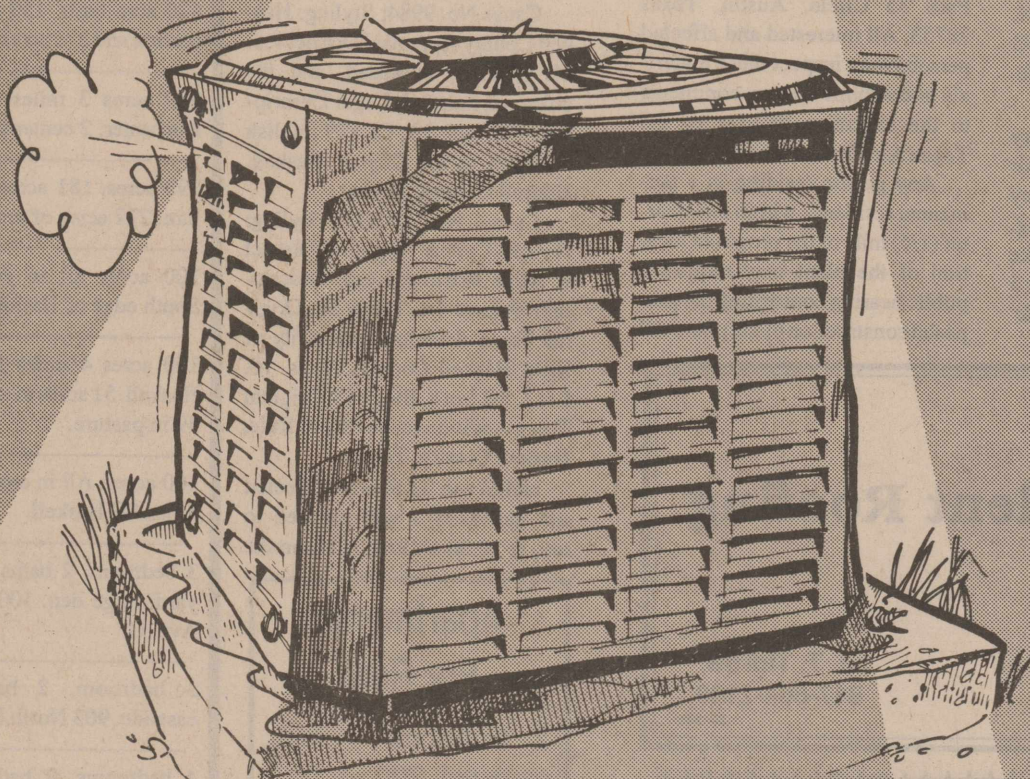
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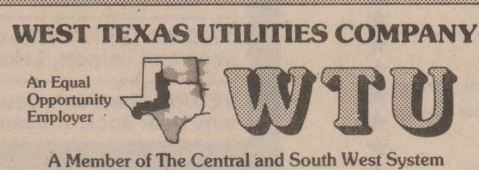
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
