

Council to interview six applicants

Six applicants for the position of city administrator for the City of Haskell will be interviewed Friday by the City Council.

The six were chosen as finalists among 15 applicants for the position being vacated June 1 by Robert Baker.

One of the finalists is from Haskell; the others from out of town. The original 15 included two from Haskell, neither of whom is now associated with the city.

It is not known whether the city will make a final decision at Friday's meeting.

He founded the law firm of Hughes and Luce in 1973, one of the state's largest and most distinguished law firms which serves the needs of businesses all over Texas.

Luce's career was highlighted by the successful prosecution of a claim on behalf of EDS against Iran, which resulted in Luce collecting \$16.5 million from that country. He also represented Ross Perot and EDS in the merger with General Motors, a \$42.5 billion transaction.

Luce was a 1990 candidate for governor of Texas. He has served and is serving on many committees

and positions. He has been deeply involved in Texas public schools and universities. He was named centennial student lecturer at the University of Austin in 1991.

Another highlight of the banquet will be the recognition of the "Man and Woman of the Year." (Suggestions are now being accepted by Lou Landes, Chamber president.) Other awards will be given, as well as door prizes, and officers for the coming year will be introduced.

City, school election ballots are finalized

Two candidates for mayor and seven candidates for three City Council seats will be on the ballot for the May 2 city election in

Mayor Jill Druesedow is being opposed by Pat Henry. Mrs. Druesedow, a former member of the City Council, was appointed mayor in January, to succeed Greg Melton, who resigned.

Haskell voters will elect two council members to two-year terms and another to a one-year tenure.

Seeking two-year terms are Ronny Tanner and Ruby Turner, incumbents, along with Kim Nemir, D. L. Layland and Terry M. Diggs. Tanner is seeking a second term, while Mrs. Turner is seeking an elective term after being appointed to succeed Mrs. Druesedow after the latter became

Candidates for the one-year term include the incumbent, C. T. Jackson, and Mrs. Iva Lee Gipson. Jackson is now serving by appointment, as successor to Dickie Greenwood, who resigned from the council. His appointment was to serve until the next city election. The May 2 winner will serve the remaining year of Greenwood's unexpired term.

Only the two incumbents filed as candidates for three-year terms on the Haskell School Board. Running unopposed for re-election are Mike Guess and Bob Aycock.

City and school elections also are scheduled for Rule and Rochester, while a school election will take place in Paint Creek.

At Rule, A. B. Arnett, a former councilman, is running unopposed for mayor, but there are six candidates for two seats on the Rule City Council.

Council candidates at Rule include Sue Smith, incumbent, and Tex Little, James Marquis, Naomi Watson, June White and Ronnie

There also are six candidates for three Rule School Board seats, John Pike, incumbent, and Jackie Wilson, Steve Lehrmann, Bobby Don Smith, Shannon Kittley and Marsha Simpson.



Use Blood Glucose Meters Carefully: Although home meters have made it much easier for diabetics to monitor their blood glucose levels, studies have suggested that as many as half of the readings may be significantly wrong. To increase the accuracy of the test: clean the meter periodically, wash hands thoroughly before testing, be sure to provide a large enough blood sample, don't smear or rub the blood when first applying it to the test strip, store the strips in a dry place, and re-test if the reading is abnormally high or low.

Haskell native to lead revival

Dr. Steve Harper, a native of Haskell, will be the guest preacher at the annual revival March 29-April 2 at St. John's United Methodist Church in Stamford.

Services will be at 11 a.m. Sunday and at 7 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Harper will be joined by his former college roommate, Larry Lefevre of Rule, who will direct the music for the revival.

Harper is a professor of Spiritual Formation and Wesley Studies at Asbury Theological Seminary in Wilmore, Ky., and a visiting professor of United Methodist Studies at Lexington (Ky.) Theological Seminary.

Since 1966, he has been engaged in a variety of ministries, including student pastor, youth minister, evangelist, ordained pastor, seminary professor and administration. He was pastor of the First United Methodist Church in Roby from 1973 to 1975. He is a frequent speaker in local churches, conferences, retreats and seminars.

Harper graduated from Haskell High School as salutatorian of the class of 1966. He received degrees from McMurry College, Asbury Theological Seminary and Duke University. His PhD is in the field of Historical Theology with a specialization in Wesley Studies. His dissertation is entitled, "The

Devotional Life of John Wesley."

He has authored nine books dealing with subjects ranging from devotional study and praying to the Wesleyan tradition. He is a member of the Society of John Wesley Scholars, Wesleyan Theological Society and American Academy of Religions, and is a certified tutor for Laubach Literacy Action and Literacy Volunteers of America. He was president of the International Prayer Fellowship, 1982-84, and has served on numerous boards.

Harper and his wife, Jeanette, have two children, John Stewart, 18, and Katrina Louise, 15.



FLBA group attends meeting

Representatives of the Federal Land Bank Association (FLBA) of Haskell were among more than 500 attendees at the Farm Credit Bank of Texas 1992 annual meeting for FLBS, according to Dale E. Bullinger, association president.

The annual stockholders' event, held in Austin, commemorated FLBA's 75th anniversary of making long-term agricultural land and rural housing loans.

Local FLBA directors and staff attending were Lavon Beakley of Rule, Ernest Beck of Vera, Wayland Hardin of Seymour, Louis Baty of Gilliland, Dale Middlebrook of Paint Creek, Lynn White of Stamford, Macky Spurgin of Anson, Craig McCormick of Haskell and Bullinger.

Highlights of the year included interest rate reductions to variable rate stockholders, bringing the rate from 9.75 percent at the beginning of the year to 8.95 percent currently; development of a lending division geared specifically to the needs of agribusiness; and

introduction of an adjustable rate loan program, with rates tied to a treasury index.

In addition, the district bank returned \$14 million in patronage refunds to district FLBAs last year to help them build financial strength

The FLBA of Haskell has \$36 million in long-term agricultural loans to farmers in Haskell, Jones, Baylor and Knox counties. Offices are located at 509 S. 1st Street in Haskell.

Getting along with others

By Lou Gilly County Agent Home Economics 3rd in a Series

In order to get along successfully with others, a person must learn through experience how to communicate, cooperate, negotiate, share, and emphasize with others. All of those are built on a foundation of listening. This skill is very inadequately developed in our American families.

By modeling good listening, providing meaningful dialogue and structuring the environment to provide practice and reinforcement, listening and all of the other skills can be greatly improved.

Without these skills, one is left isolated and vulnerable. We call such people high-risk individuals.

The high-risk individual has inadequate skills in understanding and working with other people. Therefore, he is frequently unsuccessful in dealing with others. This often creates a void which frequently leads to acting out behaviors such as depression, excessive use of alcohol, drugs, or activities which do not fulfill his need to feel successful with others. Substance abuse also gives him the delusional feeling that he is relating better to others, so he is more likely to increase his use of substance.

There are several reasons for the decline in skills that help one get along with others. One of the greatest deterrents in our society is the excessive use of television. Television greatly detracts form our developing the skills to deal with others in two ways. First, it preempts other activities that would involve communication, cooperation, negotiation, etc. Secondly, it reinforces the most passive, non-developmental participation in one's world.

Through listening skills, a child learns to understand, or empathize, with the feelings of others. He learns this as he experiences others listen to him and senses that they understand him. As a child is listened to, he learns to listen. As a child is understood, he learns to understand others.

There are many things that hinder our children's learning how to listen and therefore how to communicate, cooperate, negotiate and empathize. One of the greatest roadblocks is what we have called "adultisms"---that peculiar way of thinking that we adults have. A child will see things through a different perspective than adults.

It is very important for us to listen for a child's perceptions. Often as adults, instead of listening, we direct and force our perception, often using threats, warnings and negatives such as "That makes no sense" or "What in the world made you think that?" Instead of helping him learn, such remarks make him feel threatened or think his own perceptions are not valid and have no meaning.

If these "adultisms" continue to hang as a cloud over him, he begins to clam up and becomes intimidated as a learner and waits until he can do exactly as he is told. This leads to more warnings, threats and directions as the adult thinks he is not listening or not obeying. If you would like to learn how

to get rid of the roadblocks of "adultisms" when dealing with children and instead help build skills in dialogue, listening and communicating with others, plan now to attend the second meeting in a series on "Developing Capable People" to be held next Thursday night, April 2, at 7 p.m. in the county extension office kitchen located at 101 S. Ave. D in Haskell.
