Notes From The Rolling Plains

(Note: The following is one of a series of stories by noted wildlife photographer Wyman Meinzer offered by Haskell Save-A-\$ for your enjoyment.)

The salty smell of horse sweat filled my nostrils as the two horsemen and I trotted through the dense mesquite brush last week. As usual, I worried with my camera in an attempt to somehow come up with a safe method to transport it while we pounded through the brush at various intervals. In the distance the dogs once again sounded off and the race was on. Larry yelled, "They are looking him in the eye", and again we spurred the horses in to a reckless dash toward the distant action. Cursing the brush and bouncing camera, I raced pell-mell behind them, not wanting to miss the moment when this hog man from Oklahoma came face to face with this "mesquite bear", an old wild boar hog. When we arrived the four dogs had surrounded a very large wild boar. With foam dripping from his popping jaws and knife-like tusks protruding from his upturned lips, a wild boar is one of the most fearsome foes in America. Some liken him to an enraged bear because of his quickness and dangerous tusks. The boar raced through the brush as we rode up and Larry quickly dropped his rope and tried to put a loop on the big boar. Before he turned the horse to get away the hog swerved to the horse and cut her high on the leg. Soon the raced stalled in a little opening in the mesquite. The boar was making a stand. Slipping from his horse, with no weapon but a rope and his bare hands, Larry stood face to face with the butcher of the brush and, for an instant, time literally stood still. In slow motion the big hog started toward the man and quickly accelerated in to the lightning attack so characteristic of his breed. Fighting to keep the boar away from his vulnerable legs, Larry danced and dodged, but the boar's brute strength and speed quickly ruled. With a head thrust that would lift a 200 pound man into the air, he knocked Larry's hands away and drove into his legs. One tush ripped a frightening gash in his right leg and then followed by driving a white tush into his left knee. Man against beast, hands against teeth, I watched this duel in awe as the curtain of time rolled back 10,000 years.

The Steers bolted to a 42-0 lead in the second period before turning over most of the action to the reserves.

Kyle Hollingsworth started the scoring with an 8-yard touchdown run. Robbie Strickland added a pair of touchdowns on 13- and 1-yard runs before the first period ended.

In the second period, Strickland had a 33-yard touchdown run, Hollingsworth scored on a 39-yard run and Chris Carver scooped up a fumble and raced 46 yards for a TD.

After a scoreless third period, Southland finally broke the ice with a 28-yard scoring pass from Chris Lopez to Emmitt Amaya and then scored again on a 33-yard pass from Lopez to Roger Daughter.

Rochester scored twice in the final period, once on a 25-yard run by Mark Brown and again on a 15-yard run by Bryan Strickland after

Hollingsworth finished the evening with 130 yards on 11 carries and Robbie Strickland had 112 yards in 9 totes.

On defense, Carver had two interceptions. Curt Sloan, Michael Hester and Shannon King also had outstanding nights on defense.

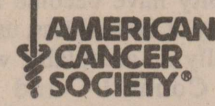
Legion to hear youth reports

I hope you have had a nice summer. It will soon be "Fair Time" and "Flower Show Time." Our 25th annual fair will be Sept. 17 through Sept. 21. I hope you will bring your beautiful pot plants and any horticulture that you may have.

Bring pot plants and dried arrangements between 1 and 5 p.m. on Sept. 19; exhibits of fresh flowers and arrangements from 8 until 10:30 a.m. on Sept. 20. If you bring horticulture, please put them in green bottles.

If you have any questions about entering in the fair, call Juanita Rhea, 864-2013, or Linda King, 864-2992, or Marian Carlisle, 864-3952. We are all excited about our fair this year. We think it will be one of the greatest.

September is a beautiful month. It is as if nature is gathering her forces to make a display that will be remembered all winter.

This is the ideal time to dig and divide daisies, irises, day lilies and other perennial flowers. Lift caladium and gladiolus bulbs late in the month and store them in dry sand or mesh bags until next spring. Order spring-flowering bulbs now. You'll need to chill them in the refrigerator for six weeks before planting. Plant in January.

I have a few tips from experts of ways to make your cut flowers last longer. Pick flowers in the morning or evening or after a rain, not during a hot, sunny afternoon. Put flowers into water as soon as possible. If you can't get them into

water right away, wrap the stems in damp newspaper or sprinkle water on the flowers and seal them in a plastic bag (creating a miniature green house) and keep them in a shady spot. Cut the stems at a 45-degree angle with two-inch vertical slits up the middle of the stems. Leaves left under water will rot, and leaves above the waterline will divert water away from the flower. Flowers that ooze a sticky or milky juice when cut (poppies, daffodils) should be passed over a flame to seal the stem. This prevents a rubbery substance from forming at the cut that will prevent water absorption.

In late summer or fall, when it's time for saving seeds, leave them in the hot sun for several days to make sure they're dry. Then place them in a plastic bag, seal it tightly, and drop it in the freezer until planting time next spring. This eliminates insects or diseases ruining the seeds and provides almost a 100-percent chance of germination.

Sept. 12, at 10 a.m., at the Haskell National Bank building we will have a flower workshop. Guests are always welcome. So please feel free to come.

Don't forget to enter your pretty flowers in our fair. See you next month.

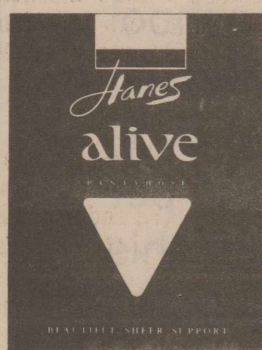

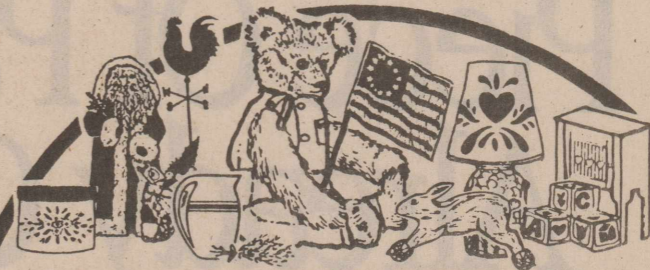

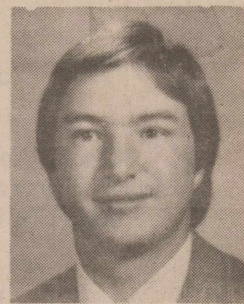

HOME OFFICE DEDUCTION

It may be easier for you to deduct the business use of your home because of a recent court ruling.

For years the IRS has relied on what's been known as the "focal point test" to determine whether you can deduct expenses related to your home office. The test requires that you use the office on a regular and exclusive basis as your principal place of business where you meet customers or patients. Employees must satisfy one more requirement: the home office has to be for the convenience of the employer.

A new test which is being used allows you to deduct certain home expenses if you have no other place for your office. For example, if you have to perform the administrative duties of your business in an area of your home, you may be allowed to deduct home office expenses. You don't need to meet customers or perform your business duties at your home office, but you must use the office regularly and exclusively for business.

The deductions for a home office can be significant, and travel from your home office to where you perform other services may be deductible. Part of the cost of your home would be depreciable, or if you rent, you may deduct part of the rent expense. You may also deduct a portion of your utilities and maintenance costs and property taxes.

If you live on the East Coast in an area served by the 4th Circuit Court and you satisfy the requirements of the new test, a court challenge by the IRS will be unlikely. If you don't live in the 4th Circuit, you can still rely on the new test, but the IRS may challenge the deduction.

Since a home office could mean significantly more deductions, we suggest you discuss the situation with your accountant if you use part of your home for business.

The legislature has enacted a statute on school funding to comply with a court mandate enforcing the state constitution. Under prior statutes (S.B. 1) the tax rate for last year provides \$4,710. per student in state and local revenues. Under this statute (S.B. 351) that same rate now provides \$5,122 per student in state and local revenues.

She has been serving as liaison from Child Welfare Council for about a year. There are 10 F/AP groups in the region; Ann Bailiff of Brownwood is chairperson. There are many problems, special needs and regulations. A new concern is how to provide funds for college-age foster children. Substance abuse training dates were set up in Abilene, San Angelo and Wichita Falls for August.

It was decided to have a display of free materials at the Haskell County Fair in the educational section. It was also decided to continue making pictures of Santa Claus and children as a fund raiser. New members were briefed on the

procedures to provide toys, food and clothing for children at Christmas. Last year, 206 children in 65 families received wrapped gifts. This was possible because of the generosity of local merchants, various civic clubs, churches and caring individuals.

Foreigners must report transactions

"Foreign investors who acquire or transfer any interest other than a security interest in Haskell County's agricultural land are required by law to report the transaction to our office within 90 days," Glenn Brzozowski, county executive director of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, reminded this week.

The ASCS official reminds foreign investors that a report must be filed if all or part of the agricultural land is sold, or if the title is transferred to another person. Failure to report could result in a civil penalty of up to 25 percent of the fair market value of the interests held in the agricultural land.

For reporting purposes, agricultural land is any tract of more than 10 acres now in farming, ranching, forestry or timber production. "This includes land in agricultural use when purchased, as well as land later converted to agricultural use," Brzozowski said.

He defined interest as any right, title or legal share of ownership in agricultural land, such as partnerships, trusts, estates or shares in a corporation that owns

agricultural land. ASCS is responsible for monitoring how much agricultural land in Haskell County is owned or controlled by foreign individuals or interests.
