

Council approves city hall plans

The City Council Thursday night approved the final plans for the city hall and set March 19 as the date to receive bids on construction of the new building.

Bids will be open at 2 p.m. on that day. The bid probably will be awarded at the regular council meeting on March 26. Construction should begin in mid-April and the project is expected to be completed during the summer.

Contractors wishing to obtain copies of the plans and specifications may order them at City Hall. A \$50 deposit will be required. The plans will be sent to the contractors by the architect.

Melton's letter of resignation

Here is the text of the letter from Greg Melton to the City Council in which he submitted his resignation as mayor of Haskell last Thursday:

Dear Council Members: For the past five and one-half years I have enjoyed the honor of serving as mayor of the City of Haskell. During this time our city has faced a multitude of issues and challenges. Through the storms of change, this community has progressed to a point of undeniable

I cannot adequately express my appreciation for being allowed to share in the impressive strides our community has made during the past half decade. To all my colleagues of the City Council, both past and present, I owe a debt of gratitude which I can never fully

It is with downtrodden heart, however, that I must tender my resignation as Mayor of the City of Haskell. I have purchased a home site just outside the city limits and will be moving in the very near future. State statutes, as you are well aware, clearly preclude a nonresident to hold any city office.

While there is no doubt that this move is a joyous occasion for our family, it is also a cause for sadness for me personally. I will truly miss the challenge of the office of mayor. I will especially miss serving with such distinguished colleagues. You are the best of the best. You selflessly serve this

Thank you for standing fast and doing what is right for our community and our citizenry. While I can no longer serve in an official capacity, Haskell shall continue to be "home", and I will aid you in any way I am capable.

Therefore, I regretfully request that you accept my resignation as Mayor of Haskell effective immediately. May God bless you in your continued service.

City has \$462,470 in cash

The City of Haskell had cash deposits of \$462,470.32 as of Jan. 31, city administrator reported to the City Council Thursday night.

This figure represents \$138,845.46 in interest-bearing bank accounts and \$323,624.96 in certificates of deposit.

The general fund bank account was in the amount of \$54,780.47, the enterprise fund \$47,532.51, the airport fund \$12,589.80, the parkimprovement fund \$15,290.79 and the capital equipment account \$8,651.89.

The certificates of deposit included \$112,283.87 (general fund), \$207,118.20 (enterprise) and \$4,222.89 (airport money market).

Baker pointed out that the total is \$23,698.03 above that of Jan. 31, 1991 when the grand total was \$438,772.39.

A decrease in interest rates the bank pays for city deposits over the past year prevented the city from having an even greater increase in liquid assets.

Last year, the city earned approximately \$30,000 in interest. In 1990, the interest income was about \$43,000.

Jill Druesedow appointed mayor

Jill Druesedow was appointed mayor of Haskell Thursday night following the resignation of Greg Melton.

Melton, who had served as mayor since Sept. 22, 1987, submitted his resignation at the regular meeting of the City Council. He announced that he is moving outside the city limits and would no longer be eligible to serve as mayor.

Following Mrs. Druesedow's appointment, the new mayor appointed Ruby Turner to serve her (Mrs. Druesedow's) unexpired term on the City Council.

The appointments of Mrs. Druesedow and Mrs. Turner are for terms which expire in May. Both indicated they would seek full terms in the May 2 city election.

Mrs. Druesedow had been a member of the City Council since April 25, 1989. She was appointed to the unexpired term of Larry McMillin and then was elected to a

full term in 1990.

The new mayor is an English and journalism teacher at Haskell High School. She became the second woman to serve on the City Council and now becomes the second woman to serve as mayor. (Franciene Johnson was a councilwoman and later a mayor.)

A native of Odessa, Mrs. Druesedow holds bachelor and master degrees from Midwestern State University. She joined the Haskell faculty in 1980, after earlier teaching in Wichita Falls and Stamford high schools.

Mrs. Druesedow was enthusiastic in accepting her appointment. "I know what I'm getting into and I want to serve." she said.

Mrs. Turner, who becomes the third woman to serve on council, is a 35-year resident of Haskell and has been active in many civic endeavors. She is head of the insurance department at Haskell Memorial Hospital.

City incumbents file

New Mayor Jill Druesedow filed Monday as a candidate for mayor in the May 2 election. She was appointed last Thursday as successor to Greg Melton.

Also filing this week (Tuesday) as a city candidate was Ruby Turner, who was appointed last Thursday to complete Mrs. Druesedow's term on the City

Ronny Tanner and C. T. Jackson

filed Monday as candidates for the council. Both are incumbents. Tanner is seeking a second two-year term, while Jackson becomes a candidate for the remaining year on the term to which he was appointed

The filing period for city offices will remain open until March 18. Holdover council members are Kenny Watson and Tony Burson.

Voters to decide

on new sales tax

Haskell voters will decide May 2 on a proposed half-cent sales tax increase to be earmarked for economic development.

The proposition will be on the ballot when voters select a mayor

and three council members. A City Council resolution

passed at last Thursday's council meeting authorized the referendum. Ken Lane, president of the

Rolling Plains Industrial Foundation, appeared at the council meeting to make the presentation for the proposition.

An identical proposition failed by a narrow margin of 131-116 in an election held last May 4. At that time it was one of two propositions calling for half-cent sales tax

increases. The other, calling for a sales tax increase for property tax relief, carried by a vote of 150-94.

If passed, the increase would boost the local sales tax rate from 7.75 cents to 8.25 cents. The state tax rate is 6.25 and the current city rate is 1.5 cents.

The increase would generate approximately \$70,000 a year, based on 1991 sales tax collections.

The money could be used to solicit and entice industry or other businesses to Haskell to improve the local economy.

Many Texas communities, including several in this area, have passed the economic development

Some county voters to change precincts

Haskell County voters who will be voting in different precincts in the March 10 primary will receive new voter registration cards.

County Assessor/Collector Bobbye Collins said the cards will be mailed well before the primary.

Re-districting of the commissioner precincts necessitated changes for many county voters, Mrs. Collins said.

And also because of the redistricting, three voting places in the county will change.

Precinct 1 voters will cast their

ballots at the St. George Catholic Church activity center on North 16th street. In the past, they have voted at the Haskell National Bank community room.

Voting in precinct 4 will be at the Experienced Citizens Center in Haskell, instead of the justice of peace office in the courthouse. Precinct 9 voters will vote at the Paint Creek school library, instead of the Paint Creek ag building.

Other voting places will remain the same.

Latchkey children need instructions

When school is in session, any childen spend time at home one once the school day ends.

National estimates indicate that many as 15 million children etween the ages of 6 and 13 are at ome by themselves some time aring the day. Child care experts elieve there are at least 1 million tchkey children in Texas, though accurate figures don't

"That's because parents are luctant to admit that their children pend time at home along," said Dr. arah Anderson, family life pecialist with the Texas gricultural Extension Service. They fear being seen as unfit arents. So, you get invalid tatistics on latchkey children in the

Latchkey children who are ictims of violent crimes or idnappings make the headlines, ut these cases are rare. National gures show that fires and accidents t home are the greatest threat, aking the lives of 4,000 children many of them unsupervised) each

Parents who allow children to ake care of themselves after school an do a number of things to help nsure their safety. Following are ome suggested tips:

•Arriving home: If children walk ome from shoool, tell them to valk with friends and never take Iternative routes. They should lways come straight home. Also, nstruct your child not to go inside f the door is open or unlocked.

•Keys: Instruct children to keep heir house keys hidden inside a ocket, purse or wallet. Make sure Il doors and windows can be locked nd the child knows how to lock

 Safety rules: Establish and post louse safety rules regarding inswering the telephone and door, laying and using appliances. Put 11 dangerous items out of reach of hildren. Check electrical cords for are wires and broken plugs and nake sure children cannot trip over

•Emergencies: Post a list of mergency numbers and addresses ear each telephone and make sure he phones are accessible to the

child. Practice emergency procedures for fires and tornadoes. Be sure a smoke detector is on each level of your home, and that all smoke detectors have batteries and are working properly.

•Check-in: Designate an adult for children to check in with when they arrive home from school. Also, you may want your child to call you at

•Friends: Do not allow friends to visit when the child is home alone. Unsupervised play leads to accidents.

•Quality time: When parents are home, time should be spent with children. Listen to their problems and answer questions.

All children need to develop personal safety skills to protect themselves. If children understand all the family rules and know about safety, both parents and children will feel more secure and comfortable.

During the month of March, the Haskell County Extension office will be mailing out a series of home study letters on "Responsible Self Care for School-Age Children" to all interested parents who request the series. The series is free of charge and will be sent to anyone requesting it.




Back surgery

The new procedure is less painful than the current type of surgery and decreases hospital time for the patient, said Dr. David S. Baskins, a neurosurgeon at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

In the new procedure, a small incision is made in the back to expose the affected area. An operating microscope is aligned to magnify the area, enabling the physician to accurately pinpoint and remove the deteriorated fragment that causes back pain.

Thigpen issues statement

The following statement to voters was submitted by Joseph Thigpen, candidate for District Attorney of the 39th Judicial

The state spent \$3,469,735 last for hospitals, physicians, laboratory, X-ray and other services.

NEW LAW EXTENDS TAX BREAKS

On December 11, 1991, President Bush signed the Tax Extension Act of 1991 extending to mid-1992 twelve tax provisions. One of these provisions had already expired, and eleven were scheduled to expire on December 31. 



study of 76 pregnancies in 51 women with juvenile rheumatoid arthritis showed that pregnancy did not reactivate symptoms of the disease when it was in remission. Most of the patients with minor or active symptoms at conception had an improvement or total disease remission in the second half of the pregnancy. A disease flare of 3 to 6 months occurred after delivery in 45 of the pregnancies. All but two pregnancies ended in healthy babies with normal birth weight.




