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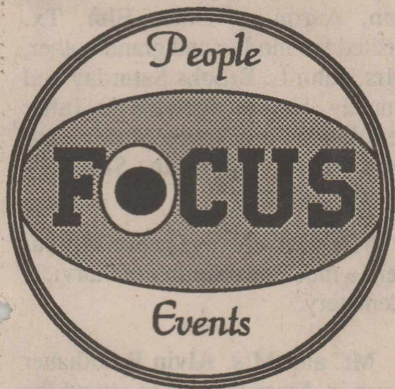

## Cafeteria prices to be unchanged

## City now has municipal judge

Andrea Kinzy began duties Aug. 5 as municipal judge for the City of Haskell.

Mrs. Kinzy moved here from Amarillo with her husband, Johnny Kinzy, who will be Haskell High School baseball coach and history teacher.

The municipal judge position was created recently by the City of Haskell. In the past, the City has contracted with the Justice of the Peace for judge services.

The new municipal judge is a native of Amarillo where she has lived all her life. She attended Canyon High School and graduated from West Texas State University with a bachelor of science degree in political science. She also is a paralegal, having coordinated studies in that field along with her degree.

Mrs. Kinzy will be on duty from 8 a.m. until noon, Monday through Friday. A couple of mornings a week, she will be a clerical assistant in the city administration office, but will be available for any duties arising in municipal court.

She is headquartered in the City Hall annex, in the office used on a monthly basis by the district Social Security representative. The new City Hall, now under construction, will have an office for the municipal judge.

## Sales tax rebate totals \$23,309

The City of Haskell's sales tax rebate check this month was in the amount of \$23,309.03.

This month's check represented a 28.87-percent increase over the \$18,086.93 received by the City last August. But last year's tax rebate was based on a 1-percent city sales tax, while this year's is based on a 1.5-percent rate.

In the first eight months of 1992, the City received \$148,125.65 in sales tax rebates. This is a 42.22-percent increase over the \$104,152 the City got in the same period last year.

Since this year's receipts are based on a 50-percent higher tax rate, it appears the City may fall short of its projected \$204,000 sales tax revenue for the 1991-92 fiscal year.

This month's sales tax rebates include taxes collected by monthly filers on June sales and quarterly filers for April, May and June, and

reported to the State Comptroller in July.

Also receiving rebates this month were the cities of O'Brien, Rochester, Rule and Weinert.

O'Brien received \$508.29, Rochester got \$775.23, Rule received \$2,143.28 and Weinert \$314.65.

For the year, O'Brien has received \$1,941.89, Rochester \$5,975.19, Rule \$12,693.60 and Weinert \$1,989.61. These figures represent increases of \$36.4 percent for O'Brien, 24.59 percent for Rochester and 13.61 percent for Weinert, while Rule's receipts are down by 14.78 percent. Each of these cities has a 1-percent city sales tax rate.

Together, the five cities of Haskell County have received \$170,655.94 in sales tax rebates during the first eight months of 1992. Receipts for the same period last year were \$126,936.07.

## City studies budget

A proposed budget, strikingly similar to the one for this year, has been submitted to the City Council.

City administrator Scott Wall presented copies of the proposed budget to Council members July 23. Council members will make what ever changes they deem necessary before conducting a public hearing on Aug. 25.

The proposal projects income of \$1,345,400 for the 1992-93 fiscal year, and expenditures of \$1,336,272.

The 1991-92 budget projected income of \$1,329,550 and expenditures of \$1,326,022.

The proposed 1992-93 budget projects general fund revenue of

\$474,550, which includes \$210,000 from the city's 1.5-percent sales tax and \$84,000 from real estate taxes. Another \$57,000 will come from franchise taxes. Other major general fund revenue items include \$66,000 as a service fee from the enterprise fund, \$13,000 from airport services, \$10,000 in interest and \$8,000 in collection of delinquent taxes.

The enterprise fund is expected to generate another \$826,700, including \$380,000 from water sales, \$102,000 from sewer services, \$192,000 from garbage collection services and \$120,000 from landfill fees.

The proposed budget calls for a salary increase of \$70 per month for each full time city employee

(excluding the administrator), for a total cost of \$16,380. Partially offsetting this budget increase, however, is the elimination of the service merit awards which employees have received in the past. The budget also calls for a \$5,000 increase in the salary of the city administrator pending the Council's performance evaluation as stipulated in the employment agreement.

Biggest budget increase comes in the landfill fund where budgeted expenses are \$171,300, compared to \$142,350 this year. Wall said more money is needed to comply with EPA requirements.

Other budget increases include

## Fountain fund gets big boost

The water fountain fund received a substantial donation last week to put the fund at almost \$3,700.

The water fountain, to be built on the north bank of the main park, is to honor the founders of the park-the Boneheads.

The \$500 donation was made by Carrol Macon, a member of the class of 1961.

"It is not our policy to publish the amount of a donation, but Mr. Macon agreed to have his name published to encourage others to give to the fund," said Jill Druessedow, project chairman.

"In a phone conversation with Mr. Macon, he said he believed the water fountain was a good idea and that he wanted to help," Mrs. Druessedow said. "We are most appreciative of his help."

He also said he challenges the

other members of the class of '61 to give to the project.

Without lights or an upgraded dedication sign, the estimated cost of the water fountain is \$4,000.

The cascading water fountain will shoot into the air, and the water will be caught in a 20x20-foot shallow holding pool.

"The fountain will honor the 27 men of vision who believed there was a need for a park and then set about making the park a reality in 1931," said Ruby Turner, parks and recreation chairman.

Donations are tax deductible and checks can be made to the City of Haskell. The mailing address is P.O. Box 1003, Haskell, TX 79521.

Contributors should designate that the money is for the water fountain fund.

## Milk pacifier can be harmful

The Texas Department of Health Bureau of Dental Health Services warns parents that the practice of calming a baby for sleep by giving it a bottle of milk, formula or juice can cause serious harm to the infant's teeth.

Dr. Donald Crow, chief of the bureau, said the prolonged bottle feeding of babies with sugary liquids during sleep can lead to a condition called "baby bottle tooth decay." The condition is a leading cause of oral health problems among children younger than 3, and often is the start of severe, life-long dental problems which can affect the patient's general health and nutrition.

**Chemotherapy Given in the Home:**  
In an effort to save time and money and to improve the quality of life of pediatric cancer patients, clinicians in New York and New Jersey taught parents how to deliver chemotherapy in the home. Patients began their chemotherapy treatments in the hospital or clinic, and if parents, child and clinician were confident that the parents had learned proper administration and safety techniques, the therapy was continued at home. Home therapy saved more than 600 hours in hospital stay or clinic visits and more than \$117,000 dollars in care.

**Loaded gun**

Editor: "Children, if you are going to play with a loaded gun, at least take one of the bullets out."

In reality, that was Texas Commissioner of Health Dr. David Smith's condom advice in last week's AIDS letter to the editor. Such erroneous advice has, and will continue, to result in teens being the fastest growing AIDS segment in our society.

High school girls that require sex partners to wear condoms still get pregnant 18 percent of the time, almost one time in five. Sperm is 450 times larger than the AIDS virus. Pregnancy can occur only three or four days per month, but AIDS is infective 365 days a year. Condoms do not significantly lower the danger of AIDS transmission. They only encourage youth to engage in a potentially fatal activity with a false sense of security.

Dr. Theresa Crenshaw, immediate past president of the American Association of Sex Education, Counselors and Therapists reports, "June 19, 1987, I gave a lecture on AIDS to 800 sexologists at the World Congress of Sexology in Heidelberg, most of whom had recommended condoms to their clients. I asked if they had available the partner of their dreams, but knew that person had the virus, would they have sex, depending on a condom for protection? No one raised their hand. I told them it was irresponsible to give advice to others that they would not follow themselves. The point is, putting a mere balloon between a healthy body and a deadly disease is not safe."

And our Health Commissioner "strongly believes condoms should be available in the schools." Unbelievable!

The U.S. Department of Education pamphlet, "Will 'Safe Sex' Education Effectively Combat AIDS?" refutes the notion of safe sex, and its pamphlet, "AIDS and the Education of Our Children: Guide for Parents and Teachers" expounds the importance of abstinence. Safe sex can only be defined as abstinence before marriage, faithfulness in marriage, and total abstinence if HIV infected.

The accepted dogma that moral abstinence education won't work among America's little headonists has been proved false. While our policy makers have ridiculed a "Just Say No" strategy like the one which has in the last five years significantly reduced teenage drug use, the evidence is mounting that education curricula such as Teen-Aid, Sex Respect, or Fertility Appreciation for Families have

resulted in teen pregnancy rates 95 percent below the national norm, only 4 per 1,000 rather than 100 per 1,000--Dinah Richard, "Has Sex Education Failed Our Teenagers?" Research Report, Focus on the Family, 1990, p. 266.

If we were to teach drug education as our health officials suggest we teach sex education, we would have "Safe Drug" classes explaining what drug provides what thrill, correct dosages, how-to use of drug paraphernalia, and we'd pass out needles and syringes in the classroom.

**Poor judgement**

Editor: The staff of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission has exercised exceedingly poor judgement by recommending the closure of Copper Breaks State Park in Northwest Texas.

As a member of the Legislature that created Copper Breaks State park, one who attended its 1974 dedication with then Gov. Dolph Briscoe, and one who has consistently supported its legislative appropriations requests on the floor of the House, I strongly opposed any consideration of closing this fine state park facility.

It was the Texas Legislature and not the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission that created Copper Breaks State Park and it is my position that only the Legislature should be able to close a state park. Sufficient funds were appropriated by the 72nd Legislature to operate Copper Breaks State Park for the full 2-year biennium and nothing in the appropriations bill suggests any wisdom in closing this state park.

This untimely proposal is contrary to the best economic interests of our region of the state and contrary to the best interests of the state as a whole. With rural Texas' economic engines largely shut down during these difficult times, it is all the more important to preserve and develop our state parks within rural Texas.

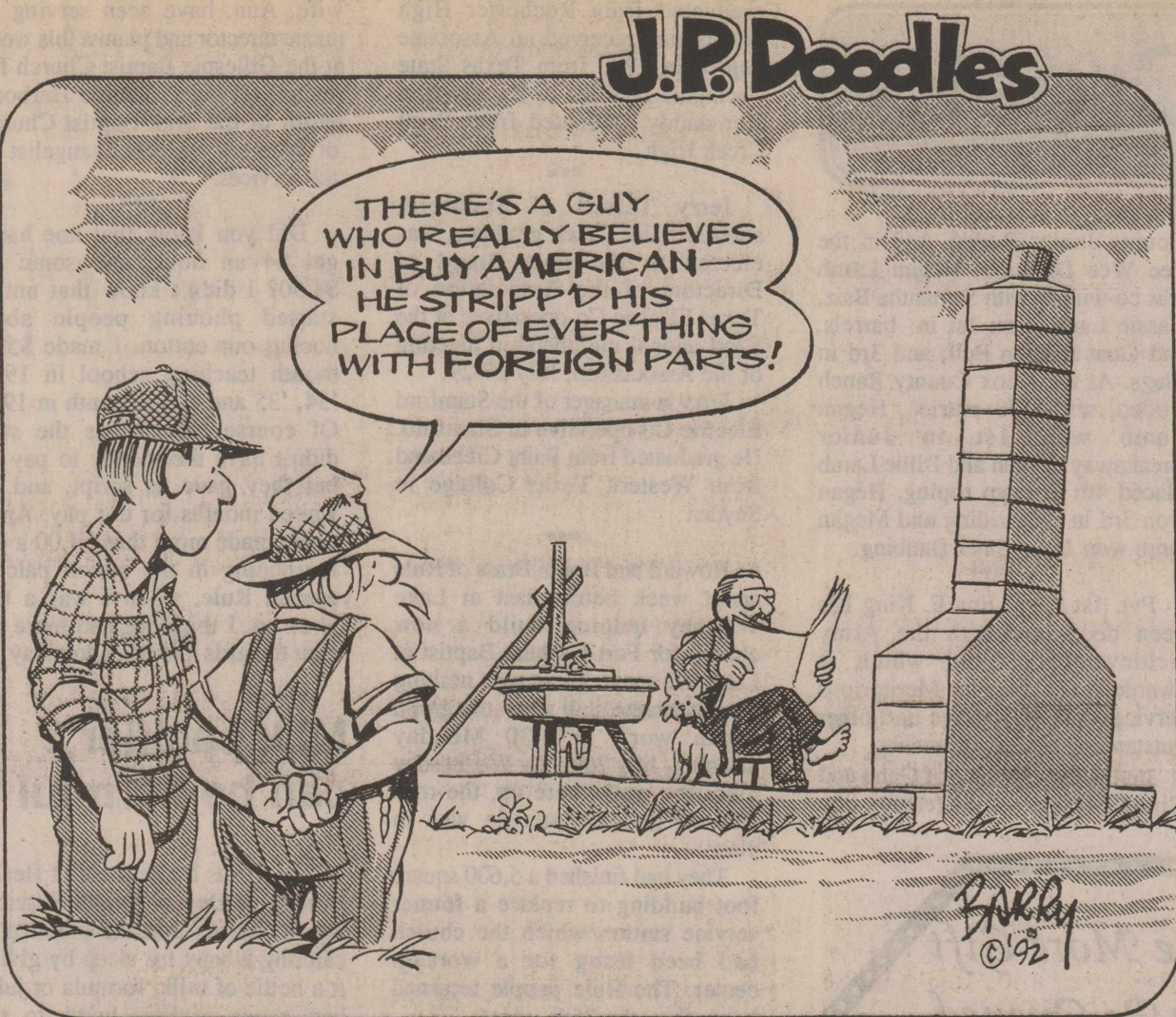

There have been substantial decreases in other areas, primarily in the capital expense funds.

**plain talk**

My grandmother called a bicycle a "wheel." To her, a movie was a "talkie." And when she announced she wanted to listen to the radio, she verbalized the noun: "I think I will radio a while."

Such terminology was common among those of her age group.

Thinking of it reminds me that a lot of words and terms that were common in bygone days no longer are used. Some have disappeared from our vocabularies simply because they don't fit today's lifestyles, others because they have been superseded by other words and terms, and some just died.

In the old days when you ordered a glass of milk, in a restaurant or at home, you had to be specific. You ordered "sweet milk", unless you wanted buttermilk or "clabber".

Light bread was that stuff that came in a loaf, usually from the bakery.

Tires were casings, a motel was a tourist court, coal oil was a fuel used in a stove or a John Deere, and a cistern was an in-ground reservoir where you captured rain water that ran off the roof of the house.

Central was the telephone operator, a thresher was a combine, a peck was a measurement used in sacking potatoes, fried pies were turnovers, and a penny postcard was a postcard that cost a penny.

A flour sack dress was a dress made from the printed sack that flour came in, and a half-sole was a new leather replacement on the part of the shoe sole that had been worn through.

A milk bottle was what the name implies, and a syrup bucket with holes in top usually contained, not syrup, but your lunch which you shared at noon with the ants.

An ice box was not for six-packs, but a home refrigerator, and a rumble seat was an outdoor seat on the back end of a Ford coupe. (Remember the song, "Oh give me a date, in a Ford V-8 with a rumble seat for two.")

Tennis shoes were those rubber and canvas things you bought at the dime store that made your feet smell, and a dime store actually sold things for a dime (as well as a nickel and a penny).

A "tramp" was a hobo who hopped off a freight train, knocked on the door and asked for something to eat.

You didn't change your oil, you "drained it" (or "dreened it"), and you didn't eat vegetables, you "put them up."

You "pulled bolls" in the fall, put the cotton in a "cotton sack" and weighed your haul on a "pea scale."

If you were dieting, you were "falling off" and if you looked like your dad, you "favored" him.

A number of things were known by their trade names. Many people called a camera a Kodak and a record player was a Victrola.

Some terms and words have different meanings today. Four-letter words were those like "love" and "hope" and "help".

And I remember a fourth-grade teacher saying she thought "gay" was the prettiest word in the English language.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission has recommended that Copper Breaks State Park in Hardeman County be closed.

I would presume the Commission has seen some kind of survey which shows that the usage of the park does not justify the cost of operation.

But one has to wonder. Of the 10 men and women who make up the Commission, two are from Fort Worth, two from Dallas, two from Houston and one each from Brownsville, San Antonio, San Marcos and Beaumont.

It doesn't take much of a geography expert to see immediately that West Texas is not represented on the Commission. Nor is rural Texas--unless you can call San Marcos rural.

The 101 employees of the Haskell schools figure out to be nearly one employee for every 30 residents of the city.

Deduct the number of students, pre-schoolers, unemployed and retired people and the ratio declines greatly.

### THE IMPORTANCE OF SAVING

Saving is like exercising. We all know we should do it, but many of us give up too quickly because results aren't immediately apparent. In fact, a survey of adults over age 65 disclosed that 51% wished they had saved more money before retirement.

The compound interest effect has often been called the eighth wonder of the world. This effect causes small amounts of periodic investments to grow substantially over time. For example, if you saved just \$1 per day for thirty years, you'd have saved \$10,950. If you had invested your savings at 8%, your \$10,950 could have grown to over \$45,000. The key to using this tremendous wealth-building tool is to start saving early and commit to regular deposits. And be patient.

Your target should be to save at least 10% of your after-tax income each year. While this may seem ambitious, it is achievable if you have self-discipline. ### -Green Thumb-

By Gladys O'Neal  
**Haskell Garden Club**  
 You can plant bluebonnet seeds now for color in your garden next spring. Before planting, soak the seeds three to four days to soften the seed coat; then broadcast them in sunny, open areas. Cover lightly with soil and water until germination occurs. It would be nice to cover with a mulch to help maintain soil moisture.  
 Now is the time to thin and re-set irises. If the weather is dry, water well after planting. Check the rhizomes carefully for insects.  
 Chrysanthemums should be pinched or disbudded for increased size of the bloom at this time. Cultivate lightly and water heavily. Feeding liquid manure will improve the quality of bloom and result in a nicer color.  
 If you grow your pansies from

seed, now is the time to plant in flats filled with a good soil mix. When the plants have formed two sets of leaves, transplant them to a larger flat. In October the plants can be moved into the garden. Then when it snows they will peek their little faces up through the snow.  
 These are some good mulches if you want to use them: peat moss, pine straw, peanut hulls, lawn clippings and pine bark.  
 The pine bark does not deteriorate very quickly and it is best not to use around annuals. The pine straw is good around shrubs, grass clippings make a fantastic mulch for tomatoes, peppers and eggplants. Work well or it will pack.  
 Compost is the best for annuals and perennials. It is made so that oxygen can get into the soil.



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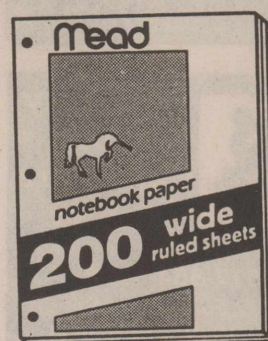

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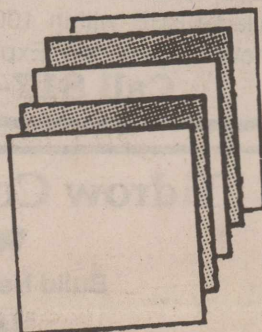
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
