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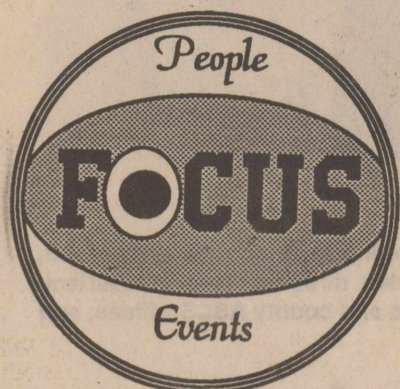

Tuesday election to decide constitutional amendments

Thirteen proposed constitutional amendments will be on the ballot next Tuesday (Nov. 5) when Haskell County voters go to the polls to cast ballots in a special election.

Also on the ballot locally is a

proposal to legalize bingo games for charitable purposes in Haskell County.

Polls open at 7 a.m. and will remain open until 7 p.m.

Briefly, the proposed amendments call for:

No. 1: Allowing cities of 5,000 population or less to amend their charters by popular vote.

No. 2: Mandating repayment to the Department of Transportation of money spent in assisting the Texas Turnpike Authority.

No. 3: Authorizing the legislature to further implement and enhance the administration of the veterans' housing assistance and land program.

No. 4: Authorizing up to \$1.1 billion in general obligation bonds for construction and renovation of state prisons.

No. 5: Authorizing exemption of certain property in an enterprise zone from ad valorem taxes.

No. 6: Creating an ethics commission to recommend salaries for legislators and the lieutenant governor and setting a per diem for those officials.

No. 7: Allowing retirement system trustees to invest funds of the system.

No. 8: Authorizing voters of the state to consider debt questions in the form of ballot propositions.

No. 9: Authorizing the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free school fund land.

No. 10: Authorizing exemption of certain property of nonprofit corporations from ad valorem taxes.

No. 11: Authorizing a state lottery.

No. 12: Increasing from 20 percent to 50 percent the percentage of water development bonds that may be issued for economically distressed areas.

No. 13: Providing for general obligation bonds up to \$300 million for educational loans to students.

Indians to meet Stamford Friday

Hoping to add a little luster to a disappointing season, the Haskell Indians journey 15 miles south Friday night to meet the arch-rival Stamford Bulldogs.

The Indians have lost four straight games since they opened district 7-2A with a 15-14 victory over Winters back on Sept. 27, their lone victory of the year to go with six losses and a tie.

Stamford is having a good year with a 5-3 overall record and a 3-2 district mark and the Bulldogs still are in the running for the playoffs.

Last week, while the Indians were losing, 32-0, to Albany, the Bulldogs were clobbering Jim Ned, 28-0.

Friday's game against Albany was called at the half after a rain and electrical storm, followed by a power failure.

The Lions proved quickly why they are unbeaten by going 69 yards

in eight plays for a touchdown the first time they had the ball. Johnnie Hudman ran 13 yards for the score. The drive had featured a 25-yard run by Buster Shelton and a 10-yarder by Hudman. Clint Chapman's pass for the extra points failed, but the Lions were out front, 6-0, at the 6:52 mark of the opening period.

The Lions took over next on the Indian 36 after a short Haskell punt. A 24-yard pass from Chapman to Hudman moved the ball to the 12, but the Indian defense stiffened. On fourth down from the 7, Matthew Hise booted a 25-yard field goal to make it 9-0 with still three minutes in the quarter.

Albany's third possession resulted in the Lions' third score. This time they went 61 yards in nine plays with Shelton getting the touchdown from 7 yards out. Big gainer in the drive was an 18-yard

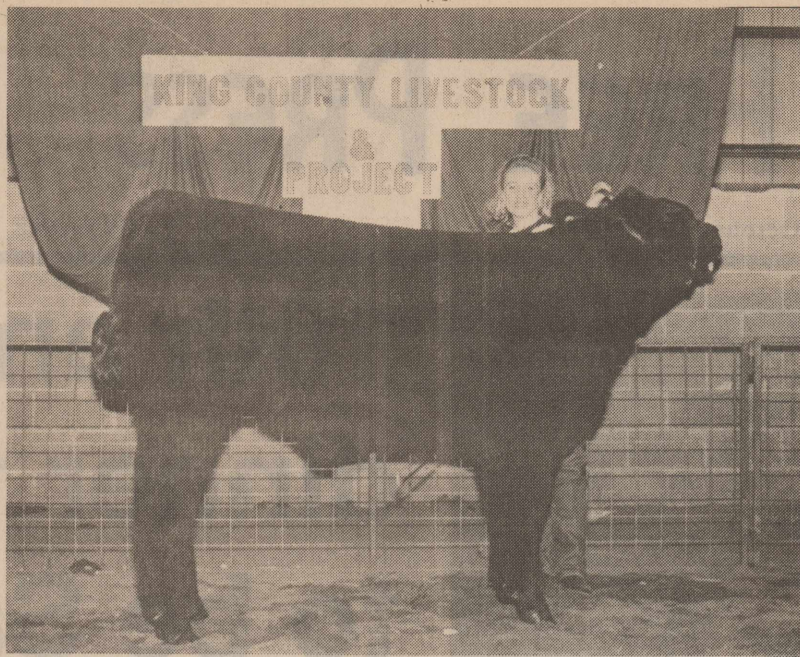
McMillin family gathers

Rochester edges Pirates

Rochester chalked up its seventh consecutive victory Friday night, but the unbeaten Steers had their hands full before finally subduing the stubborn Paint Creek Pirates, 21-14.

Playing in a steady downpour at Paint Creek, the Steers were held to their lowest point total and their thinnest margin of victory.

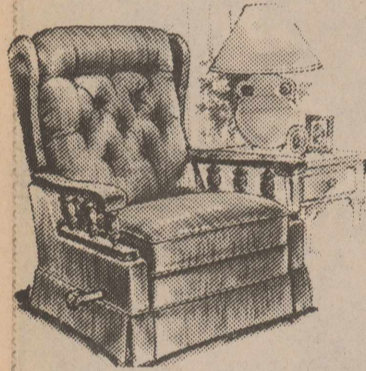

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ACU honors Pace with 'Aggie' award

A Haskell man was honored Saturday as Abilene Christian University's "Aggie Alumnus of the Year."

William Lynn "Sam" Pace III, biologist and native plants and grass specialist with the Texas Department of Parks and Wildlife in Knox City, received the award during ACU's homecoming at the annual Aggie Reunion Banquet at University Church of Christ in Abilene.

To receive the honor, an individual must be employed in agriculture, have graduated from ACU at least 10 years ago, must have made a major contribution to agriculture, and be active in church and community. The annual award is sponsored by ACU's chapter of Delta Tau Alpha national honor society for agriculture.

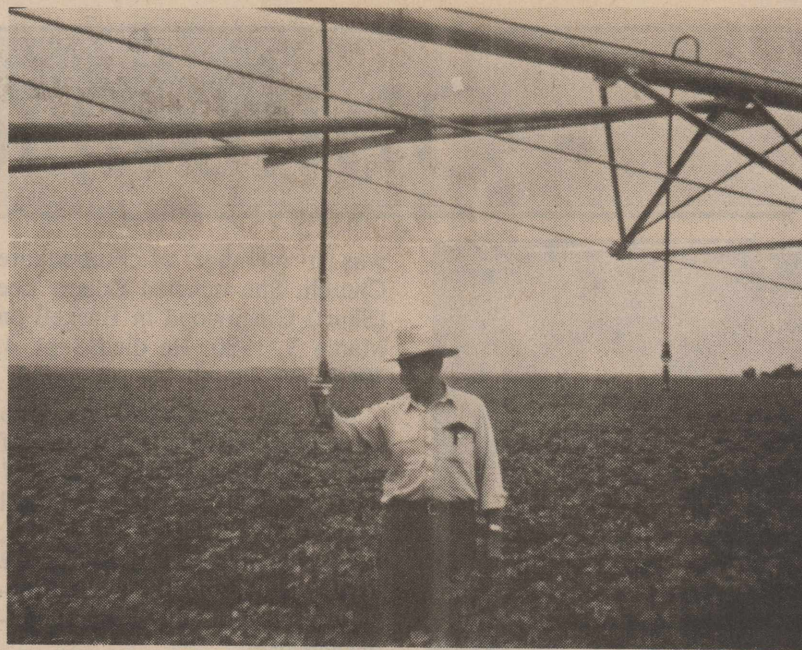
Pace received his bachelor's degree in range management from ACU in 1968. He was a member of the dean's honor roll and was given

the Outstanding Range Management Student Award. He received his master's degree from ACU in wildlife biology in 1973 and has served on the ACU agriculture advisory committee.

He has received numerous awards for his research and statewide restoration of native plants and grasses. Among the most notable examples of his work is the prairie restoration at Caprock Canyons State Park near Quitaque.

Pace was honored in 1987 by the Texas Vanishing Native Prairie Conference in Austin for his 15 years of grassland restoration. He has recently been elected president of the Native Prairie Association of Texas.

Pace and his family live in Haskell where he has served many years as a deacon in the First Christian Church. He was active in all phases of Boy Scouts for 20 years, including seven years as scoutmaster of Troop 136.

To get the most out of the money you spend on irrigation, consider testing the efficiency of your center pivot irrigation system. An irrigation efficiency test is similar to checking the miles per gallon on your car. The test tells you how productive the system is operating.

The first step in calculating the efficiency of an irrigation system is to determine the gallons per minute of the irrigation wells. Flowmeters or velocity gauges are generally used to determine the gallons per minute for irrigation efficiency tests. Velocity gauges measure the speed of water traveling through the pipe. Based on the size of the pipeline and the speed of the water, the gallons per minute can be determined.

An irrigation system is designed for a certain amount of water. Too much or not enough water delivered to the system will result in a distorted irrigation pattern and irregular crop growth.

After the GPM is determined, a series of catch gauges are placed along the length of the center pivot and water is caught in the gauges as the system passes over them. From this data the pattern efficiency, application efficiency, and system efficiency can be determined.

The pattern efficiency shows the uniformity of water applied to the field. The application efficiency compares the amount of water pumped through the system to the amount of water caught in the gauges. The system efficiency compares the amount of water pumped to the lowest 25 percent of the water caught in the field.

Amount of water pumped through the system, operating pressure, worn or plugged nozzles, system leaks, wind, humidity, and temperature are factors that will influence the efficiency of the irrigation system.

Areas of irregular crop growth under the pivot system would indicate too much water is being applied in some places and not enough water is being applied in

others. An efficiency test could show how to correct this problem.

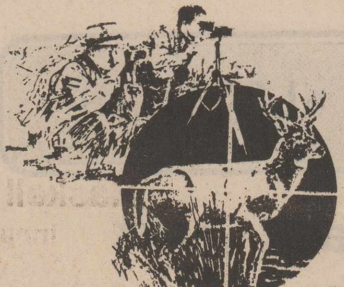
A fun-filled, action-packed day was had by all.

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Public Notice

On July 1, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas that proposes to delete Paragraph 3.4(G) from Section 3 of Southwestern Bell's intrastate Access Service Tariff, which concerns credits where a customer uses Switched Access Service to furnish a service which has been defined to be an exchange service. The application was assigned Docket No. 10463.

Because Southwestern Bell is not aware of any customers who presently use switched access service to furnish an exchange service, Southwestern Bell does not believe its revenues will be affected. However, certain interexchange carrier customers of switched access service have made claims under the aforementioned tariff. Such customers, but only to the extent they provide an exchange service using switched access, would be affected by this application. Based on claims made for credits (assuming such credits were allowable), Southwestern Bell's revenues would be affected by no more than \$1,168,962 annually, which is .037 percent of the Company's adjusted revenue for the 12-month period ending December 31, 1990. It is not possible to know how many interexchange carriers might believe themselves entitled to credits, but 189 carriers have registered with the Commission pursuant to PUC Substantive Rule 23.61.

The tariff, after suspension, is proposed to be effective May 1, 1992.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible, but no later than November 15, 1991. A request to intervene, participate, or for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Blvd., Suite 400N, Austin, Texas 78757. The 312-page book details HSU's history over 100 years through the spring semester of 1991. It contains 14 chapters and a conclusion.

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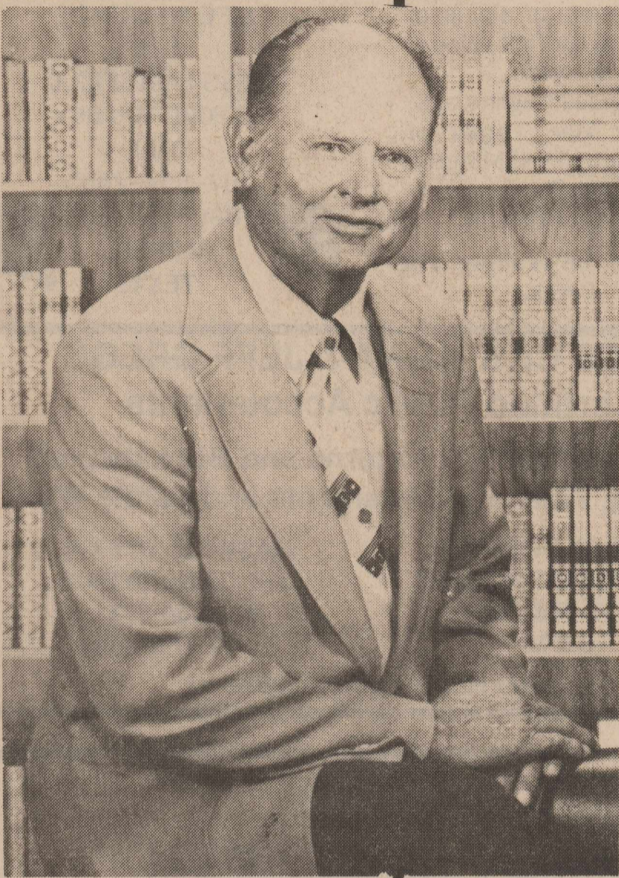

A Salute To R. V. Earles

R. V. Earles was born on June 15, 1918, in the Paint Creek community which was then known as the Post community. Except for the five years spent in service to his country in the Air Force during World War II, Mr. Earles has spent his entire life in the Paint Creek community.

He attended Post School for grades one through eight, and then he moved to Haskell and lived with family friends in order to get his high school education. In 1937, he graduated from Haskell High School where he was captain of his basketball team.

R. V. Earles enlisted in the Army Air Corps, which later became the United States Air Force, in 1940. During the last 3 1/2 years of his service, his rank was Master Sergeant in the flying command as line chief keeping the planes repaired and ready for service. He left service on October 5, 1945, which was the end of World War II.

Mr. Earles belonged to the Paint Creek Baptist Church, which consolidated with Howard Baptist Church in 1938 and became Paint Creek Baptist,

until 1990. He now attends and is a member of the First Baptist Church of Haskell.

He married Violet Slater on October 12, 1943, in Roswell, New Mexico. His three children include Mrs. Bill Cooper (Judith Ann), Mrs. Don Erwin (Sandra Gayle), and Robert V. Earles, Jr. His grandchildren are Mrs. Doug McWhorter (Lezie Erwin) of Weatherford, Eric Erwin of Houston, Aaron Earles of Haskell, and Cole Earles, also of Haskell. Mr. Earles is also great-grandfather of Mandi McWhorter and Ryan McWhorter, both of Weatherford.

Mr. Earles has been a deacon in the Baptist church for over 45 years. He taught Sunday school classes of all ages from the time he came home in October 1945. He is now assistant teacher of the Businessmen's Class of the First Baptist Church in Haskell.

For about 24 years, R. V. served on the Paint Creek Consolidated School Board as a trustee.

In 1970, he was chosen as the Outstanding Farmer by the Haskell Chamber of Commerce in

appreciation of his outstanding contribution to Haskell County agriculture.

He served as Director of Farmers' Coop Gin for several years. He was one of the original Directors of the Paint Creek Water Supply Corporation and was instrumental in the construction of the new system.

Mr. Earles has served for the past 23 years as a Director of the Soil and Water Conservation District, first with the California Creek Association which at that time included the south half of Haskell County and Jones County, and then with the Haskell County Soil and Water District as Chairman of the board of directors until he retired in October of 1991.

He has farmed and ranched in the Paint Creek and Jones County areas since January 1, 1946. His family describes him as a "workaholic" who, though he seldom finishes working, still has time to delight in his children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren.

Speeding Up Your Metabolism: Although body metabolism is determined genetically, researchers have found ways to enhance it and, therefore, burn more calories.
